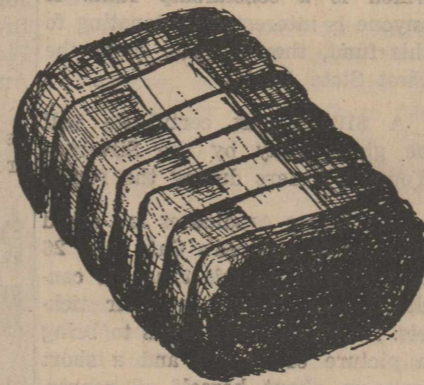
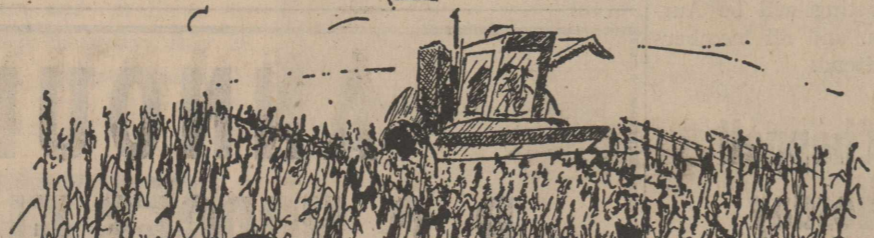

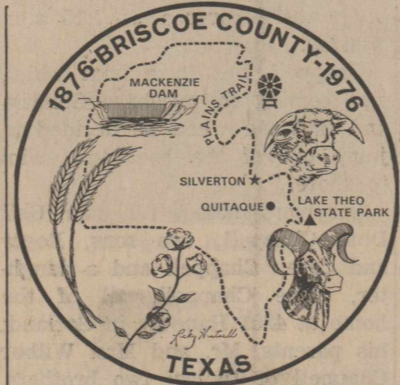

### Record Workshop Planned Today

A Briscoe County-Wide Record Book Workshop will be held today (Thursday, July 17) at 5:00 p.m. in the P. C. A. community room.

Refreshments and a swimming party are planned after the program.

Record books will be due in the County Agent's office Monday July 28, at 1:00 p.m.

Following the auction, the Briscoe County Committee will be selling unnumbered single coins in the community room of the Production Credit Association office building. These coins will be on necklace chains, on key rings, or they can be purchased in single plastic cases.

The commemorative coins will be treasured for generations to come, and you are urged to see and buy them as they honor Briscoe County's birthday.

The proceeds from the sale of the coins will go toward the completion of a book containing the history of Briscoe County.

Beginning with the 1975-76 year, the Silverton Independent School District will change from the traditional two semesters per year to three quarters per school year.

Each quarter will consist of approximately 60 school days, or 12 weeks. Grades will continue to be reported to parents every six weeks, and quarter tests will be given three times per year. Grades will be recorded on the permanent records at the close of each quarter and the average of these three grades will be the yearly grade the student earns.

Instead of making one credit per year, for most subjects, a student will receive three units (or credits) for each subject. Subsequently, instead of requiring 20 credits, a total of 60 units will be required for graduation.

The Fall Quarter will begin August 25 and continue until November 18. The Winter Quarter will last from November 20 until February 26, and the Spring Quarter will begin March 1 and end May 26.

One Teacher In-Service day has been scheduled at the close of each of the Fall and Winter Quarters and two after the Spring Quarter.

This system of school organization was designed to aid students who move from one school to another during the year. Hopefully, it will allow the Silverton Schools the flexibility needed to introduce some new subjects in the form of short mini-courses.

The Silverton School faculty will report August 18 to begin five days of In-Service training before classes begin for students on August 25.

All faculty positions are filled, with the possible exception of an additional Kindergarten teacher if there are enough students to require two classes.

As previously reported, Kindergarten will begin on January 19 and will be a full day program for the remaining half of the 1975-76 school year. Children must be five years old before September 1, 1975, in order to attend.

The school day will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. This is a result of the elimination of study halls and changing from seven periods to six periods per day.

The school dress code is the same as last year and it is hoped that parents will be cooperative to the extent that their children will not have to miss any classes due to improper dress or hair styles. When students are sent home, they suffer the loss of instruction in one or more classes before they are able to be re-admitted. Parents who are truly concerned about their children's education can make their own "inspection" before each child leaves their home and eliminate many problems before they ever reach the school campus.

It was necessary to raise the price of school lunches from 60c to 65c in order to continue to provide a nourishing meal.

The school will be operating under the new finance bill recent-

ly passed by the Texas Legislature. Governor Briscoe was very forceful and successful in demanding no new state taxes, but he has forced most school boards to raise local taxes instead.

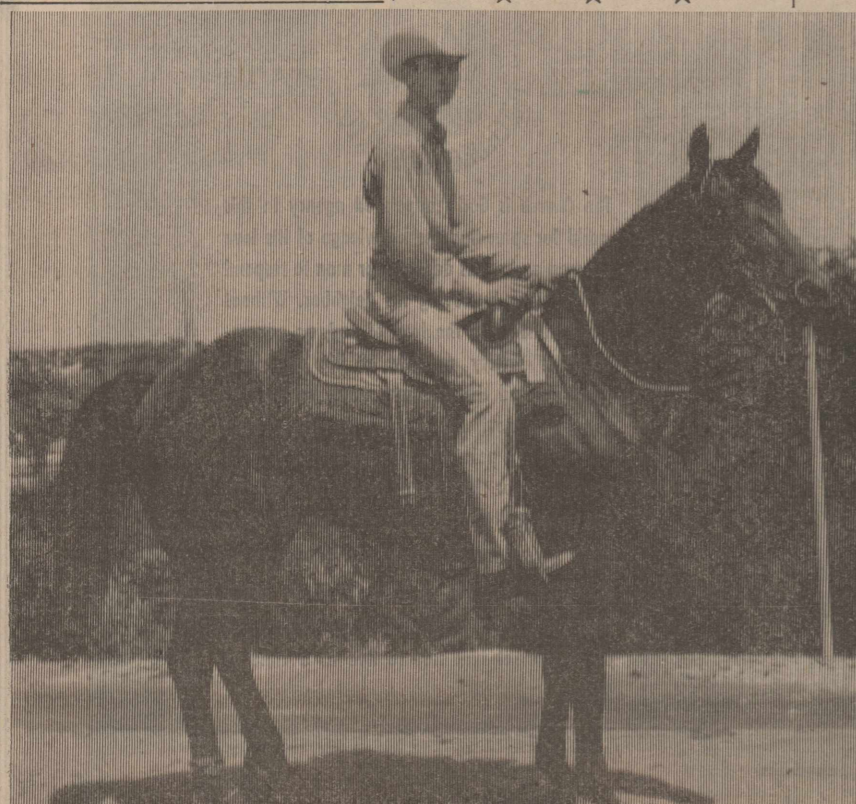

**Deadline Near For Queen's Contest**

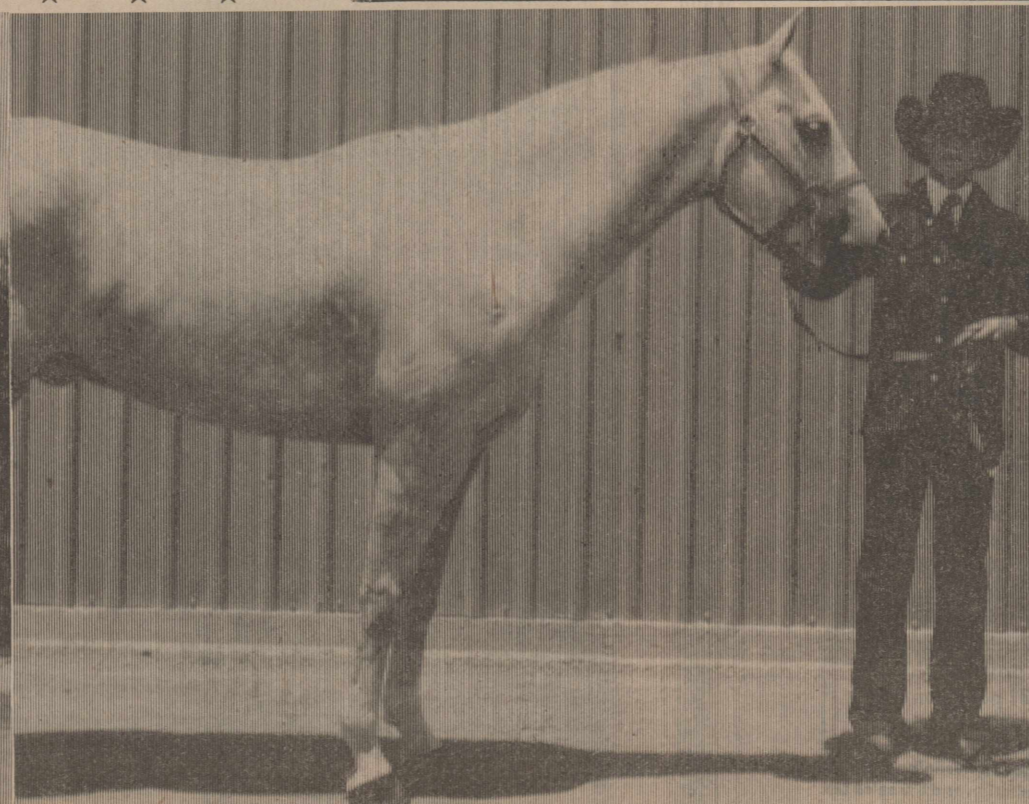
The deadline is approaching for entering candidates in the Silverton Young Farmers Rodeo Queen Contest.

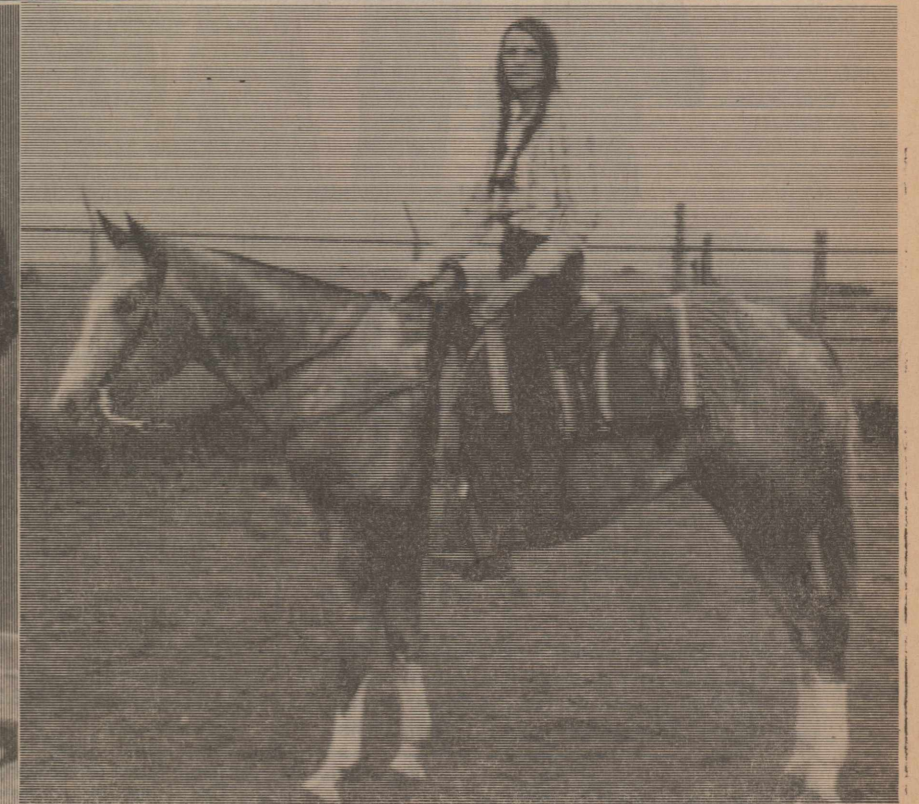
Each candidate is asked to bring a list of her activities and interests and a billfold-size photograph of herself to the meeting to be used in rodeo publicity.

## Sunflower Field Day Set In Halfway

A sunflower field day at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Halfway, 14 miles west of Plainview, has been set for Thursday afternoon, July 17.

Announcement of the event was made by Dr. George McBee, resident director of TAES at Lubbock, with co-chairmen Dr. Raymond Brigham, associate professor, oilseed crops at Lubbock, and Dr. Douglas Owen, research scientist at Halfway.

New developments in sunflower research will be spotlighted. Until now, little has been known about disease and insect problems associated with sunflower production on the High Plains, said Brigham. Scientists also have had few answers for farmers wanting to know about planting rates, irrigation and fertilization of the new crop.

Sunflowers were grown on 5,000 acres in this area last year. This season the acreage is estimated at 300,000.

Activities for the afternoon event are from 2:00 until 5:00. A series of tours plus a farm machinery display are featured attractions.

Brigham said the tours of research plots will include stops at test sites ranging from hybrid trials, fertilization and irrigation studies to insect and weed control tests.

## JULY 31 IS DEADLINE

### FOR QUARTERLY REPORTS

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded 225,000 retail businesses Monday that July 31 is the deadline for sending in quarterly sales tax reports.

"Late reports are nothing but headaches for the taxpayer and for the Comptroller's Office," Bullock said. "I'd like to see every quarterly report filed on the deadline."

Reports due July 31 cover the April-May-June quarter. Forms for the reports were sent to all sales tax permit holders by Bullock's office in June.

"Most of the delinquent or tardy reports are just oversights and simple mistakes but consequences under the law are just the same," Bullock said.
