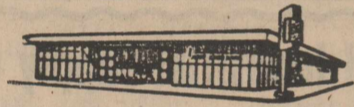
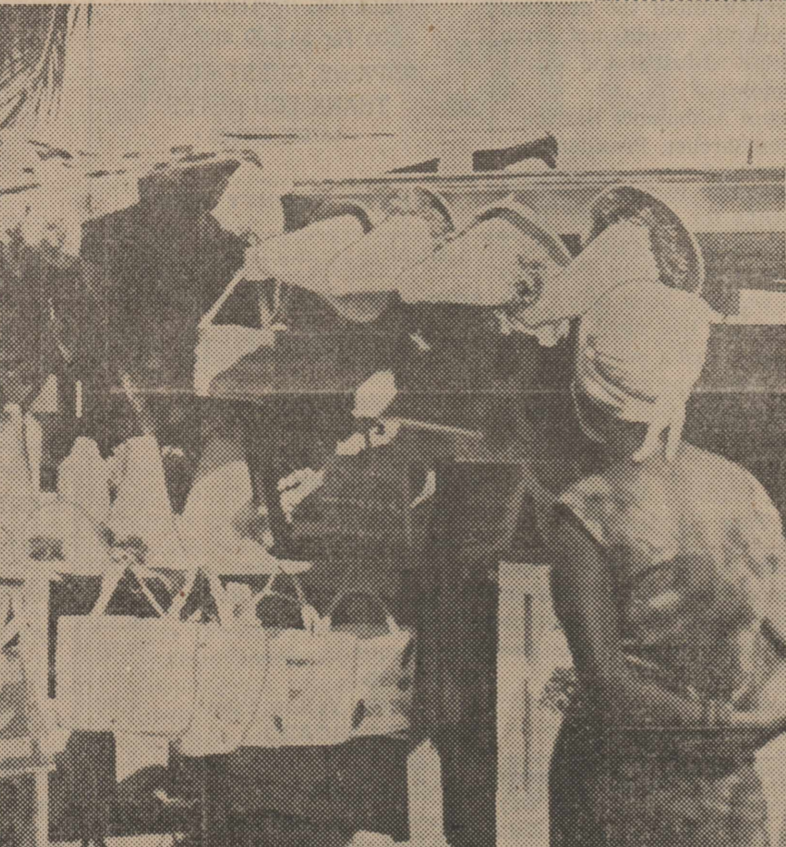

USE PASTURES WISELY

Summer annual pastures can produce top quality forage if managed properly, says a forage specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The important factor is to use adequate amounts of fertilizer. Although it is best to follow soil test recommendations, at least 60 pounds of nitrogen should be used at each fertilizer application. Proper use of the forage is important when it is growing rapidly. Part of the pasture can be fenced to permit harvesting of hay. Following grazing of most leaves, stalks should be shredded and nitrogen fertilizer applied to stimulate new growth.

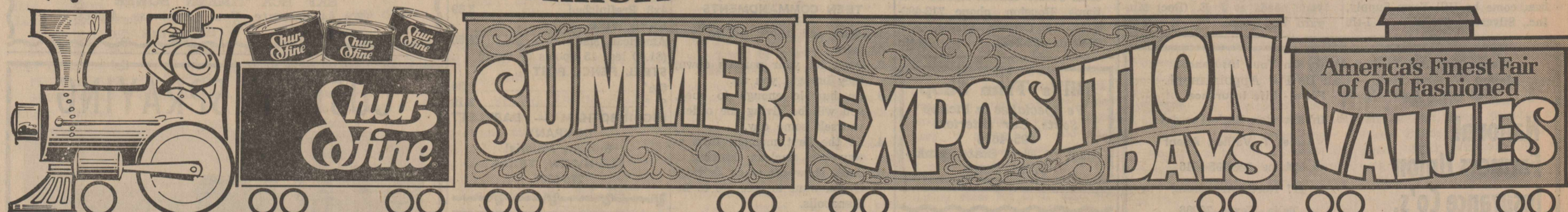
