Rivercrest Draws Rogers In State Tournament

The Rivercrest Rebelettes will be facing one of the tallest teams they have met in the opening round of the State Girls Basketball tournament Friday morning at 9:30 a.m. in Austin.

The Region IV champion Rogers girls are paced by 6' senior Tammy Williams, who is a double figure scorer, along with Tammy Doggett, 5'11" senior, and Carol Wasserman, 5'8 1/2" junior. Other starters will be Karen Williams, 5'8" junior, and Lisa Ashcraft, 5'3" senior.

The Rogers coach, Harley Doggett, will go with these five girls most of the time, according to Temple Telegraph sports reporter Bill Knight, and will sometimes play Cathey Clowers.

Rogers is a good defensive team, Knight said, with a sagging man to man or zone defense. Their 40-1 season record includes victories over Temple, Killeen and Pflugerville.

Doggett has been coaching girls basketball for 11 years and has won seven district championships in that time. In 1974, Rogers girls went to the State Tournament, but didn't win.

Rogers is rated number two in Class A girls basketball, with Hale Center (28-3) rated number one. Hale Center will meet Wall (28-2) in the second game in Class A competition in the state meet at 11 a.m. The Rivercrest-Rogers game and the Hale Center-Wall game will be played in the University of Texas Special Events Center (Super Drum), along with Class B, AA, AAA and AAAA finals.

The Rebelettes advanced to the state finals by defeating Spring Hill 48-24 in Bi-District competition, Centerville 53-51 in the opening round of the regional tournament and LaPoyner 38-31 in the finals at Huntsville.

The first game of regional competition against Centerville was a fight for survival for the Rebelettes,

who found the heat of the television lights in Huntsville's Sam Houston Coliseum more oppressive than the cool temperatures

in gymnasiums in North Texas. Not only were the Rebelettes not able to dominate the game as they did against Spring Hill, they

had to battle every minute to stay even. Rebelette junior Robyn Reeder pulled the game out for Rivercrest in the final seconds with two

free throws. After that the Rebelettes had only to keep Centerville off the board for a few seconds to win.

The LaPoyner contest was no less a struggle through the first half, with the score 19-19 at the half and the Rebelettes in a zone defense against a team which scores primarily from outside. The quickness of Scotti Wood developed into steal after steal in the third quarter, but it was only in the final moments of the third quarter that the Rebelettes could turn their defensive efforts under the LaPoyner goal into baskets in the Rivercrest goal.

Rebelette Coach Frank Stubblefield said Tuesday that the Rebelettes will leave Rivercrest at 9:30 a.m. Thursday morning and arrive in Austin in time to stretch their legs before dining and bedding down for the Friday morning opener against Rogers. The final will be at 7 p.m. Saturday.

The Rebelettes won the Class AA championship with a 36-0 record in 1967-68, and played in the state tournament in 1968-69 and 1969-70.

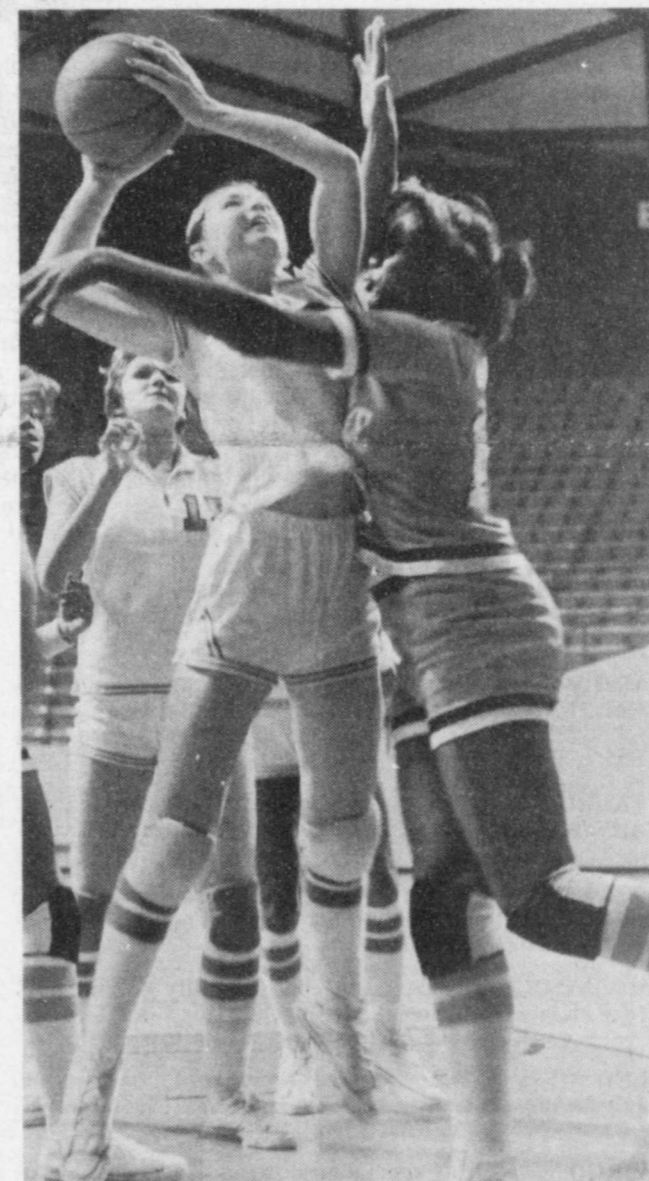

Short Course

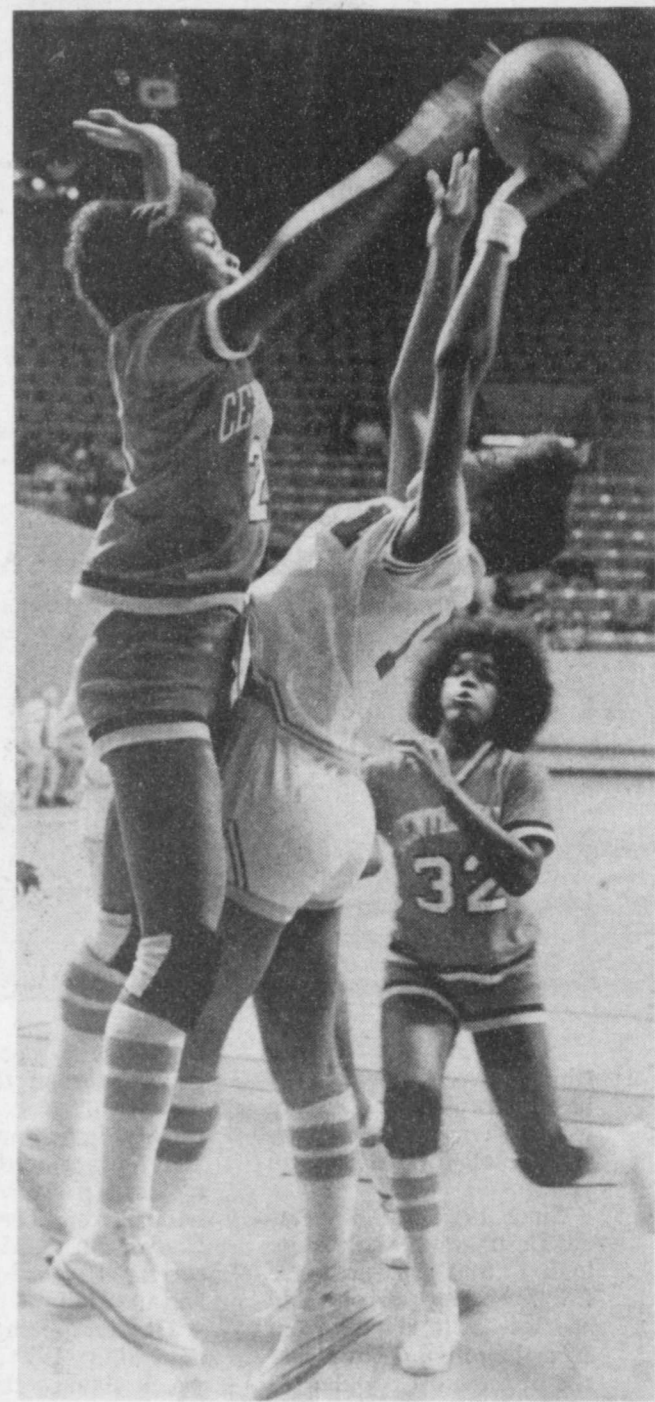
March 12-15

Exemptions To Be Mailed

Approximately 1500 applications for homestead exemptions will be mailed in the next few days to homeowners living within the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District, according to Cornelia Dickey, tax assessor-collector.

According to the new law, all homeowners, including and in addition to those over 65 and disabled veterans, will be granted the \$5,000 ad valorem tax exemptions if

they own their own homes and live in them.

The forms claiming the \$5,000 market value exemption on the homestead should be completed and returned to the tax office by April 30. Four blanks on the form should be filled in. The name of the owner on the affidavit, the year 1979, the signature of the person and the date the form is signed go on the two bottom lines.

Those persons over 65 and disabled veterans who have already signed exemption forms for 1979 need not complete and return the forms. They will automatically receive the additional \$5,000 exemption. Those over 65 and those veterans who have a VA-approved disability classification and who have not applied for their exemptions this year need to do so by April 30.

Approximately 16 children attended, accompanied by their sponsors and other adults.

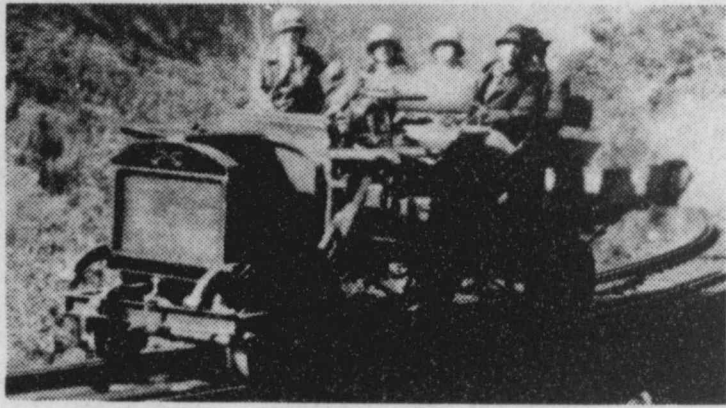

Avalanches And Blizzards Don't Stop Mail Man



Neither rain nor sleet nor train wrecks and avalanches have kept Elbert Despain from delivering the mail to Alta, Utah for the past 56 years.

Since 1922, the 80-year-old Despain has made more than 17,000 trips up Little Cottonwood Canyon and has seen Alta change from a bustling mining town into one of the most popular ski resorts in the country.

When Despain started delivering the mail, there were still a dozen mines operating around Alta. The only way up the canyon back then was by horse-drawn

wagon or a steep narrow-gauge railroad that served the mines.

"My father and I operated a jitney on the railroad tracks," Despain told a writer from The National Council on the Aging. "We carried freight, passengers and the mail."

Despain operated the jitney until 1928, when a wreck claimed the life of a passenger.

"It was during a snowstorm," Despain recalled. "We hit a slick place and the brakes were useless. Five miners jumped off right away but three other

passengers froze—I had to threaten them with a crow bar."

They finally jumped but were all seriously hurt. One of the passengers later died of gangrene which resulted from the amputation of a leg. Despain escaped with scrapes and bruises. Since then, Despain has used cars and four-wheel drive vehicles to deliver the mail.

Avalanches are another danger during the long Utah winters. Despain has been trapped dozens of times and even had the back end of his car pushed off the road by one slide.

"I've been scared so many times going up that canyon I can't remember them all," Despain said.

Despain was born near the mouth of Little Cottonwood Canyon and has lived there all his life. He picks up the mail at the Sandy, Utah post office and spends about half a day making his run up the canyon.

"When I drive up, people gather around," Despain said. "I'd get done a lot sooner if I didn't talk so much."

Despain's contract with the postal service expires in July and he's not certain he'll continue.

"I'm already what you might call semi-retired," Despain said, "but I don't

know if I'm ready to give up working altogether. I'd really miss it."

IN WASHINGTON, D.C., recent hearings by the House Select Committee on Aging revealed that a lengthy probe by the committee's staff found that many older persons are paying \$1 billion annually for so-called "Medi-gap" insurance policies they do not need or may not be able to collect on.

Around 15 million of the 23 million Americans eligible for Medicare purchase supplementary insurance policies without realizing that in many cases claims will not be honored on more than one policy, a stipulation frequently overlooked in the fine print.

Committee Chairman Claude Pepper said the investigation found that some older persons have bought three, four, five and sometimes as many as 30 different health insurance policies, even though, according to Pepper, "they generally contain a clause saying that only one policy will pay."

As a result of the committee investigation, the Health Insurance Association of America has formed a task force to look into the problems the committee uncovered.

Split Pea Soup

On a cold wintery evening a bowl of hot soup is good, filling, nutritious and not too expensive. Split pea soup is an all time favorite and is even more delicious if it sits in the refrigerator a day or two. It gets thicker and has more flavor but must be reheated slowly and stirred often to avoid burning.

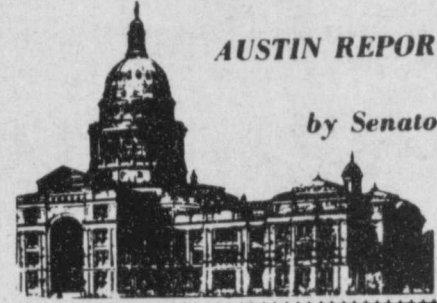
The easiest way to prepare split peas is to combine a pound of peas with 6 cups of cold water and a generous teaspoon of salt. Bring to a boil, uncovered, over high heat and then reduce heat so water just simmers — cook for about an hour, until soft enough to put through a sieve.

- 1 pound split peas
- a ham bone
- 2 carrots and
- 2 stalks celery sliced
- 2 diced onions
- 3 tablespoons
- butter or margarine

Bring to a boil, two quarts of water and the hambone. Add peas, celery and carrots. Simmer over low heat for an hour and a half or two. Saute the onions in the butter or margarine and add to the peas and ham. Cook another 30 minutes or so. Remove ham bone and cut off any meat to return to the soup.

AUSTIN REPORT

AUSTIN — Undertones of the Governor's budget recommendations, gasohol production, and generic drug discussion, have brought about a whirlwind of activity in the Legislature this week.

One topic that is in the forefront and causing some criticism is Governor Clements budget recommendations, especially those pertaining to the cut in salary increases for teachers. The Legislative Budget Board had recommended a 5.1% increase which is in addition to the normal yearly increase they receive. The Governor has also proposed to remove 25,000 state employees from the state payroll during the next two years. Although most of the cuts will come from natural attrition, Governor Clements has said that he hopes other state agencies will adopt an efficient procedure that will result in some firings. Many feel that Clements' budget is neither reasonable nor realistic.

"Fill 'er up with gasohol," may soon be heard throughout Texas as measures are being taken to change corn, sorghum and other starch or sugar crops capable of conversion . . . into fuel. Gasohol is made up of 90% unleaded gasoline and the remaining 10% from 200 proof anhydrous ethyl alcohol. The new fuel will increase gas mileage and improve the engine performance of a car due to a reduction of carbon monoxide emissions.

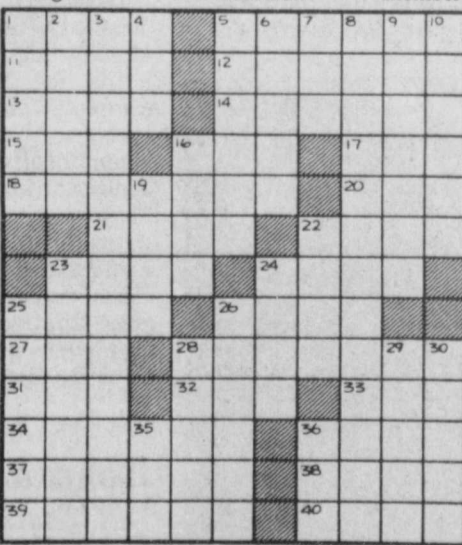
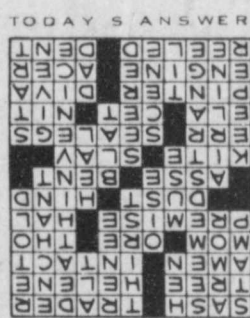
In other Senate action, a bill that would allow a generic substitution to be used for a higher priced name drug has been referred to the Committee on Human Resources. The generic equivalent could be used unless the prescribing physician or consumer requested otherwise. The main argument against certain generic drugs is their inconsistency in the rate they are absorbed into the bloodstream. It is for this reason that the current bill leaves the substitution of the generic drugs to the physician's discretion.

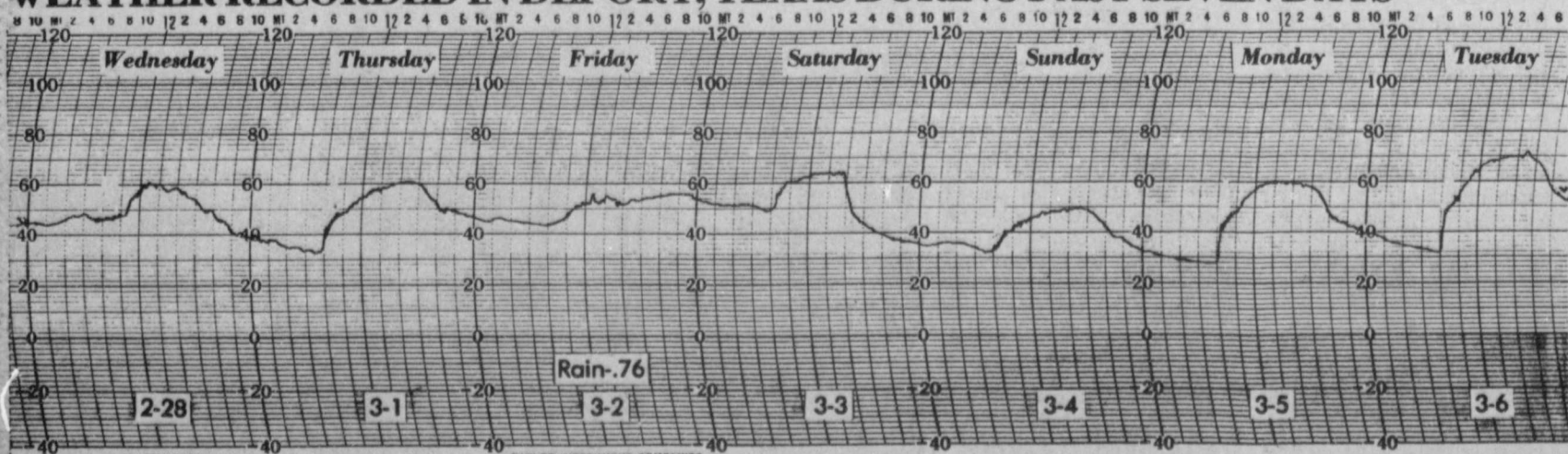

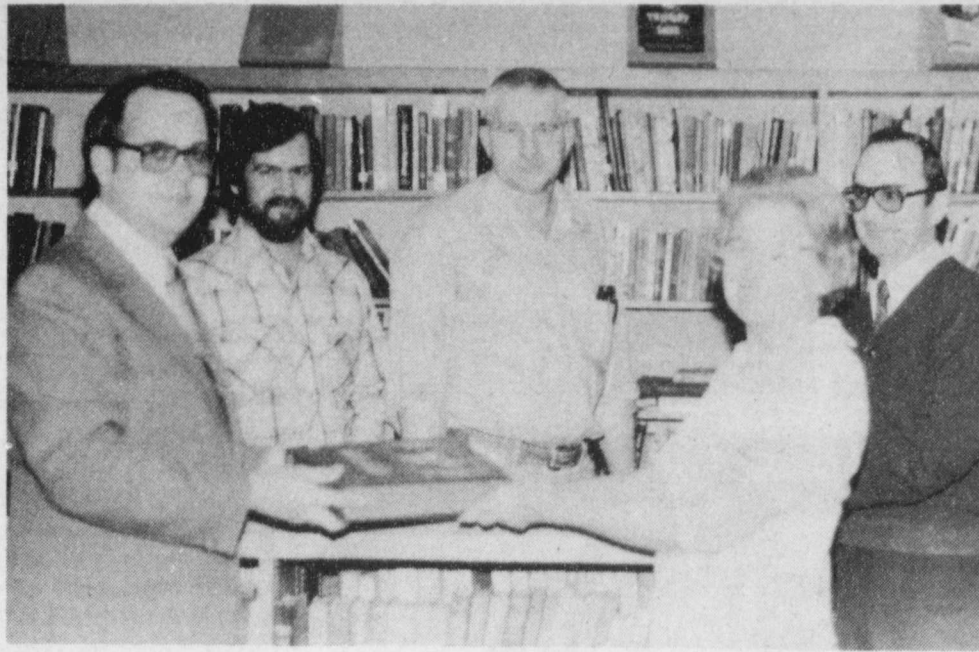

Gardening Made Easy

By Barrie L. Kridler

If last year's yard was a wreck and you would like to have something more beautiful for the neighbors to look at this year, then now is the time to act! Weeds are the spoilers of a smooth, green lawn in most cases. How many times was it last year that the weeds in the yard made you mow, while the actual grass was not that tall? We have about three weeks to apply a pre-emergence weed killer to stop a lot of these weeds that make for ragged yards and if you use the "weed and feed" fertilizers, you will be taking care of both primary requirements of early spring. Grass burrs are a special problem in sandy areas of low fertility and these "weed and feed" products are excellent for control. To be effective they must be applied before the weed seeds sprout, so the sooner, the better! Early feeding of lawns is more important than all the water you can run in summer. Well fertilized yards will be thick and fill in solid during the spring rains.

Also during the next three weeks is an excellent time to drastically cut back over-

grown foundation plants, groundcovers, and hedges. Even dwarf plants will eventually outgrow their places and at this time of year, can be cut far back into bare wood and will sprout anew. Hollies, ligustrum, pyracantha, nandina, photinia and even camellias can be rejuvenated by this method and after a few months growth, will look like new shrubbery. Spring is the only safe time to do this work so that the new growth will be hardened by cold weather next fall to prevent freeze damage. Don't be timid in your pruning, cut back farther than the height you want the plants to be maintained, as new growth will shoot out much beyond the cut ends by summer. Leave the bottom branches longer than the top, that is, taper from top to bottom so that the bottom will get plenty of sun and be full to the ground. A feeding of high nitrogen lawn food with iron will stimulate new growth on these pruned shrubs and don't forget the rest of the shrubs in the landscape. It's been a hard winter on most plants, for a lovely spring yard, feed and prune! HAPPY GARDENING!

Telephone Company Announces Construction Plans

Continental Telephone has budgeted almost \$700,000 in 1979 for new services and service improvements in Bogata and 11 nearby exchanges.

Ray Loveless, Customer Service Manager for this area, said that \$287,802 will be spent on Continental's continuing program of replacing wire lines and poles with buried cable. The company's intent is to provide individual line service to every customer within the cities served, and to provide four-party service or better to customers in rural areas.

Construction is scheduled to begin in many locations during 1979, though not all work is expected to be finished within the year. Loveless reported that one of the largest projects is replacement of open wire long distance circuits with buried cable from Bogata to Paris. The number of circuits will be increased and noticeable improvement in transmission quality is expected. At the same time,

cable will be placed west along Highway 271 then south on FM 410 to provide additional local service for Bogata customers in this area.

Election School To Be Held March 12

An election school for persons involved in the local elections in April will be held Monday, March 12, 1979, from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. at the Titus County Civic Center in Mount Pleasant.

Persons who may attend include election judges, mayors, city secretaries, school district personnel, county judges, special district officials, county party chairmen, and others who are involved in conducting elections.

P&WD Schedules Public Meeting

A public hearing on proposed changes in hunting and fishing regulations will be held at 3 p.m., March 12 at the Chamber of Commerce office in Clarksville, according to officials of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department.

All interested citizens of Red River County are invited to attend and express their views on the proposals. The department has regulatory authority in 237 counties. In others, game and fish laws are set by the State Legislature. In some counties, the department may have authority over game species but not over fishing, or vice versa.

Additional information about regulatory hearings in other counties and more complete details about proposed changes can be obtained from Parks and Wildlife Department offices.

Similar work will be undertaken in Detroit and Windom. All eight-party service will be upgraded to four-party or individual line service upon completion of these projects.

Other planned expenditures during the year include \$200,000 for phones, PBX systems and other equipment for customers,

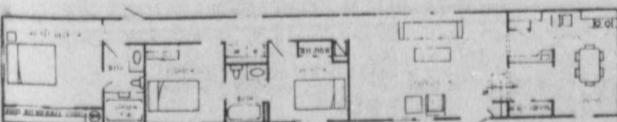

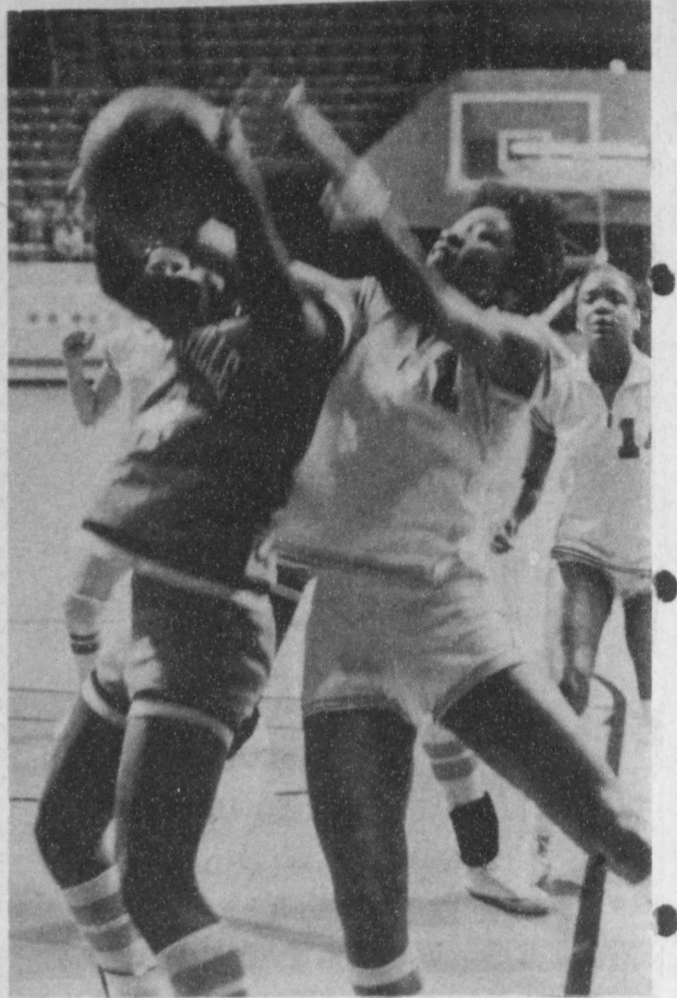
