Winner will be expected to promote and advertise Mackenzie Lake.

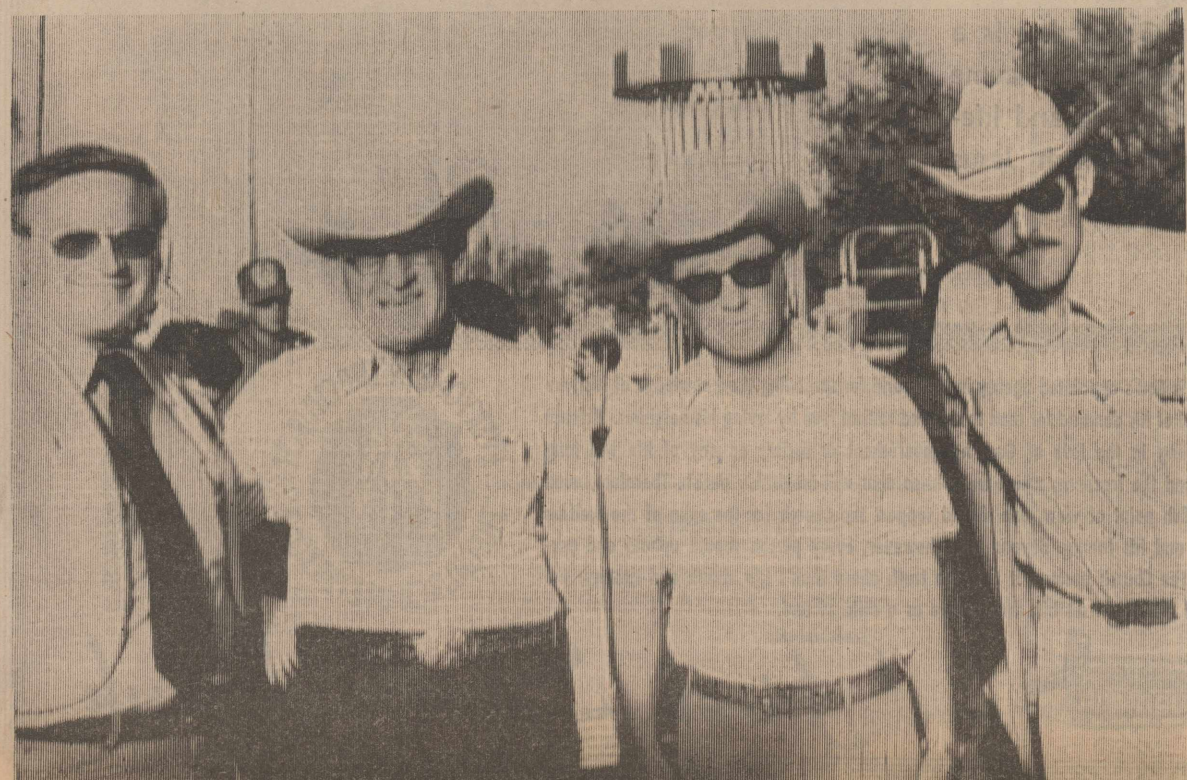

## Senior Citizens To Have Luncheon

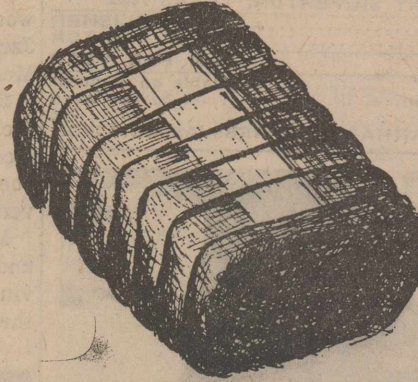
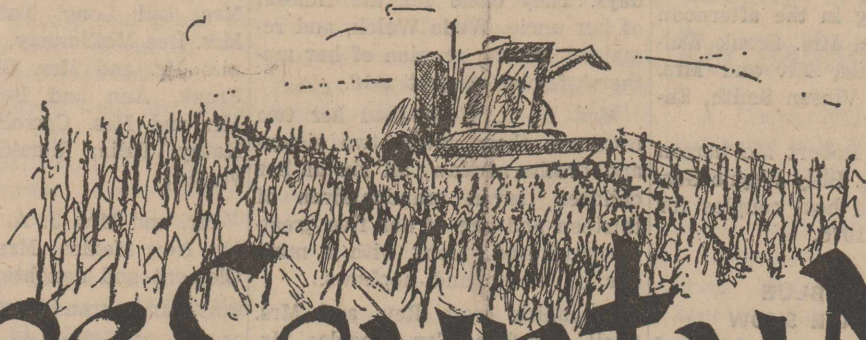
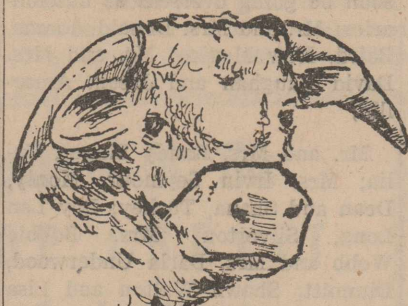
Senior Citizens Luncheon will be Friday, August 22, at the Church of Christ Annex.

Silverton: Home of Scenic Lake Mackenzie

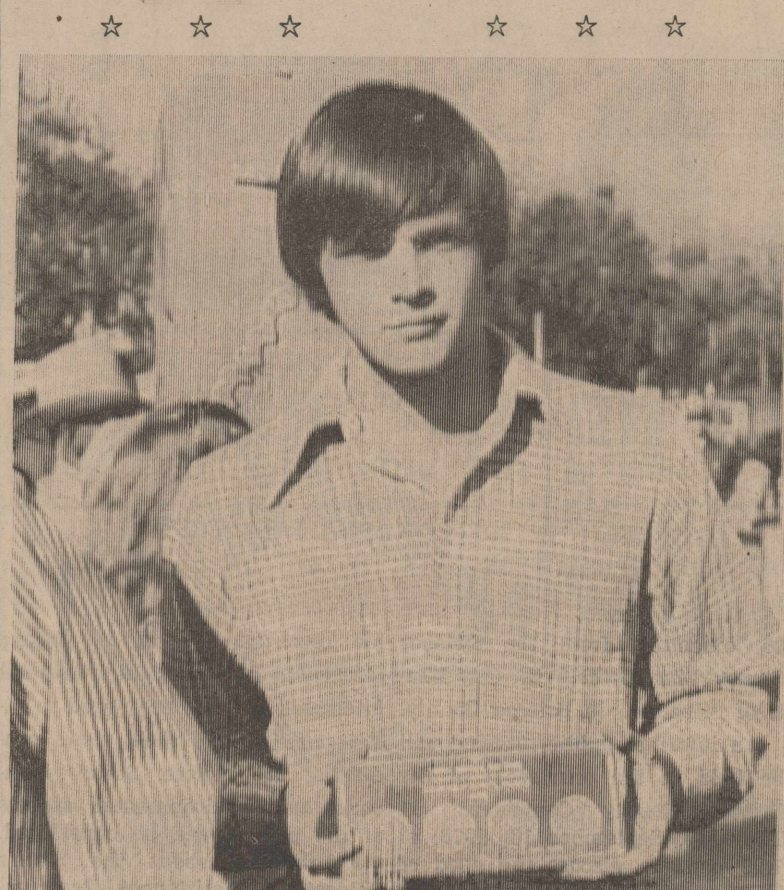

According to many who gathered in Silverton to take part in the celebration of Briscoe County's 83rd birthday, the affair was one of the best ever held. Approximately 1800 people were present to enjoy the old-fashioned pit barbecue and all the trimmings prepared under the direction of Wayland Fitzgerald, and the senior citizens were provided tables and chairs in the shade and were waited on by members of the Silverton Lions Club.

The day's activities began with one of the nicest parades ever seen in downtown Silverton. Winners of the Kids' Bicycle Parade were 1. Ernest Lain, dressed like Uncle Sam riding a bicycle decorated with red, white and blue streamers, \$10.00 prize; 2. Jamie Frizzell, dressed like an engineer driving a tricycle decorated to look like a train, \$5.00 prize; 3. Donna Lavy, the Frito Bandido, \$2.50 prize. These prizes were donated by the Briscoe County News.

In the floats division, winners were 1. Silverton Young Homemakers, \$50.00 prize donated by the First State Bank; 2. L. O. A. Junior Study Club, \$30.00 prize donated by Mackenzie Feed Mill, and 3. Terra Cotta CowBelles, \$20.00 prize donated by Brown Hardware.

The best senior riding club in the parade was the Swisher County Sheriff's Posse. The best junior riding club was the Briscoe County 4-H Horse Club.

The Silverton Lions Club sponsored the Briscoe County Championship Fiddling Contest immediately following the parade in the City Park where the free public barbecue was being served. There were eight entries in the contest, including Jimmy Burson, W. A. Holt and Scott Garvin of Silverton. The contest was judged by Jack Sutton, George Martin and Clifton Stodghill, and the winners were 1. Bill Murray of Phillips, \$75.00 prize; 2. Henry Lester, Idalou, \$50.00 prize, and 3. Charles Overstreet, Plainview, \$25.00 prize.

The first showing and auction of fifty numbered sets of four commemorative medallions was directed by Bennie Reagan, auctioneer, assisted by Stanley Fogerson, Joe Brannon and Eddie Holland. The winning artist, Ricky Hutsell, was introduced by Mrs. Wayne McMurtry, a member of the Briscoe County Historical Survey Committee, and was presented the artist's proof set of the commemorative coins. It was noted that of all the coins minted by the WNW Mint Industries of Amarillo, Briscoe County's was the only design which included the aoudad sheep.

The artist is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Riddell C. Hutsell of Reseda, California, and resides in Silverton with his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Hutsell. All fifty of the sets of four commemorative medallions were sold at auction.

Mrs. Cass Fowler, who was the first white baby girl born after Briscoe County was organized in 1892, was announced as the eldest of the old-timers attending the festivities. Alex Davis of Stuttgart, Germany travelled the furthest to attend. Each received a numbered set of two of the commemorative medallions from the Silverton Lions Club.

**Changes Proposed In State Brucellosis Regulations**

Interested Texas cattle producers will have an opportunity to hear and discuss proposed changes in the state's brucellosis eradication program during a series of public meetings on the Texas High Plains this month.

Scheduled by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Animal Health Commission, the meetings will be held in Amarillo at Goulde Sales Arena, Tri-State Fairgrounds at 8:00 p.m. August 14 and in Lubbock at Plains Coop Oil Mill at 8:00 p.m. August 19.

As of July 1, 24 Texas counties had qualified as bovine brucellosis free areas and 23 other counties had no known infection, according to Dr. H. Q. Sibley, TAHC executive director. Current regulations do not contain provisions for protection of these clean areas, Sibley emphasizes.

The TAHC has proposed a number of major changes in the brucellosis program. The Commission voted to propose the regulation changes to bring the Texas program more in line with national brucellosis standards contained in the "Uniform Methods and Rules" for eradication recommended by the United States Animal Health Association.

The proposed changes will be posted in every Texas courthouse for at least 30 days prior to the September 4 public hearing, said Sibley.

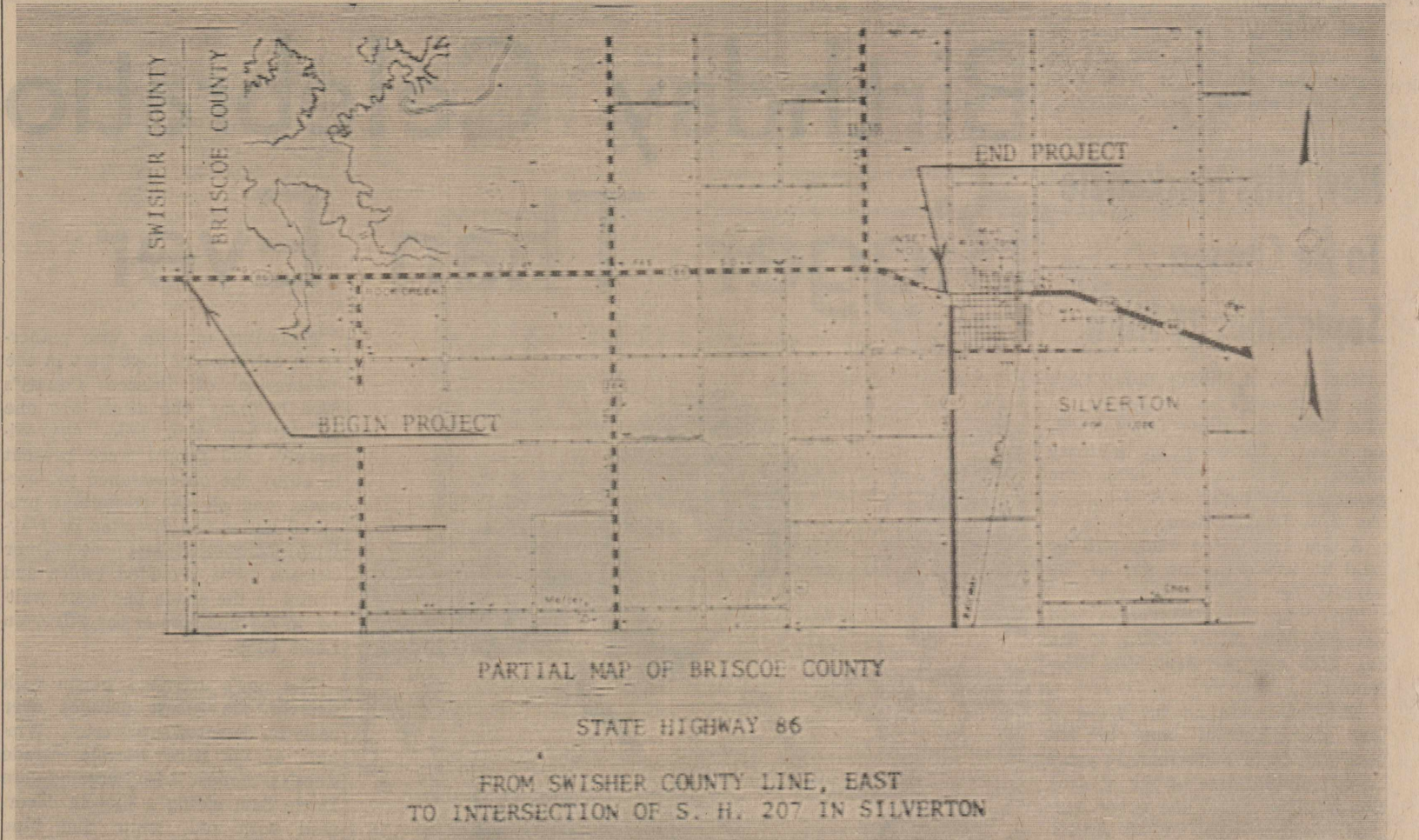
