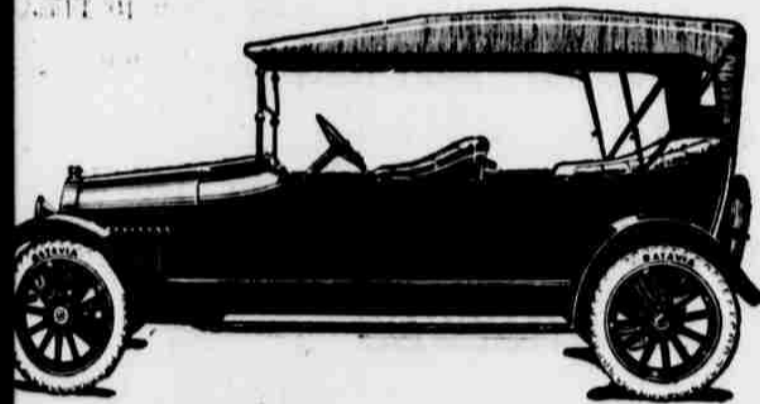

Warning! Danger!

All persons are warned that
there is very great danger in

tact with the wires of the trans-
mission lines between Haskell,
Rule, Knox City and Munday, or
with any of the apparatus or equip-

with great care, and in a manner
approved by the best practice,
and great efforts will be made to
maintain the lines in perfect con-
dition, but if by any accident any
wire should fall within reach it
should by no means be touched
even with a stick, but the com-
pany should be notified of the
condition as soon as possible.

Especially should children be
warned and parents and school
teachers are especially request-
ed to warn them, of the danger of
throwing at or shooting at, and
especially of the danger of throw-
ing wires at the lines, insulators
or equipment, as such may
result in a condition highly dan-
gerous to themselves and others.

As long as the lines are not
tampered with and are allowed
to remain as they have been in-
stalled there is no danger, as no
part which is dangerous has
been placed within reach of any
person on the ground or while
pursuing any usual means of
travel.

THE CAUSE AND PREVENTION OF BLACK LEG

Mr. W. H. Parks, a close observer and practical cattle raiser of Plemons, Texas, has written an article to a leading farm paper, in which he expresses the opinion and gives some practical experiments to show that the heel fly causes the black leg.

Having studied this troublesome fly for thirty years from nature, more than from books, I am prepared to endorse his opinion, which I wish to emphasize in this article and give my reasons for so believing.

In the first place we must be convinced of such a fly and know its true history before we can take intelligent steps to combat its ravages. Much to do is being made about the tick and its eradication, which is all well enough, but the heel-fly is by far the most destructive pest. A tick remains on a cow a few days only while the larvae of the heel-fly remains under the hide of a cow for ten to twelve months. The tick is comparatively local, the heel-fly is universal, hence the ravages and losses from the heel-fly greatly exceeds that of the tick.

Second: It is chiefly if not altogether, early calves born before April that die the next year with black leg. Calves that come after this date, when the heel-fly depredate little or none, are not affected with black leg. If those that die are skinned and examined, their backs will be found full of warbles or where these warbles have been. Again they die at that date when the warbles are mature and at the most aggravating stage from December to March as a rule. If a calf lives over the disease or is only infested partially, it becomes immune by the second year.

Third: These warbles cause clotted blood and putrid matter to form around where they make their nest and while in a growing stage the warbles consume this as their food and keep it from entering the blood circulation. But when the warbles become mature and begin to crawl out of the back in great numbers in late winter and early spring, they leave behind masses of this clotted blood and putrid matter, which causes blood poison when nature endeavors to absorb and remove this putrid mass. If the effort is too great for nature to accomplish, the calf dies and we call it black leg.

I am thoroughly convinced that the heel fly brings on the black leg, that I will unreservedly say that if every stock raiser will get the warbles out of the backs of his cattle as soon as they begin to make their appearance during July, August and September, he will never have another case of the black leg.

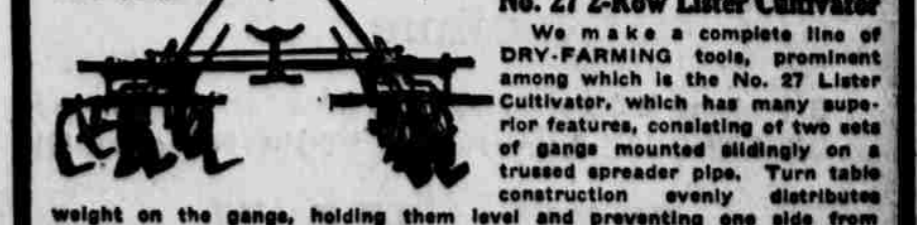

The School Trustees Make a State- ment of the Financial Condition and Needs of Haskell Independent School District.

We, the trustees of the Haskell Independent School District, desire that each patron of the school and each citizen of the town shall understand fully the financial conditions and needs of our school. We believe both patrons and citizens desire better schools and that they are willing to cooperate with the Board in an effort to secure funds sufficient to maintain a free school for a term of nine months. Our school is classified by the State Supt. of Schools and by the University of Texas as a school of first rank and all such schools are required to maintain a school for a term of nine months each year.

Many patrons and citizens do not realize the problems which confront the school Trustees. Our buildings must be repaired, seats and stoves must be purchased for additional school rooms; three or four additional teachers must be employed in order to take care of the scholastic population of nine hundred children; children should be provided with free school for a term of nine months and enough teachers should be employed to relieve the crowded conditions we have in the rooms and allow children to come to school for the full school day rather than half day, as many are now coming.

Our receipts for next year will

be as follows: If the state apportionment of six dollars per capita is not lowered this year (It was lowered two dollars per capita last year), we will secure approximately \$5,400.00 from Austin next year. The tax rolls of last year show a real estate value in this district of \$853,105 and a personal property value of \$482,879.00. The school rate of fifty cents will secure \$6,670. provided that tax values are not lowered and provided there are no delinquent taxes. The amount that should be considered available, without a reasonable doubt, is \$6,000. The local taxes and the state apportionment gives a sum total of \$11,400.

Our expenditures for next year should be as follows: Repair of buildings, purchase of stoves, fuel, seats, insurance and other incidental expenses will call for at least \$1,500. The heavy bonded indebtedness of the district calls for \$2,500. for interest and sinking fund next year. From this it may be seen that \$4,000. of the \$11,400. must be spent for purposes other than teachers and janitors. Assuming that the Board employ enough teachers to allow children full day sessions and to take care of the children without over-crowding them and assuming that no change be made in salaries (The salaries of our teachers at present are lower than they are in the average school of our rank in the state), the amount necessary to pay teachers and janitors for one month is \$1,500. \$13,500. would be required

to pay teachers and janitors for a term of nine months. Our total expenditure for next year in order to provide a free school for all of our children for nine months should and would be \$17,500.

With the foregoing facts in mind, it is obvious that the Board of Trustees must do one of three things: (1) They may employ teachers and provide for a term of free school for five months and close the public school at the end of that time. (2) They may require regular tuition [\$2.00 per month in the grades and \$3.00 per month in the High School] for the first four months of school and have five months of free school following the pay school. (3) They may do like Rule, Anson and many of the schools of this section of the State are doing, namely; they may select an assessor and a collector of taxes; appoint a board of equalization; and assess property in the district at a value sufficient to raise the necessary school funds to maintain the school for the desired term.

Citizens and patrons are requested to meet with the Board in the Court House next Monday night at eight o'clock. Each of the above three plans will be discussed and the Board wishes to secure an expression from the patrons and citizens relative to the best course to pursue. If interested meet with us at the Court House Monday night.

Cost of Living Rising Higher

Of course everybody knows it costs a plenty to live, and have a general idea that things are getting higher, but would be surprised at the many different things effected, and the enormous advances in price.

In the drug line, Calomet has only advanced about 500 per cent, castor oil 400 per cent, carbolic acid just about 1000 per cent, wood alcohol 200, and paragoric 250 per cent, etc.

In dry goods, everything that is dyed has advanced. Shoes and gloves are about 10 per cent higher.

Everything in the grocery line is advancing both staple and fancy. Sugar about 25 per cent, syrup 10, candy, and all sweets about 10 to 15 per cent, can goods about 10 per cent. Meats both fresh and cured are advancing.

Last but not least, everything that a print shop must use has advanced in price from 10 to 25 per cent.

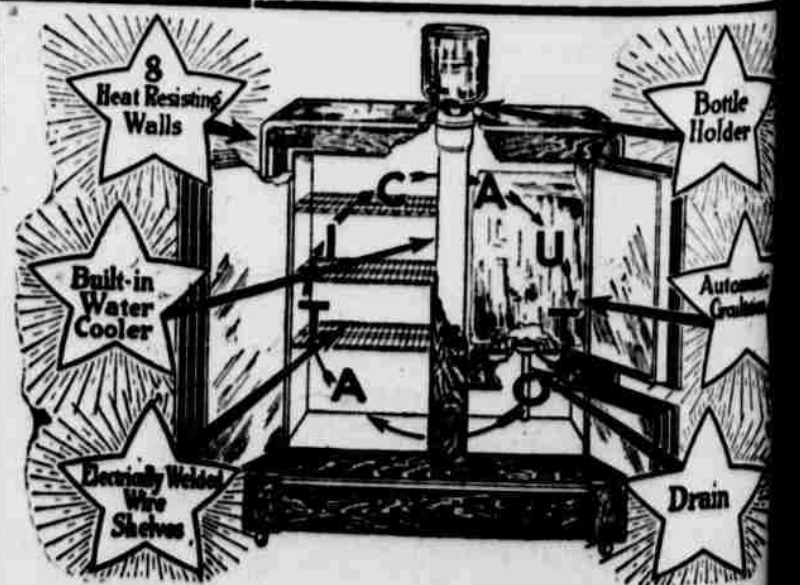
