Rebels Lose Bi-District Tilt

The Rivercrest Rebels had the opportunities and the "breaks" to take the Bi-District Championship from the Hawkins Hawks Friday night at Mount Vernon, but the Rebels were unable to turn their good luck into points on the scoreboard. The Hawks took the victory and the title, 28-6.

Only in the first period,

when the Hawks fumbled and Rebel Ricky Franks recovered on the 34 yard line, were the Rebels able to convert a turnover into a touchdown. A series of short yardage, conservative plays pushed the Rebels to the three yard line, where Billy Scales went in for the touchdown. Jimmy Via's extra point kick was blocked.

The Hawks then began

their penetration of the Rebel line, scoring early in the second quarter from the one yard line.

The Rebels had an opportunity to score on their next possession, but the drive died on the 12 yard line, and a field goal attempt by Jimmy Via was unsuccessful.

The Hawks were able to put another seven points on the board from the seven yard line in the second quarter, bringing the score at half time to 14-6.

Rivercrest's biggest break came with the second half kickoff when Gregg Norman recovered the ball on the Hawks seven yard line, with Hawkins apparently waiting for the ball to roll out of bounds.

With first and goal to go, the Rebels still could not penetrate the Hawkins defenses, giving up on fourth down with an interception.

From their six yard line, the Hawks marched to the Rivercrest 12 yard line, where Ricky Franks knocked the ball loose from the Hawkins ball carrier and Billy Scales recovered the fumble.

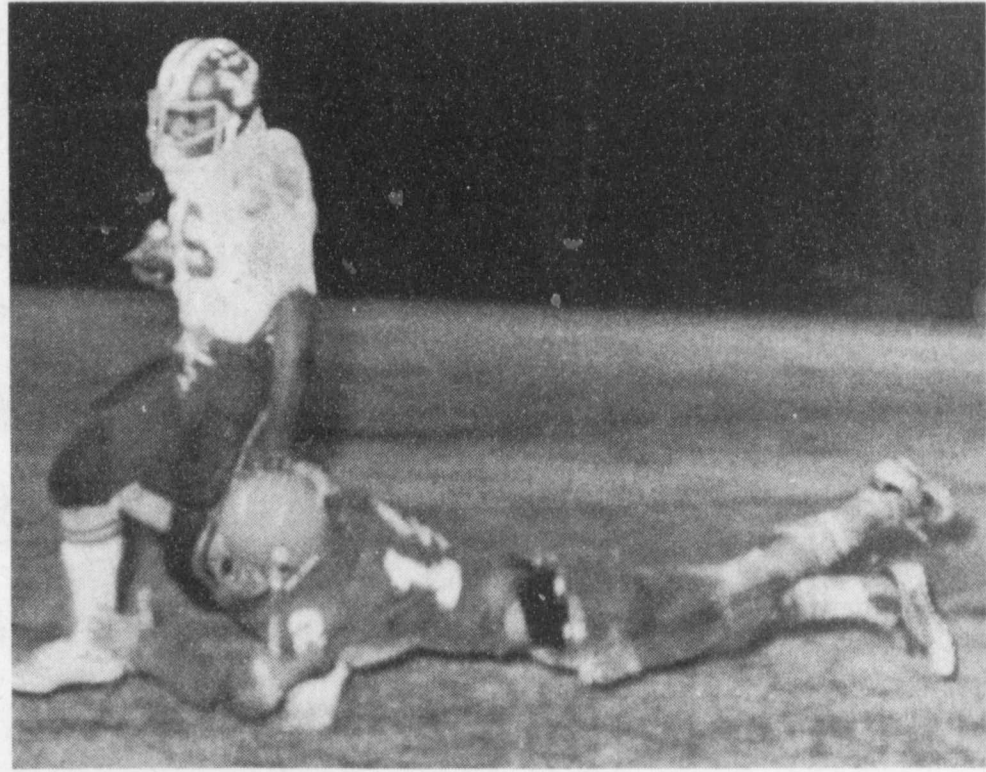
This fumble the Rebels converted into a touchdown play on a pass from quarterback Kip Stansell to Jimmy Via, but the score was called back on holding call. The fourth down punt by Nicky Brown was blocked and recovered on the Rivercrest five yard line, and the Hawks scored on third down.

An interference call on a pass from Stansell to Gregg Norman put the ball on the Hawkins 20 yard line, but the Rebels were again unable to penetrate the Hawks defenses to get on the scoreboard.

The Rebels stopped the next Hawkins drive, but another interception by the alert Hawks defense stopped the Rebels efforts.

The final Hawkins score came with only eight seconds left on the clock.

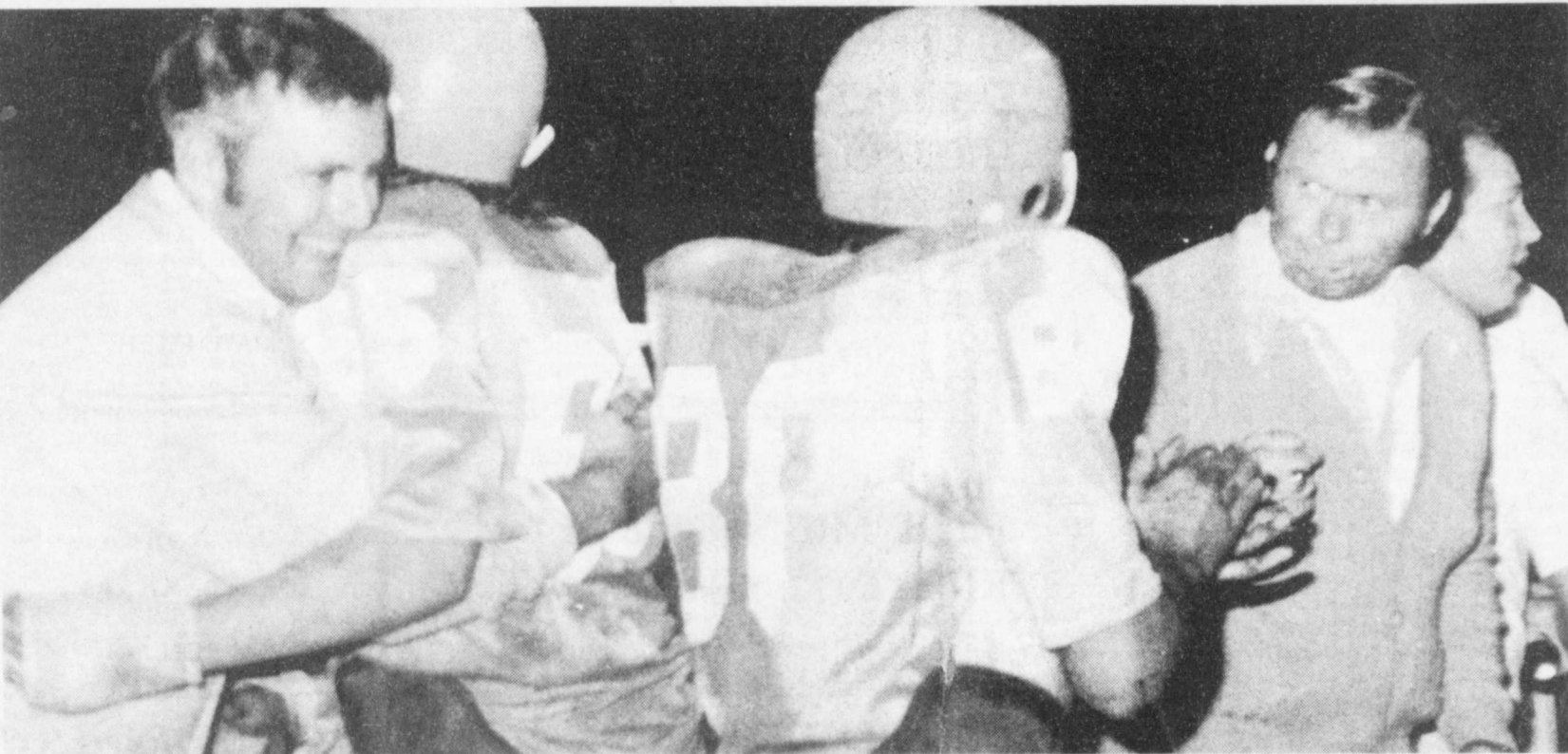
Christmas Parades Scheduled

Food Stamp Recipients Will No Longer Pay

Food stamp recipients will no longer pay for their food stamps after December 1. That is the date new federal regulations will go into effect, in Texas.

The change, according to Texas Department of Human Resources Com-

missioner Jerome Chapman, is intended to help lower income people who cannot accumulate enough cash to buy all the stamps they need for a month's worth of food.

"Accumulating enough cash to pay their rent and

utilities and still have enough left over to buy food stamps has been simply more than many people could handle," Chapman said. He said the change should make the food stamp program more accessible to those who really need assistance in putting food on their tables.

In addition to the December 1 change, other regulation changes are set for March of 1979, Chapman said. The spring regulation changes will deal with eligibility requirements for food stamp recipients.

Under the new system going into effect Dec. 1, recipients will be mailed monthly an "authorization to participate" card, which they will be able to exchange for the food stamps for which they are eligible. Food stamp recipients will receive fewer stamps than under the present system, which means that in order to maintain the same level of nutrition as they have currently, they will have to spend some of their own money at the grocery store.

What To Do Until The Ambulance Arrives

What would you do? While driving on a lightly traveled road, you see a car swerve into the ditch, roll twice and smash into a telephone pole. You're five miles from the nearest town. And you've never had any kind of first aid training. How could you help that wreck victim survive until an Emergency Medical Services ambulance arrived?

Dr. Clarence Temple, Medical Director for the Ark-Tex COG EMSS program, says there are quite a few things untrained persons can do to help a victim survive those first critical minutes after an accident.

"The first thing you've got to remember," Temple says, "is to park at least 60 feet beyond the wrecked vehicle. You need to be that far away so that an ambulance or other emergency vehicle can get as close as possible to the wreck. Don't park directly behind the wreck. That would block the view of oncoming motorists."

"Once your car is in the right place, remember your own safety as you approach the wreck," said Temple. "If any power lines are near or touching the car, stay away. Shout at any conscious victims in the car to stay put. There is no safe way to get out of a car with an electric current running through or around it. All you can do in a situation like that is to wait for help from the telephone or power company. They're the only ones who can safely handle those live wires."

"If there's no threat of electrocution, do what you can to help," Temple advised. "But your first

thought should be: Do not move the victim. Rushing in and pulling an injured person to a safer place has crippled more persons than has any other error." What may happen, he explained, is that the movement could aggravate a spinal injury.

There are two exceptions to the "don't move the victim" rule, Temple says. If the victim is in danger of further injury, move him as gently and as quickly as possible. Examples: fire, rising water. Neither of these is common. If an automobile doesn't catch fire at impact, it probably won't, even if there's gasoline all around—unless someone helps it. Turn off the car's ignition, and don't let anyone with a cigarette get near you.

The other exception is when the victim is not breathing. That doesn't mean he's dead—not yet. Once you are at the victim's side, the first thing to do is to be sure he is breathing. Look for chest movement; listen, if these don't show anything feel for breath by placing your cheek or your ear very near the victim's mouth and nose. If you neither see, hear, nor feel a breath, you've got to move the injured person.

This can be done gently and in the following way: open the victim's mouth and remove any obstructions, then tilt the head back. That's often all that is necessary to start the breath flowing again. If that doesn't work, and if you don't know how to administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation, hope for help quick. You don't have much time left. Without oxygen, brain damage begins in four to six minutes and death comes quickly.

Once you're sure the victim is breathing, do what you can to control any serious bleeding.

"That doesn't mean to apply a tourniquet," Temple says. "That could do more harm than good except in the case of a severed limb. Control the bleeding by applying direct pressure with your hand to the site of the bleeding. Use a handkerchief, a cloth, your shirt, any kind of padding you want, but use your hand. And apply pressure directly to the wound."

Temple says there's one other basic you should remember: talk to the victim. If he is conscious, pain and fear are likely to be so intense that he may enter a state of shock that could worsen the effect of the injuries. Your voice can help overcome fear. Comfort the victim. Assure him that help is on the way. If possible, hold the victim's hand. Control your own emotions.

None of this will be easy for a person without any training. Temple says it's a strain even for the emergency medical technicians and other ambulance personnel who are trained to handle such emergencies. But if you can remember just the following five points, you'll have a chance of keeping a person alive long enough for that trained help to arrive. These points are: my safety, no movement, breathing, bleeding, and talk.

And you need not worry about legal liability. Texas' Good Samaritan Law protects all who administer emergency first aid, unless they are willfully and wantonly negligent, says Temple.

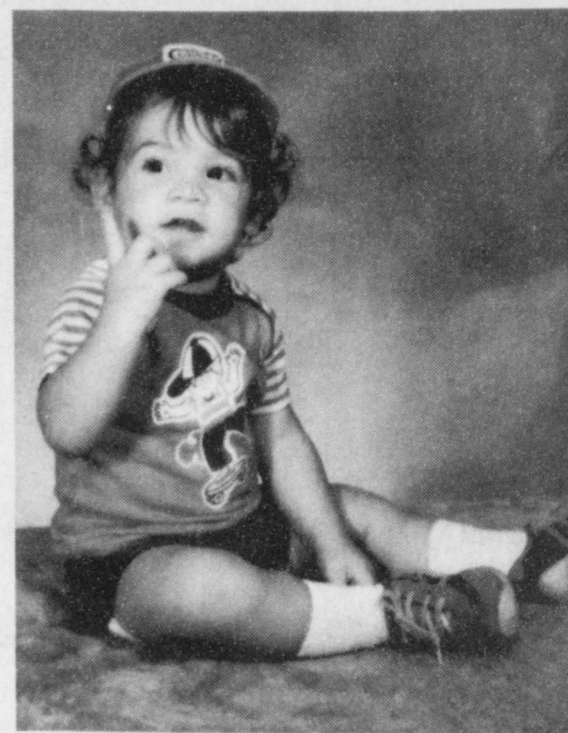
