Tribe Wins Olney Homecoming

The Haskell Indians downed the Olney Cubs 15-0 last Saturday night in a game plagued by penalties. The officials amassed a total of 219 yards in penalties against the two teams.

Of the penalties, 98 yards were against Haskell and 121 against Olney. The Indians' total offensive effort totaled 216 yards, bettering Olney's endeavor of 143 yards by 73 yards.

A total of 25 penalties were stepped off against the two teams, and another 9 were declined.

Both teams suffered during the first half from mistakes and poor execution. During the first half the Indians managed only 56 yards total offense compared to Olney's 90. Haskell had three first downs and Olney had 7. Haskell had 43 yards in penalties and Olney had 20.

The Cubs moved the pigskin to within 15 yards of pay dirt on their first possession but couldn't manage a needed first down to keep the drive alive.

Neither team had the ball

over six plays during the first period and together managed only 6 first downs. The Indians had the ball three times and Olney twice during the first quarter.

The second quarter was even worse for the Tribe, who managed only 11 yards on seven plays during the entire quarter. Olney moved to within 25 yards of a TD early in the second period only to be halted when the Indians recovered a fumble. Two plays and three penalties later the Indians punted. A penalty and return of the punt gave Olney possession 16 yards from the goal line. (One yard from the original line of scrimmage).

Understanding what happened during the next 10 plays is pretty close to impossible. The Cubs began the drive 16 yards from the goal line, gained 15 yards, scored two TD's, (both were called back), and gave the ball up on the 6 yard line. Indians Ricky Bird, Calvin Marshall, and George Brown halted the final scoring attempt on 4th down and three yards to go when they threw Olney for a three yard loss. The scoreless half ended one play later.

The Tribe amassed a total of 160 yards offensively during the second half and held Olney to a total gain of 52 yards.

The Tribe scored on their first possession during the second half with a seven-play drive which covered 67 yards. Indian Jim Pippin began the drive with three runs totaling 12 yards. On the fourth play, Quarterback Gary McAdams threw 18

yards to Cris Love. Pippin rushed twice more for 26 yards before Love scored from the 13 yard line. The entire drive took place without either team being assessed a penalty. This was the most number of consecutive plays by either team without a penalty. An offside penalty against the Cubs nullified Love's attempted extra point kick and the Tribe decided to try for two points. The conversion came on the same pitch-out from McAdams to Love around right end and was also good.

The Tribe defense held Olney to 5 yards on their next attempt. The Indians also had difficulty moving the ball on their next possession and were forced to punt seven plays later. The Cubs moved the ball 3 yards in as many plays and again punted to Haskell.

The Indians moved the ball 60 yards in six plays. (Two 15 yard penalties against Olney helped sustain the drive). McAdams connected with Love on the next play and the duo resulted in a 36 yd. scoring pass. Love's kick was good to finalize the scoring at Haskell 15, Olney 0.

Midway through the final period, the Tribe threatened to score again but could not manage a first down to keep the drive alive. The Cubs got the ball on their own 19 yard line and on their first play Indian Tom Watson recovered a fumble. Penalties stopped the drive and Olney again had possession of the ball.

The Cubs moved the ball to within 29 yards of a TD only to lose possession of the pigskin when Steve Drinnon intercepted a pass. Indian George Brown rushed for 10 yards and Jessie Billington moved another 5 yards as the game ended.

The Indians have an open date this Friday and will spend the next few days making final preparations for district play. The Tribe will meet Aspermont October 18 in Haskell at 7:30 p. m. See you there.

Dallas, Texas — Bankers representing the more than 260 charter member banks of the newly organized Independent Bankers Association of Texas met recently in Austin to elect permanent directors and officers.

Fred T. Brooks, president of Merchants State Bank, Dallas, will serve as the new organization's president. L. Scott Anderson, president of Atlanta National Bank of Atlanta, is first vice president; Arthur F. Hoehn, president of Lockwood National Bank of Houston, is second vice president.

Robert W. Herren, Chairman of the Board, Haskell National Bank, was elected to the Board of Directors of the new organization.

In his remarks to the members, Mr. Brooks said that IBAT's purposes are to represent the views of the independent bankers in the State of Texas to the legislature, the press and to the public generally; to maintain a state association of independent bankers which will have the power and prestige to effectively protect and promote the interests of its members; to oppose all forms of monopolistic multiple banking practices as may be determined by the membership to be detrimental to the public welfare; to work for the enactment of state and federal banking laws which will advance the cause of independent banking and protect the public from undue concentration of banking power and to promote the general welfare and common interests of independent banks doing business in the State and to promote unity among them in all matters affecting their common welfare.

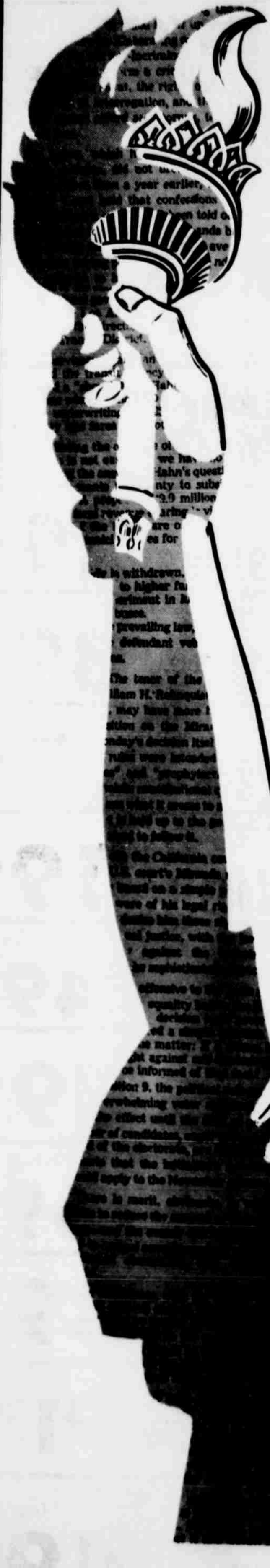

He presented Ray Farabee, successful businessman, lawyer, and candidate for the State Senate from District 30, as speaker for the day. Mr. Farabee spoke on industrial development and cited a number of things necessary to success in securing industry for any given city or town. He said, "It is necessary to survey the area and see if new industry is really wanted, organization of effort to utilize talents and get the job done, prospect for new business or industry, and finally the task of selling prospects on a given area, if a town or city is to succeed in acquiring new industry." He further stated, "It is better to have a number of smaller industries than to rely on one larger one. Two reasons why Texas is especially attractive to industry is because Texas has no corporate or income tax and the good labor market available," said Farabee.

Rehab. Center Awarded Contract

Abilene's West Texas Rehabilitation Center has been awarded a \$45,000 contract by the Regional Medical Program of Texas (RMPT) to develop a rural rehabilitation patient referral network for the West Texas Planning Region. The contract covers the 1974-75 fiscal year. Staff of the rehabilitation center will initiate and develop an organized system for educating physicians and other health care personnel in identifying orthopedically and neurologically handicapped conditions in patients and the need for improvement in interim care and early referral for diagnostic and rehabilitation services. This system is being reviewed and activities organized at planning conferences at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. Participants include physicians, hospital and nursing home administrators and other public health officials within the West Texas Planning Region. Inservice education workshops also will be held for health care personnel from hospitals and other health care facilities in Snyder, Sweetwater, Stamford, Breckenridge, Haskell, Ballinger, and Eastland. As part of continuing education activities, videotapes and slide presentations will be produced to encompass techniques of patient identification, methods of interim care and types of rehabilitative services that are available. A resource library of audiovisual materials for inservice education will be developed and maintained at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. In addition, a monthly newsletter will be produced and distributed for continuing education and professional communication and a directory of rehabilitation services will be provided to agencies in the referral network. To perform ongoing evaluation of program effectiveness, a nurse trained in rehabilitation will make regular visits to each participating facility. The rehabilitation nurse will insure that home programs are being carried out and will assist in expediting referrals of the regional elderly, infirm and handicapped to rehabilitation facilities. The project also will establish cooperative agreements between hospitals, nursing homes, public health agencies and school nurse programs in the region to produce opportunities for shared services and equipment between facilities. RMPT, a health agency located in Austin, assists health professionals in improving patient care and increasing the capacity for quality health care delivery for Texas citizens. The agency is funded by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

New Ag Campus To Start At Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION—October 12 will be a red-letter day in the history of Texas A&M University and its agricultural programs as ground will be broken for a new West Campus. The ground-breaking plus a display of A&M's sprawling agricultural complex will be highlighted during Agriculture Day on the A&M campus, and agriculture will receive special attention during the Texas A&M-Texas Tech football game which gets underway at 3:00 p. m. Ground-breaking ceremonies of the West Campus development program will be at 11 a. m., announces Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of agriculture. A barbecue will follow, with tickets at \$3 each. Prior to the ground-breaking, visitors will have an opportunity to tour some 14 different agricultural departments that will be holding open house. The U. S. Army's "Golden Knights" will stage a parachute drop at 10 a. m. onto the main drill field. According to Kunkel, plans are proposed for two multi-million dollar centers to be located west of Old College Road, directly across from A&M's main drill field. The two proposed buildings are the 165,000 square foot Animal and Food Sciences Center and the 153,000 square foot Soil and Crop Sciences and Entomology Center. Expected participants in ceremonies will be State Senator Max Sherman, chairman of the Senate Committee on Natural Resources; State Representative Joe Hubanek, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture and Livestock; Clyde H. Wells, president of The Texas A&M University System Board of Directors; Dr. Jack K. Williams, president of the TAMU System; and Kunkel. "Agriculture is a \$5 billion industry in Texas, so it's a big business not only in the state but at Texas A&M University as well," points out Kunkel. "We invite all Texans to share in the unveiling of plans for our new agricultural complex, to see our present facilities, and to hear of our plans to continue to move forward in supporting the great agricultural industry of this state."
