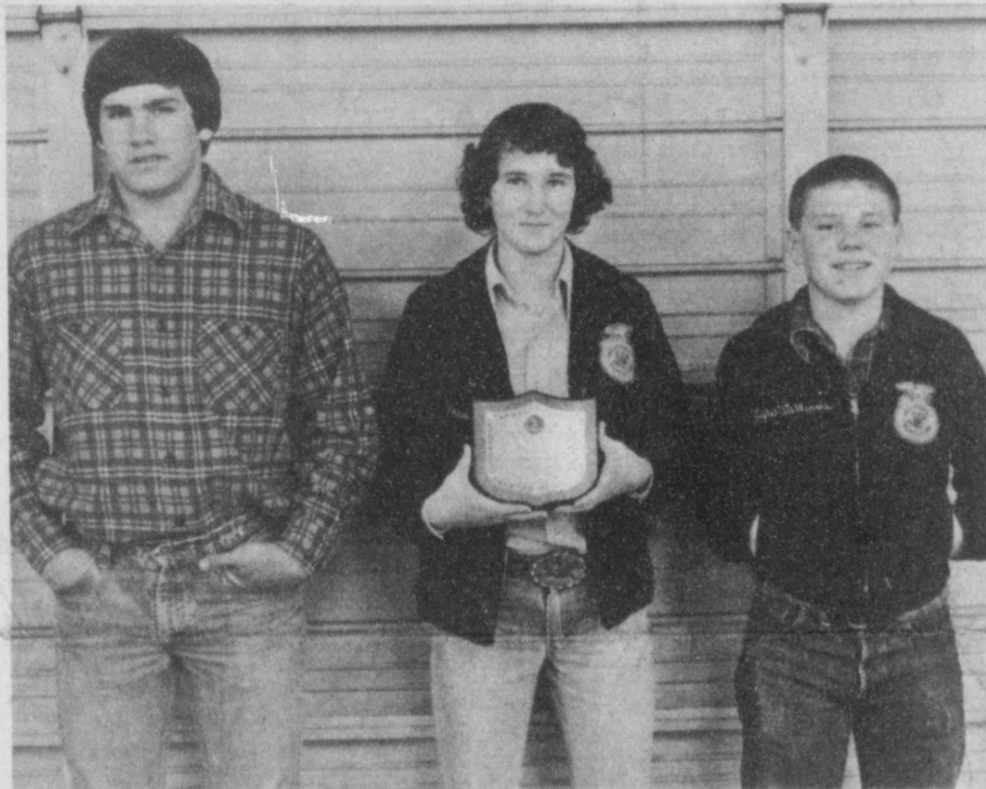

Now Mandatory

Talco Mayor Joe B. Morse announced Tuesday that a \$4 charge per month per water meter would be made to cover the cost of trash pickup in the city of Talco.

Morse said that the city policy of allowing residents to elect whether or not they want trash service is not working. Cost of maintaining the trash dump, trucks and personnel has continued to rise as the number of trash customers has dwindled, although the volume of trash has remained constant, Morse said.

The \$4 per month charge will be assessed beginning April 1, Morse said.

It is not usually easy to accurately gauge the "progress" of a town, city or area, but one of the best ways to check growth is to play the numbers game. Year end growth figures compiled by General Telephone Company of the Southwest show 723 telephones in service in Talco at the end of 1978. During the year, Talco gained 55 telephones.

At the end of 1977 there were 668 telephones in service with a gain of 62 for the year.

And, in the past ten years Talco has experienced a 53 percent increase with 472 telephones in service at the end of 1968.

Anyone wishing to enter, is asked to register clean shaven at the First National Bank in Bogata and receive the rules and regulations.

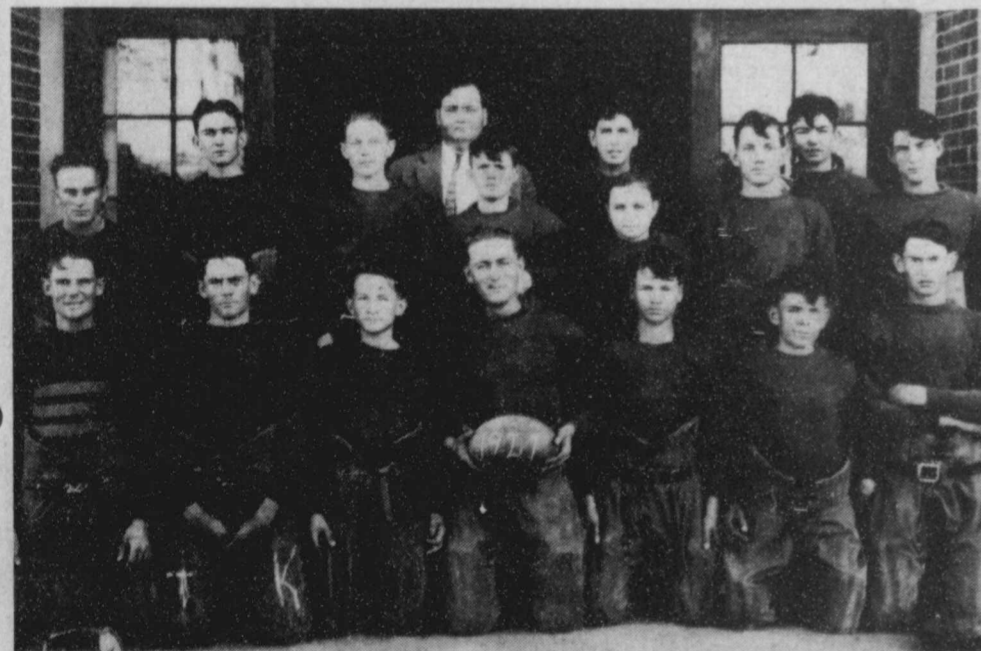
Entrants are reminded that they must not shave prior to June 30, to be eligible to participate.

Security Numbers

Delay Refunds

Tax refunds can be delayed by incorrect social security numbers and inaccurate addresses, the Internal Revenue Service warned.

To guard against unnecessary refund delays, the IRS encourages taxpayers to use the peel-off identification label provided with the tax package. The label is pre-printed with the taxpayer's name, address and social security number, and needs only to be affixed to the tax return before it is mailed, according to the IRS.

The IRS reminded taxpayers to check the information on the label before using it, however, to be sure all information is correct. Any changes should be made in ink on the label itself.

The IRS also reminded those persons who changed their names last year to report the new name to their local Social Security Administration office. This ensures that the new name will be assigned to the proper social security number.

Army Extends Enlistment Incentives

The Department of the Army announced earlier this week expansion of the Selective Reserve Enlistment Incentive Program to all US Army National Guard and US Army Reserve units during the period March 15 to June 15, 1979. Applicants will be offered a choice between a \$1500 enlistment bonus or \$2000 in educational assistance funds.

The purpose of these incentives is to assist recruiting efforts directed toward overcoming severe

shortages of Reserve Component personnel. Applicants must enlist for a term of six years in a troop program unit; be high school diploma graduates, or high school seniors about to graduate; score 31 or higher on the Armed Forces Qualification Test; never previously have served in an armed force; not be enlisting to qualify for civilian positions where membership in the Reserves is a condition for employment; and not be enlisting for voluntary

assignment to full-time training duty or active duty for training in excess of 90 days in support of the Reserve Program. Individuals who want to enlist under this program should contact their nearest Army National Guard or Army Reserve recruiter.

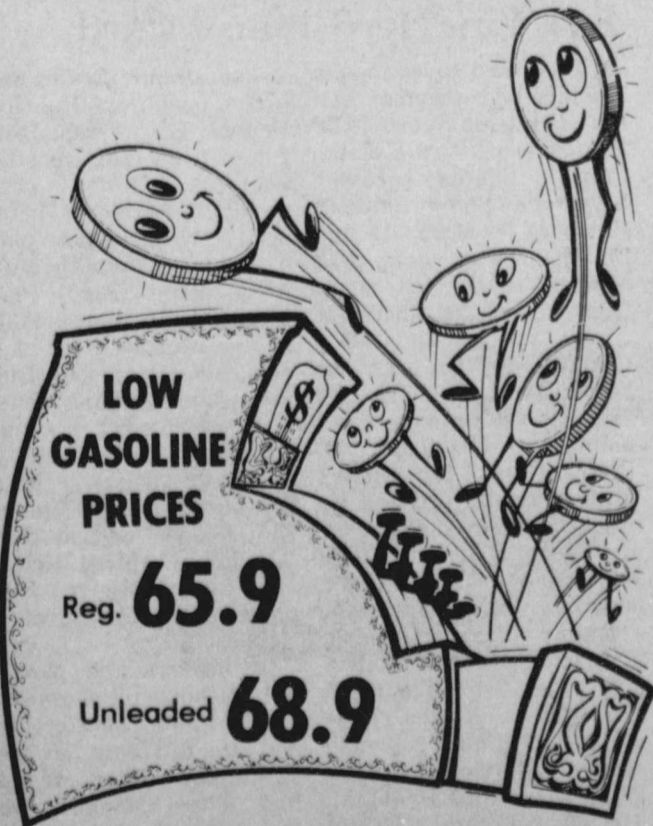

Training Center Opens For Diabetic Children

Camp Sweeney Diabetic Educational Training Center for diabetic boys and girls, ages six through 16, will open for the 30th year of operation on June 3, 1979, with three week sessions as follows: June 3 to June 22, June 24 to July 13 and July 15 to August 3.

Camp Sweeney is located nine miles east and one mile north of Gainesville, Texas on 338 acres of beautiful rolling timbered hills with three dormitories for boys and three for girls; a non-denominational chapel; a modern hospital; a 38 acre lake for boating, fishing and water skiing; a sanitary swimming pool, tennis courts, recreational pavilion, target range and 20 gentle saddle horses.

Under the supervision of a specialized medical staff, dietitian and counselors, these children are taught their proper diet with regulated exercise, how to take their own urine tests and give their own insulin injections. Of major importance, through this group association with other young

diabetics, they realize they are not alone with their disorder and with proper knowledge and instruction they can learn how to live with their lifelong companion—diabetes.

Diabetes is hereditary, incurable and increasing yearly. It is the third killer of diseases and ranks third as the cause of blindness. Medical authorities estimate one fourth of the world's population carries the diabetic gene and some 5,000,000 cases of diabetes are in the United States, of

Forest Service Is Looking For Trees

The Texas Forest Service is looking for four trees. Not just any four trees—they need a champion-sized American holly (Ilex opaca), a bluejack oak (Quercus incana), a paw paw (Asimina triloba), and a shagbark hickory (Carya ovata).

The dry summer, old age, and disease took the lives of these four state champion trees last year. Replacements are needed to complete the Registry of Champion Big Trees in Texas.

The Registry, maintained by the Texas Forest Service, includes 147 state champion trees, of which 51 have the additional title of national

champion. The Big Tree Program is conducted by this state agency to promote an awareness and appreciation of trees, and to help preserve outstanding examples of native tree species in Texas.

If you own or know the location of a champion-sized tree, contact the Forest Resource Educator, Texas Forest Service, College Station, TX 77843, for a nomination form. Copies of the current Registry of Champion Trees are available on request.

Gasoline rationing will have a great adverse effect on Texas and will do nothing toward solving America's energy shortages. Congressman Jim Collins of Texas said.

Collins, who serves on the House Energy and Power Subcommittee which is now holding hearings on the Administration's gasoline rationing plan, said the proposal will hurt the western and southern states that have low population densities. The plan allows each motorist nationwide two gallons of gasoline per day.

"Common sense should indicate that Texas is a different area than New York City, and motorists have to drive farther to go from one place to another, but once again common sense does not prevail in Washington," Collins said. He noted that the rationing plan will give the Northeast as many ration coupons as people in the Western states will receive. "This will surely lead to shortages of coupons in Texas, whereas people in New York City will have surpluses which they call sell back to us."

According to Collins, the economic impact of the Administration's plan on Texas is prohibitive. He cited a Department of Energy study that said Texas would lose \$116.4 million a month during rationing because we will need more coupons than we will be allotted, while the Northeastern states of New York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Massachusetts will gain over \$140.3 million a month.

"This gasoline rationing plan does not solve our energy shortage it only

reallocates that shortage. Decontrol of oil and gas prices is the only solution to spurring domestic production of energy and reducing our dependence on foreign energy.

"In 1960 we imported only 16 percent of our domestic energy needs, in 1978 we imported 47 percent. As long

Legislation Aimed At Sales Tax Redistribution

State Representative Ray Keller, Duncannonville, has announced his sponsoring of legislation aimed at redistribution of the city sales tax "to allow cities to regain the tax revenue that is rightfully theirs in the first place."

Explaining, Keller said, "The city sales tax is voted on by citizens of a local municipality but it is promulgated, administered and dispersed by the State. My bill calls for redistributing this money on the basis of population rather than where it is collected, under present law. Now, when someone shops outside his hometown, the one percent portion of the tax does not return to the citizen in the form of services. It goes to another city for services, means the shopper is footing the bill for another city and represents blatant taxation without representation."

Continuing, Keller said, "Not only does this create a windfall for cities who happen to have many

as we continue to pay foreign countries anywhere from \$16.50 to \$25 per barrel and pay Texas oil producers \$5.25 a barrel, America will continue to have shortages and will become even more dependent on unreliable foreign sources of energy," Collins said.

businesses arbitrarily situated in their political boundaries, but the recovering cities are under no obligation as to how the revenue should be used. Under my proposal, 91 percent of the cities in Texas would receive a net gain and we would stop subsidizing those nine percent who gain under the present inequity. In fact, the City of Deport would realize a net gain of \$26,153 under this legislation. Bogata would realize a net gain of \$37,314, and Talco would realize \$20,530."

Keller concluded, "The cities with large retail areas gain from increased property taxes. There is no reason to subsidize other cities at the loss of our own when demands for tax relief and ever-increasing expenses are the concern of every local government. The time has come to do away with the inequities of the present law and give each citizen their rightful voice in how that money is spent."
