BEWARE OF HUN PROPAGANDA

Ever since the armistice was signed by Foch and the German emissaries a wall has been coming out of Germany that the enforcement of the truce terms as they now stand would work against the establishment of a responsible government in the fatherland. Already government agents have noticed evidences of German propaganda machinery being put in operation in the United States to promote sentiment of leniency toward Germany in peace terms. The Department of Justice officials warn the public to keep watchful against organized propaganda by interests formerly pro-German, but for the past year passive.

Four long years of experience with the Germans have taught the Allies and the United States the true character of the Teutons. Ruthless in imposing terms upon conquered territory, they ask for leniency when the tables are turned against them. Yellow to the core they begin to cry for mercy now as they cried "kamerad" at the point of the bayonet. The American people and the people of the nations we are allied with cannot find it in their hearts to be lenient with a nation of people who through four years gave evidence of the rigid terms we could expect if they were

victorious. Had Germany won the war, would the American people have been given food by the victors? Not much! We would have been left to work out our own salvation in the food problem. Would Germany have fed England? Not likely when she vowed she would starve the British out. Germany has been assured that she will receive food if there is an actual necessity, but the Allies are not going to deprive themselves to put food in German mouths.

Every term of the armistice must be enforced even if it comes to a resumption of hostilities and the complete wiping out of Germany. The United States and the Allies intend to see that their honored dead have not sacrificed their lives on the battlefield in vain. Germany must be placed in a position which will forever render her unable to duplicate the

maelstrom of death in which she plunged Europe for four long years. As recent as last June a member of the Prussian House of Lords in outlining Germany's demands upon the Allies, included as one item an indemnity of \$45,000,000,000. Does that look like we would have received leniency at the hands of a victorious Germany! Hardly, and if we really wish to safeguard the victory which our armies have won, we will turn a deaf ear to Germany's pleadings for leniency. Germany must carry out every term of the armistice and pay every cent of indemnity demanded of her, no matter what hardships they may claim the enforcement of the terms will work. Since the German people sanctioned the war to a man, they must pay the price of the vanquished.

TAKE CARE OF THE MACHINERY

The farmer is confronted by a new problem, the shortage of farm machinery and repair parts, due to the diversion of steel to government use.

In view of this difficulty, if the necessary standard of food production is to be maintained, the best possible care of present supplies is absolutely essential. Intelligent operation, comprehension of weak points, care in cleaning and oiling, with frequent overhauling and immediate attention to small repairs, all are necessary if the machines are to last over until a new supply is available.

Old, discarded machinery should be carefully looked over as a possible source of supply for needed re-

pair parts.

The pound foolish neglect of expensive farm machinery which has too often been the fault of the usually penny-wise tiller of the soil must be completely reformed, if the machinery now available is to meet the strain to which it must be subjected. The best way to inaugurate the reform movement is for farmers to begin at once putting under shelter all the machinery they have standing exposed to the weather.

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Federal Land Loans

It may seem odd, and most people will question it, but the facts show that a farmer, in borrowing from the Federal Land Bank, is actually paying but three and six-tenths per cent interest, though the note reads a rate of five and a half. How does this come about?

He borrows \$1,000. The length of time is thirty four and a half years. The rate is five and a half per cent. Each year, in addition to interest payments he pays one per cent, or \$10 on the face of the loan in the time he pays as principal only \$345, yet the loan is paid off in full. What has become of the rest of the principal?

Put it another way. During the life of the loan, he will have paid, principal and interest, \$2,242.50. Deduct from this the amount of the principal \$1,000 and he has paid during the time only \$1,242.50 as interest for thirty four and a half years on \$1,000. Dividing this it appears that the interest rate he has paid is three and six-tenths per cent per year. Yet he thought he was paying five and one half per cent. Yet these are the facts and figures. They can be verified by anybody, and the Federal Land Bank is ready to loan millions and millions, and is doing it on these terms.
