Arrangements have been made with the American Mill Manufal turing Company to have the mill and equipment on the ground by June 1st. When asked by our reporter for a statement regarding this new home industry Mr. Christian said : "I became interested in a flour mill for Haskell ome months ago, and after making a lose investigation was convinced that Haskeil not only wanted, but needed a flour mill." A factory expert will be

sent by the makers of the mill to superintend the construction of the mill and the installation of the machinery and nothing will be left undone to have it comply with modern milling practices. This will be a short system mill and will convert wheat into flour in the remarkable short time of 50 seconds against the one-half to three-quarters of an hour by the long system. It is claimed that flour made on these mills is a beautiful product of utmost purity. The mill is to be conducted on the community plan, which means that its products will be milled from home wheat and sold to home people. A corn mill and feed crusher will be run in. connection with the flour mill and it is believed that the promoters will receive the hearty co-operation of the people of Haskell county.
