## Rivercrest Rebelettes Take Second Place In Class A

The Rivercrest Rebelettes won second place in the state Class A girls basketball tournament Saturday night in Austin. After defeating Rodgers 46 to 37 in the

opening round, they lost to Hale Center 46 to 29. The small but quick Rebelettes, who were never considered very prominently in state standings until they

proved themselves the hard way, were "Jack, giant killers" until they met Hale Center, a team balanced with both quickness and height.

The Rebelettes led Hale Center briefly in the second quarter, but four early fouls on the team leader, Scotti Wood, put the Rebelette ball handler and leading scorer

on the bench, and the girls were never in the ballgame after that.

The contest against Rodgers Friday morning in the opening round was one of

the Rebelettes better performances, when they defeated players who are considered to be college basketball material.

Wood scored 26 points against Rodgers, and based on her ability as displayed in this game and the one quarter she played against Hale Center, was a unanimous All-Tournament choice by sportswriters covering the contests.

All the players on the Rivercrest bench saw action against Hale Center, as Rebelette Coach Frank Stubblefield tried every combination in an effort to slow down the Owlettes. Bright spots in the Rivercrest-Hale Center game included a revival of the outside shooting of Margaret Hines, not seen since the Spring Hill game, the

aggressive goal tending efforts of seniors Margaret Mills and Tina Vickers, the further developing skills of Robyn Reeder and the ball handling of Annette Harris.

Because only three of the

Rebelette squad are seniors, Mills, Vickers and Bessie Knight, most fans and coaches expect that the Rebelettes will qualify for the state tournament again next year, and if freshman Veronica Howerton develops into a starting post, the Rebelettes would be hard to beat. With Howerton at post, then the Rebelettes would have the combination of quickness and height that defeated them in the finals.

More than anything, the Rebelettes have depth, and should be able to defeat any team in Class A, with or without Wood. With Wood in the game to handle the ball, assisted by Annette Harris, Margaret or Donna Hines on the outside, plus Judy Via, Robyn Reeder or Howerton at post, the Rebelettes might have another chance to beat Hale Center in Austin in 1980.



### Bogata-Talco

#### Elections Set

Bogata will elect three city councilmen to its five member governing body April 7, each to serve two-year terms.

Only three candidates filed for the seats, Kenneth Brumley, Morris Foster and Charlie Lewis.

Mayor Joe B. Morse is unopposed in the April 7 Talco city council election, but incumbent councilmen Leo Roberts and Ellis Brown face opposition from Jack Daniels. The two seats will be filled by a majority vote.

### School Board Considers Employment Of Teachers For 79-80 Year

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, March 6, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. with all members present.

One of the major items on the agenda was the consideration and employment of teachers for the 1979-80 school year. Principals had met with the Board at the previous meeting to discuss and give evaluation reports

on the personnel of each of the three campuses. Principals were also in attendance at this meeting to further discuss teachers and their work and to make recommendations for the 1979-80 school year. Apart from the resignations that were accepted by the Board, all of the present teachers were employed for the coming school year. The resignation of B.A. Holbrook, Bogata Elementary principal, was accepted by the Board due to his pending retirement. Also, the resignation of Miram Cooper, Talco Elementary teacher for the past 10 years, was accepted as well as that of Doris May, Talco music and English teacher for the past two years. Walter Rich, Rivercrest band director for the past four years, submitted his resignation. Rich and his wife plan to return to college to further their education. Appreciation was expressed by the Board and administration for the contributions that these individuals have made to the

school system during their tenure.

Also related to personnel, the contract of Cornelia Dickey, tax assessor-collector, was extended for an additional year. Odessa Isbell, bookkeeper-secretary for the school district was reemployed for the 1979-80 school year as well as Clarice Vaughan, cafeteria supervisor.

Tillman Hale, Rivercrest principal, discussed a few matters concerning the high school program with the Board. These matters relate to changes and or improvements that it is felt could be made in the band program, pep squad, and junior varsity cheerleader program but are only being discussed at this stage. However, approval was given to a procedure whereby each of the elementary campuses will elect four cheerleaders from their eighth grade to try out before outside judges at Rivercrest with two of the cheerleaders from each campus to be selected by the judges as junior varsity cheerleaders.

In another matter, the superintendent was authorized to check into a question related to a part of the old Pine Branch School property to see that no unauthorized use is made of the property.

In final matters, the Textbook Committee report was approved, the 1979-80 school calendar was ap-

proved, approval was given to mileage for the high school principal for use of his personal car for business, and the various financial reports were approved. Also, approval was given to school being dismissed Friday, March 9 due to the fact that the Rebelettes are playing in the state basketball tournament. This being a student

day, it will have to be made up later in the school year.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be delayed until Monday, April 9 at which time the results of the April 7 trustees election will be canvassed. As always, the public is cordially invited to attend meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools.

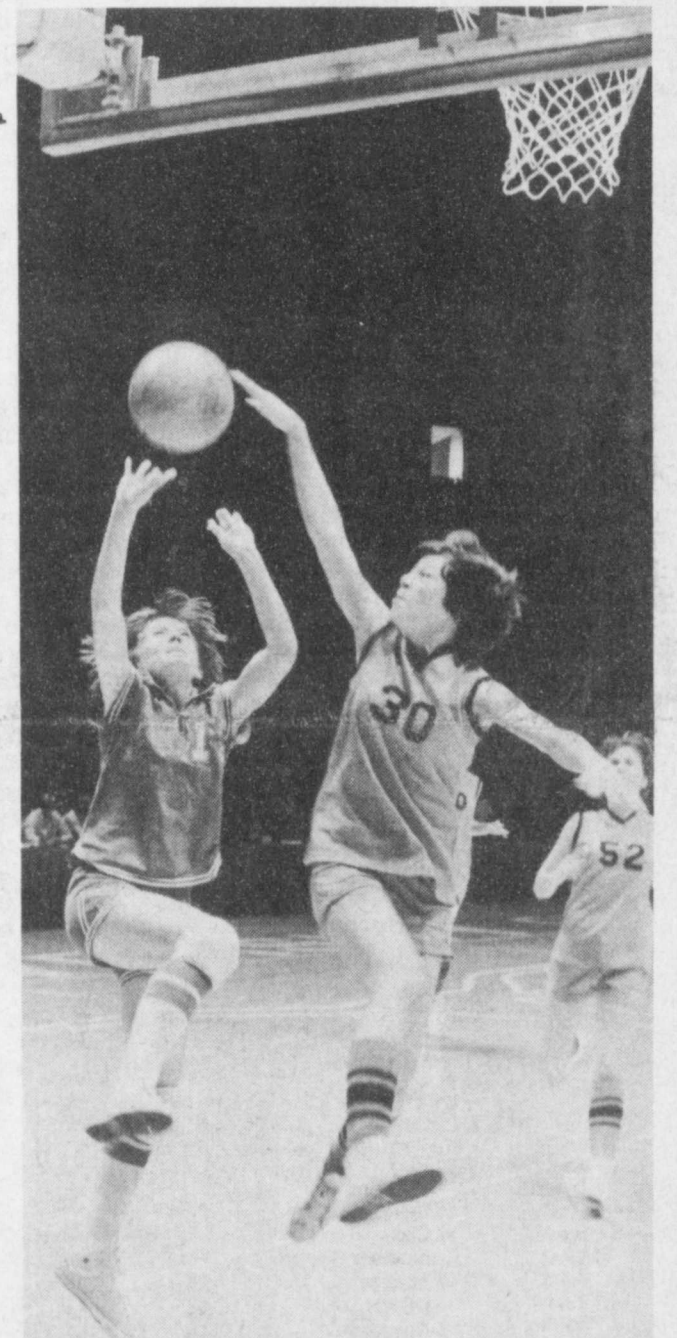

Dear Bogata Area Citizen:

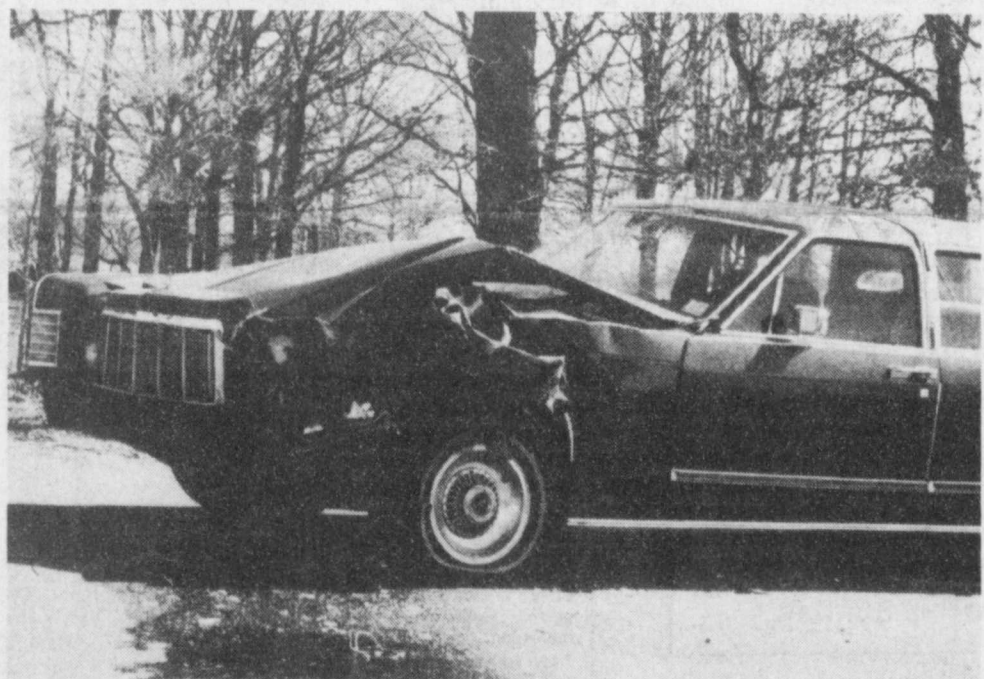

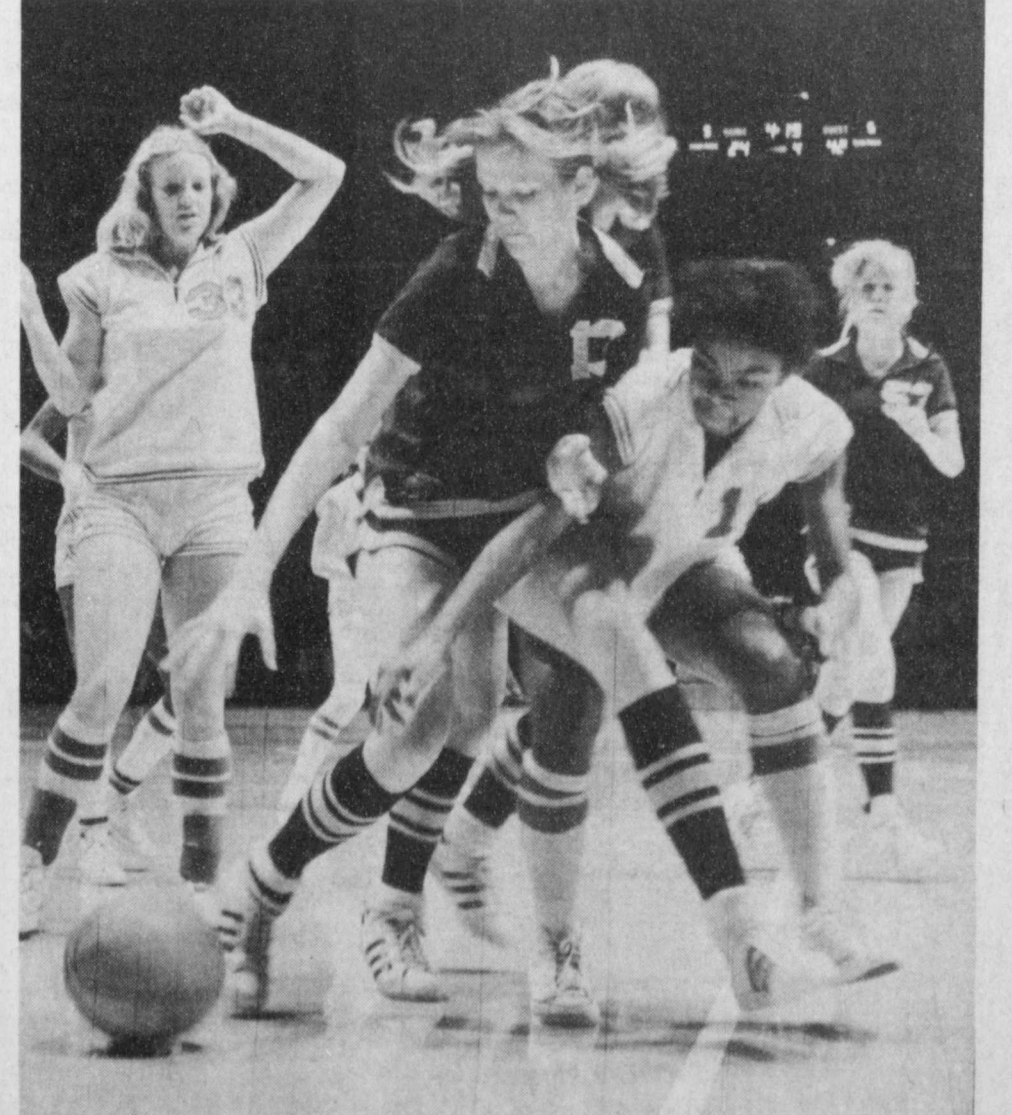
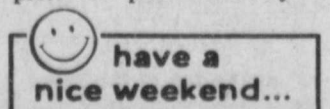

and was convinced that it was the right way to educate children.

After a trip to Europe to compare the English version of Montessori to the American version, she founded the Montessori Family Chapter Center in 1963.

"We've grown from 50 to 200 children," Mrs. Gadpaille said. "We recently moved into a \$2 million building on two acres of land."

The facilities include about an acre of playground and a greenhouse and garden. They are hoping to build their own television and radio station in the near future from which they will broadcast shows dealing with the Montessori method.

Originally from Ellington, Conn., a small tobacco growing community in the middle of the state, Mrs. Gadpaille went to Radcliffe College in 1923 but quit when she learned of Howard University, a black school in Washington, D.C.

"I wasn't around other blacks when I was a child," she said, "so when I heard about this school for black students that had black teachers, I decided I had to go there."

Mrs. Gadpaille had planned to be a doctor but after taking a course in

comparative education, she devoted the rest of her college career to education, receiving a bachelor's degree in education.

Now working with her third generation of children at the center, Mrs. Gadpaille has no plans for retiring.

"I'll be working for the next 25 years," she said. "I don't believe in aging. I think it's a myth. We're always told we're going to get old and die but I've found out so much of aging depends on your mental attitude."

Mrs. Gadpaille feels that most older persons could be as active as she is.

"There are plenty of people just wasting their lives," she said. "They could be enriching the life of a child, for example. Older people really make the best teachers, because while college degrees are good, getting old teaches you so much more."

IN LOS ANGELES County, older adults are entitled to Gold Cards which allow them free admission to activities sponsored by the nine campuses in the Los Angeles Colleges System.

The Gold Card program, which was the first of its kind in the country, started in 1972 at Valley College in the San Fernando Valley. About 16,000 cards have been issued to date.

Older persons not only attend classes but are given help in finding employment, a factor that has led to greater attendance by seniors in credit classes. In fact, at Valley College, the senior student population increased 500 percent in one year.

THE STEREOTYPE of poor health among older persons is not supported factually. According to a study by R. M. Campbell, a Ph.D. from Houston, Texas, 81 percent of older persons are mobile and self-sufficient and 14 percent are completely free of chronic conditions, diseases or impairments.

Factors other than age, such as sex, income, education and attitudes influence the health of older persons.

### THOUGHT FOR FOOD

#### Cheese Fondue

Cheese is a nutritional food as it contains protein, fat and vitamins necessary to body requirements. Eggs and cheese have proven to be good for us so we're doing ourselves a favor to combine the two for a filling dish without the costly pieces of meat.

- 1 pound grated cheddar cheese
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 small bottle club soda — yes — club soda
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- Dash of tobacco
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 egg yolk, beaten lightly
- Cut French bread in hunks so that each will have some crust.

Combine shredded cheese with flour. Combine club soda and seasonings in saucepan and simmer. Add cheese and flour mixture slowly while stirring constantly. Cook until all cheese melts and continue stirring until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and add a little cheese mixture to beaten egg yolk. Simmer for just a few seconds — not boil and stir constantly. Serve with the bread chunks by dipping them into your super cheese Fondue.

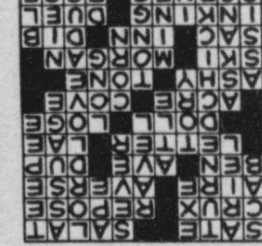

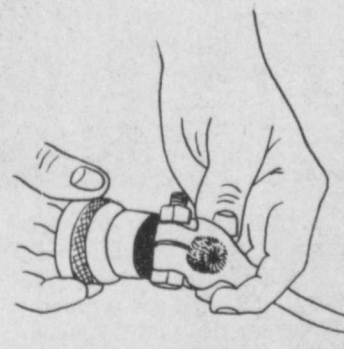

#### Clean Battery Cable

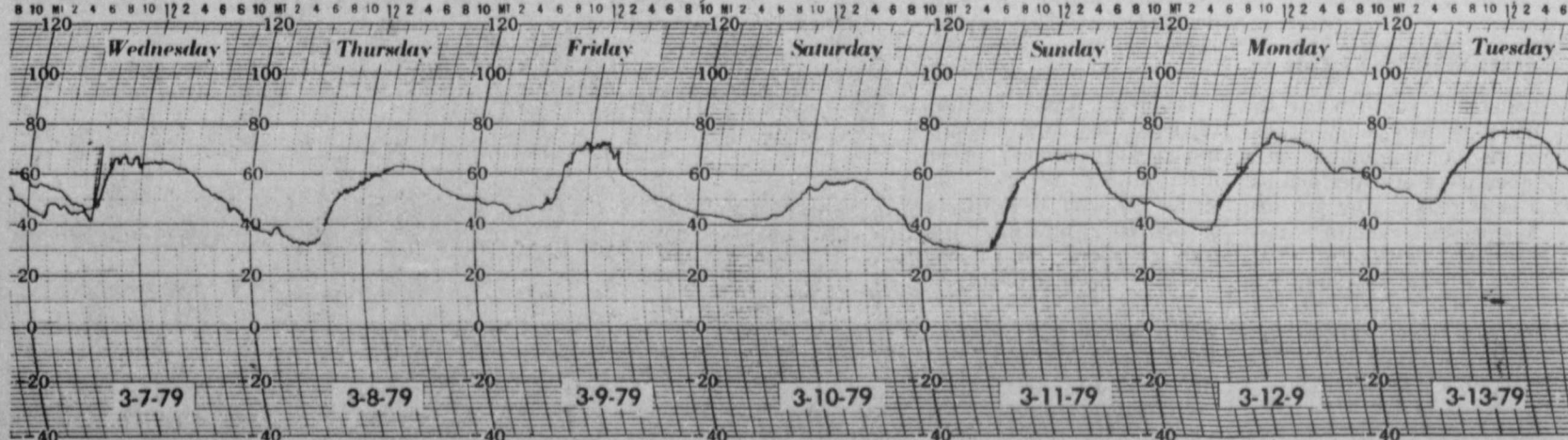
Corrosion on battery cable and terminals can block flow of electricity. Keeping them clean is easy, with wire brush or sandpaper. Always use gloves. Use a solution of 1 tablespoon baking powder to 1 cup water. Clean with damp rag. Be sure to re-attach cables tightly, apply light coat of spray lubricant to provide protection against additional corrosion.

**Sweater Care**

## you and the LAW

PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

**Q:** When I travel to work each morning I park my car on a street where there are no parking meters and no prohibitive parking signs. The street is located just outside an area where there are parking meters. When I left work and returned to my car the other day I found that meters had been installed where I park and a ticket was on my windshield. Do I really have to pay a fine? This seems unjust!

**A:** You have the right to demand a trial for any citation, including a parking ticket. This includes the right to subpoena witnesses and documents. Therefore, if you really wanted to make a big deal about this, you could subpoena the head of the street department in your city directing him to bring the records concerning when the parking meters were installed. Presumably, the judge would find you not guilty. It would sure be a lot simpler to pay the fine since this is one of the cheaper injustices you will have to face in life.

**Q:** When I had my safety inspection on my car last February the inspector installed a number five (5) upside-down on my inspection sticker to represent the number two (2). He said he had run out of number two and that this substitution procedure was acceptable. Is it acceptable?

**A:** The procedure is acceptable. The large number on the front of the sticker is for administrative convenience only. Its only function is to help enable law enforcement officers to detect violators. The information on the back of the sticker is what the officer should go by in issuing a citation for non-compliance. This information should correctly reflect the time, date of issuance and expiration, as well as vehicle identification information.


