City-School Board Elections Set Saturday

Area residents will vote in a number of city and school board elections Saturday, April 7, 1979 and only one of the races is uncontested.

Mayor Joe B. Morse is unopposed in the Talco City Council election, but incumbent councilmen Leo Roberts and Ellis Brown face opposition from Jack Daniels. The two seats will be filled by a majority vote.

Five names will be on the ballot for the three positions to be filled on the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata School in the Saturday election. From the Bogata area, Kenneth Jeffery, incumbent, and John M. Ward are the candidates. From Talco, Gene Smith, incumbent, and Charles Arther Smith are the candidates.

One three-year term will be filled from Bogata; one three-year term will be filled from Talco and one one-year term will be filled from either the Bogata or Talco area according to the number of votes received.

Voting boxes will be at the Bogata gymnasium and the Talco Elementary School.

Clinic Set

For April 12

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at the Bogata City Hall in Bogata on April 12, 1979 from 2 to 4 p.m. Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (DTP) and Tetanus-diphtheria (Td). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults.

On the ballot for election to the Prairiland School Board are Raymond Hoover, Calvin Day and Harold Klinkerman for place 7.

Unopposed for place 5 is incumbent Bobby Kennedy, and unopposed for place 3 is Paul Ray Keys, who is running for election to the unexpired term of Gary Nixon.

Charles E. Rollins and Ernest L. Stinson are running for place 4 vacated by the resignation of Pat Bailey.

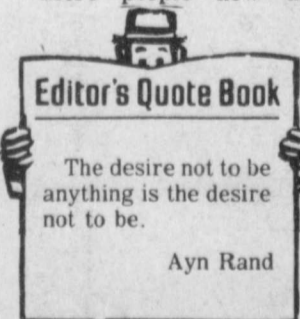
Pay Taxes Due, But Not In Cash

When paying your Federal income tax, send either a personal check or money order, but never cash, the Internal Revenue Service warned.

Using a check or money order is safer from two standpoints, the IRS explained. First, a check or money order is harder to steal; second, the cancelled check or money order will serve as a record that the payment was made. The IRS

also advised taxpayers to put their social security number on the check or money order directly below the signature. That way the taxpayer will be certain to get credit for the payment should the check or money order be detached from the return.

The IRS noted that no matter what type of check is used, the tax is not considered paid until the draft is honored by the bank on which it is drawn.

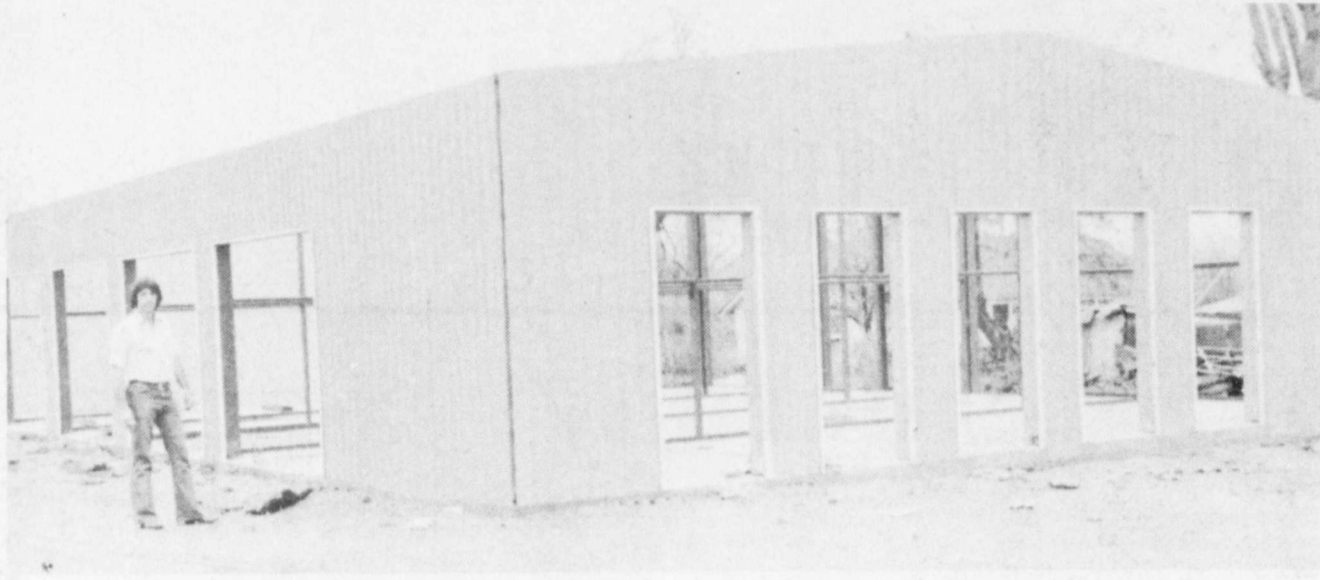

Employer's Report Deadline Is Near

April 30 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the first quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until May 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

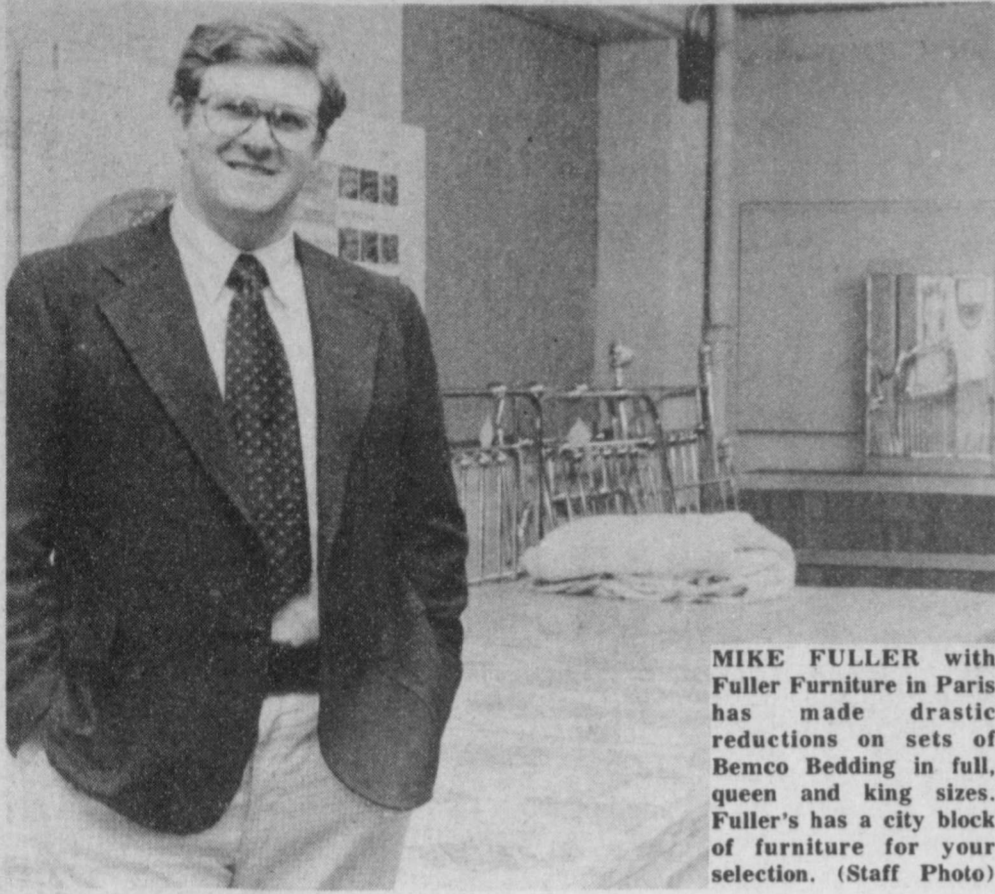

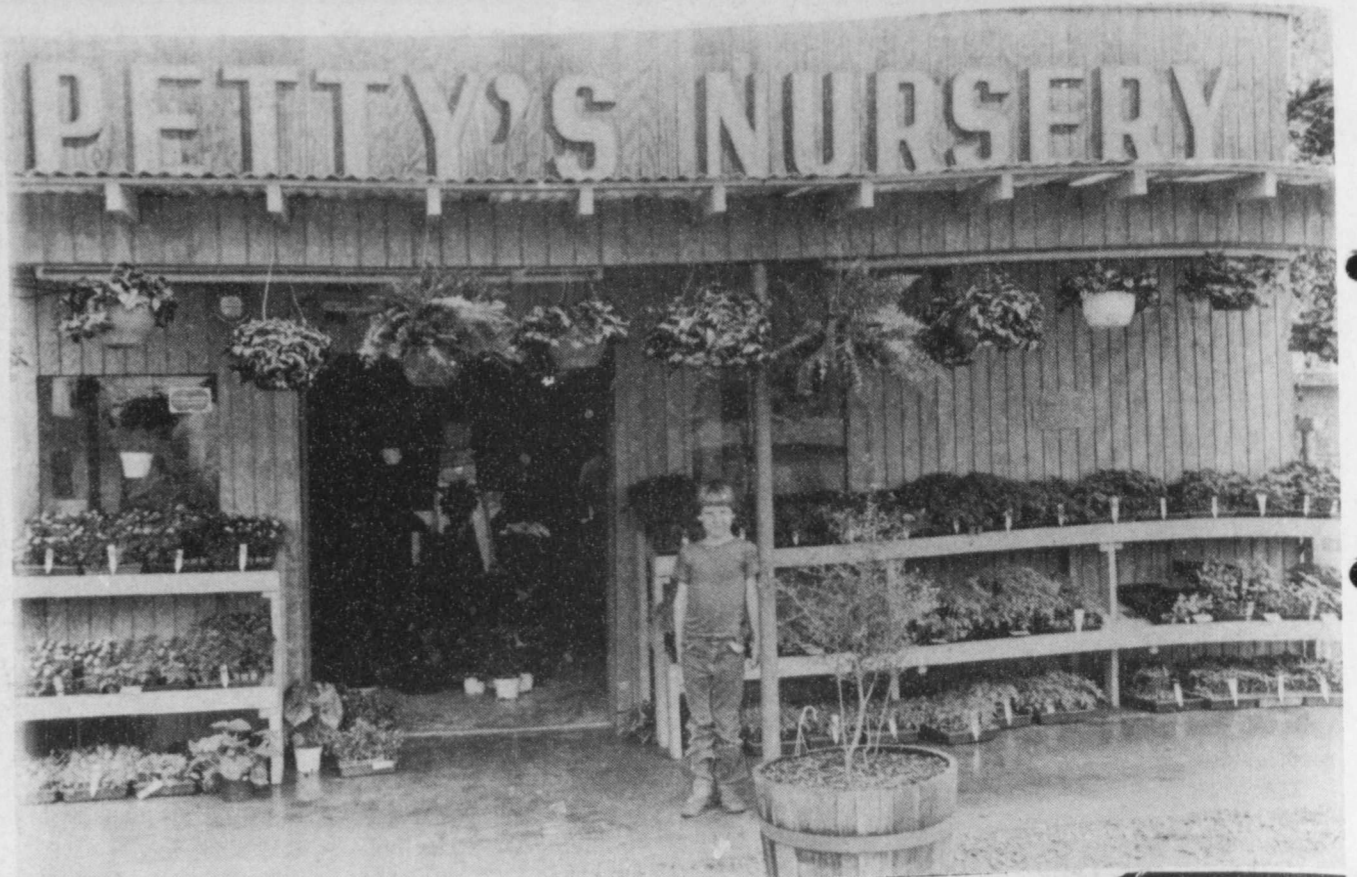

Wire Thief Interrupts Telephone Service

If you tried calling friends or relatives in Deport or Bogata Monday night and found your long distance calls weren't getting through, don't worry. It wasn't just your telephone. About \$300 worth of copper wiring was stolen off

telephone poles between 12th and 24th SE, disrupting long distance service between Paris and those Red River County communities. J. Marlin Moss, a maintenance supervisor with the company told police that some 12,800 feet of the

copper wire had been taken from poles. Some eight spans of wire, eight wires to a span, containing 200 feet of wire each, was reported stolen. Moss estimated loss at least \$300, not counting, he said, the labor it will take to replace the wire.

Crews, after receiving complaints that long distance service between Paris, Detroit and Bogata was disrupted, investigated to find the wire missing in a pasture south of the railroad tracks near 12th SE. Crews apparently scared the thieves off, police said, as some rolled bunches of wire were reported recovered from where they had been stacked beneath trees.

Jim Epperson, assistant manager at the Southwestern Bell Service Center, said service was restored at 1:45 a.m. Tuesday. The initial call came through at 7 p.m., he said. Bogata and Deport were reported isolated, Epperson said, and 61 circuits were reported out of service. Nine craftsmen and three supervisors handled the service. Permanent repairs were being made Tuesday morning, Epperson said, with last night's work seeking only to restore service.

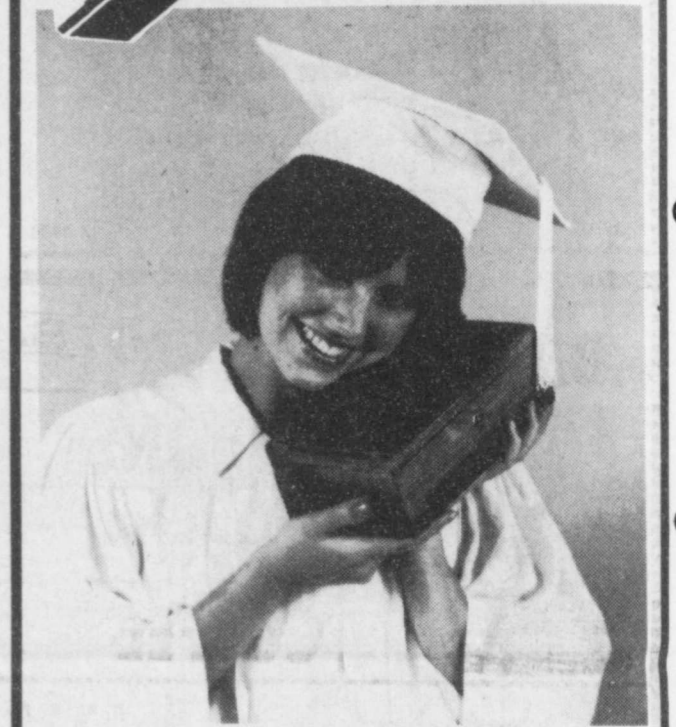

Services were Saturday at 2 p.m. at the Bogata Funeral Home Chapel, with burial in Rose Hill Cemetery at Pittsburg.

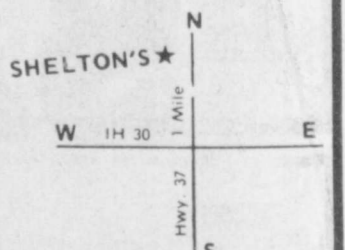

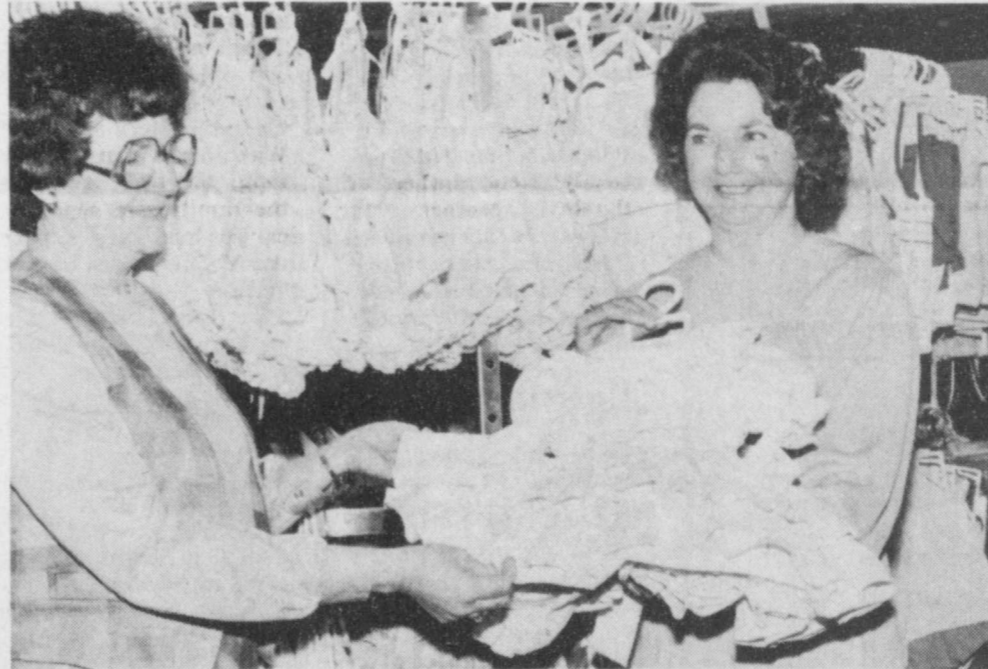

Texas Gross Sales Exceed \$45 Billion

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said gross sales in Texas during the third quarter of 1978 surged past second quarter sales by more than \$1 billion, reaching \$45.2 billion during the three month period.

Only one major urban area--Tarrant County--posted a decline in sales over the second quarter, Bullock said.

The 1978 three-quarter total for gross sales in Texas climbed to \$131.8 billion with the addition of the latest sales figures.

Bullock's office released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales breakdown by the state's 25 Standard

Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Totals for the state's SMSAs divide total sales into 21 different categories including agriculture, mining, manufacturing, construction and retail.

Harris County topped the state list in recorded sales for the third quarter, reaching \$12.4 billion. This is a \$500 million gain in sales over the second quarter. First quarter sales in Harris County were \$10.7 billion.

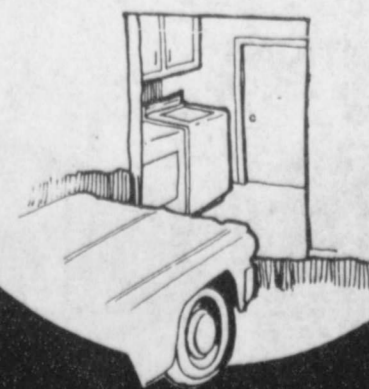

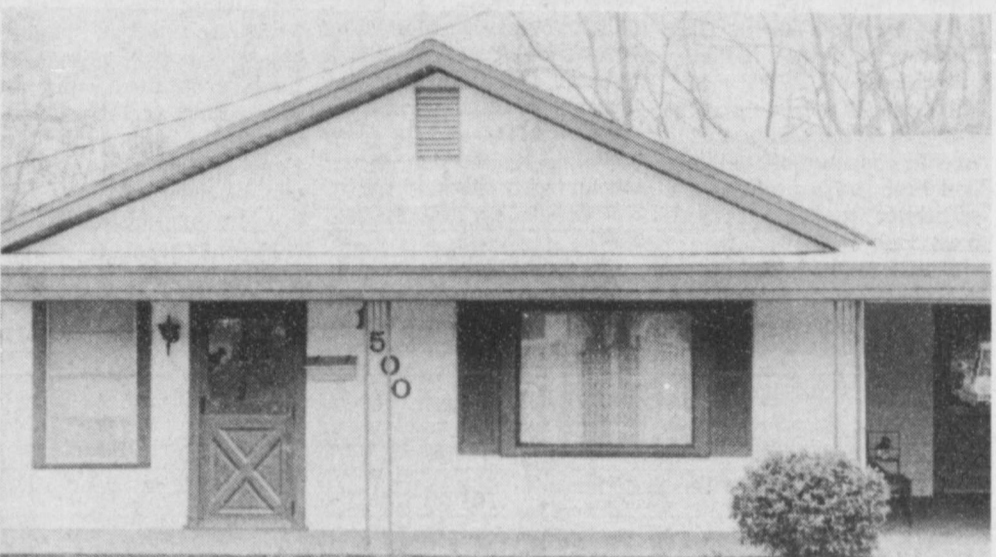

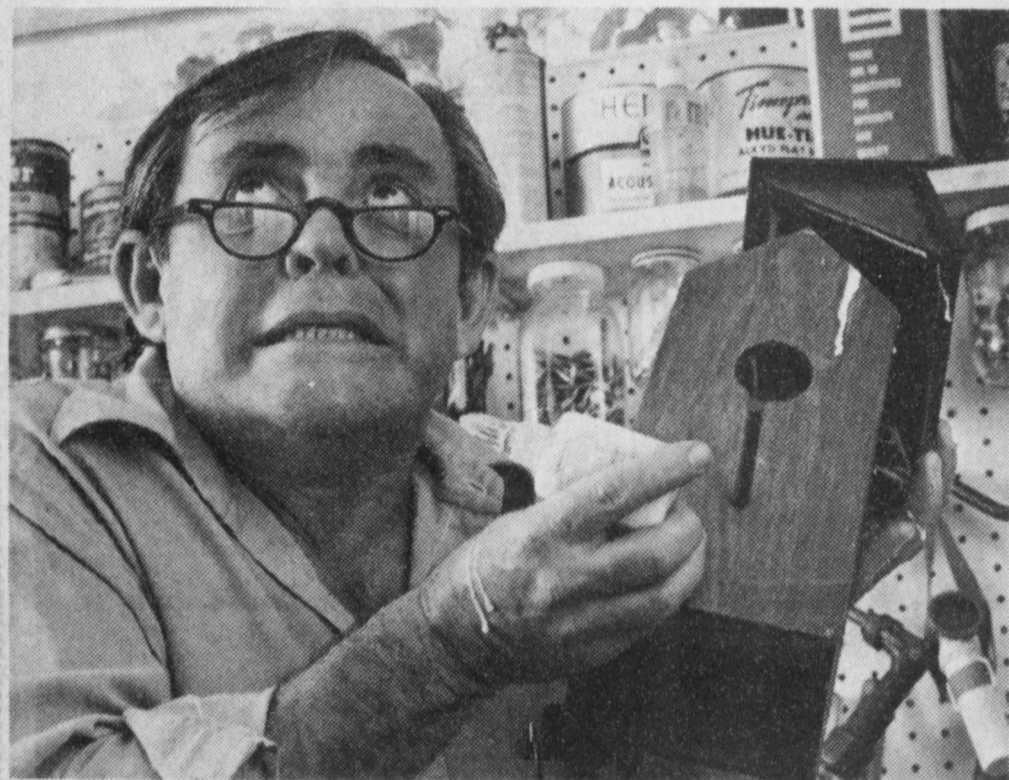
Payment Authorized

Wheat haying and grazing for payment in 1979 has been authorized. The program will operate the same as in 1978 with the exception of: (1) there will be no advance payment; (2) there is no guaranteed payment rate. To be eligible, a producer must have planted the wheat for grain and comply with all other applicable program requirements. The acres designated for wheat haying and grazing are limited to the larger of 50.0 acres or 40 percent of the total acreage of barley, corn, grain sorghum, upland cotton and wheat intended for harvest in 1979, not to exceed the NCA or the wheat acreage. Once the acreage is designated for haying and grazing, no harvest of any crops for grain is permitted. The acreage may be planted to haygrazer or similar type crop for hay and or grazing.
