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## Judges Should Not Legislate, Pesek Says

Leon Pesek, the newly sworn judge of the 102nd District Court, which has jurisdiction over Red River

and Bowie Counties, said Tuesday afternoon that he does not think the judicial system of the United States should legislate, and that the courts should interfere as little as possible in the lives of ordinary citizens.

Pesek's remarks followed formal ceremonies in which he took the oath of office as Judge of the 102nd District Court from Henry Braswell, Judge of the 6th District Court.

A reception hosted by the Red River County Bar Association followed the ceremony. Clarksville attorney Tom Fowler welcomed approximately 50 guests, and refreshments were served.

Pesek pledged that the 102nd District Court, which was formed to serve Red River County, but has centered around Bowie County in recent years, will under his direction focus more attention on Red River County. Pesek added he thought the purpose of the courts was to redress wrongs, and not to give unnecessary rewards to victims.

### Accurate Records

#### Mean Accurate Return

Taxpayers who keep good records during the entire year will be better prepared to file a complete and accurate tax return, the Internal Revenue Service said. By keeping good financial records, the taxpayer cannot only substantiate expenses, income, and itemized deductions listed on his or her tax return but also be aware of certain deductions that might otherwise be overlooked.

Taxpayers are not required to keep any particular types of records, but

they must retain all receipts, cancelled checks, bills and other written documents to prove their expenses.

These records must be kept for at least 3 years from the date that the return was due or filed for two years from the date that the tax was paid, whichever occurs later.

### Tax Installment Due

Taxpayers making estimated tax payments on their 1978 income must pay the fourth installment by Monday, January 15. The tax installment should be paid using declaration-voucher 4 from the Form 1040-ES package, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Taxpayers whose anticipated income during 1978 has changed may have to file an amended declaration. Space appears in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate, the IRS said.

For more detailed information, taxpayers can obtain IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," available free from local IRS offices. Supplies of the Form 1040-ES package are also available from these offices.

## Model Airplanes Provide Excitement For Ridges

What flies, does aerobatics, looks like an airplane, but doesn't have a pilot in the cockpit? Radio controlled model airplanes, that's what.

Tom Ridge, Church of Christ pastor at Bogata, and his son Tommy, are experienced operators of the little aircraft. But the "birds" are a far cry from the popular idea of a model airplane.

Available in complete kits, or built from scratch, it depends on one's inclination and abilities.

Ridge has built a number of airplanes, some of which he designed himself, and several of which he has sold. One airplane, which is similar to the Ag 1 crop-duster which was designed in the 1950's by Texas A&M, was built by Ridge out of paneling scraps and balsa wood, and covered with a heat shrink plastic applied with a steam iron. It has a wing span of six feet, eight inches, and is five feet long, and flies at speeds up to 70 mph.

That particular aircraft is one of Ridge's favorites, and has sixty or seventy flights to its credit.

He has also built a swept wing airplane similar to an old Aeronica Champ, which he describes as "the ugliest airplane imaginable", and a thing called a "Sweeper" which is a knock-about, sunny Sunday airplane, flown for the sheer fun of watching it do aerobatics.

The planes come with a variety of engines, but the one of the miniature ag plane is a two and one half power engine, and carries about 12 ounces of fuel.

The planes are controlled by a small box with control knobs on them. They have an "out of sight" range, and the world altitude record for a radio controlled model airplane is 2,800 feet.

It takes practice to learn to handle the small aircraft, especially until landing is perfected. Old hands advise newcomers to have a handful of propellers until landing is smoothed out.

Ridge says there are a

number of model airplane enthusiasts in the area, but that they are loosely organized. He would like to see more people becoming interested in the sport, as it is a wonderful hobby for parents and children alike.

It is an educational, healthy way for parents and children to work on a project together, with craftsmanship, aerodynamics, and excitement being just a few of the advantages.

Ridge and his son Tommy, fly their planes off of a miniature airport in Paris. Interested people donated money to pave the strip with asphalt, and provide a good place to fly the planes.

The sport can be as expensive as one desires, or as economical. The price range can be from under \$200 to over a thousand, depending on what amount of precision, design and authenticity one desires.

Next time you're considering a pastime, Tom Ridge would advise you to look into radio controlled model airplanes, for fun and excitement.

## 1978 Agriculture Census Begins This Week

The 1978 Census of Agriculture gets underway this week with the mailing of report forms to all farms and ranches in the 50 states, the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce, announced earlier.

Farmers and ranchers are being asked to report on their agricultural operations during 1978. This 1978 census, the Nation's 21st farm census in a series that started in 1840, will update data most recently obtained in 1975 for 1974 operations. Information will be sought on all agricultural operations.

With report forms for the 1978 census drastically reduced from the 22 pages of the last census, most agricultural operators will receive a four-page form in the mail, and about 20 percent will receive a five-page version. The overall time required by farmers to complete the form has been reduced by more than one-third.

The census will continue to monitor trends in domestic ownership and control of land. The last census showed a five-year gain in the number of U.S. corporate farms from 22,000 to 29,000; the amount of acreage they farmed rose from 80 to 97 million acres, and the value of their farm products rose from \$6 billion to \$14 billion.

The census asks whether the farm is operated by a family or individual, a partnership, a family held

corporation, an investor-owned corporation with more than 10 stockholders, or some other legal entity such as cooperative, estate or trust, grazing association, etc.

## Officer Named For County

Jerry Morris, a former Lamar County resident and most recently a deputy sheriff in Odessa, Texas, has been named a deputy in Red River County by Sheriff Avret Vaughan.

Morris was hired through a grant funded by the Law Enforcement Coordinating Division of Continuing Education at East Texas State University in Commerce. Sheriff Vaughan made the application for the funds several weeks ago and was notified Tuesday morning that the funds would be available.

Morris will be a traffic officer for the county and will be trained to use a breathalyzer. Red River County qualified for the officer based on the fatality statistics compiled by the LECD which place fatality probability if involved in an accident on Highway 37 north of Clarksville at 50 percent.

foreign ownership of land has raised questions in the Congress and with business and agricultural groups. In 1974 a Department of Commerce survey showed about 5 million acres of the Nation's one billion acres of farm land were owned by foreign interests, or less than one-half of one percent of the total. The new farm census will measure the increase.

As in earlier censuses, information obtained about farming operations will be published for each of more than 3,000 counties with agricultural operations, for each State and for the entire Nation.

Each report form will have a control number printed on the address label. Because response is required by law, each control number must be accounted for by the Bureau of the Census. Followup letters will be sent to non-respondents. Everyone who receives the agriculture

census report form should answer the first four items and as much more of the report as applies, and return it, so that it will not be necessary to spend more tax money on obtaining a response.

Despite careful screening of the mailing lists used, some persons not engaged in agricultural activities will receive report forms. Those persons should return the form with that fact noted in order to stop additional mailings.

The law which requires a farmer to answer the census items also protects the privacy of answers. Since 1900, census report forms have been confidential by law. They may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical totals. Even other government agencies cannot obtain or use the reports made by any farm operator.

## Wildlife Group To Study Substance Control

The National Wildlife Federation has received a grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to carry out a toxic substances project. The end product of the study will be a citizen's participation handbook, for use by individuals and citizens groups as well as by state and local toxic substances regulators. Dr. Edward Segel, of

Chevy Chase, Md., has joined NWF, the nation's largest citizens conversation organization, as coordinator of the project. Segel, who holds a Ph. D. degree in physical-organic chemistry from the University of Chicago, was formerly vice president of the United States Brewers Association. He holds nearly a dozen

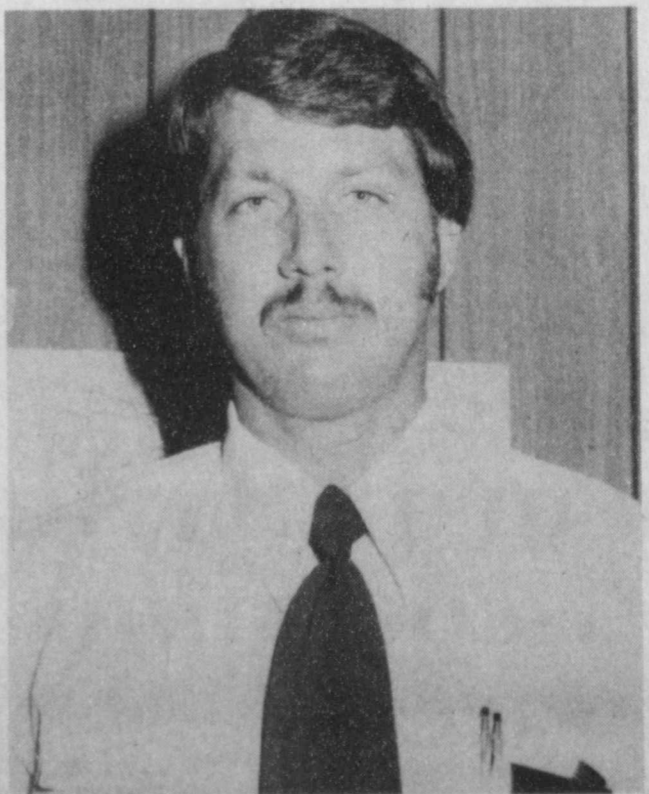
patents and has been published in numerous scientific journals.

As coordinator of NWF's toxic substances project, Segel will meet with experts from industry, government, and academia to gain an understanding of all sides of the toxic substances control issue. For purposes of illustration, the study will focus on the problem in New Jersey.

## Health Clinic Scheduled

### In Bogata

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at the Bogata City Hall, Bogata, Texas.

The clinic will be held on January 11, 1979 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis and Tetanus-diphtheria. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria vaccine is also available to adults.

## Army Offers

### Education

#### Program

The Army's test two-year enlistment with a \$5,400 education program is now being offered for the first time here to selected high school graduates.

This limited enlistment option was announced today by Lieutenant Colonel Harlin L. Fenn, Jr., Commander of the U.S. Army Dallas District Recruiting Command. Only one of 10 district commands in the Army's Southwest Recruiting Region is involved in this particular option.

"All openings are for certain skill positions in Europe," the Colonel said. Qualified two-year volunteers may enroll in the Veterans Education Assistance Program option. The VEAP, commonly called the peacetime GI Bill, matches a soldier's educational savings two-for-one up to a certain amount.

Colonel Fenn pointed out that this special offering appears simple on the surface. "But," he added, "some rather complex requirements exist for the limited openings." Further information and application assistance, he said, can be obtained at the nearest Army Recruiting Station.

This special option is being offered in addition to the normal three-year and longer enlistments currently in effect.

## Going Strong

**Hardest Worker In The Company**  
— At 80

Ask any of 80-year-old Barbara Savelsberg's fellow employees—they'll all tell you she's one of the hardest workers in the company. The company is a drug-store chain in the Washing-

ton, D.C. area, which Mrs. Savelsberg has worked for since 1945. Before that she worked for a Washington hotel and for the government.

"Actually, I was still working for the government when I went to work for Drug Fair," Mrs. Savelsberg told a writer from The National Council on the Aging. "The man who interviewed me wanted to know how I was going to hold down two jobs. I said, 'you won't know until you try me.' Before long I was working 96 hours a week—half for the government and half for Drug Fair."

A native of Pittsburgh, Mrs. Savelsberg's husband died shortly before World War I, leaving her with two children to raise. In the early 40's she moved to Arlington, Virginia, which is right across the Potomac River from Washington.

Mrs. Savelsberg acquired her taste for hard work as a young girl, helping her mother run the family grocery store when she was 12 years old. That's why it

never occurred to her not to have two jobs.

"I wasn't making enough to support my family on my government job," Mrs. Savelsberg said. "That's why I went out and got another job. That's the way I was raised."

She works so hard that the manager of the store where she works says, "I have to chase her out of here at night." But why, after all these years, does she continue to work as hard as she did when she had a family to raise?

"Money!" she replied. "You can't live on a fixed income these days. Besides, I don't think people should sit home in a rocker whether they retire or not. I think the more active you are the better off you are."

**RESIDENTS OF** a nursing home in Chattanooga, Tennessee, tutor 4th, 5th and 6th graders in math and reading. The older persons are transported to the school twice a week. Students have been doing better in their schoolwork and the older persons are gaining a new sense of fulfillment.

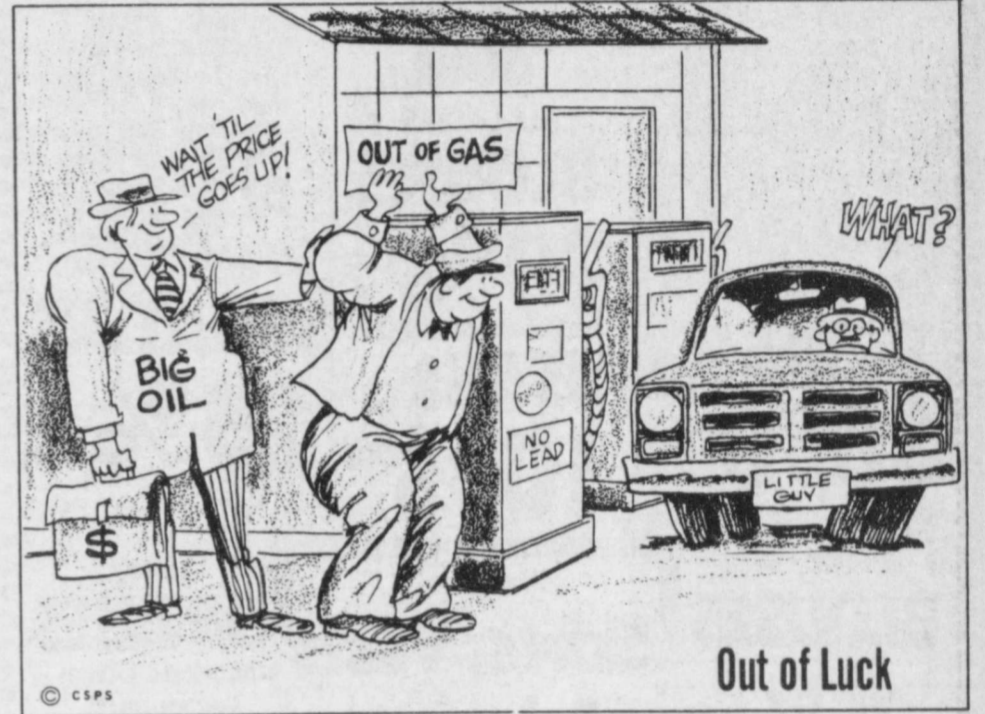
**IN MINNEAPOLIS,** 4,000 older persons are served by the Mobile Com-

munity Post Office, a converted parcel post delivery truck that makes rounds at buildings housing seniors throughout the city. The number of stops since service was started in 1971 has increased from 3 to 17.

Along with selling stamps, the service includes registered and certified mail service and the acceptance of cards, letters and packages for deposit in the mail.

**SOCIAL SECURITY** recipients who continue to work should remember that the rules have been changed regarding income. The monthly earnings test has been completely eliminated and replaced by an annual income limit.

Basically, persons 65 and over can earn up to \$4,000 in calendar year 1978 without any loss of benefits. That exemption will rise to \$4,500 in 1979 and will continue to rise \$500 a year through 1982. For every two dollars earned over the exemption limit, one dollar in Social Security benefits will be lost. To get more information on the new rules, call your local Social Security office and ask for the booklet, "How Recent Changes in Social Security Affect You" (HEW Publication number: 78-10328).

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### THOUGHT FOR FOOD

**Cranberry And Orange**  
This will remind you of an old favorite; it's tart and thick with fresh cranberries and oranges. The recipe doesn't call for nuts but I always add about 1/2 cup of chopped walnuts or pecans before it congeals.

- 4 cups (1 quart)
- 2 small oranges — washed
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 pkg. orange gelatin

Quarter and peel the oranges, and remove the seeds. Run through a food chopper with the cranberries, using a medium knife. Do not drain. Dissolve the sugar in the water, stirring over low heat. When hot, dissolve the orange gelatin in it. Add to the fruit. Nuts can be added now or before it sets. Turn into a pan of your choice — shallow or mold and chill until firm. Can be served on slices of orange which have been placed on greens. Serves 10 easily.

**you and the LAW**  
PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

**Q: If an emergency vehicle approaches a railroad crossing that is blocked by a slow-moving freight train, must the vehicle wait until the train passes or is there a law requiring the train to be broken to allow the emergency vehicle to proceed?**

**A:** There is no statutory law in this state requiring trains to yield right-of-way to emergency vehicles. Ordinary vehicles and street cars are required to yield, but due to the impracticality and sometimes impossibility of trains to stop and/or decouple, neither state or local authorities have required them to do so.

There may be a common law duty of care on the part of the train engineers depending upon the particular circumstances. It would depend largely on whether the engineer had knowledge of the emergency vehicle and whether opportunity and practicality could enable him to stop and/or decouple.

**Q: Recently I sold a TV set I had at a garage sale. It was operating perfectly when I sold it. Three days later the person who bought it from me brought it back claiming it wouldn't work and wanted his money back. Am I obligated to take the set back and return his money?**

**A:** No, assuming that he can prove no fraud or misrepresentation on your part. If you did not expressly warrant or guarantee the performance of the set, no warranty will be implied.

Because the set was used and the purchaser had reasons to know that it was used, he assumes the risk.

However, if you warranted the TV's performance, you will be liable until the warranty term specified had expired. If no specific time period was specified, a reasonable one will be implied. Warranting a product simply means that you guarantee its performance for a period of time.

**Q: Everyday my neighbor parks one of his several cars in front of my house. I'm tired of my home being used as a parking lot. Besides, there is a bicycle lane there. I don't want to anger my neighbor but isn't there some legal way I can force him to move the car elsewhere?**

**A:** The Texas Legislature has traditionally allowed municipalities wide discretion in making and enforcing parking regulations, but has said that cars should not be parked on the roadside if practical to park off the road. Local police officers have authority to remove any vehicles violating either the state or local laws. In the event your neighbor is in violation of the above, you should notify your local police. You should also check into the local ordinances for your particular city or municipality. They may or may not cover this problem.

### Facts from a pro on driving to survive.

**Q. Someone's old beat up car broke down in front of my house about two weeks ago. Is there any way I can have the thing towed off? It's a real eyesore. S.P., Austin**

**A:** Contact the local authorities (either city or county depending on where you live) and pass the information on to them. They may declare the abandoned vehicle a public nuisance and attempt to notify the latest known owner. The owner then has a reasonable amount of time to remove the vehicle or the local authorities will tow it away.

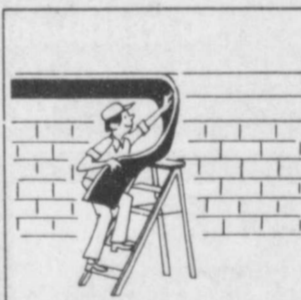
**Q. What can I do to stop the terminals on my car battery from becoming encrusted with corrosion? P.K., Farmers Branch**

**A:** The first step is to clean them regularly. If you don't let the corrosion build up too much, the terminals are easy to clean and maintain. Remove the clamps from the terminals and clean them thoroughly with a wire brush. Make sure the inside of the clamp is also clean. After all the parts are free from corrosion, coat the terminals and the clamps (inside and out) with petroleum jelly before hooking the battery back up.

**Q. The heater core went out on my car and the car overheated almost immediately. I had to call a tow truck and the driver said I could have by-passed the core and saved myself the cost of the tow. What does by-passing the core mean? J.H., Baycliff**

**A:** By-passing the core is a convenient method of temporarily repairing your car so you can get to help. There is a rubber hose that leads from the engine block to the heater and one that leads from the heater to the block. Simply disconnect the hose that comes out to the heater completely. Then, connect the end of the other hose that leads to the heater back to the engine block where you disconnected the first hose.

One simple method of cutting utility bills is to insulate your basement. If you don't have a basement, insulate the crawl space below floors. Princeton University researchers found that 25 per cent of the furnace heat they monitored stayed in the basement. If that area isn't insulated, heat loss could be costing you money.

The Department of Agriculture has announced that there will be a program sign-up in 1979 from February 15 through April 16 when producers of wheat, cotton, feed grains and other crops will indicate whether or not they wish to participate in the Farm Program. The County Committee has determined that the period April 1 to October 1 will be the non-grazing time for designated set-aside land. During this time, land designated as set-aside under the program may not be grazed by livestock.

Set-aside land must be kept in such condition as to prevent erosion and to prevent the growth of noxious weeds. Eligible tillage operations include stubble mulching, disking and chiseling.

ASCS will be offering measurement service to producers via the aerial observation method and conventional methods. If you are not absolutely positive about the acreage in a field, ask about measurement service. Its benefits are great when compared to its low cost and protection from

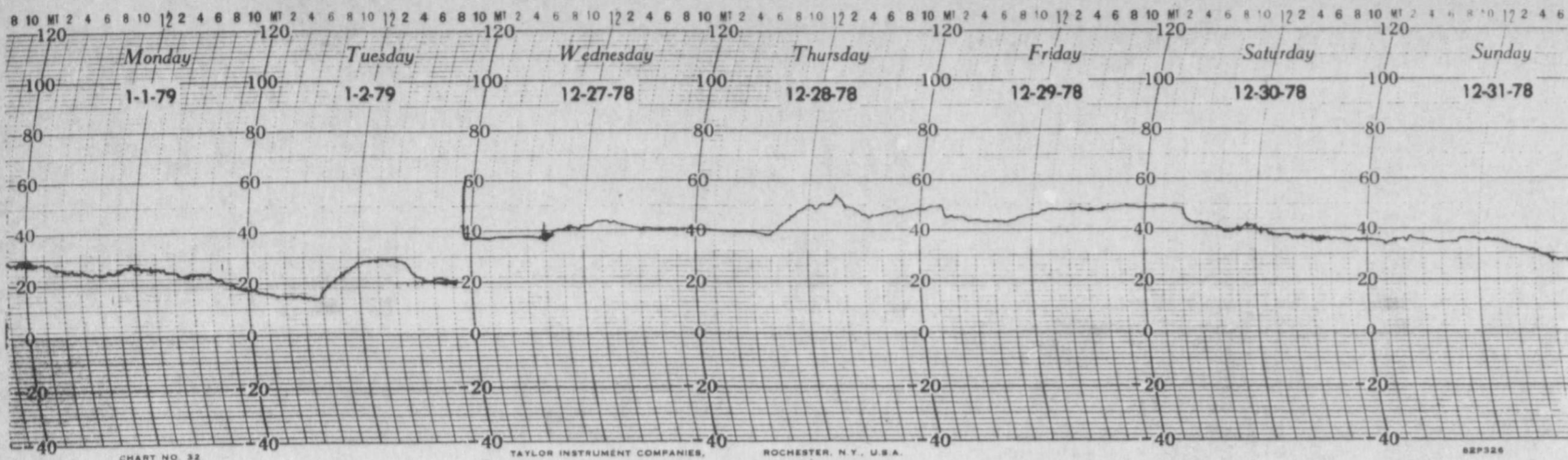

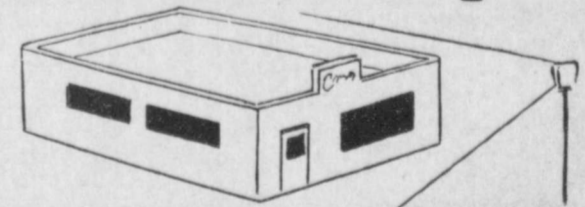
