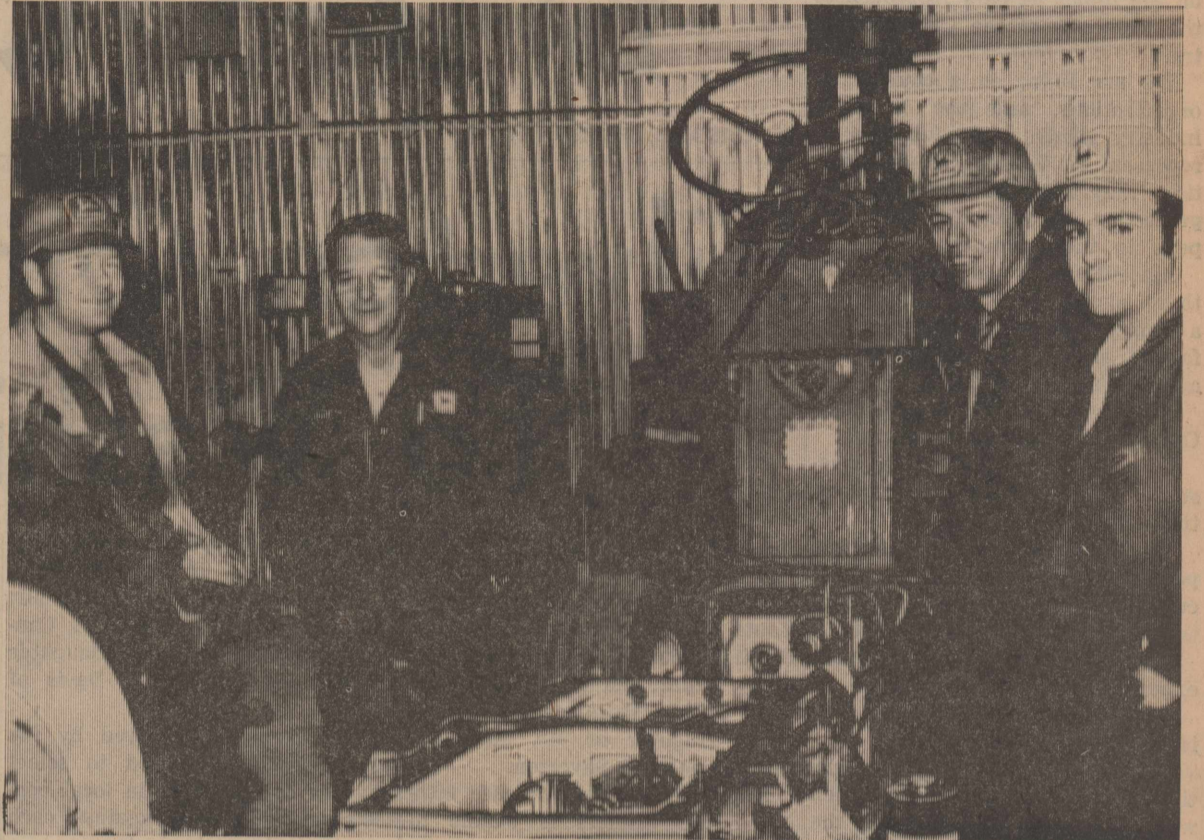
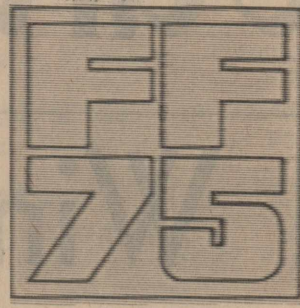

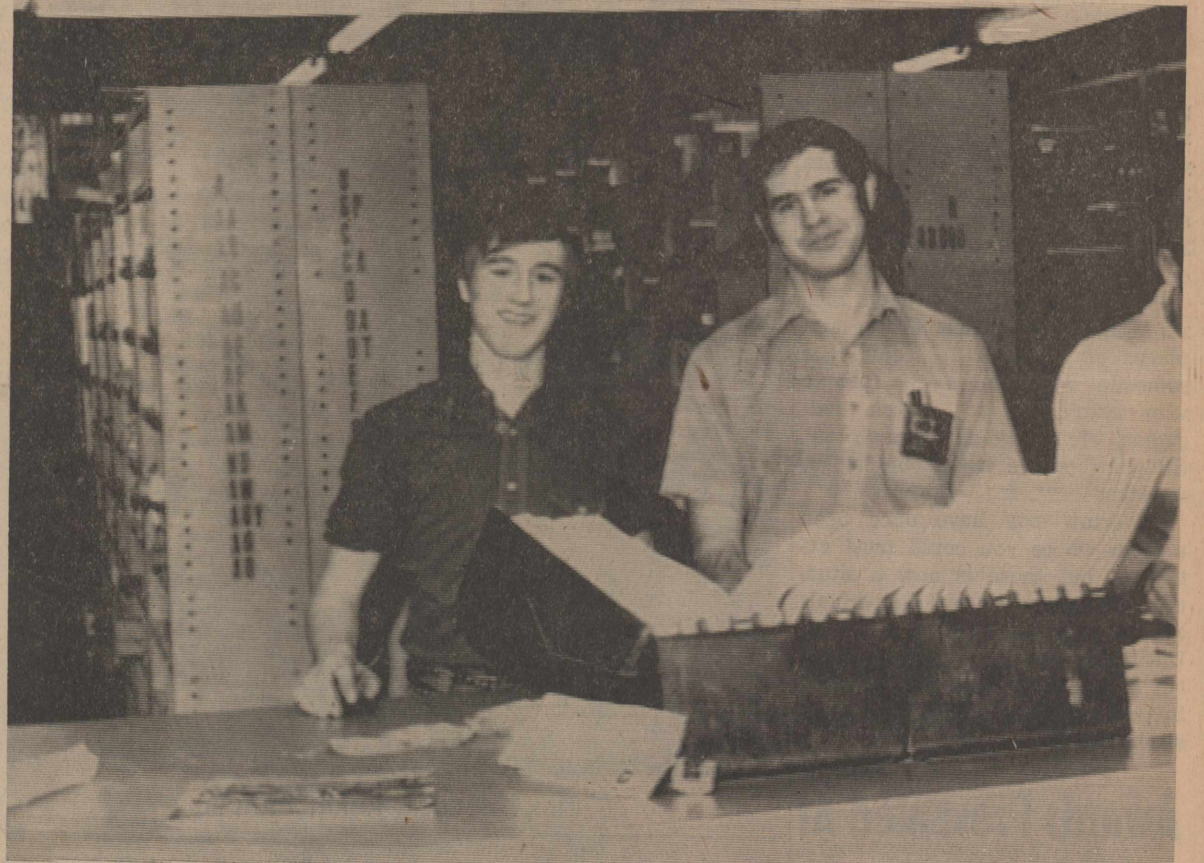

**Clean Crib Toys Are a Must**

Tiny babies, susceptible to germs, must be protected from possible contamination by keeping crib toys immaculate with frequent detergent or soap sudsings. Since babies put everything they touch into their mouths, be sure that rattles, tie-on crib toys and cradle gym sets are kept clean.

**Give Your Dog an Occasional Bath**

A dog needs a bath when he is dirty or has a strong "doggy" odor not related to a medical problem. But puppies should be at least three months old before bathing them.

Since most dogs do not like being bathed, the keys to success are gentleness and speed. Have everything ready in advance. Start with pre-bath brushing to remove loose soil and hair.

Then into the tub or sink if it's

a smaller breed. Only clean water and a sponge or soft cloth should be used on the dog's face. Work lather down to the skin with your fingertips, from front to back. Avoid getting water into eyes or ears.

Thorough rinsing cannot be overemphasized. While soap is necessary to clean, a residue left on the skin may cause irritation. If possible, let the dog shake himself to get rid of excess water; towel dry. Keep the pet indoors and away from drafts until he is completely dry—a process that can take three hours or more depending on the thickness of his coat and the weather. A hairdryer will speed the process if the dog will tolerate.

**How To Fold a Fitted Sheet**

Fitted sheets are ideal for bed making, but smooth folding can present a problem. After washing and drying, spread the sheet lengthwise, inside out. Place hands, palms up, in two corners and bring fingertips together.

Now turn one corner over the other. Repeat with the other two corners. Then repeat again, fitting the two sets of corners smoothly one inside the other. From there it is easy to complete the folding.

Another method is to arrange the sheet lengthwise and fold all edges in, making a tuck at each

corner. Fold from side to side and top to bottom.

They say some people have a skeleton in the closet, but when clothes are rumpled or seem to be missing, the fault is not with the supernatural. Things seem to disappear or get severely disheveled in a closet or drawer. To keep clothes in good order and to help make them last longer, thoroughly clean out all drawers and closets and organize storage areas.

Departmentalized drawers—one for sweaters, one for underwear, etc.—and closet shelves for bags, hats and other accessories, make it easier to be tidy. Shoe bags or boxes keep shoes neat and dust-free.

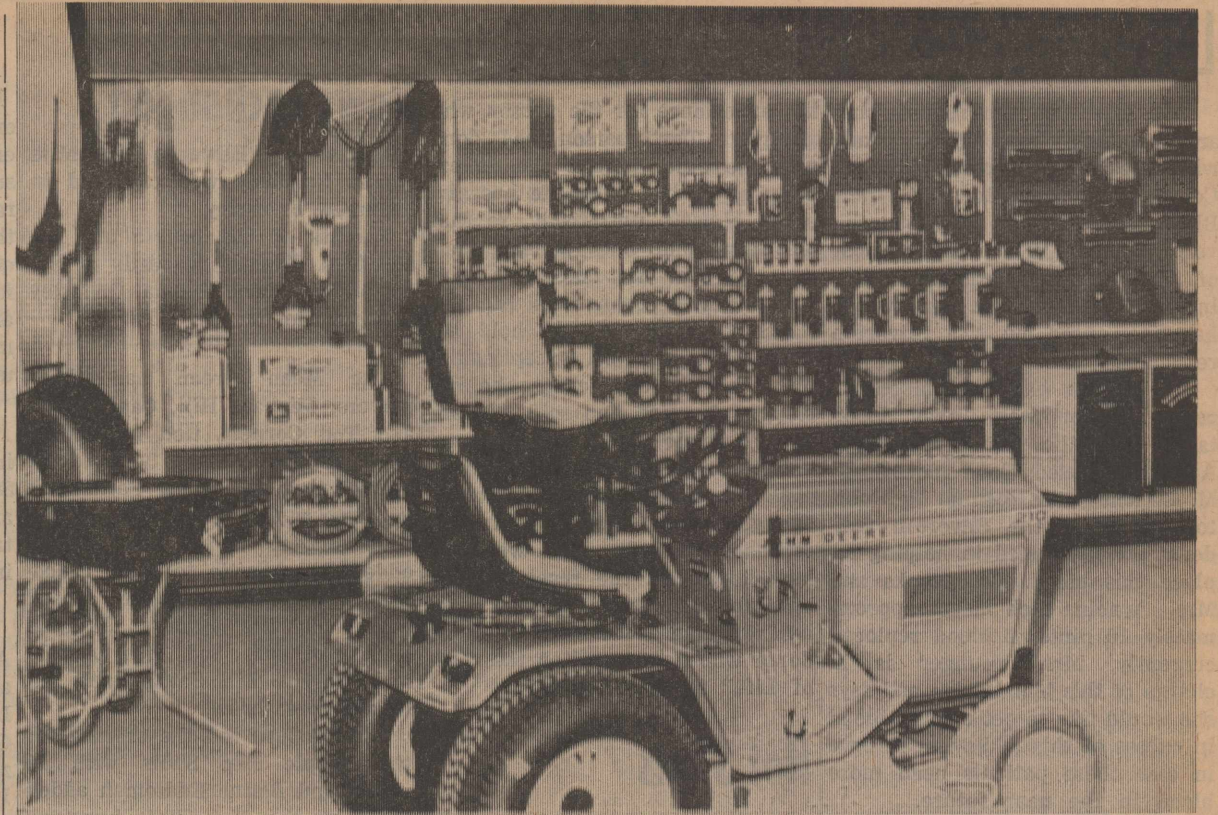
Specialty items such as belt and tie racks are also available so that these items can be hung in a closet or on suitable hangers.

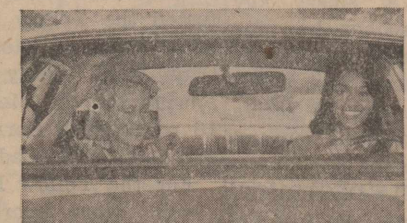
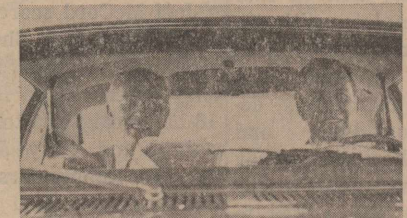

## Local Residents Need Blood Given

Mrs. Lou Younger reports that arrangements have been made with the Coffee Memorial Blood Center in Amarillo for their Bloodmobile unit to come to Silverton March 10 for the purpose of Silverton area residents donating blood to replace that which has been used by two Silverton residents.

Jim Brooks has used blood recently at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, and Mrs. Gladys Arnold has used blood recently at M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston. Many of the Silverton residents are interested in helping replace this blood. Mr. Brooks and Mrs. Arnold each need approximately 10 pints of blood replaced currently. Mrs. Younger is in charge of this blood drive and says she would like to get enough blood in excess of this to have a reserve in case these patients need more blood in the near future.

The Bloodmobile unit will be parked at the courthouse as in the past, on Monday, March 10 from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. This will allow enough time to take from 25 to 30 blood donors. Anyone interested in helping replace this blood is asked to please call Mrs. Younger at 823-2254 or one of the Silverton Young Farmers, who originated the idea of bringing the Bloodmobile back to save people having to make trips to Amarillo. They need to know how many blood donors to expect in case special arrangements have to be made to accommodate everyone. Each person who wants to donate blood will be asked to be at the Bloodmobile unit within certain time limits so that no one is kept waiting an inconvenient length of time.

The process of donating blood should only take each person about 20 minutes, so no one would be away from his duties very long. Donating this blood will not only help the families involved in a financial way, but more important, it will help replace the blood on our hospital shelves which has to be renewed each time a pint is removed. In this way, there is always plenty of fresh blood on hand at all times in case any of us should need it.

Giving blood can be a reward.

### Undeclared In Little Dribbler Action

Moe Eddleman's Purple Hot Shots continue to hold the lead in Little Dribblers action after the third round which saw the Hot Shots taking a narrow 17-15 win from the Gold Dusters Tuesday night.

Jeff McCord scored 14 points for the Purple Hot Shots and Blaine Eddleman added four points as they defeated the Red Rebounders 18-11. Craig Patton put up six points and Gary Juarez got five for the Rebounders, who are coached by John Gill and Larry Jarrett.

The Mean Green, coached by Don Cornett and J. E. Patton, defeated the Yellow Hornets, coached by Jimmy Stone and Randy Clay, 24-21. Casey Bean led the scoring for the Mean Green with 16 points, Tad Cornett put up six and Mark Patton added two points.

For the Yellow Hornets, Jimmy Dwain Stone scored eight, Mitchell Martin got seven, and David Vaughn put in six points.

#### TUESDAY NIGHT

The Yellow Hornets defeated the Red Rebounders, 27-13 Tuesday night. David Vaughn led the Hornets with 25 points, and Alvin Stice added two points. For the Rebounders, Brandon Jarrett put in seven points; Craig Patton added four, and Gary Juarez got a pair of points.

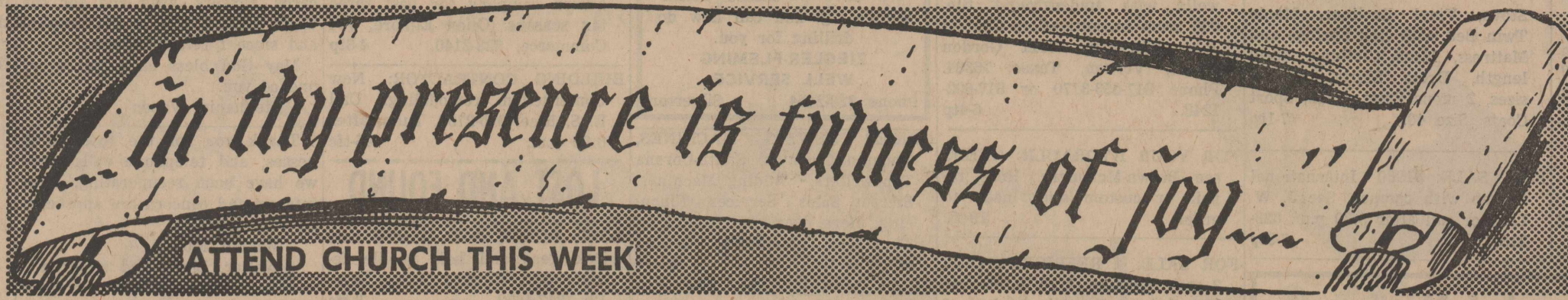

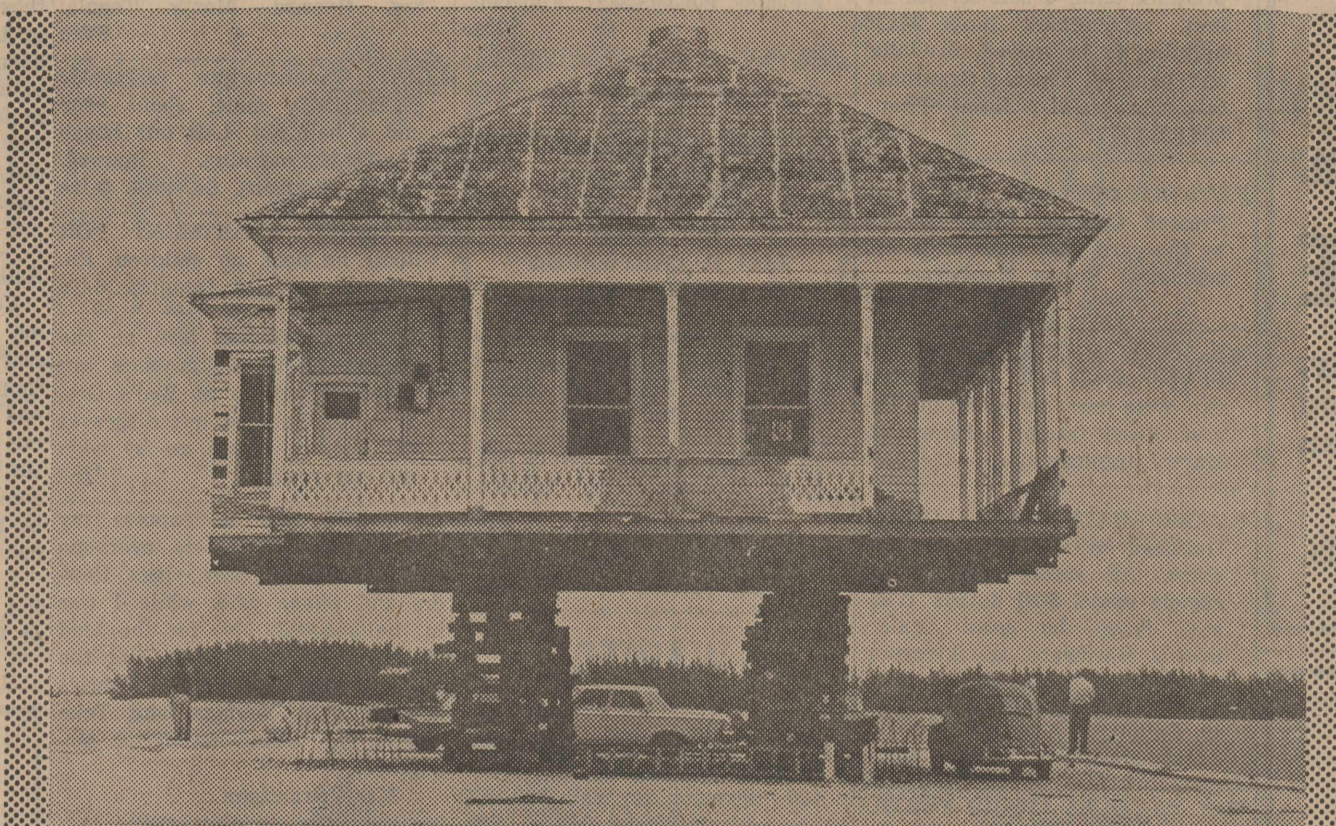
