Fire at City Cafe Wednesday at Noon

Fire during the noon hour Wednesday did considerable damage to the kitchen of the City Cafe. However, the blaze was confined to the kitchen and the damage to the building was insignificant. The fire is said to have been caused by an oil stove.

But for prompt and hard work, more serious damage would have resulted. The City Cafe is located on the east side of the square and is a frame and sheet iron structure.

Sunday night about eleven o'clock, an alarm of fire was turned in from the oil mill, where a small blaze was discovered in the seed house. This fire, also, was soon gotten under control, with only slight damage resulting.

Home Circle Spreads Out

The Haskell Home County Circle is now snugly domiciled in new offices in the building just to the rear of the Corner Drug Store, formerly occupied by the Roy Shook Auto Supply House. The building has been overhauled and is being fitted up in magnificent style for the conduct of the insurance business.

Mr. Rutledge, secretary of the Circle, states that the membership has now passed the fifteen-hundred mark. This is a remarkable showing, when the fact is taken into consideration that less than five months ago there were only three or four hundred members in the organization.

New Bulletin On "Woman Suffrage"

University of Texas, Oct. 20.—The Chairman of the Interscholastic League, Prof. E. D. Shurter, announces a new edition of the bulletin entitled "Woman Suffrage" as follows:

"This bulletin was originally prepared primarily for use by schools in Texas belonging to the University Interscholastic League during the year 1912-13, the question for the interscholastic debates that year being, Resolved, that Women in Texas should be granted the suffrage on equal terms with men. The general demand for the bulletin has been such as to justify the issue of a new edition. This bulletin will be mailed free to citizens of Texas upon application, to those outside the state the price is 15 cents."

The bulletin contains eight or ten pages of general reference both pro and con, including both books and magazine articles. There are seventy pages devoted to both affirmative and negative arguments on the subject.

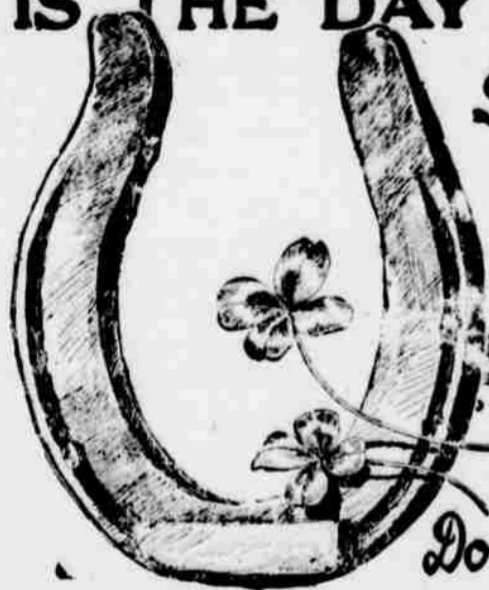

Land, in addition to the specula-
 tive value, has a productive value
 and a social value. The farm may
 sell for more than it is worth or it
 may be worth more than it will
 sell for. As a home and a source
 of a living it is worth its produc-
 tive value added to its social value.

The owner of the farm is very
 largely responsible for the produc-
 tive value of the farm. While ac-
 cessibility to market is always a
 factor where crops and animals
 must be sold, the manner of culti-
 vation, the rotation, the use of
 fertilizers and manures, turning
 under certain crops, irrigation and
 drainage, are some of the ways
 that the manager can influence the
 productive value of the farm. By
 intelligent tillage and successful
 management the soil may be im-
 proved year after year and the
 yield considerably increased. In
 this way, the farm increases in
 productive value according to the
 yield and profits derived from
 crops and animals.—Farm and
 Ranch.

Kansas City Live Stock Market

Kansas City Stock Yards, Oct. 18, 1915—Range beef cattle closed last week 10 to 20 cents lower for the week, stockers and feeders about steady, fat cows 10 to 15 higher. Country demand is exceptionally heavy. 43,000 stockers and feeders bought here and shipped out last week, 57 percent of the total cattle supply. Receipts today are 31,000 head, containing a fairly liberal number of range cattle. Total supply at the leading markets is smaller today than last Monday, and the market on beef cattle is 10 to 15 higher in some cases. Country demand is higher, if anything, than last week, as prospective buyers begin to appreciate the fact that heavy runs will soon be over for this year. Choice panhandle yearlings sold up to \$8.25 today, New Mexico yearlings \$7.75 to \$8.00, and Colorado yearlings and twos at \$7.70 to \$7.75. These prices were paid for the best cattle, middle grades dropping down a dollar or more per hundred below these figures. Fat cows sold at \$5.50 to \$6.50, some heifers \$6.75. Colorado beef steers sold at \$6.75 to \$7.40. Receipts today contained nothing from points beyond Colorado, but good Idaho and Oregon beef steers are quotable up to \$7.65. Sheep and lamb supply was 12,600, market steady. No good fat lambs were included, medium Colorados selling at \$8.50, and some heavy Arizona lambs, 85 lbs average, at \$8.15. Fat ewes are worth \$5.40 to \$6.00, best fat wethers \$6.50 yearlings around \$7.00. Feeding lambs are selling steady, the demand having switched from heavy feeding lambs to lighter weights.

Some 51 lb Mexican lambs sold at \$8.35 today, heavier feeding lambs \$8 to \$8.20. Feeding and breeding ewes continue in strong demand. Wyoming breeding ewes today at \$6 to \$6.50, and feeding ewes at \$4.80 to \$5.50. Moderate receipts are expected here, and stronger prices, buyers particularly appreciating good to choice fat lambs.
