Mr. Poe who is generally known as a successful farmer, decorated a farm wagon with some of everything that he had raised so far this year, viz; Corn, Cotton, Maize, Cotton, Pumpkins, etc.; covered the sides of the wagon, with some striking and original placards, calling attention to the advantages of farming in Haskell County; surmounted the whole with a United States Flag; put the boys and their musical instruments in the wagon and with his fiddle under his arm got in and drove to town where the exhibit was the center of attraction for a couple of hours and caused much comment.

Besides the many other things that Mr. Poe raises on his farm, he specializes in the raising of Tamworth hogs, he having one hog

14 months old and weighing 400 pounds. Mr. Poe is an exponent of the old "Hog and Hominy" way of living.

We are still hopeful of the Y. M. B. L. movement. Better pinch yourself though, and step ahead a little.

First Monday, Haskell's Trades Day, was attended by an unusually large crowd. Everybody wears that smiling, bustling air of prosperity. "Can't help it."

All the gins are busy and this 13c price is putting "rubber in their heels." If this keeps up we may be able to get our own heels re-shod.

At a recent meeting of the Cabinet President Wilson offered a prayer to God before proceeding with the business of the session. He said to the cabinet members, "I don't know whether you men believe in prayer or not I do. Let us ask the help of God." While this terrible conflict rages across the seas, we in this country should be thankful that in this hour we have a man at the helm of the ship of State who is a man of prayer; who has faith in an all-wise God.

Making Good

There is much in the common every-day expression "making good." It gives the idea that whatever success one considers of sufficient importance to meet the requirements of making good must depend upon his own efforts and was not just by chance. The expression implies that we must make a way ourselves and not trust our fortunes to nature or some one of our neighbors.

We are beginning or soon will begin the serious business of preparing for crops next year. Some have already begun, others are now beginning. Will we "make good" on the farm next year? Will we manage the farm in such a satisfactory manner that we can at the end of the year say, "I have 'made good' this year?"

Not all of us agree upon what is meant by making good. It means one thing for one person and quite a different thing for another. But perhaps all would agree that to make good each of us must be successful enough in what we undertake to meet our own approval, at least, under the existing circumstances. In other words, we must be in a measure satisfied with our achievements to make good.

But success in farming means more than is generally meant in other business. Not only must large crops and adequate profits be made one year, but the land must be left capable of producing equal or larger crops the following year, and the other years that swiftly follow. Enough feed and food crops must be produced to run the farm while another crop is being produced. The buildings must be kept in the proper repair, the implements must be replenished, suitable power and machines bought and the home kept in order. Livestock must be raised to consume the surplus feed, to provide work teams and to supplement the revenue.

But these are not all. Every farmer is part of the community. He owes his neighbors, his county and state something. In addition to making good in producing a competence on the farm we should take an interest in rural society. The schools, churches, roads and moral tone of the com-

munity will demand some consideration at our hands. To make good as a highly respected and progressive citizen, we must devote some thought to helping our neighbors build up the community. Unless we do this it will be hard to approve our own efforts at the end of the year when the harvest is finished. Making good as a farmer means making good as a neighbor and citizen.—Farm and Ranch.

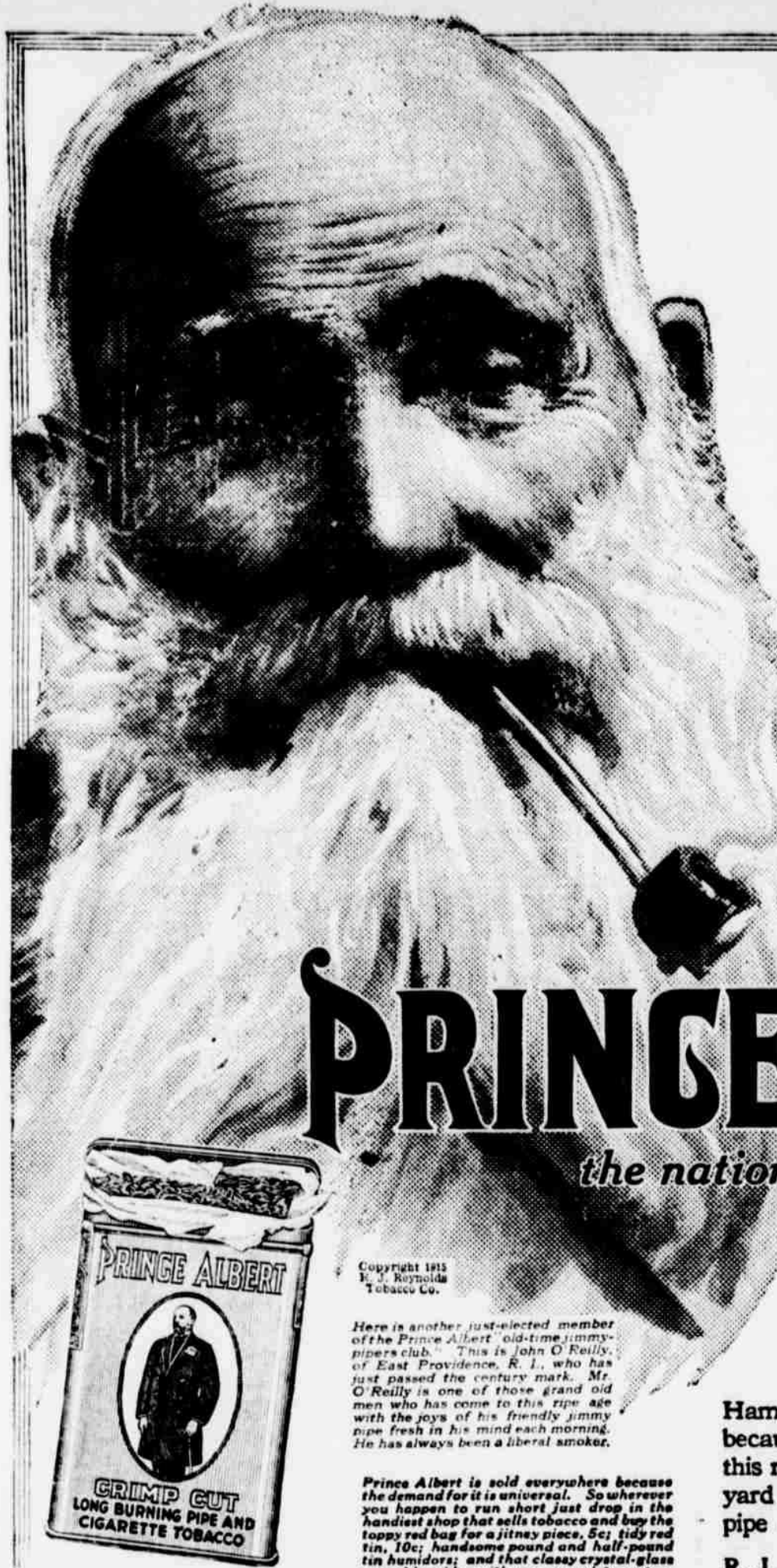
