Tracksters Shatter Records At District Meet

Five new district records were set at the District 20A Girls Track and Field Meet held at Rivercrest on Friday, April 6.

Annette Harris, Rivercrest cinder star, topped four records. A junior, Harris set new district records in the triple jump with a 36'4" effort, the long jump with a 17'1/2" jump, the high jump with a 5'2" jump, and the 880 yard hurdles with a sizzling time of 11.23 seconds.

Scotti Wood, a sophomore at Rivercrest, set the record

in the 880 yard dash in 2:36.2. The Rivercrest team took first place honors with an aggregate of 162 points. Other team placings were Queen City, 126; Ore City, 82; Detroit, 65; James Bowie, 40; and Redwater, 38 points.

The winning team members on the 880 yard relay from Rivercrest was composed of Annette Harris, Scotti Wood, Debbie Ward, Margaret Hines. The mile relay team, winning first in

that contest, consisted of Judy Via, Scotti Wood, Debbie Ward and Sonya Moore.

Judy Via won second in the 440 yard dash, while Marilyn Mills placed third in the high jump. Placing third in the 440 relay was the team of Margaret Hines, Janice Bivins, Monica Belcher, and Debbie Ward.

Sandra Dunn placed third in the 880 yard dash, Jean Bivins placed third in the 220 yard dash and Margaret Hines placed third in the 880 yard hurdles. Fourth place winners were Cindy Houghton in high jump, Sonya Moore in 440 yard dash, Sarah Scales in 80 yard hurdles and Jeanie Edge in the mile run. Placing fifth were Monica Belcher in triple jump, Janice Savage in the shot-put, Kim Smith in the discus, Dusty Damron in the 880 yard dash, and Janice Bivins in the mile run. Sixth place winner was Debbie Ward in the triple jump and long jump. Qualifying to attend the Regional Meet at

Kilgore Junior College on April 20-21 are Annette Harris in triple jump, long

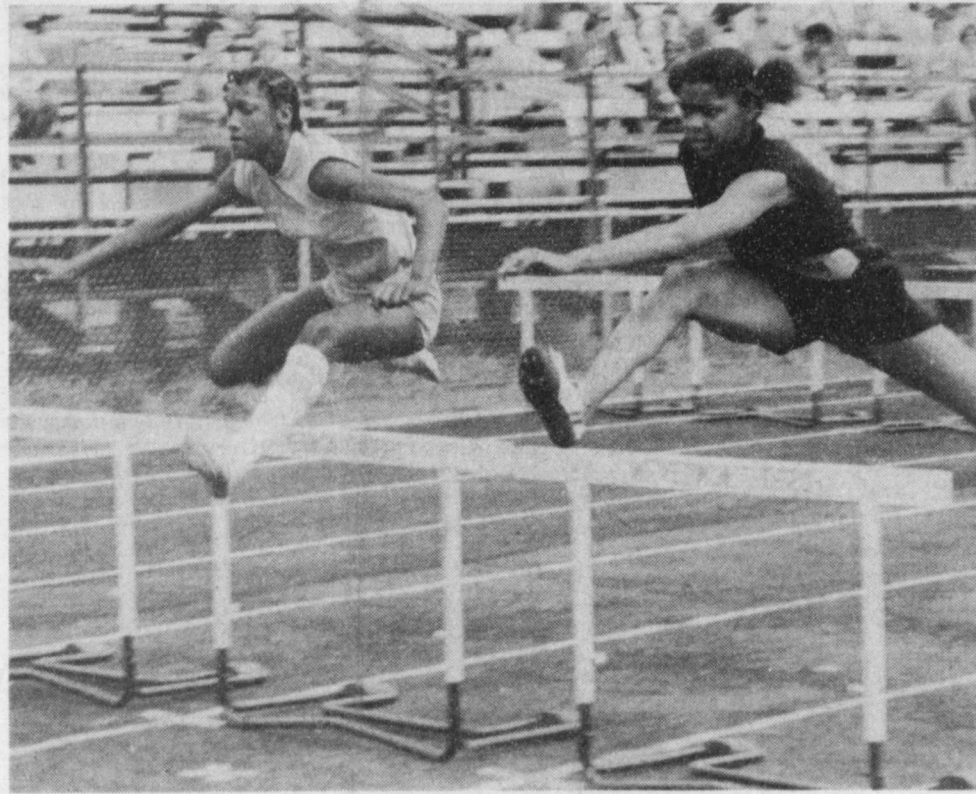
jump, high jump, 80 yard hurdles and 880 relay; Scotti Wood in 880 yard dash, 880

relay and mile relay; Judy Via, 440 yard dash, mile relay; Debbie Ward, 880

yard relay and mile relay; Margaret Hines, 880 yard relay and mile relay; Jean Bivins, 880 relay; Sonya Moore, mile relay; and Monica Belcher, mile relay.

The Regional Meet, finals, field events and preliminaries will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, April 20. Preliminaries in the track events will be Friday, with the finals for track at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 21.

Winners of the first and second places will go to the state meet in Austin on May 5. Coach Frank Stubblefield said, "We plan to have several entries in the State meet."

School Registration At

Talco-Bogata Scheduled

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan has announced that registration for Kindergarten and 1st grade students for the 1979-80 school year will be held on Tuesday, April 24th at 9:30 a.m. Students who will be

attending Bogata Elementary School will register with Principal B. A. Holbrook and students from Talco will register with Principal Robert Giddens. After registration, students will have an opportunity to visit and get acquainted in the school until 11:30 a.m. Children must be 5 years of age on or before September 1, 1979 to be registered for the Kindergarten and 6 years of age on or before September 1, 1979 to be registered for the 1st grade. It will not be necessary to register children presently attending Kindergarten for the 1st grade.

Parents are reminded that it will be necessary to furnish a birth certificate at the time of registration. Also, children must meet the requirements of the Texas Education Agency and the State Health Department on immunizations before they can be admitted to school. These requirements are: Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus, Measles, Rubella, and Mumps.

Annona

Votes Wet

The small city of Annona broke a half-century of traditional dry voting in Red River County Saturday by approving package-only liquor sales by a four vote margin.

Of some 240 registered voters in the town, 216 cast ballots, 110 of them for liquor sales and 106 against.

Wet supporters had promised the sales areas will be strictly governed by city officials and said the increased revenue will finance street and water improvements for the city.

"We worked hard," said Barry Peek, chief wet supporter, "and we didn't make any promise we don't intend to keep. It will be a nice business place just like any other business."

"This wasn't a religious issue. The people who voted for it are good people. The people who voted against it are good people. If it had been a religious issue, we wouldn't have gone to seek out what we did. We intend to do what we said we'd do when we set out, to help the city," Peek said.

Bobby Brem, local used car dealer who also supported the issue, said he is "very pleased" with the election results.

"I just don't have any comment except that they beat us four votes," said Rev. Claude Martin, adding he said he "hasn't had time to think about" legal action stopping the election implementation.

"I'm going to talk to some men, but I don't know anything about the laws in this kind of thing," he said.

Recount Reverses Election Results

A recount of the ballots during the election canvass Monday night revealed an error which returned Roy Castlebury to a place on the Dept City Council rather than elect write-in candidate Pete Storey to the slot.

Deport council members and Mayor Charles Foster recounted the ballots at the regular meeting of the council Monday night while Storey looked on, and all agreed with the new count. "I've been counting cotton

for sixty years," Storey said, "and I know how easy it is to make a mistake."

Election judges Paul Wood, Ina Sparks and Tommie Lawler originally came up with a tally which gave John Denison 124 votes,

Duane White 93 votes, Pete Storey 89 votes, Roy Castlebury 88 votes and Ann McKinney 65 votes.

When the votes were counted again at the Monday night meeting, Denison received 123 votes, White

received 91 votes, Castelbury received 88 votes, Storey received 75 votes and McKinney received 63 votes.

The proposition which would allow a \$3000 homestead exemption for

residents 65 years and older passed by 17 votes, 85 to 68. Storey commented that the new count "appears to be all right." According to the election laws, another recount can be made on or before May 7, 1979.

Voters in the Talco-Bogata School District gave Gene Smith of Talco and Kenneth Jeffery of Bogata each a three-year term on the district's board of trustees and John Ward of Bogata a one-year term.

According to Superintendent Talmadge Morgan, the candidate with the most votes from each district gets a three-year term. The candidate with the third highest number of votes, the superintendent says, gets an at-large one-year board spot.

In Talco, Smith took 98 votes; Jerry Stansell took 96; and Charles Arther Smith, 53.

In Bogata, Jeffery took 108 and Ward took 104.

Talco voters elected a mayor and two city commissioners in light voting Saturday.

Joe B. Morse won a stint as mayor with 42 votes while Leo Roberts polled 40 votes and Ellis Brown captured 30 ballots for terms as commissioner. Jack Daniels, the only other commissioner candidate, received 14 votes.

Thirty-six votes were cast Saturday, April 7, in the city election of councilmen. Three were elected, being Charlie Lewis, the incumbent who received 33 votes; Kenneth Brumley, incumbent who received 35 votes; and Morris Foster, who received 35 votes to replace Troy Howerton who did not run for re-election.

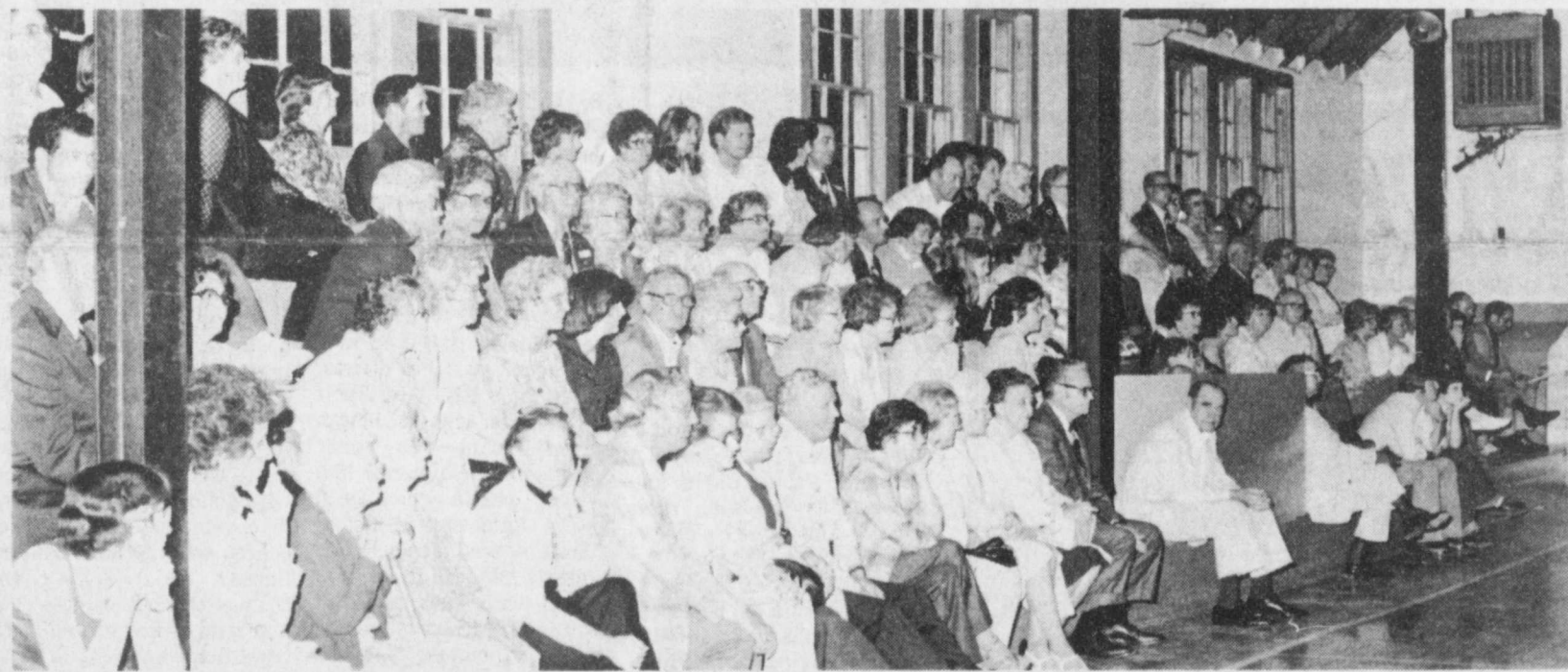
Voting was done at the city hall with Mrs. Gordon Allen as judge and Mrs. William Rozell as assistant.

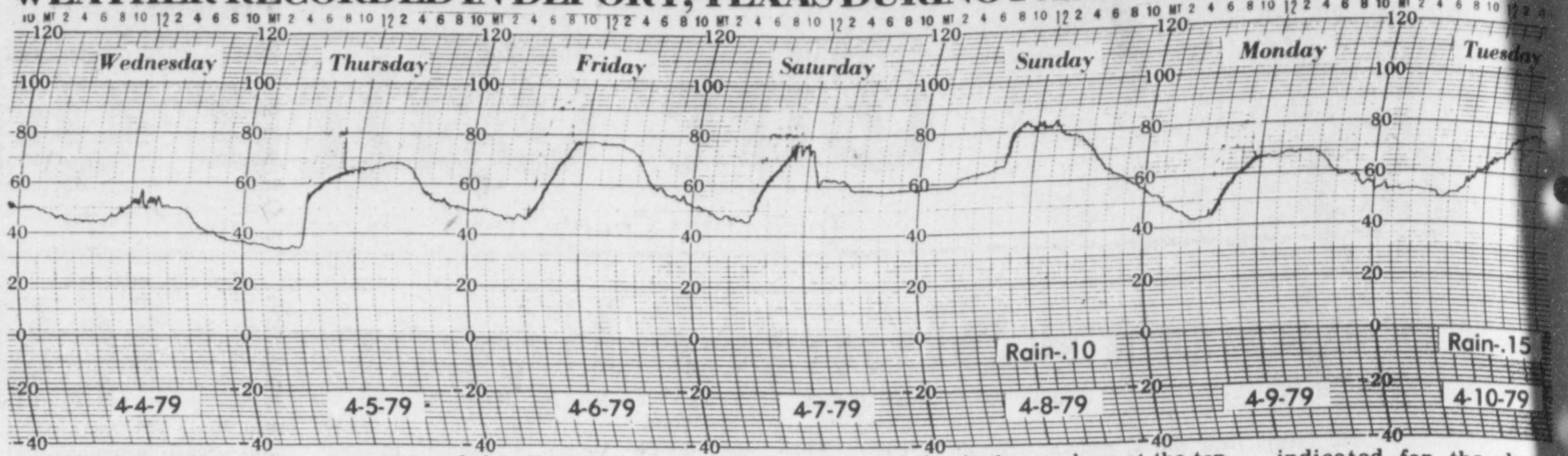

East Texas Eating

Asparagus is sending up tender, succulent spears in East Texas gardens. And, fresh asparagus is available, though a bit expensive, in some local grocery stores.

The asparagus spears are at their peak of flavor and tenderness snapped at ground level when they are 6 to 8 inches high. Fresh asparagus that you buy in grocery stores will usually need to have an inch or so snapped off of the lower end of the stalk—it will snap easily where it is tender enough to keep the remainder of the stalk.

Wash the asparagus. Thinly peel off the tough outer scales and membrane with a vegetable peeler or a sharp knife. Loosely tie into serving size bundles. Cook the asparagus in boiling salted water until it is tender, usually around 12-15 minutes. Some cooks prefer to stand the asparagus in boiling salted water with the water covering the lower part of the spears but not the tips and cover with a lid or

the inverted top of the double boiler so steam will cook the tips. Other cooks drop the spears into a deep saucepan of boiling water and cook uncovered. Asparagus is cooked when a knife point pierces the lower and end easily. Drain the spears on dish towels. Serve immediately or wrap in one layer in towels and refrigerate.

Real, fresh asparagus has such a delightful flavor that I think all that it really needs in the way of seasoning and garnish is a bit of butter.

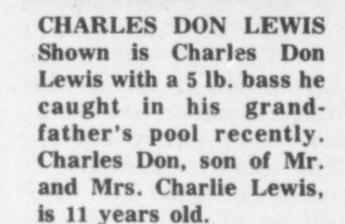
Students Practice Teaching

East Texas State University has placed 347 student teachers in school districts across northeast Texas this spring, according to Dr. Stuart Chilton, director of Educational Field Experiences at ETSU.

The group began student teaching on March 12.

Chilton said that the number of student teachers is 40 less than the 387 ETSU sent into the field last spring. He added, "Statewide, student teaching is down 25 percent from the high point of 1971-72. Nationwide, there has been a 33 percent decrease in student teaching."

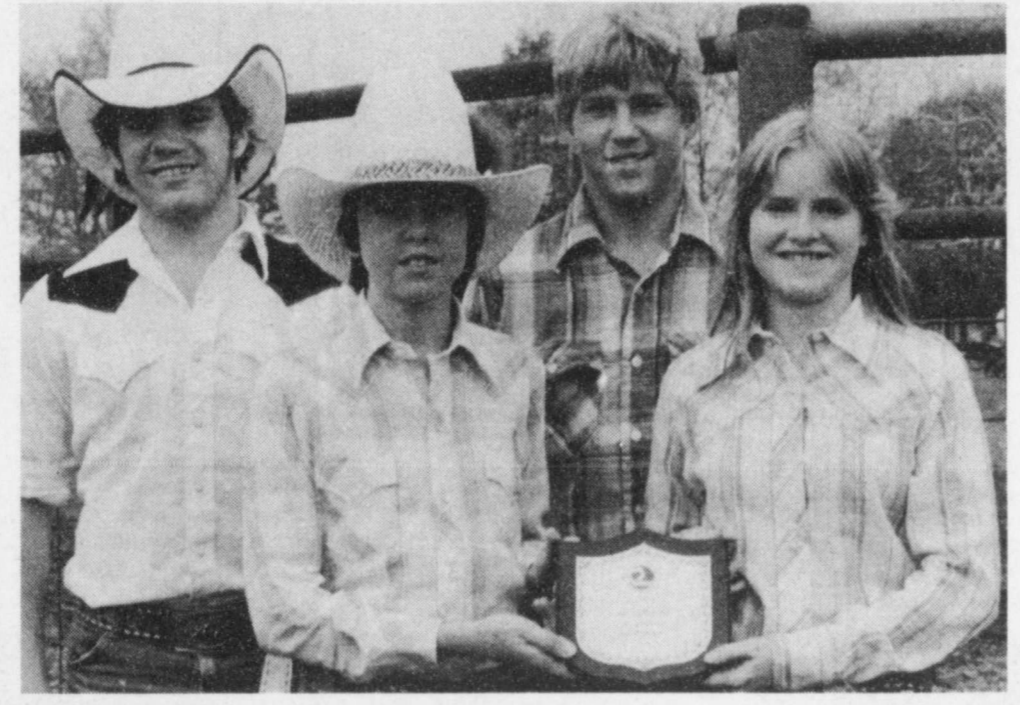

"Beefless" Campaign

Would Backfire

An agricultural leader said a "beefless Wednesday" campaign would backfire and result in higher beef prices in the long run.

Carroll Chaloupka, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, said the partial boycott of beef recommended by the New York City Department of Consumer Affairs "shows a total lack of understanding of what it takes to put beef on the table."

"Cattlemen are doing everything they can to increase the supply of beef for the American people," Chaloupka said. "They are responding to the more favorable prices of the past several months. A successful boycott would break the cattle market. It would be a signal for cattlemen to reduce herds again."

Chaloupka said cattlemen reduced total cattle population by 21 million head over the five years following the price collapse in 1974.

"The facts of life are that we have eight million fewer cows than we had five years ago," he said. "It takes cows to produce the calves that we fatten for beef steaks and hamburger. All we ask is that the boycotters and government leave us along to build back our herds and provide an adequate supply of beef."

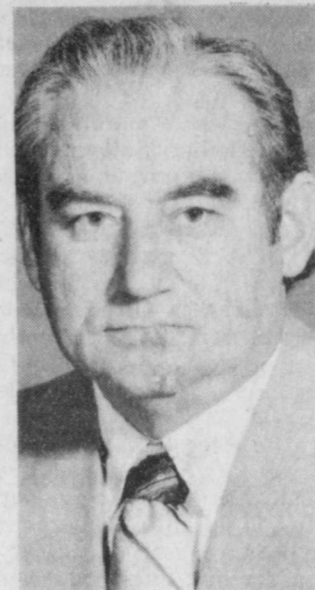

Gardening Made Easy

This cold rainy spell has set back gardening for the first part of the month, but take heart, it should be the last cold of the season. As the soil dries, warm weather garden plants can be set out and seed of heat loving annuals sown. Peppers, tomatoes and eggplant do nothing until we have warm nights, so little was gained on early transplants. During the next few weeks warming soils will encourage these crops.

Buy caladiums now but wait to plant in late April or May. Bulbs will produce twice the foliage as started plants, however, planting now will only lead to rot in cold wet soil. Later started bulbs will also last longer into the fall and the same is true of most tropical bedding plants. It is far too early for lantana, copper plants, coleous, impatiens, moss rose and periwinkle - these thrive on heat and even demand it to grow well. Put in petunias and marigolds for early color in sunny areas, as these like the cool nights we will still be having.

Container roses can be put out now or later as they come into bloom. Be sure the pot is at least 2 gallon size or larger that they grow in - anything smaller means the bushes had their roots cut off to fit the can. The smaller plants will be cheaper, but they will be weaker plants and need extra care to bloom the first year or two. The savings of a dollar or two won't mean much in the long run. Feed your roses their second feeding if it has not been done with a rose food or high phosphate fertilizer. Dust with Diazinon if aphids appear.

Add azaleas to shaded areas if you can keep up summer watering. Azaleas need more water than most shrubs, but must not ever stand in water as roots rot. Beds should be half peat moss and pine bark conditioner mixes with an equal amount of sandy Always mulch with pine bark after planting to conserve moisture - pine needles are good but not as attractive and a severe fire hazard next to the house. Dogwood like the same conditions and while you see azaleas and dogwoods in full sun, they are extremely hard to get started and keep watered in such areas during the summer. Morning sun and afternoon shade is perfect.

Hosta will give the effect of green and white caladiums in shade, but be perennial. They also give stalks of lavender, blue, white and pink blooms during summer when shade color is most appreciated. Use a good amount of peat moss or compost when planting. One light feeding each month through the summer will produce huge clumps of ruffled leaves next summer and years to come.



April Is Cancer Month

On April 5th, 1979 Governor William Clements will "roll up his sleeves" to fight cancer...by signing a proclamation declaring April cancer Control Month in Texas and by donating blood to the American Cancer Society's Blood for Cancer program.

Four and one-half old Christopher Smardz will accept the proclamation on behalf of over 100,000 ACS volunteers working for 360 local ACS organizations in Texas. Christopher, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Smardz of Missouri City, is currently being treated for leukemia and is a recipient of the Blood for Cancer program. Governor Clements will meet with ACS state leaders during the signing ceremony to highlight concurrent American Cancer Society fundraising and blood donor pledge drives being conducted during April.

The Blood for Cancer program is a cooperative program between the American Cancer Society and many Texas blood banks. Cancer requires the greatest number of blood transfusions of any disease known today. Changes and improvements in the treatment has meant cancer patients often require

literally hundreds of units of blood or blood components. Combined with Chemotherapy and Radiotherapy advances, transfusion of blood has become a powerful new tool in the fight against cancer.

Blood donors recruited by ACS volunteers help create a fund of blood credits at local blood banks. The blood is available to any cancer patient at approximately one half the normal fee (due to the elimination of the recruitment expense. Blood for Cancer volunteers hope to recruit 20,000 donor pledges during the drive. Persons wishing to pledge a blood donation should contact their local volunteer unit of the American Cancer Society.

The fundraising goal of the Texas Division ACS for 1978-79 is \$6,500,000. The funds are used to support the Society's three part program of Research, Service to patients and Education. Over \$3.5 million of ACS supported research is currently in effect at 14 Texas institutions. 29,170 cancer patients were given assistance such as sick room equipment loans, transportation, blood, rehabilitation and counseling last year.

Food Drying

Successful food drying depends upon having enough heat to draw out moisture - but not enough to cook the food. There should also be enough dry air on hand to absorb the released moisture plus enough air circulation to carry the moisture off.

On Friday, April 20, from 9 to 11 a.m. the energy

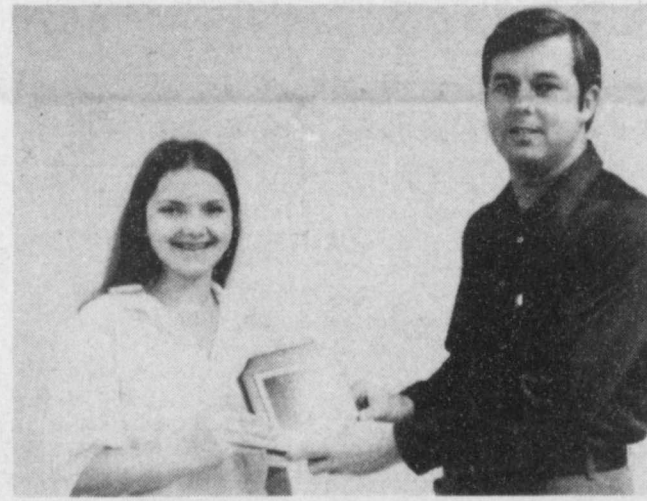
