Unless your high school children are studying at least two hours at home, and many of them should study three hours every school night, you may know that their work is not what it should be. We have about forty high school pupils failing in their work because they are not studying enough at home. Your children can not attend the picture shows on week nights and do much with their work-neither can they attend any other ouside attractions and accomplish much. School is a serious job, the most serious we will ever undertake and on its proper accomplishment great issues of life are at stake.


