## Dorothy Dean Stiewert

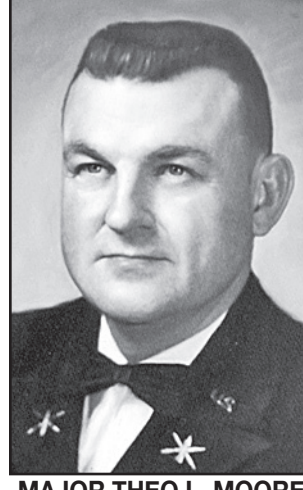

Moore served in the United States Army Air Corp and Artillery during WWII and Korea. He served with the 441st Troup Carrier Group, 301st Troop Carrier

Squadron.  
Moore graduated from Haskell High School in May 1939. On Feb. 9, 1943, he was united in marriage to Marjorie Anna Preston in Dalhart. He went on to complete Glider Pilot, Helicopter Pilot and Aviation Training, logging total pilot time of 5,891 hours by 1960. He served in Germany, England, France, Yugoslavia, Holland and Italy during his military career. He was then employed by the Federal Aviation Administration for 28 years, lastly as an Accident Prevention Specialist at GADO 3, DuPage Airport, West Chicago, Illinois. During this time Moore was a certified Flight Examiner proficient in flying single and multi-engine aircraft, helicopters, gyrocopters, hot air balloons and gliders. In these, he logged more than 30,000 hours before his retirement in 1989.  
He was a member of the Little Home Church, Silver Wings Association, WWII Glider Pilots Association, Experimental Aircraft Association, Boy Scouts, Chicago Flight Instructors Association (CFIA), American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.  
Moore was awarded Eagle Scout, the Silver Beaver (Boy Scouts of America), selected

for the Illinois Aviation Hall of Fame (1990), the EAA Oshkosh President's Award (1984), and the "Theo Award" which continues to be awarded annually in his honor for improving aviation safety, by the CFIA. Moore was one of the first 100 Army Aviators to be titled a "Master Aviator."  
Welcoming him home are his wife, Marjorie Moore (2003); his parents, Oscar (1961), Gracie (1989); a brother, Velton (1974), sister, Onella (1949), and brother-in-law, Henry Harris (2010). He will be remembered by all for the kindness and love he gave to everyone.

## Viral diseases in wheat are vectored by wheat curl mite

The viral diseases of wheat (Wheat streak mosaic virus, Wheat mosaic virus and Triticum mosaic virus) are all vectored by the wheat curl mite, *Aceria tosichella* Keifer. These diseases cause devastating yield losses. Unfortunately, our current practices for managing these diseases are the same practices that were used in the early 1970's. These practices are delayed planting, clean tillage, and destruction of volunteer wheat in August and early September in order to break the "green bridge" cycle of wheat curl mites moving onto the wheat seedlings in the fall.  
However, Dr. Charlie Rush with the Texas A&M AgriLife Research, Bushland, and his research team are continuing to study the relationship of

the wheat curl mite to disease infection and the impact of the progressive nature of the disease on additional crop inputs, such as fertilization and irrigation. Research findings are providing valuable information that are leading to management decisions which will reduce the losses from mite-vectored virus diseases.  
The research objectives are: 1.) Evaluate the impact of cultivar mixes and deficit irrigation on mite infestations, 2.) Develop an economic threshold for mite-vectored virus diseases of wheat, and 3.) Identify new chemistries for efficacy in controlling the wheat curl mite. Coupled with the research objectives there are objectives for Extension to: 1.) Develop multimedia educational tools and programs for mite-vectored diseases and 2.) Develop a First Alert system for tracking the progression of the mite-vectored diseases across the Texas High Plains during a growing season.  
A website "Wheat Virus


Early Detection System" is being created so individuals can find information about mite-vectored virus diseases and the wheat curl mite. The site will show by county when each of the viruses have been positively detected. Individuals can follow where hot spots are across the Texas High Plains. This system will provide an early detection for when virus infections are light or heavy each season. When the website is completed we will provide a link to it. We expect the website to be available before fall 2014.  
Currently, few samples have been submitted this year to the Plant Diagnostic Clinic at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center. Because of the limited number of samples there has not been wide spread detection of the diseases. We encourage submission of samples to the Plant Diagnostic Clinic because as wheat begins growing now the symptoms development of diseases may increase.

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### 10 tips to help you cut back on salt and sodium

It's clear that Americans have a taste for salt, but salt plays a role in high blood pressure. Everyone, including kids, should reduce their sodium intake to less than 2,300 milligrams of sodium a day (about 1 teaspoon of salt). Adults age 51 and older, African Americans of any age, and individuals with high blood pressure, diabetes, or chronic kidney disease should further reduce their sodium intake to 1,500 mg a day.

**1. think fresh:** Most of the sodium Americans eat is found in processed foods. Eat highly processed foods less often and in smaller portions—especially cheesy foods, such as pizza; cured meats, such as bacon, sausage, hot dogs, and deli/luncheon meats; and ready-to-eat foods, like canned chili, ravioli, and soups. Fresh foods are generally lower in sodium.

**2. enjoy home-prepared foods:** Cook more often at home—where you are in control of what's in your food. Preparing your own foods allows you to limit the amount of salt in them.

**3. fill up on veggies and fruits—they are naturally low in sodium:** Eat plenty of vegetables and fruits—fresh or frozen. Eat a vegetable or fruit at every meal.

**4. choose dairy and protein foods that are lower in sodium:** Choose more fat-free or low-fat milk and yogurt in place of cheese, which is higher in sodium. Choose fresh beef, pork, poultry, and seafood, rather than those with salt added. Deli or luncheon meats, sausages, and canned products like corned beef are higher in sodium. Choose unsalted nuts and seeds.

**5. adjust your taste buds:** Cut back on salt little by little—and pay attention to the natural tastes of various foods. Your taste for salt will lessen over time.

**6. skip the salt:** Skip adding salt when cooking. Keep salt off the kitchen counter and the dinner table. Use spices, herbs, garlic, vinegar, or lemon juice to season foods or use no-salt seasoning mixes. Try black or red pepper, basil, curry, ginger or rosemary.

**7. read the label:** Read the Nutrition Facts label and the ingredients statement to find packaged and canned foods lower in sodium. Look for foods labeled "low sodium," "reduced sodium," or "no salt added."

**8. ask for low-sodium foods when you eat out:** Restaurants may prepare lower sodium foods at your request and will serve sauces and salad dressings on the side so you can use less.

**9. pay attention to condiments:** Foods like soy sauce, ketchup, pickles, olives, salad dressings, and seasoning packets are high in sodium. Choose low-sodium soy sauce and ketchup. Have a carrot or celery stick instead of olives or pickles. Use only a sprinkling of flavoring packets instead of the entire packet.

**10. boost your potassium intake:** Choose foods with potassium, which may help to lower your blood pressure. Potassium is found in vegetables and fruits, such as potatoes, beet greens, tomato juice and sauce, sweet potatoes, beans (white, lima, kidney), and bananas. Other sources of potassium include yogurt, clams, halibut, orange juice, and milk.

#### DPS creates center to protect children

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Public Safety on March 18 announced the creation of the Texas Crimes Against Children Center within the agency's Texas Rangers Division.

The stated goal is to protect children through the collection and dissemination of vital intelligence, investigative support and cooperation with victim-assistance counselors by "providing support to local, state and federal partners on investigations related to missing and exploited children, the trafficking of children, child abductions and other high-risk threats to children."

"The exploitation and human trafficking of children is a deplorable crime and it is critical that we use all available resources to keep them safe," said DPS Director Steven McCraw.

#### Flu season isn't over

For the week ending March 8, the Department of State Health Services on March 14 reported the presence of "influenza-like illness or institutional outbreaks in at least two but less than half the regions of the state with recent laboratory evidence of influenza in those regions."

And although "influenza laboratory data and influenza-like illness indicators have demonstrated a consistent decrease for the last several weeks," influenza-like illness intensity "is still elevated throughout Texas" and 14 pediatric flu deaths have been confirmed in Texas this season.

The state health department punctuated its report by encouraging "everyone six months old and older to get a dose of flu vaccine" for this season's particular strains.

#### Drought declaration lives on

Gov. Rick Perry on March 14 renewed an Emergency Disaster Proclamation he originally issued on July 5, 2011, certifying that exceptional drought conditions posed a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas.

The 30-day renewal applies to 143 of Texas' 254 counties, and suspends "all rules and regulations that may inhibit or prevent prompt response to this threat."

#### Actor speaks for vets program

Barry Corbin is front and center in a new 30-second Texas Veterans Land Board public service announcement that began airing March 17 in targeted broadcasts, announced Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson, who oversees the Veterans Land Board.

Corbin, a Lamesa native who served in the U.S. Marine Corps, played roles in such films as "War Games," "Urban Cowboy" and "No Country for Old Men," in television shows

such as "Northern Exposure" and in the 1989 TV mini-series "Lonesome Dove."

In part of the announcement, Corbin says, "Right now, if you're a Texas veteran or a member of the military, the VLB has low-interest loans up to \$100,000 with only 5 percent down. This is a great deal, just for veterans."

#### Interim charges are made

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, announced items for four standing committees to study and report on before the 2015 Legislature.

The Senate Committee on Health and Human Services is to: Evaluate prescription drug abuse and strategies for reducing it; monitor initiatives to improve the quality and efficiency of Medicaid; monitor fraud, waste and abuse in Medicaid and other health and human services programs; monitor the State Board of Dental Examiners' ability to respond to complaints and reports of potential fraudulent activity; and monitor efforts to increase the transparency of the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas.

For the Senate Committee on Jurisprudence, charges include monitoring: (a) the implementation of laws passed in 2013 regarding criminal procedures related to children who commit certain Class C misdemeanors; (b) the prosecution of certain misdemeanor offenses committed by children and to school district law enforcement; and (c) the state's new electronic, digitized court filing system.

The Senate Committee on Open Government is to "review the Texas Public Information Act to ensure that access to public records and information by the public remains fully transparent, but that governmental entities have the authority to protect the privacy interests of citizens, including primary and higher education students, from improper public disclosure." The committee also will review and make recommendations on improving the transparency of information available on state websites regarding state expenditures, reports and contracts, including a comparison of how similar information is provided by other states.

The Senate Committee on Transportation is to evaluate comprehensive development agreements and design/build project delivery methods and make recommendations. The panel also is to examine the implementation of law passed in 2013 to provide "remedies for habitual violators of nonpayment of tolls" and "make recommendations for any legislation needed to improve, enhance, and/or complete implementation."

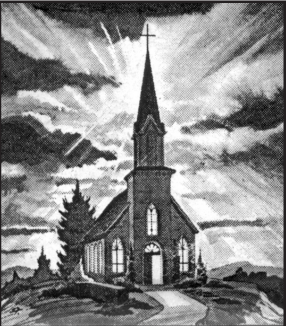
