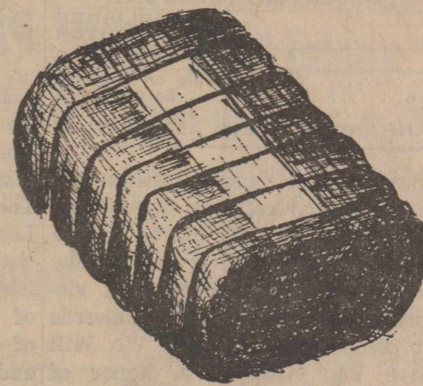
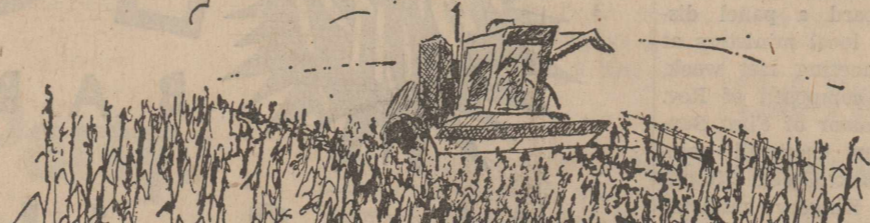

The visiting on the bus, both going and coming, which at times grew quite boisterous, attested to the fact that everyone was enjoying the occasion.



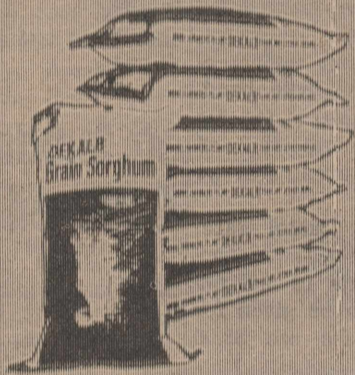
