The 1975 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm-to-Market Road Improvement Program statewide include 709 projects in 201 counties of the state, involving 4,328.2 miles roads.

Fifty-two percent of the work is on US and State numbered routes, 47 percent is on Farm-to-Market roads and one percent is reserved for later assignments.

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
