



"These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by the drought that began Nov. 1, 2013, in the following primary counties," announced Tanya N. Garfield, Acting Director of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.

Haskell, Baylor, Jones, Knox, Stonewall and Throckmorton are among some counties on the Primary Texas counties list.

"SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the disaster," Garfield said.

Small, nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating

"Eligibility for these loans

SBA economic injury disaster loans

available to Texas small businesses

is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4% for businesses and 2.625% for private, nonprofit organizations, a maximum term of 30 years, and are available to small businesses and most private, nonprofits without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Garfield

By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Tom Vilsack declared this disaster on Jan. 15, 2014.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance.

Small, nonfarm businesses been met had the disaster not should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, in drought disasters nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure Web site at https://disasterloan.sba. gov/ela.

Disaster loan information and application forms are also available from SBA's Customer Service Center by calling SBA toll-free at 800-659-2955, emailing disastercustomerservice@ sba.gov, or visiting SBA's Web site at www.sba.gov/ services/disasterassistance. Individuals who are deaf or hard-of-hearing may call (800) 877-8339.




