





Trash Disposal Method Changed

Changes in the manner in which trash is handled in of the Texas Department of Health were announced Monday by Bogata Mayor W.C. Barnard.

Correspondence from the Health Department was the subject of discussion at the February City Council meeting, when an alternate disposal method was approved. The City of Bogata has

owned and maintained a dump ground south of Bogata for years, but that dump no longer meets the the cost per week this requirement of the Health Department, Barnard said.

"The cost of land, equipment and operating personnel is more than the city can finance at this time," Barnard noted, and explained the new system in this manner.


