Wood, director of the Bogata Funeral Home, was presented a plaque by Morris Foster, the Chamber's secretary-treasurer.

The honoree was determined by a secret vote of the citizens of the area. Wood has been one of the leaders in the Bogata Chamber and municipal

activities, and received another vote of confidence as he was re-elected to another term as head of the organization.

City Rebates Fall Behind Last Year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that rebates to Texas cities of the local one percent sales tax for the first three months of 1979 have fallen slightly behind the first quarter of 1978.

The dip in city allocations as well as a similar drop in the collection of the state's four percent sales tax is not likely to affect overall state revenue this fiscal year, he said.

"However, I'll be watching tax trends and receipts closer than a hawk watches a sparrow and plan to give the Legislature an updated revenue estimate for the next two fiscal years in the next 15 to 20 days," Bullock said.

Bullock said more than 915 Texas cities will share \$56.6 million in sales tax rebates during March.

He said 1979 rebate payments to cities from the first of the year total \$100.3 million, compared to 1978 payments of \$101.4 million over the same period.

Bullock said late returns that have not hit the Comptroller's system and not

sluggish retail sales during the reporting period seem to be the chief culprit for the downturn in rebates.

Bullock said the Comptroller's office had about 2,400 returns on hand that weren't processed for the March allocation.

Houston will receive \$11.2 million in rebates, bringing

the city's 1979 payments to date to \$20.3 million, about the same as last year's payments to date.

Locally, Bogata will receive \$2,495.37, for a seven percent increase over last year's payment of \$3,250.65. Clarksville will receive a check for \$24,701.67, marking a five

percent increase over last year's payment of \$25,521.25, totaling \$34,216.85 to date thus far in 1979.

Mount Vernon will receive \$8,524.19, marking a seven percent increase over last year's quarter figure, totaling \$14,471.15 to date in payments received.

Deport will receive

\$1,300.26, marking a nine percent decrease over last year's payment of \$1,300.26, which totals a payment of \$1,436.86 to date.

Paris received \$164,618.76, as compared to \$183,765.91 last year, with payments totaling \$254,187.38 to date.

Sun Valley will receive \$2,459.08, for a 28 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,968.73, while Talco will receive \$2,514.47, for a 15 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$2,973.77.

Toco received a check for \$110.18, for a total of \$3,162.13 thus far in 1979.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

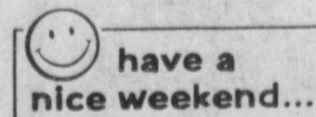

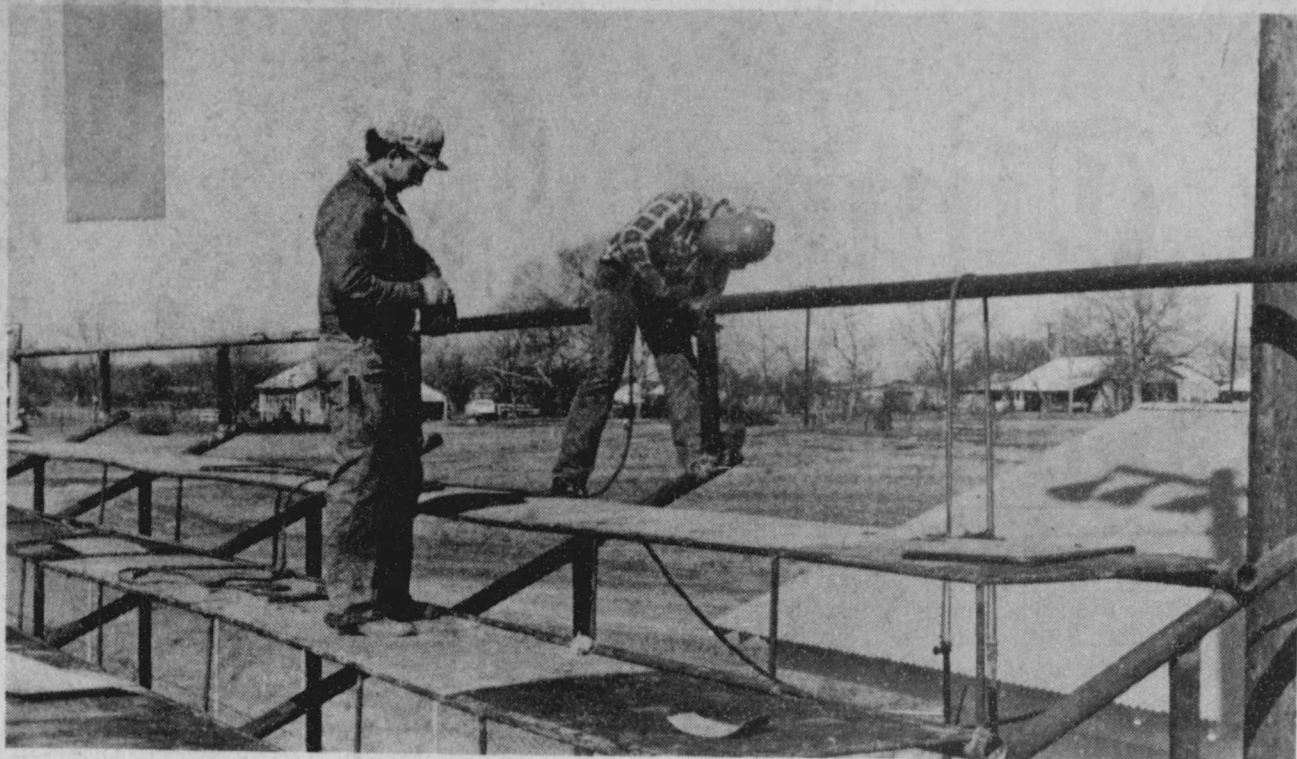
Cunningham To Have Carnival

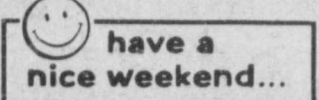

New First National Bank Building Announced

Plans for a new building to be located on the east side of Main Street for the First National Bank of Deport have been announced by Michael Stinson, president and chairman of the board, and principal stockholder in the bank.

The building will feature one drive in window with room for expansion to two windows, a room for a future insurance office, an expanded tunnel proof vault and additional safety deposit box facilities. Provision for the additional drive-in window includes underground wiring and other facilities for the window.

A raised entrance and 33' x 37' lobby with a bronze glass front will accent the front of the building, with a covered porch which will measure 34' x 10'. Tile shingles will be used on the Mansard roof of the brick veneer building.

Customers will be served from five tellers windows at the south side of the lobby, which will also contain waiting areas for customers. Space has been provided for a directors meeting room, employees lounge, and private offices for the president, executive vice president, vice president and cashier.

Customers will be able to drive around the building on a paved driveway, and paved parking areas will be provided at the north and west sides of the building.

A date for the start of

construction has not yet been set, according to Hugh L. Jeffus, Jr., executive vice president of the bank.

The new bank building will mark the first major construction in the business district in Deport since Blackland Prairie Gin was built in 1963. Most of the brick buildings now standing were built between 1900 and 1920.

The First National Bank of Deport was organized on Oct. 10, 1902, and survived the panic of 1907, when deposits were recorded at \$45,000, and the depressions of 1914, 1921, 1933 and 1939.

Assets at the close of business on December 30, 1978 were \$6,775,408.00. Total deposits were \$5,861,555.00.

IRS Suspends

Requirement

The Internal Revenue announced that it has temporarily suspended the requirement that employers provide copies of Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, to employees within 30 days after payment of final wages when employment is terminated. The temporary suspension applies only to wages paid during 1979.

The IRS said it took this action because the printing of the 1979 W-2 form has been delayed. Publication of the Revenue Procedure covering privately printed substitute Forms W-2 for 1979 will be delayed also.

The IRS will announce when Form W-2 must be furnished to former employees and when the Revenue Procedure is available.

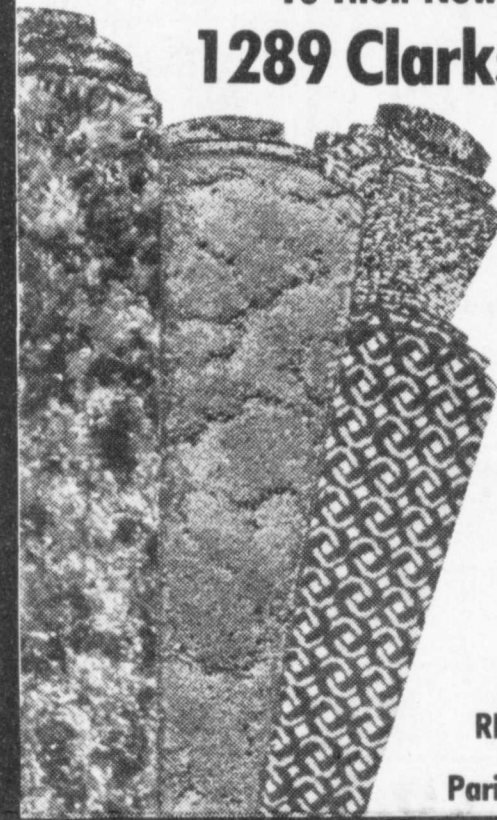

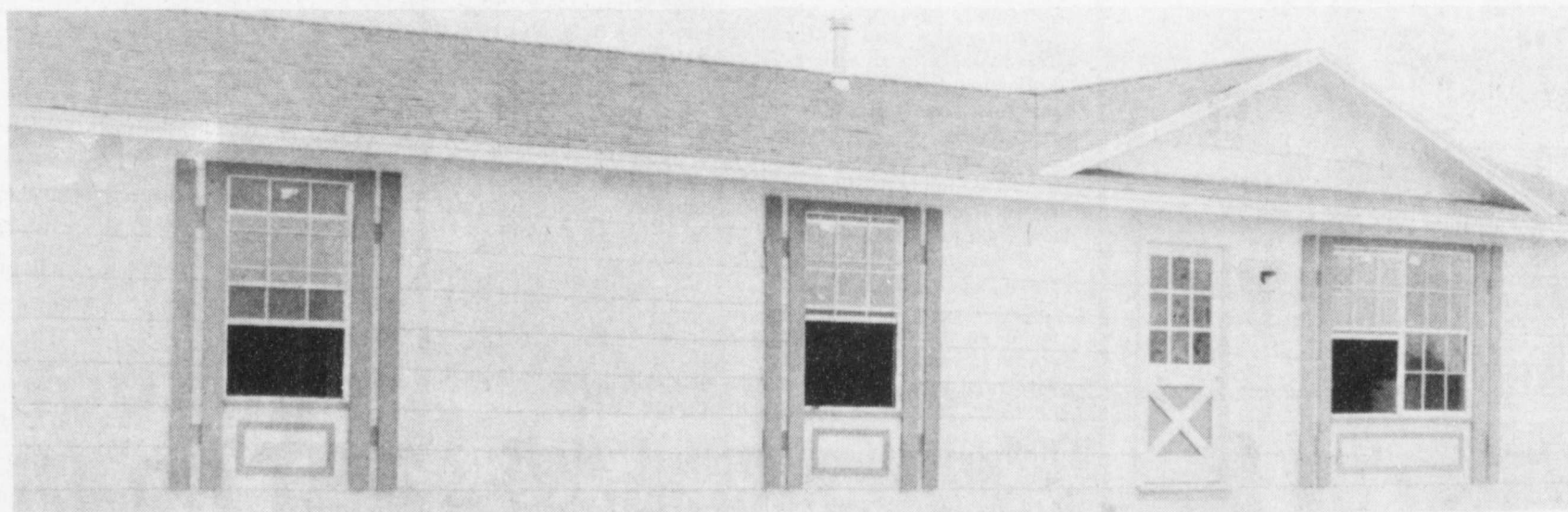

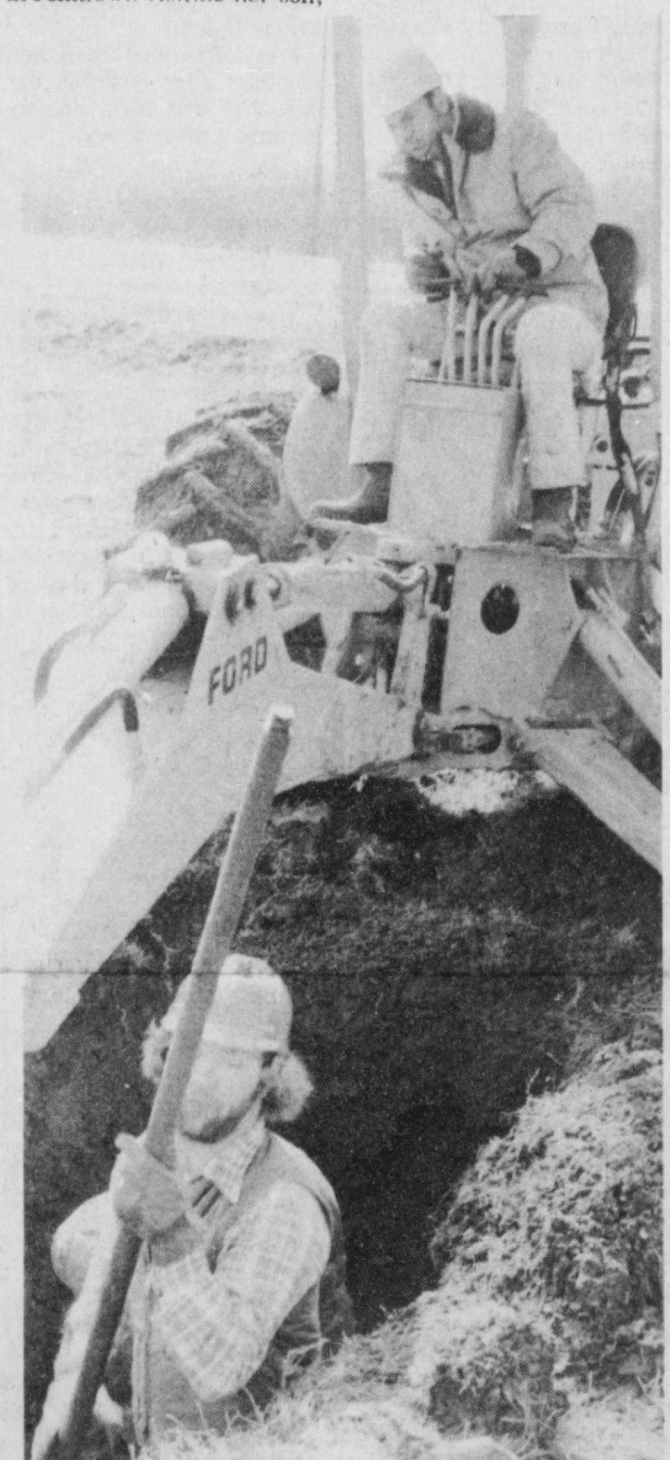

Benefits For Certain

A person whose spouse died in 1976 or 1977 may be entitled to a special tax benefit, the Internal Revenue Service said.

There are requirements for obtaining the lesser tax rates: the taxpayer must have been entitled to file a joint return for the year of the death, even if one was not actually filed; the taxpayer must not have remarried before the close of the current tax year; he or she must have a child or stepchild who qualified as a dependent; and he or she must have furnished over half the cost of maintaining a home which was the principal residence for the dependent child or stepchild for the entire year.

Taxpayers who are eligible to take advantage of the lower tax rates should file Form 1040, check Block 5 under Filing Status, "Qualifying Widow(er) with

Widows, Widowers

Dependent Child," and figure the tax using the "Married Filing Jointly" column.

The last year a taxpayer may file jointly with, or claim an exemption for, a deceased spouse is the year of the death, the IRS said.

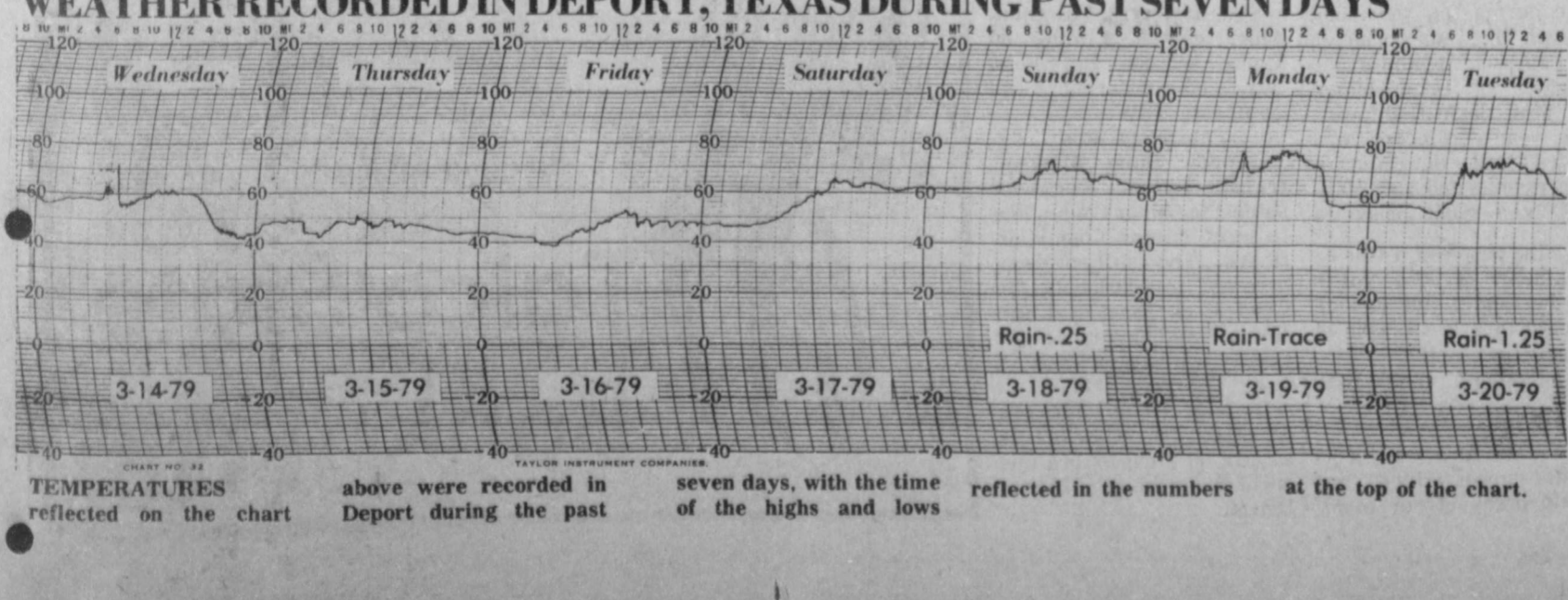

PJC Offers Travel-Study Program

For the first time this summer, Paris Junior College will offer a travel-study program including two weeks of classes at PJC and two weeks of travel in Europe. During the first summer semester, May 28 through July 3, students may take History 300-Western Civilization and include a 14-day cultural exploration of Europe as part of the course, explained Dwight Chaney, dean of academic instruction at PJC.

Offered through the Division of Social Sciences, the three-hour course will be taught by Chaney, who will conduct class sessions at PJC from May 29 through June 8 to give students background information before they leave for Europe on June 11.

The course is open to PJC students or high school juniors and seniors who are interested in acquiring college credit before graduating or just after graduation. Also, community residents interested in making the European trip only may pay the tour fee and not take the course for credit.

Class members will fly first to Athens, Greece, one of the most famous and historical cities in the world. After spending three nights in Athens and cruising to some of the Greek Islands, the group will go by boat to Italy and spend three days in Rome visiting the Vatican, Sistine Chapel, Roman Forum, Pantheon, Trevi Fountain and other historic sites. Students then will visit Florence, a city noted for the quality of its arts and handicrafts.

The final days will be spent

in London, England, where students will receive a comprehensive tour of all the most important places of interest, Chaney explained. Group members will have free time in all the countries to explore on their own, the instructor added.

Applications for the trip must be submitted soon to finalize the tour plans, Chaney said, so all interested persons should call him at PJC, 785-7661, extension 135, before April 1. The course will be limited to 24 so those going will have a small group for touring and more individual attention from tour guides. Information on costs for the course and tour may be obtained from Chaney.

The three-hour course is fully transferable as a history credit or social sciences elective. For students who already have credit for Western Civilization, arrangements may be made for an advanced history credit.

The trauma workshop will be sponsored by PJC's Continuing Education Division in coordination with the Texas Department of Health, Emergency Medical Service Division.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. both days in the Student Center Ballroom at PJC, and the seminar will continue until 5:30 p.m. both days. 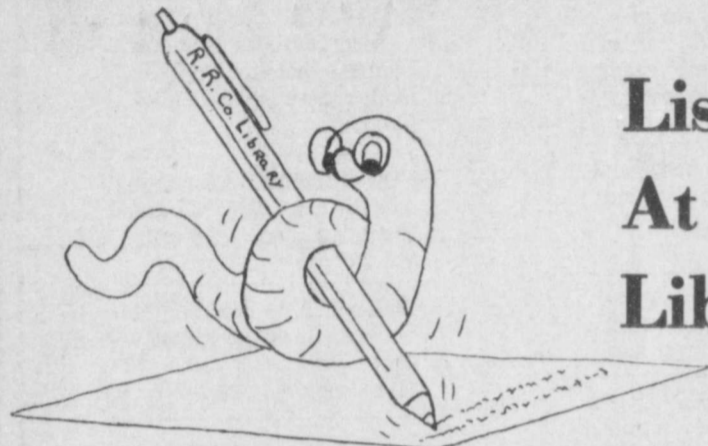

Hall Elected President Of Texas State Society

The Texas State Society is a 1000 member organization in Washington, D.C. that coordinates a number of activities for Texans who are located in the Nation's Capital. Founded in 1904, its first President was former Congressman Oscar W. Gillespie of Fort Worth.

Congressman Hall has the distinction of being the 50th President of the Society, which traditionally has been the largest and most active of the various state societies in Washington.

Noted Texans who have served as President of the Society include the late President of the United States, Lyndon B. Johnson. The Majority Leader of the House, Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth, served as President in 1959-60. Hall's predecessor in the House, the late Congressman Wright Patman, was President in 1941-42.

In addition to offering displaced Texans an opportunity to attend traditional Texas events, the Society acts as a clearing house for the wants, needs and ideas of Texans in the Washington, D.C. area.

Every state in the union has organized a state society, and during the annual Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington, a princess is selected from each state to represent that state during the week-long festival. This year's princess will be Alison Hightower, the daughter of Congressman and Mrs. Jack Hightower. Last year's princess was Sandra Hall, daughter of Congressman and Mrs. Hall.

"It is a great honor to serve the people of Texas as President of the State Society, and I am looking forward to a great year of constructive activities for our members," said Rep. Hall.

The Marshall Congressman added that "while many of our mem-

bers are now residing in the Nation's Capital, there is no such thing as another place of residence for a Texan, because your heart is always in Texas".
