
Relay for Life set Saturday in Munday

Officials jump into river boundary issue AUSTIN – When temperamental river with mud

banks and sand bars defines the border between two states or two countries, there's a natural potential for conflict between humans on both sides of it.

And so, a 140-acre plot of land along the Red River border between Texas and Oklahoma became a growing news topic last week. That particular plot is within some 90,000 acres of land along a 116-mile stretch of the river that has some people worried about federal tinkering with the border.

While the U.S. Bureau of Land Management stated it is not expanding federal holdings along the river and is not involved in litigation between two landowners vying for the 140 acres, a lineup of lawmakers floated statements on the issue.

Gov. Rick Perry called what was going on a federal land grab. Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst said what the BLM is doing makes his blood boil. Attorney General Greg Abbott blasted what he termed a "potential seizure of land that rightfully belongs to Texas landowners." Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples urged the BLM "to immediately cease any attempt to seize private lands from Texas citizens."

U.S. Congressional District 13 Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Amarillo, whose sprawling district includes those 116 miles, wrote to the BLM in January to head off the threat of potential losses to Texas landowners. In a reply to Thornberry dated March 17, a BLM official wrote "... there are no claims to Federal land south of the gradient bank of the river, and no claims to Federal land in the State of Texas as defined by multiple rulings of the U.S. Supreme Court."

The letter to Thornberry, signed by Steven G. Tryon of the BLM's Tulsa, Okla., field

and Wichita counties, and part of Clay County, all of which border the Red River along the 116 miles mentioned previously are in exceptional drought. Also in exception drought are the across-the-river Oklahoma counties of Harmon, Jackson, Tillman and part of Cotton County.

Panel to study coastal barriers

House Speaker Joe Straus on April 25 named 11 legislators to the Joint Interim Committee to Study a Coastal Barrier System.

Straus said the committee will study the effects of recent changes made to the Texas Open Beaches Act, a law that grants the public a free and unrestricted right to access state-owned beaches and a right to use any public beach extending from the line of mean low tide to the line of vegetation bordering the Gulf of Mexico.

House Bill 3459, signed into law last year, created a process allowing the land commissioner to suspend the designation of a new line of vegetation for three years. The committee also will examine the feasibility and desirability of maintaining a coastal barrier system in Texas and of authorizing coastal property owners to grant easements to governmental entities to build and maintain stabilized dunes, according to the Speaker's statement.

Unemployment rate drops

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 5.5 percent in March, down two-tenths of a percentage point from February's rate of 5.7 percent, Texas Workforce Commission announced April

Employers added 9,100 jobs in March for a total of 310,000 jobs added over the year and the annual growth rate for total nonagricultural employment has remained at or above 2.6 percent since January 2012, the agency said.



will be remembered as a cold and dry one for most of Texas following a wetter than normal fall and good stand establishment for most wheat fields across the state. This is a significant reversal of the 2012-2013 crop which got off to a dry start in the fall, but received some timely rains and cool temps in the spring to finish out the crop. The Panhandle and portions of the South Plains have been the exceptions both years with persistent drought and poor stands. Two common themes remain though throughout the state: (1) soil moisture profiles remain mostly depleted of any significant moisture, particularly in the High Plains and Rolling Plains and (2) freeze injury in wheat is once again on everyone's mind.

already been marked by one, somewhat minor, freeze event which occurred on March 3. During this cold spell, temperatures bottomed out in the single digits as far south as Lubbock, low teens were common for the Rolling Plains, mid-teens were experienced from San Angelo to Waco, and subfreezing temperatures were even recorded throughout the coastal bend region. Despite these extreme temperatures for March, most wheat was not far enough advanced to be susceptible to freeze damage thanks to a colder than normal winter which still has wheat delayed by up to 2 weeks. Severe leaf burn was observed through much of the Blacklands Region; however, further inspection revealed limited damage to growing points and wheat has since grown out of the superficial damage. 
The spring of 2014 has some stem damage did occur colder temperatures down to during this event near and south of College Station which has led to some producer reports of lodging in their fields.

> We are now into mid-April and wheat has initiated jointing even in the far northern reaches of the Panhandle, which means wheat everywhere in the state is more susceptible to subfreezing temperatures. Wheat is near flowering currently from the College Station to Waco area and westward towards the Concho Valley and is most susceptible to freeze injury (>2 hr @ 32°F) at this stage. In Lamesa, wheat is still at Feekes 7 (no flag leaf emergence yet); however, wheat is at the late boot to early heading stages in portions of the Rolling Plains and central Blacklands. Heads are visible on earliest maturing varieties at research plots in Ennis County and Chillicothe. The northern Blacklands region (north and east of Dallas) still remains largely in the early boot stage. The Panhandle region is largely in the Feekes 6-8 stage (mid jointing), so wheat can take

24°F still.

Temperatures across Texas this morning, April 15, are cause for concern. Readings of 30-32°F were recorded near Waco, where wheat is at or near flowering. However, temperatures may not have sustained subfreezing temperatures long enough to cause significant damage. Likewise, the Brady and San Angelo areas have some wheat around flowering, but temperatures registered in the upper 20's and for over 2 hours in many cases. Temperatures ranged from the low 30's to the mid 20's throughout much of the Rolling Plains while the South Plains were mostly in the low to mid 20's. Some spots even bottomed out in the upper teens (Muleshoe, 16°F; Floydada, 19°F; Tahoka, 19°F), which is cold enough to damage even early jointed wheat. Fortunately, much of the Panhandle remained in the mid 20's, which should avoid major widespread damage to the wheat crop, though colder spots and thus potential isolated damage cannot be completely ruled out.

Wheat, canola, triticale and cropping systems will be highlighted during a field day May 14 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research Chillicothe Station, located south of Chillicothe on Farm-to-Market Road 392.

The annual Hardeman County Wheat Field Tour and the Rolling Plains Spring Field Day, held every three years, will be combined this year, according to Steven Sparkman, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agricultural and natural resources agent for Hardeman County.

Special guest Julie Borlaug, external relations director for Texas A&M AgriLife Research's Norman Borlaug Institute for International Agriculture, will be the keynote speaker at the noon luncheon.

"It is fitting that we bring Julie in to speak with our producers at an event such as this because this is the 100th anniversary of the birth of her grandfather, Dr. Norman E. Borlaug, who was called the 'Father of the Green Revolution," said Dr. Jackie Rudd, AgriLife Research wheat breeder in Amarillo and coplanner of the event.

"He is credited with saving the lives of millions worldwide with his research that yielded

higher producing grains for developing countries," Rudd said. "Most of the high yielding, disease-resistant wheat varieties in the world trace back to germplasm developed by Dr. Borlaug."






