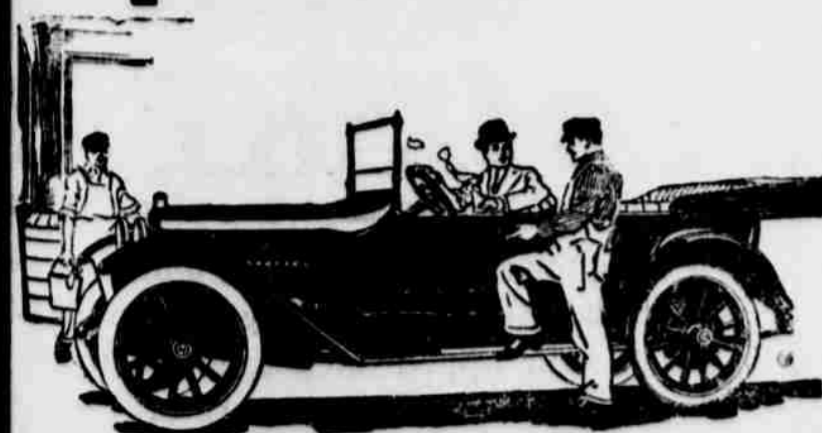

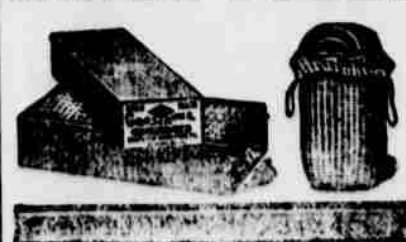
C. F. Crane was over from Haskell Monday and while here sold two monuments; one to Dr. Ragan for his father and the other one to F. Golden.

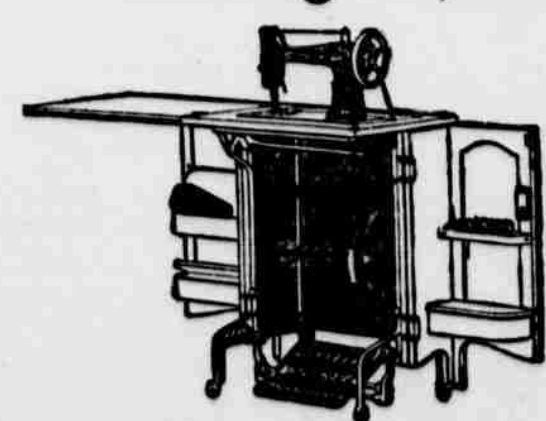

THE EUROPEAN WAR

Mr CLAPP, Mr. President, it is
not very often that I ask to hav-
anything inserted in the RECORD,
but I hold in my hand a state-
ment from the Washington Post of
January 30. It is not an editorial,
it is a compilation of the figures,
according to the best estimates, of
the indebtedness incurred and lost
in life and disability in the Euro-
pean war. I ask to have it inserted
in the RECORD.

There being no objection, the
paper was ordered to be printed
in the RECORD, as follows:

Twenty seven Billion Sixty-one
Million Dollars is spent in 18
months of war; No decisive blow
yet—losses in killed, wounded and
prisoners since struggle began are
more than 15,000,000—Bankruptcy
Menaces great Nations engaged
in terrible struggle, in which
neither side has been able to gain
an advance, two battle lines 1,950
miles long are deadlocked at every
point with belligerent countries
bleeding to death—Allies and Ger-
mans confident of result, refuse
to consider peace.

The European war will have
lasted 18 months to-morrow—the
blackest 18 months known to the
modern world.

What has been been accom-
plished?

No European country has been
benefited nor has human liberty
advanced at any point nor has any
great moral principal trumped in
any place or on any battlefield.

The net result has been 2,990,
000 men in the very prime of life
killed, more than 2,200,000 made
prisoners, and more than 9,830,000
wounded and maimed, many
crippled for life.

This measureless bloodshed and
suffering making millions widows
and many more millions orphans

The people of this, the sixteenth
congressional district will have

Space will not permit us to give
Mr. Grisham's platform in full, but
we clip the following which are
his views on preparedness:

That there is danger of a con-
quest against the new world or
any country thereof and in spite of
the barriers of the oceans is either
the hallucination of an alarmist or
the dream of interests. Yet the con-
ditions in Europe today came with-
out precedent in history without
apparent cause and unannounced,
Hence for precaution, America
will put a sentinel on the watch-
tower, oil in her lamps, and keep
them trimmed and burning. It
only behooves her in making her
vast expenditures for preparedness
to take cognizance of the fact
that after the storm of war may
follow a perpetual calm of peace.

In view of the possibilities above
outlined we have thought that as
an adjunct to a proper system of
preparedness that we should have
military highways, not only to gird
the continent as has been sug-
gested but to traverse her perpen-
dicularly and that such cardinal
thoroughfares should be cross-sec-
tioned by roads from every state
in the Union and with the aid of
the nation, States and counties
should co-operate in forming in-
finite connections. Not only would
this facilitate the mobilizing of
armies in time of war but prevent
the necessity of vast standing
armies on our otherwise exposed
sea-shores in time of peace.

The inadequacy of our railroad
facilities to cope with the normal
commercial condition is empha-
sized by the president's recent mes-
sage to congress wherein he sug-
gests an investigation into the
efficiency of our Commerce Com-
mission to control and make more
effective our railways. It is patent
to the most casual observer and
painfully obnoxious to every con-
sumer who resides in the cities and
to every producer on farm and
ranch that the rates for trans-
portation are so high that many
products of the farm and ranch
now perish in the fields because
the rates for transportation exceed
the market value at destination.
