Norman, wide receiver; and Nicky Brown, tight end. Defensively, placers on the second team from River-

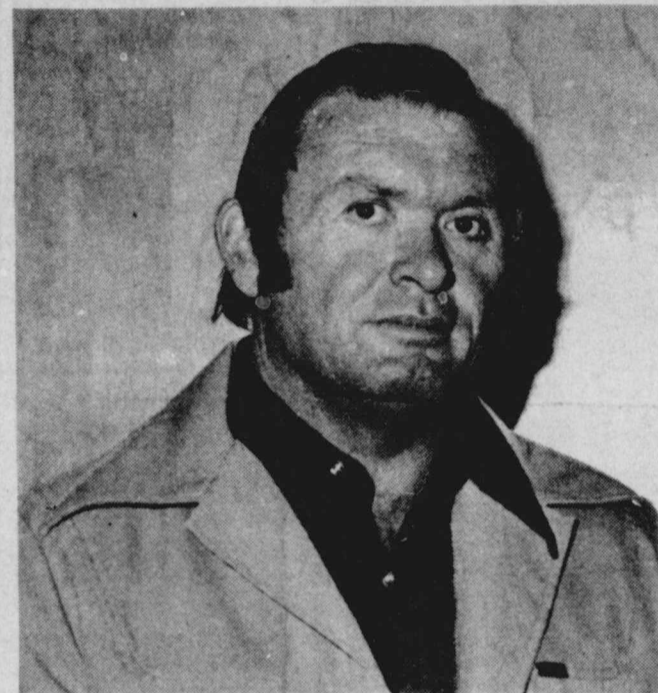
crest were Nicky Brown at end; and Gregg Norman, back.

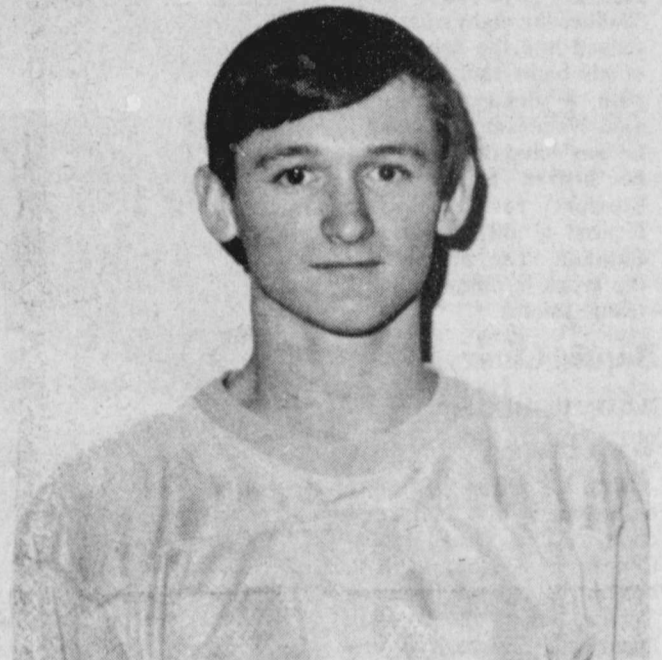

Officers Consider Incidents Unrelated

Red River County Sheriff Avret Vaughan and Lamar County Sheriff Roger Peterson agreed Tuesday that incidents last week concerning the rape of a 16 year old Rivercrest High School student and the attack the same evening on a 30 year old Cunningham woman in Deport were unrelated.

The incidents in Bogata, upon which no charges have been filed pending the meeting of the Red River

Grand Jury on Friday, occurred between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. Wednesday, December 6. Shortly after 9 p.m. that night, Linda Duarte, an employee of Down Home Cafe in Deport, was driving home from work and had stopped for traffic on Highway 271 to turn left, and a man with a knife jumped into her car. Ms. Duarte kicked the man repeatedly, causing him to cut himself, then kicked him out of the car, according to officers.

An extensive search of the area turned up nothing that night, but Monday, blood stains and other evidence were discovered which led officers to believe the man hid in the attic of the Larry Driggers home, about three blocks from where the attack took place.

Another report was received by the sheriff's department Friday night that a man in an orange shirt was seen in the same neighborhood, and when challenged, ran away. "The only description we have is the orange shirt," Peterson said. "We don't have any information on a beard or anything like that."

The motive (in the Deport incident) appears to be robbery and not rape," he said. "We think he's local, and he wanted her purse or car."

Gas Service Halted

Temperatures dipped to twenty degrees Thursday, Dec. 7, when many Deport and Bogata residents spent the night without the benefits of heat because of a malfunction in a natural gas regulator in Fulbright.

Lone Star Gas Co. crews worked throughout the day and night Thursday and all day Friday first shutting off the service throughout the area and then restoring service to residents.

Although the valve was replaced and service was restored by 9:30 p.m. Thursday to the Deport Nursing Home and to many other residents in the west part of Deport, many residents on the east side of Deport were without gas until 8:30 Friday morning. Approximately 850 customers were affected by the shutoff, which occurred between 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. By 5 p.m., City Drug Store in Deport had sold out of portable electric heaters because gas company officials were not sure how long the shutoff would last. About 30 Lone Star gas employees worked throughout the night in the bitter cold, knocking on doors and lighting pilots

after the regulator was replaced about 9:30. Among the first to have service restored were residents of the Deport Housing Authority, primarily senior citizens. Reports of a man loose in Deport who had attacked a woman in a car near Shipp's Grocery the previous night, only complicated matters for gas company employees, who had to assure residents of their identity over and over before being allowed to enter some homes to light pilots.

Board Approves Audit

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, December 5 at 7:00 p.m.

In major action taken, the school audit report for the 1977-78 school year was approved. Also, authorization was given to make needed repairs to the roof of the Talco Elementary School.

In other matters, a Textbook Committee was approved, a new school bus was ordered, an amendment was made to the student tardy policy at Rivercrest, acknowledgement was made of the purchase of a copy machine by the Talco PTO for the Talco Elementary School, and the various financial reports were approved.

In matters related to personnel, the resignation of Dorothy Morgan as a Title I Reading teacher was accepted.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be January 9, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. with the public cordially invited to attend.

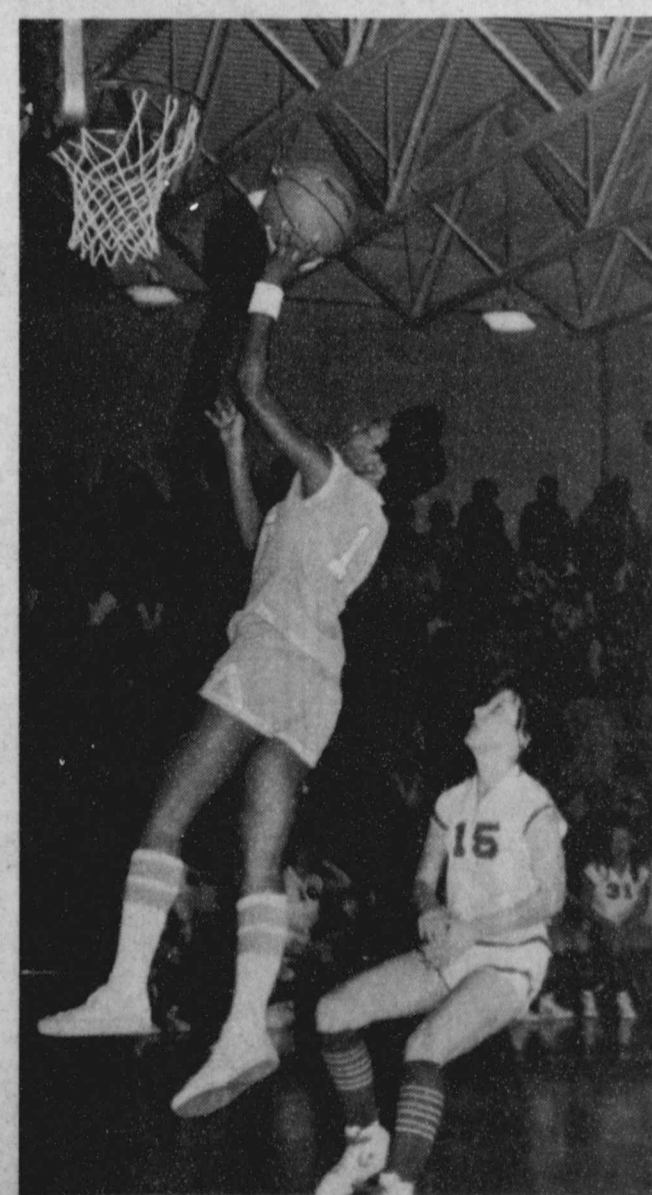
Agriculture Movement To Have Supper

Sponsors of the program are the PJC Continuing Education Division and the American Heart Association. Paris Junior College is charging a \$3.00 fee to be used for maintenance of the mannequins and to purchase equipment.

Cardio pulmonary resuscitation is a method of restoring a heartbeat to victims of cardiac arrest. It is a combination of artificial respiration and chest compression.

Upon completion of the course, certificates from the American Heart Association will be given to the students. "Many lives have been saved by those who know the

cardio pulmonary techniques and can perform them while professional help is on the way," said Mrs. Bill Jones, director of continuing education at PJC. "You can be a lifesaver, and the life you save may be someone you love," she added.

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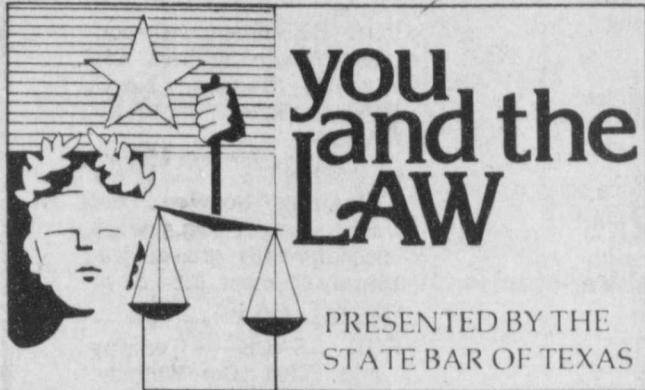

You and the LAW

Q: When I hired a lawyer recently, we made an agreement that I would pay him the balance of his fee before I had to appear in court. I requested a preliminary examination. On the day of the examination, which incidentally never took place, my lawyer told me that if I didn't pay him the balance of his fee, he was going to drop my case. I have already paid more than a third of what I owe him. Can he do this?

A: Your lawyer can't just abandon you. However, he can obtain the court's permission to remove himself from your case for good cause shown such as a flagrant refusal by a client to pay a previously agreed fee. If your lawyer can convince the judge that he's earned what he's been paid or if he offers to refund whatever fee has not been fairly earned in the judge's opinion, he can drop your case. You are entitled to notice of a hearing at which you may tell your side of the story. If he is allowed to withdraw, you can insist upon a reasonable amount of time to hire another lawyer.

Q: A new highway is being planned that will go right through several areas of land I own. I worked hard to pay for that land. I plan to build a home and retire there someday. Can I be forced to sell the land so the highway can be built?

A: A governmental agency can condemn your prop-

erty, forcing you to sell. You have a right to be fairly compensated for your damages - what you have title to and any devaluation of what is left. If the condemning agency does not offer what you think is fair, you can take your case through a judicial procedure, with a jury trial if you want one, to try to get what you think is fair value for what you will lose.

Q: My husband and I thought we had a definite buyer for our old house, so we signed a contract to purchase a new one. Now, the deal on the sale of our old house has fallen through. Is there any way we can get out of the contract to purchase the new house without losing the earnest money we paid down?

A: The terms of the purchase contract for the new house probably would determine your legal liability. Unless the contract contains a provision making the contract valid only after completion of the sale of the old house, there probably is no alternative except either buying the new house or losing the earnest money. Although advance legal advice may have prevented this type of problem, a lawyer probably would not be able to provide a solution at this stage.

How to Live a Long, Happy Life

People interested in living a long, productive life would do worse than using Calvin "Pete" Pfingst, of Evanston, Illinois as an example. At 95 years of age, Pfingst is up and out every Monday morning to play golf, works a few hours every Tuesday at a nearby social center and drives several friends to church every Sunday.

A former school principal, Pfingst retired in 1948 after almost 30 years with the Chicago Board of Education. He graduated from the University of Chicago and received a master's degree in education from Northwestern University.

His first job after graduation was at a school in Indiana for \$40 a month.

Pfingst thinks his longevity is due partly to heredity. His mother lived to 97 and her parents lived into their 90's. The other factor Pfingst says is his lifestyle. "I've avoided bad habits," Pfingst told a writer from The National Council on the Aging. "I don't drink and I don't smoke. I also take my time to do what I want to do. I've never been in a rush. I also take a walk each day."

He has a regular Monday morning golf match with an 85-year-old friend. Pfingst said "we play until we're tired. We're usually on the course by 6:30 in the morning and play the back nine so we won't be rushed."

Pfingst's moderate lifestyle has kept him active and in good health: he has no hearing or sight problems and he walks with a quick, sure stride.

Every Tuesday, Pfingst works in a senior center in Winnetka, a Chicago suburb near Evanston. He keeps track of the biographies of the center's more than 700 members, writing them in longhand.

Pfingst still enjoys reading the classics and the Bible and plays bridge several times a week.

A widower for ten years, Pfingst lives in a Presbyterian retirement home, where he enjoys the company of the other residents. "What you need most in later life are friends," he said, "and it's something you have to work at. I'm a very wealthy man because I have so many friends."

IN A STUDY done before enactment of legislation raising the mandatory retirement age to 70 in the private sector, David J. Ekerdt and Raymond Bosse of the Veterans Administration Outpatient Clinic in Boston found that 12.8 percent of the men sampled planned never to retire.

These persons were generally older, presently unmarried, less likely to face compulsory retirement, had higher income, educational and occupational levels and claimed to be healthier.

The study concluded that greater numbers of other able workers would forego retirement if given the choice and if pressures to retire were eased.

PEOPLE NEARING 65 who are not already receiving Social Security benefits should contact a Social Security office two or three months before their birthday to make sure that they will have Medicare protection the month they reach 65.

They should do this even if they are not retiring, because Medicare is available to full-time workers. Failure to apply may result in delays of from one to three months and as much as a year if a person fails to apply within three months after their 65th birthday month.

They said "Can be kept in the refrigerator 6 weeks - bake as many as you want at a time in well greased muffin tins 25 minutes at 375°." This is the recipe attached and it makes 2 pound coffee cans full. I make it often during the year as well as holiday time.

Pour 2 cups boiling water over 2 cups Nabisco All Bran and 2½ cups Kellogg All Bran - let stand while mixing the following:
5 cups flour
2½ cups sugar
1 teaspoon salt
4 eggs
1 quart buttermilk
6 level teaspoons soda
1 cup shortening

Mix shortening and sugar, add beaten eggs, combine flour, salt and soda and add to first mixture alternately with buttermilk. Now mix in the All Bran and water - it should have cooled some by now. Very very good muffins.
