Nicki Harle Files For **House District 53 Race**

Baird resident Nicki Harle announced on Thursday, Dec. 18, 2003 that she has paid her filing fee at the State Republican headquarters to secure a spot on the ballot in the race for Texas House of Representatives in District 53.

Last filing date is Jan. 2, 2004.

Harle will run against incumbent District 53 Representative Harvey Hilderbran (R-Kerrville) in the Republican primary on March 9, 2004.

Hilderbran, who was first elected to the House in 1988, announced earlier that he will seek re-election in 2004.

Callahan County lies on the northern tip of District 53, a 15-county district including Crockett, Sutton, Schleicher, Real, Kerr, Kimble, Menard, Mason, Llano, San Saba, McCullock, Concho, Coleman, Runnels, and Callahan.

Nick Harle announced her candidacy as Republican nominee for State Represen-

tative in District 53 in November.

Since then, the 55-year-old area community development leader and 30-year resident of Baird, said she has traveled more than 25,000 miles meeting the citizens of all communities in the 15 counties and learning of the issues that she will be asked to address at the State Capitol.

"I have been listening to District 53 residents from all walks of life, and I am hearing what they are saying," Harle said.

Nicki Harle is executive director of Texas Midwest Community Network, and currently serving on the governing board of the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA).

As landowners, Nicki and Rob Harle are members of the Texas Farm Bureau and Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn. Rob Harle is a veterinarian and owner of Callahan County Veterinary Clinic.

Commissioners Court Holds Last 2003 Scheduled Meeting

Callahan County Commissioners held their last scheduled open court meeting of the year on Dec. 22, 2003.

The agenda included the review and signing of minutes of previous meetings, and public comments.

A discussion/approval of a Contract for Professional Services with Allison, Bass & Associates, L. L. P. to provide necessary legal services to successfully complete all procedural steps outlined in Chapter 258 of the Texas Transportation Code, H. B. 1117 was also on the agenda.

The Contract was approved.

A discussion regarding the approval of setting regulations on County Roads was held, as well as the approval of a Family Protection Fee.

Setting regulations on County Roads was tabled to be taken up at a future date.

The Court approved a Family Protection Fee of \$15, which will be charged by the District Clerk on each divorce case filed.

The Court discussed the mutual aid agreement with cities and WCTCOG (West Central Texas Council Of democracy? Governments).

The Court reinstated the Burn Ban in Callahan County, and approved the payment of bills.

CALLAHAN COUNTY --All industries:

The 265 outlets (up five over a year earlier) had gross sales (All industries) of \$17,449,389, down -.05 over the same period of 2002 when total sales were \$17,541,881. Of the six-month total, \$77,403 was subject to use tax and \$6,785,424 was subject to state sales and use tax.

Callahan mid-year Retail Trade Sales:

The 138 outlets (down one from 2002) had grass sales of \$10,880,739, up 11.6 per cent tax and \$14,242,745 was subject to sales and use tax. Definitions

Reporting Outlets: The number of individual business locations with a sales and use tax permit that filed a return.

Gross Sales: The total amount of all sales, leases and rentals of tangible personal property and all labor and service charges made during the reporting period.







During a yearlong planning process, volunteers and city leaders in Brownwood produced a living downtown master plan that resulted in renovations to more than 30 buildings. Streetscape construction is now underway as well.

The revitalization of downtown is key to growing business and tourism. With the Santa Fe Depot restored and a transportation museum on the drawing board (complete with a million dollar model train collection donated by a local family), Brownwood's heritage is the lifeblood for its future.

The community's hotel and motel tax revenues have increased almost 12 percent in the last two years, and 350 jobs have been retained or created. Brownwood's year-round "Feels Like Home" activities also include a bluegrass festival, rodeo, quilting bee and fishing tournaments.



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
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Son Of Cross Plains Resident Moves **Up The Ladder Of Navy Leadership**

by Mea Williams Boston - Standing proud in Boston's harbor is the U. S. Navy's oldest Commissioned warship, USS Constitution.

The vessel stands as a testament to 300 years of Navy traditions and values, and today serves as a training platform for newly selected chief petty officers, known as "Chiefs."

The time on board gave the latest generation of senior enlisted leaders a once-in-alifetime opportunity to live, work and train on the decks of "Old Ironsides."

Chief Petty Officer Charles Barreras, son of Paul Neeb of Cross Plains, was among the few chiefs selected from all points of the globe to explore the warship, learn principles of leadership and reconnect with the traditions and heritage of the U.S. Navy.

Barreras described what a typical day was like on board Constitution. "It is an honor being able to spend the amount of time we have on board this mighty warship. The days are long and full of training, which gives us so much knowledge of how the ship operated over the last 200 years.,"

Based on his experience, Barreras described a few of the similarities between values of Sailors in today's Navy and those of Sailors in the Navy 300 years ago. "We ourselves."

Barreras expressed happiness and pride in his sele ief, and commented on the lessons he'll share with fellow Sailors once he dons his new khaki uniform. "I am very proud I was selected as a chief petty officer. I have waited to don this uniform and I will take many lessons with me. The one lesson that stands out the most is the need to take care of the people that work for you," said Barreras, husband to the former Diannem Barreras and father of three.

Aside from his duty as a chief, Barreras spend times with his family. "The things I love are my children and wife. My family is the support in my life and I would not be where I am today if I didn't have them."

After days of intense training and indoctrination aboard the Navy's oldest ship, Chief Pctty Officer Charles Barreras and fellow chiefs are equipped and ready to serve in one of the highly influential positions in the Navy.

"But there are some items of particular concern, and our visit was an opportunity to continue expressing the needs of Texans straight to the top, an effort that will not end with this meeting."

Cornyn continued: "While positive many recommendations have been made to improve health care delivery to our veterans in Texas, I remain concerned about the possible closure of the VA facilities in Waco and Big Spring, and a significant reduction in service at the Kerrville facility," Cornyn said. "Sec. Principi is well aware of those concerns, and what Texas veterans expect for the future."

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
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



Shuttles often made their e-entry high in the atmosphere on the south side of the county, making a hypersonic dive to a landing at Cape Canaveral, Florida.

This morning about 7:55 a.m. the Shuttle crossed the California coast high above San Francisco. Within the next minutes it streaked across Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and West Texas veering slightly north of the usual Shuttle paths.

As it reached the vicinity of Stephens and Palo Pinto County, sonic booms were heard and the craft glowed with an eerie light. At that time, about 8 a.m., Mission Control in Houston and Cape Canaveral lost all contact with Columbia.

Several bright streaks were seen in the skies near Ft. Worth, then debris began to rain down on Nacogdoches and other areas.

Citizens across Texas, like others throughout the nation, were profoundly shocked. By the end of the day, lawmen and private citizens were

notified to look for pieces blown to earth from the explosion.

The explosion of the Shuttle Columbia and loss of the astronauts was a tragic event of a lifetime. And it happened only a few seconds from us.

Then came the war in Iraq, and it was no surprise. Saddam Hussein was a dictator who had defied the United Nations ever since the Gulf War settlement 12 years before.

Most people rallied when the President announced on March 19 that he chose to send the might of the U.S. Military into battle on foreign soil rather than await the day when "mass murder" might be unleashed on the American homeland. It sounded so simple. But along with the war came that parade of pictures in the newspapers, fresh-faced young people going to an ancient country to risk their lives.

The war began with "shock and awe" pictures of bombs bursting over Baghdad. The invasion followed, with a column moving across the deserts in the south. Hard, gritty fighting, but brilliantly executed!

In April we were treated to the capture of Baghdad, with statues of Hussein being pulled down. Surely the resistance was crumbling.

Oddly enough, it wasn't. And by the way, where was Saddam Hussein?

daily killing The continued, with guerilla-like warfare around the crumbling streets of the towns.

But finally, on Dec. 13, the whereabouts of Saddam Hussein was revealed. American forces caught him in a farmhouse near a town to

the north of Baghdad. Or, more accurately, he was under a farmhouse, down in a narrow hole.

In Texas, the year 2003 will also probably go down in history as the year of the Republican Redistricting.

At first many people were surprised - they thought they had been redistricted in 2001, after the 2000 census.

Yes, they were, but they were about to get it again. This time only the U.S. Congressional Districts were involved, but that was enough to create a stir that lasted for months.

Four Republican leaders reportedly directed these efforts: Tom Delay, Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives, Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, and Tom Craddick of Midland, Speaker of the House of Texas Representatives.

votes and rural votes being dominated by cities.

Republicans first offered a new map in the last weeks of the regular Legislative Session. Then 51 House Democrats boycotted a vote on the issue by fleeing to Ardmore, Oklahoma, for several days in May.

They didn't return until a House deadline passed and the measure was killed for the regular session.

Then Gov. Rick Perry called the first of three special sessions, each costing millions of dollars. During the first 30-day session the House passed the measure.

Republican Bill Ratliff joined 11 Democrats to prevent the bill from being considered in the Senate. Under rules and tradition, it took two-thirds of a majority to pass a bill there.

In a second special session, Dewhurst dropped the twothirds tradition for the Senate, and 11 Democrats fled to Albuquerque, N. M. to boycott the measure. When one of their group defected they came back.

A third special session was called, and things grew more tense. Senator Troy Fraser (R) had always opposed the redistricting, saying it was bad for his District. He was one of the few Republicans who did not back down.

On Sunday night, Oct. 12 in Austin the bill finally passed the Senate.

The re-drawn maps of the Congressional Districts were shocking to many. Twentyeight counties in the state were split, and the 17th District in West Texas was demolished.

In its place were three jagged horizontal Districts -

The primary deadline was moved to March 9, 2004 in hopes that it could be met.

After the vote in favor of redistricting, the matter moved to the Courts. A lawsuit was filed by the Democrats in Tyler, but then moved to a Federal Court in Austin.

On Friday, Dec. 19 a panel of Judges ruled in favor of the Republican plan, stating it was legal in Texas to redistrict between census counts. Another Court ruled that the new maps protected the interests of minorities.

So much attention had been focused on redistricting that most citizens were blissfully unaware of a number of other laws enacted by the Legislature during the regular session. County officials were bringing back the news from Austin - but it was still hard to see the effects of the \$10 billion shortfall.

Then, in August, Carole Keaton Strayhorn, State Comptroller, sent newspapers a huge list of new fees the public would pay in many areas of life.

"Texans To Pay \$2.7 Billion More Under New State Laws," her headlines read.

She listed new fees for teachers school and employees, health care (including rural Doctors), children (including increased rates for CHIPS participants), and business and professionals. The professionals included Courts and Attorneys.

Some of the proceedings in the trial over redistricting in Texas ended in Austin on Tuesday (Christmas Eve), and now the case will be considered by a three-judge federal panel.

One Federal Judge said a ruling would come at the end of next week at the earliest.

So far, all the rulings have favored the Republican plan for Congressional redistricting and the new map approved by the House and Senate.

This map could put as many as seven additional Republicans in Texas' congressional delegation, which is now held 17-15 by Democrats.

Republicans hold a majority in Congress, and the new Texas map would add to that.

Last week the U.S. Department of Justice gave clearance to the map after reviewing it for Voting Rights Acts violations. But that does not stop further litigation on the map.

Some say this matter will go all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court.

In the ruling Tuesday, Attorneys for the state used only a part of their allotted time to defend the map drawn by step in relocating the Court the Republicans.

> Attorney General Gregg Abbott reportedly said there was no need to defend the map, for the state felt Democratic and minority plaintiffs did not prove their case.



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In the meanwhile, candidates and counties are preparing for the March 9 Primary Election. Apparently, candidates who have filed under the current map will have to re-file if the new map is finally accepted.

One of the Districts in limbo on this is the 17th Congressional District, which includes a large part of West Texas. Under the new map it will be redrawn into three districts, taking in territory all the way to Midland and the New Mexico border west of Lubbock.

If the new plan is upheld, Eastland and Callahan County will land on the east side of an area called District 19.



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
