Advance To Region

Rebelettes Take Bi-District

The Rivercrest Rebelettes will play Centerville at 6:00 p.m. Friday, March 2 at the Sam Houston State University Coliseum in Huntsville in the first round of Class A Region III competition.

The Rebelettes advanced to Region after defeating Springhill Tuesday night at Quitman 48 to 24.

Not long after the Rebelette-Springhill Bi-District competition tip-off, the question changed from, "Will Rivercrest win?" to "Will Springhill make a field goal?"

The Rebelettes came out with a full court press, to which the Springhill team was unaccustomed, and the strong Rivercrest defense rattled Springhill badly.

Score at the end of the first quarter at 14-0, and by the half, Springhill had only two free throws on the board while Rivercrest had posted 24 points.

Heart Fund Collects \$487

Mrs. M.E. Jones, chairman of the American Heart Association in Talco, announced Tuesday that total contributions to the fund totaled \$487.33.

"We made them speed up their game," Rebelette Coach Frank Stubblefield commented Wednesday morning, but quipped that what really happened to

Springhill was, in a word, "Rivercrest."

"It was not our best game," Stubblefield said, "but it was one of our better games. We made a lot of long shots."

Altogether, Rivercrest hit 47 percent of their field goals, and Margaret Hines, who seemed to be hitting from outside whenever she pleased, was making 63

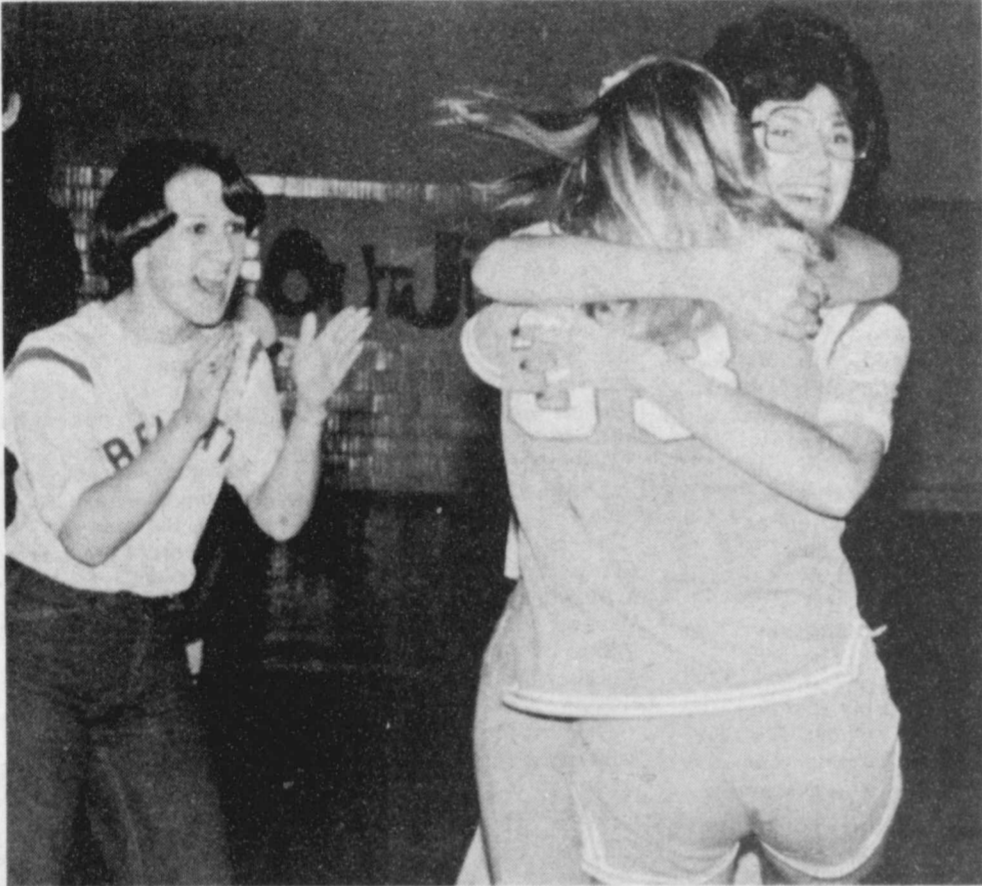
percent of her shots. Margaret Hines contributed 10 points to the Rivercrest effort, and Scotti Wood, hitting 37 percent, mostly from outside, made 14 points.

The Rebelette strong post, Judy Via, made five of seven from inside.

There seemed to be no end to the embarrassment that Rivercrest could cause Springhill. The final blow came when the newest addition to the Rebelette team, 6'4" Veronica Howard took her position at post, replacing Via, and the freshman from Rivercrest who is short on experience but tall on determination proceeded

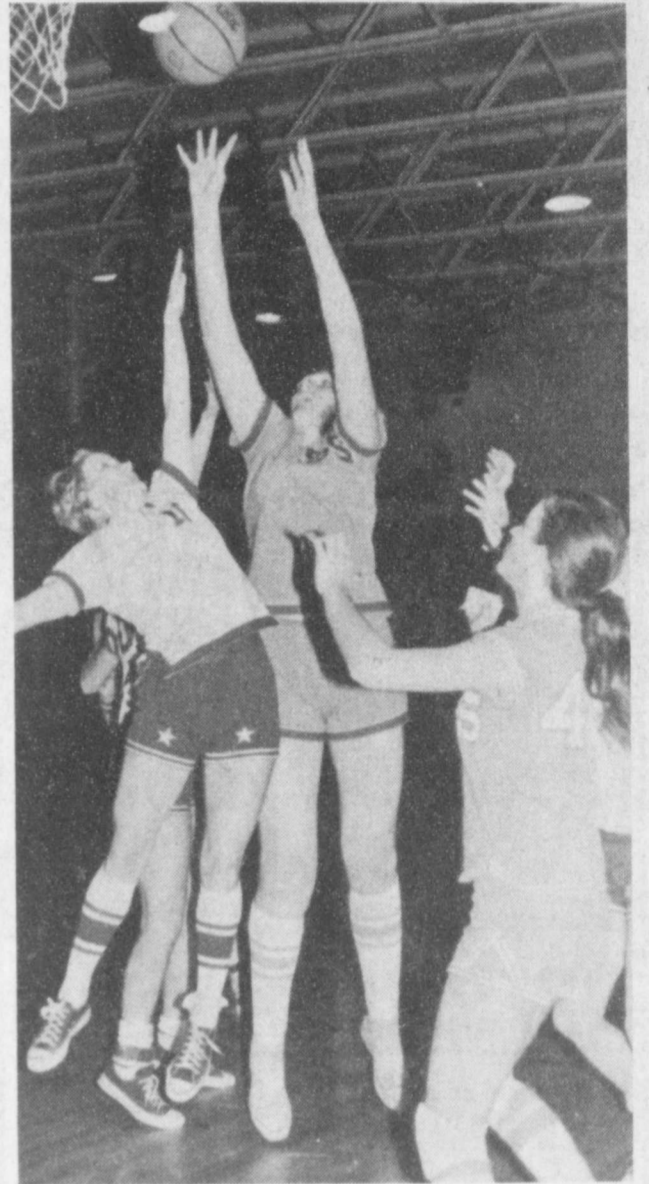
to tip four points into the basket from the lane. Howard was playing in her second ballgame, and the Rivercrest fans, along with the Rebelettes gave her instant appreciation and acceptance.

The game between Rivercrest and Centerville will be followed Friday at 8 p.m. with a game between Sabine and LaPoyner. The winners of the Friday night games will play at 1:00 p.m. Saturday to determine which team will advance to the State Tournament in Austin the following weekend. The Coliseum is located on the southeast corner of the Sam Houston Campus.

Trustee Election To Be April 7

Three school trustees will be elected for the Talco-Bogata Schools on Saturday, April 7. The terms of Jerry Stansell and Gene Smith of Talco and Kenneth Jeffery of Bogata are expiring. As of Tuesday, February 27, the only candidate that has filed for a place on the ballot is Jerry Stansell of Talco.

All requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for the election shall be in writing, signed by the candidate, and filed at the superintendent's office at Rivercrest by 4:30 p.m. on March 7, 1979.

One three-year term is to be filled from the Bogata area; one three-year term is to be filled from the Talco area; and one three-year term will be filled at large Bogata City.

Election Set

Three councilmen are to be elected to the Bogata City Council at the Bogata city election, to be held April 7, 1979. To date, three people have filed as candidates. Kenneth Brumley, and Charles Lewis, incumbents, have filed, and Morris Foster has filed.

Troy Howerton does not choose to run for re-election. The last day for candidates to file applications is March 7.

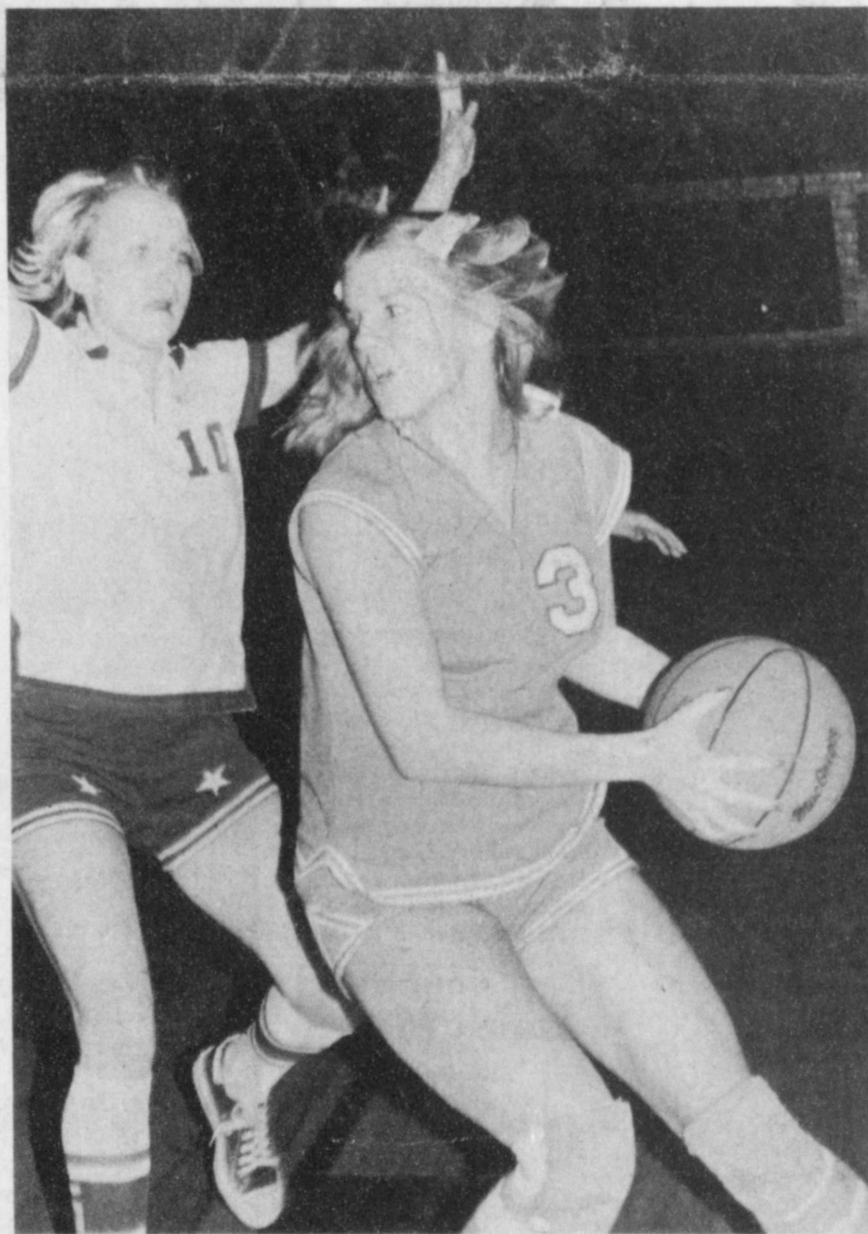
The Bogata Rodeo Association's meeting previously scheduled for Monday, March 5 has been changed to Thursday, March 8.

Trash Disposal Method Changed

Changes in the manner in which trash is handled in Bogata, due to the objections of the Texas Department of Health were announced Monday by Bogata Mayor W.C. Barnard.

Correspondence from the Health Department was the subject of discussion at the February City Council meeting, when an alternate disposal method was approved.

The City of Bogata has owned and maintained a dump ground south of Bogata for years, but that dump no longer meets the requirement of the Health Department, Barnard said. "The cost of land, equipment and operating personnel is more than the city can finance at this time," Barnard noted, and explained the new system in this manner.

"Barney Bray, a commercial trash hauler of Paris, will pick up the City of Bogata trash and make disposal, at a place to which he has access. The city personnel will gather the trash in eight cubic yard containers and park them at a central location. When these containers are full, they will be emptied to a large truck and the trash removed from the city. The city will pay Bray \$12 for each eight cubic yard container that he empties.

"We do not know yet what the cost per week this arrangement will be to the city. We will know after it has been in operation a few weeks. It is hoped that the cost can be met by our present revenue. Bogata is one of the few cities that pays for trash disposal out of general revenue. If we are

unable to meet the cost of trash disposal out of our existing budget, it will be necessary to find additional funds. This may mean an increase in ad valorem taxes or a surcharge on the water

bill to pay the cost." Mayor Barnard urged that Bogata residents help keep the cost of the service as low as possible by burning trash that can be burned, and placing only cans and other

non-burnable items in garbage bags to be picked up. Barnard stated that metal objects such as old stoves and refrigerators will not be picked up.

Immunization Clinic Set For Bogata March 8

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced today a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children

needing immunization. The clinic will be conducted at the Bogata City Hall, Bogata, Tex. The clinic will be held March 8, 1979, from 2 to 4 p.m. Future clinic

dates will be announced later.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children pre-school and school age beginning at two months of age.

Immunizations to be offered include mumps, measles, rubella, oral polio, diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dpt), tetanus-diphtheria (Td). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

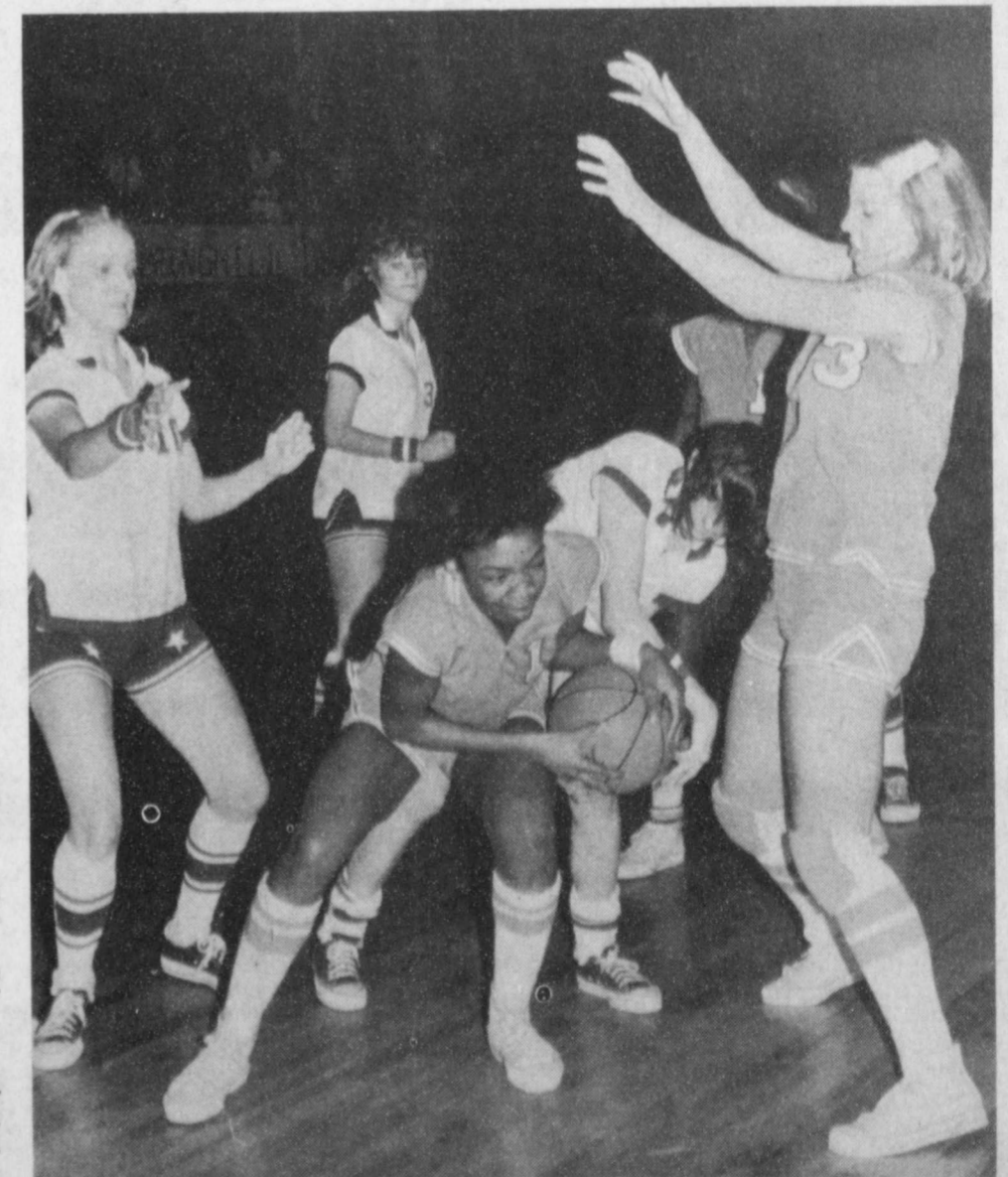
sound, and (2) people will support that which they help make.

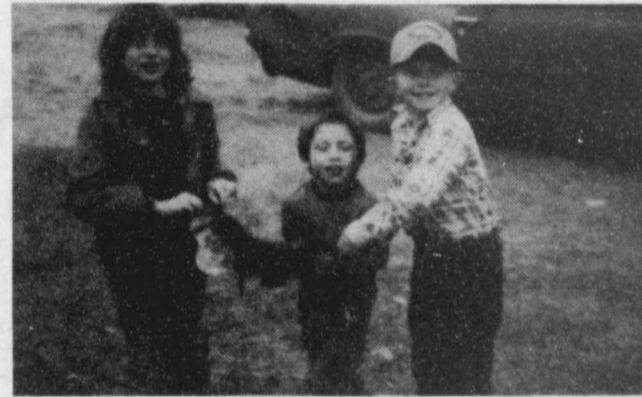
