Actual work on the paving of the public square in Haskell has been under way for several weeks. Part of the curb has been finished, and the first layer of concrete and brick is being put down this week. The hammer of the knocker who said, "It can't be done," is silent. Haskell is striving to deserve her reputation as one of the liveliest and most progressive towns in West Texas.

The *Stanford Leader* this week comes forth as a semi-weekly edition. According to a statement in Tuesday's issue, this step is being done to care for the increased advertising and holiday business. The *Leader* hereafter will be issued on Mondays and Thursdays each week and the first issue carries a good volume of advertising and news. The *Leader* is one of the best weeklies published in this section and we wish them success as a semi-weekly.

With the third annual show of the Haskell County Poultry Association, the most successful of any yet held, those who have ventured into poultry raising as a pleasant, as well as profitable venture, find much encouragement. And there are sure to be a number of farmers who do not raise poultry to become interested in more and better poultry as a profitable venture, with the result that our county and its citizens will become more prosperous. This section has proven to be ideally adapted to poultry raising with cheap feed and good marketing facilities, and if every farmer in Haskell County were to devote only a part of their time to the care and raising of a flock of poultry, our country would be one of the most prosperous in the south.

According to F. L. Caldwell, manager of the Haskell Produce Co., he had paid to the turkey raisers of Haskell County already this season the sum of \$4,500.00; and has contracted with the Haskell County Turkey Raisers Association for 2,000 turkeys to be delivered during the next ten days, at 32 cents per pound which will amount to approximately \$10,800.00, a total of \$15,300.00. He also estimates that one thousand more turkeys will come in from individual raisers, which will easily swell the total to \$20,000.00. Twenty thousand dollars paid to the farmers of Haskell County for turkeys in one season! Those farmers who do not raise turkeys should need no further encouragement to cause them to take advantage of a venture that will pay 100 per cent on the investment.

Who's \$50?

We were much surprised the other day to find \$50—fifty perfectly good dollars—lying along the roadway in the corner of a field, belonging to one of our most prominent farmers. It had been there for several weeks and looked much the worse for wear.

The \$50 was in the shape of a CORN PLANTER. It was rusting fast. By spring it would be worth \$50 any more. Another season and it will be worth about 50 cents unless it is protected.

HOTEL OWNED BY HASKELL MAN DESTROYED BY FIRE

M. R. Jones, a farmer living a few miles east of Haskell, was in the city Friday, and stated that he had just received a telegram from Post City stating that the Harper Hotel, owned by himself had been destroyed by fire Monday. One man was probably fatally burned in the fire, which destroyed the hotel and entire contents.

Mr. Jones stated that the hotel was a 31 room two-story building, and that he had been unable to get insurance on either the building or contents. He estimates his loss to be something like \$35,000.00.

A STATEMENT

Prompted by the change in the management that is being made in the Haskell National Bank, we think it appropriate to make a statement of the following facts, and comparative figures:

The earnings of the Haskell National Bank for the first twenty-four years of its existence amounted to approximately \$160,000, or about 265 per cent. The earnings for the next seven years, or until January 1st, 1922, was approximately \$112,000, or about 186 per cent. During the past seven years of the bank during which time, R. C. Couch was concerned with its management the bank made money each year and paid a substantial dividend for each year. It has been the policy of the bank during this time to clean up the bad paper once each year, pay the revenue taxes due before the dividend is paid. When this is done this year we know that the assets of the institution will be in good shape.

The Haskell National Bank, during the past seven years has been a large factor in the marketing, as well as the growing of the agricultural products of the county and practically the marketing of 90 per cent of such products, including cotton and grain, has passed through the regular channels of the bank with no loss whatever to the bank in so doing. In the meantime its customers were cared for in a manner satisfactory to us both.

During the strenuous deflation period of 1921 the bank borrowed but little money and was proud of its ability in being able to aid its customers and at the same time be of assistance to a number of other West Texas banks in tiding them over the low ebb.

We consider the above a commendable showing especially when we remember that the stock sales of the bank in 1915 were around \$125.00 per share or below book value as compared with \$200.00 and better per share, on the average, on sales made in recent years which was above book value or at a premium.

We consider that Mr. Couch is leaving a much better bank than he entered in that the assets have been considerably improved, the generally policy and clerical methods of the bank kept in line with improving and changing conditions.
