





East Texas Eating 1975 Recipe Contest. My mother passed it on to me

Thanksgiving season on into the new year has been pumpkin pie time since early America. Pioneer Virginia and Maryland homemakers sliced the top off pumpkins, scooped out the fiber and seeds, filled the pumpkins with milk and baked them on the open hearth. Later, a greased pan sprinkled with rye meal was filled with pumpkin combined with milk and spices. Later, the pastry crust was added. Pumpkin pies, as lots of others, were "about the thickness of a board" so as to stretch the meager food supplies of those days. The pumpkin pie we enjoy today is usually a custard type pie; eggs added when they became available lend smooth texture and rich flavor. A couple of other ingredients have been added to the pumpkin pie recipe that Mrs. W.C. Chisam, of Gainesville, has graciously agreed to share with East Texas Eating readers. Her Pumpkin Chiffon Pie was the grand prize winner of the

Mrs. Chisam's Pumpkin Chiffon Pie 1 T. unflavored gelatin 1/4 cup orange juice

3 egg yolks 1 cup sugar 11/4 c. cooked or canned pumpkin

1/2 cup milk 1/2 tsp. salt ½ tsp. nutmeg 3 egg whites

Soften gelatin in orange juice. In top of double boiler, beat egg yolks until bubbly; stir in 1/2 cup sugar, pumpkin, milk, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until thickened. Stir in softened gelatin and continue to stir until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat; chill until slightly thicker than unbeaten egg white consistency.

Beat egg whites until forming stiff peaks; gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar, about 1 tablespoon at mixture into egg whites; pour into baked pastry shell. Chill until firm.

Deer Have Bugs Too

Many hunters have killed a deer and then found that the animal was infested with 'bugs''. Have you ever wondered what they are, what they do and will they bite man? Dr. James burn made a business trip to Robinson, Extension area entomologist at the Texas A&M. University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton, says that most deer killed in Texas are healthy, but do have their share of external parasites. The most common are deer keds, biting lice and ticks.

'Deer keds, which are actually wingless flies, are about one-fourth inch long and have short strong legs and a flattened body," Robinson said. "Their shape allows them to move sideways among the hairs much easier. The deer ked sucks blood from the deer through hypodermic type mouth parts. They may be found in chains of three or four with the first fly drawing blood from the host, the second with its mouth parts thrust into the abdomen of the first, the third spent last weekend with her drawing on the second and so parents, Mr. and Mrs. on. Deer keds do not attack man but may crawl on the body and cause an itchy feeling."

"Biting lice, usually no longer than one-eighth inch, feed on hair and skin," the entomologist continued. "They do not such blood and cause little harm to deer. Their body is also flattened and wingless. These critters are not harmful to man but may get between the skin and clothing and cause a person to think they have the

"Ticks are a different matter," Robinson cautions. "Several species of ticks may be found on deer and they will also attack man. certain diseases which are transmittable to man. Caution should be taken when handling or skinning a deer to prevent ticks from moving from the deer carcass to man.' "Proper care of the deer



Possibly the most popular burglary prevention device that is used on homes is the burglar bar. Attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division say, however, that homeowners should be wary of certain unscrupulous burglar bar businesses. Our attorneys switch" tactics. Unscrupulous operators guarantee or warranty. often advertise in local newspapers and distribute promotional fliers offering to sell and install burglar bars at a very low price. Consumers are also urged by the advertisements to contact the company for free estimates.

If a consumer inquires about the low-cost burglar sales representatives will induce the customer to reputation. purchase a better quality bar at a much higher price. This is a typical "bait and switch" tactic.

These unscrupulous sales people fail to mention that the bars are small and flexible and have only limited They may also represent that call toll-free: 1-800-252-9236.

the bars are guaranteed for 30 years and won't rust or need to be painted for five years, when in truth the window guards are often improperly installed and show rust within a year. Defective burglar bars have even been known to cause damage to some homes after being installed improperly.

*Do not fall for "bait and advertisement offers burglar bars at in incredibly low price, to purchase the bars, make sure you get a written

Q. We're a group of high school students and we need an argument settled. Is it true that teenagers have more accidents than older drivers? T.B., San Antonio

A. Unfortunately, it's true. The yearly accident rate for drivers under 20, as measured by the National Safety Council, is consistently higher than the rate for other ages, with the 20-24 age group next. The fatality rate is highest for the 20-24 group, and the under-20 group is second. In fact, motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause of death for those between 15 and 24 years of age . . . Lots of room for improvement.

Q. Is it the law anywhere in the United States that drivers and passengers must use their safety belts in a car? J.F., Amarillo

A. No state, at present, has a mandatory safety belt law, although such a law does exist in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. Tennessee law calls for infants in cars to be properly restrained. Several Canadian provinces, parts of Australia and some European countries have belt laws. In all cases where these laws have been enacted, accident injuries and fatalities have dropped sharply.

Q. Winter's not far off, and someone at ork was talking about his car's freeze plug. What was he referring to? K.W., Austin

A. Freeze plugs are metal alloy "corks" in the water jacket of the engine block. The plugs pop out to relieve pressure if water in the block should freeze, to prevent the block from cracking. But don't count on freeze plugs alone to protect your engine block. Keep the proper mixture of antifreeze and water in your car for cold-weather driving.



Older Workers Called **Loyal and Diligent**

While many companies are upset by recent legislative changes raising the mandatory retirement age from 65 to 70, Bankers Life and Casualty Company of Chicago, Ill. has no special policy for older employees.

"We deal with all identifiable employee groups the same way." Bankers Life vice president Gerald Maquire told a writer from the National Council on the Aging. "Whether a person is elderly, handicapped. female or represents a minority, he or she is expected to contribute their best efforts to the company."

Not only is there no mandatory retirement age at Bankers Life, but the company also hires new employees who are over 65.

"We're concerned with their ability to do the job they're hired for, not with their ages," Maquire said.

For example, Frances Stapleton worked for 20 years as the secretary to the president of another insurance company until she was forced to retire at age 65. Now over 70, Mrs. Stapleton has received three promotions since joining Bankers Life about six years ago.

After 42 years with the post office. Herschel Bold started with Bankers in 1965 when he was 68 years old. According to Bold. he was retired for three years when he "got tired of it." and decided to go back to work.

"Bankers has had the same attitude toward older workers as far back as 1954." Maquire said, "and in that time we've heard all

rid of the employee who can no longer do the job. a problem that many personnel managers feel is best handled by mandatory retirement.

On this subject. Maquire said. "We've found that our employees are among the first to realize when their productivity is suffering. In most cases, employees retire voluntarily when this happens. Pride and concern for the company are among the chief factors, although I wouldn't discount financial security through the company pension plan and social security

payments." Maquire also feels that older workers are valuable in an intangible way and

'Perhaps we don't have space-age personality but we like it that way, Maquire said. "Our older employees teach us persistence, diligence, loyalty, a day's work for a day's pay, trust and honesty. These are values that every employer is searching for."

Among the airlines offering these special fares are Allegheny. American, Braniff, Delta, Eastern, National. Northwest, Ozark, TWA, United and Western.

Some airlines do have certain restrictions, such as limiting discounts to flights within the continental United States, so check with the airline before making reservations.




