Truck Accident Fatal

Dwight Marris, formerly of Lone Star Community, was killed on Saturday, April 21, around midnight. Marris, who was living in Clarksville, was driving a 1972 White Freightliner pulling a tank trailer of liquid fertilizer northward on Hwy. 37 about two miles from Mt. Vernon. The vehicle belonged to H&H Soil Service of Clarksville. Marris allegedly swerved to the right to avoid hitting a car that pulled out from the driveway of a Trades Day Auction Sale. He managed to

avoid hitting the car, but careened to the right, crossing a ditch and striking a large oak tree. The tree fell on the truck and partially across the highway. The vehicle was totally demolished and Marris was pronounced dead on arrival at Franklin County Hospital. Marris was thirty years old.

Highway crews were required to remove the tree from the road and off of the truck.

The vehicle which allegedly caused the ac-

cident did not stop, and at present officers have little clue to the identity of it. Anyone who might have witnessed the accident to

may have information regarding the accident is urged to contact Texas Highway Patrolman Wayne Foster in Mt. Vernon.

Rivercrest's Annette Harris will compete in three events in the State Class A track meet in Austin May 5 and 6. Harris won first place in the Regional meet in Kilgore in high jump and in the 20 yard hurdles, and won second in the triple jump.

Historical Society To Meet

The Cypress Basin Historical and Genealogical Society will meet Tuesday, April 24 at 7:00 p.m. at the Guaranty Bond Bank, 109 1st in Mt. Pleasant.

A jump of 5' was in the high jump was what it took to win the meet, and since the competition could not make the five foot mark, Harris did not try for a record. In the 80 yard hurdles, Harris finished first with a time of 11.05. Triple jump effort totaled 34.6 for the second place spot and qualified for the State Meet. Harris was

fourth in the long jump. Scotti Wood qualified for the finals in the 800 meter dash at Region, but place fifth, not high enough to qualify for the State Meet. Rivercrest's mile relay team did not qualify for the finals, but the 800 meter relay team qualified for the finals and placed third with a time of 150.2.

The Rebelette team was fourth in the Regional Meet with 46 points, led by Karnak in first place, Spring Hill in second, and Hawkins in third. Grapeland was fourth in the meet.

The events were run in the rain, according to Coach Frank Stubblefield, slowing the times of all the contestants.

DWIGHT MARRIS was killed when the White truck pulling liquid fertilizer, crossed a ditch and hit a large tree Saturday night. Marris apparently swerved to avoid hitting a car which pulled into his path. The car which apparently caused the accident has not been located by officers and did not stop at the time of the accident.

Jerry Pat Weathers and Roy Grasty both of 503 South Side, Mt. Pleasant, were injured at approximately 1:00 a.m. Saturday. Weathers apparently fell asleep while traveling north on Highway 271 and sideswiped a tractor trailer truck driven by Robert Madison of Mississippi.

Texas Highway Patrolman Frank Munsinger reported

that Weathers was in intensive care in serious condition. Grasty received cuts and bruises and was listed in fair condition. Both men were taken to the Titus County Memorial Hospital.

Madison, driver of the truck, reported that he was hauling highly explosive liquid hydrogen. Neither he or his passenger, a Mr. Dardin, were injured. The

truck was heavily damaged and the car was totaled.

Mrs. Charlene Horton of Talco, Rt. 1 was reported in fair condition Tuesday morning at Titus County Memorial Hospital after she was injured in a one vehicle accident two miles west of Talco on FM 71 at approximately 1:15 p.m. Sunday.

According to investigating officer Steve Balke Mrs. Horton received lacerations and bruises after she lost control of her west bound vehicle on the rain-slick pavement and veered off the road to the left. She went through a fence and hit a small tree. The 1972 Chevrolet received extensive damage to the front and left side.

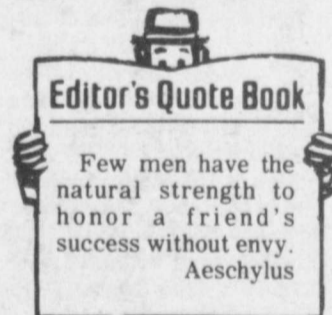

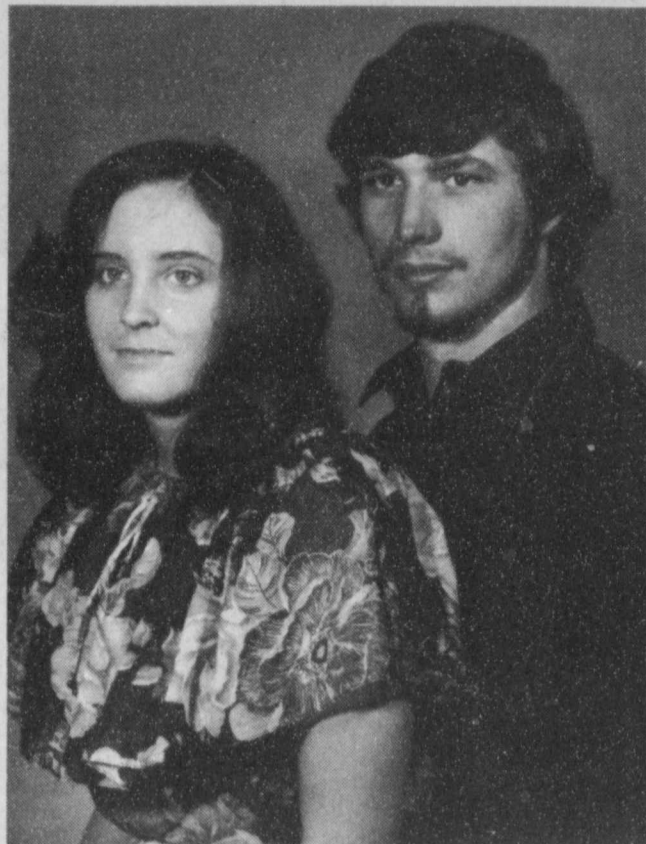

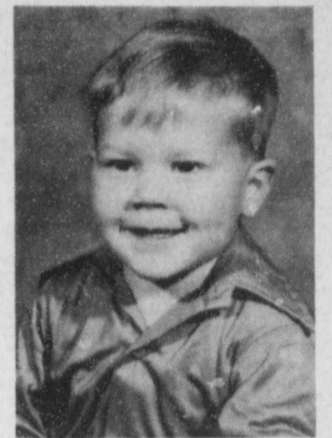

ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS

Sealed Proposals addressed to the Mayor and City Council for the City of Deport, Texas, hereinafter referred to as the Owner, will be received at the office of Walter Gifford, City Secretary until 7:30 p.m. on May 14, 1979 for the following projects:

Construction of a complete oxidation ditch type sewage treatment plant which consists of bar screen, comminutor, lift station, sludge drying beds, aeration ditch, final clarifiers, flow recorder, service building, laboratory equipment, chlorination tank, site grading, piping, pumping equipment and other related items.

Construction and improvement of a sewer interceptor line in the northern portion of town.

All bids must be made on the blank form of proposal.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or bidder's bond payable to the Owner for five percent of the total amount of the bid. As soon as the bid prices have been compared, the Owner will return the check or bond of all except the three lowest responsible bidders. When the contract is awarded, the checks or bonds of the two remaining unsuccessful bidders will be returned. The check or bond of the successful bidder will be retained until the contract and surety bond have been executed and approved, after which it will be returned.

A performance and payment bond in the amount of 100 percent of the contract price with a corporate surety approved by the Owner and Engineer, will be required for the faithful performance of the contract, and the bidder shall state in the proposal the name and address of the surety or sureties who will sign this bond in case the contract is awarded to him.

The party to whom the contract is awarded will be required forthwith to execute the contract and a performance and payment bond within ten calendar days from the date when the written notice of the award of the contract is mailed to the bidder at the address given by him. In case of failure to do so, the Owner may at his option consider that the bidder has abandoned the contract, in which case the certified check or bidder's bond accompanying the proposal shall become the property of the Owner.

The Owner reserves the right to reject any and all bids or to accept any bid. It is understood that work to be done is being financed in part with a grant from the Environmental Protection Agency EPS No. C-481194. Contractor's proposals shall hold firm for sixty days to allow the Owner to complete its financing arrangements. Mutually agreed upon extensions of time may be made, if necessary.

If the prospective contract exceeds \$10,000, the bidder must submit a "Compliance Statement" with his bid. An Equal Opportunity Clause will be a part of all construction contracts exceeding \$10,000.

If the prospective contract exceeds \$10,000 and the contractor has 100 or more employees, he will file Standard Form 100, "Employer Information Report," with the Joint Reporting Committee, P.O. Box 12, Springfield, Va., 22150, within 30 days after the contract award and annually on or before March 31 thereafter for the life of the contract.

If the prospective contract is for \$50,000 or more and the successful bidder has 50 or more employees, he will develop and place on file within 120 days of the contract award written affirmative action compliance programs using Form AD-425, "Contractor's Affirmative Action Plan for Equal Employment Opportunity," as a guideline.



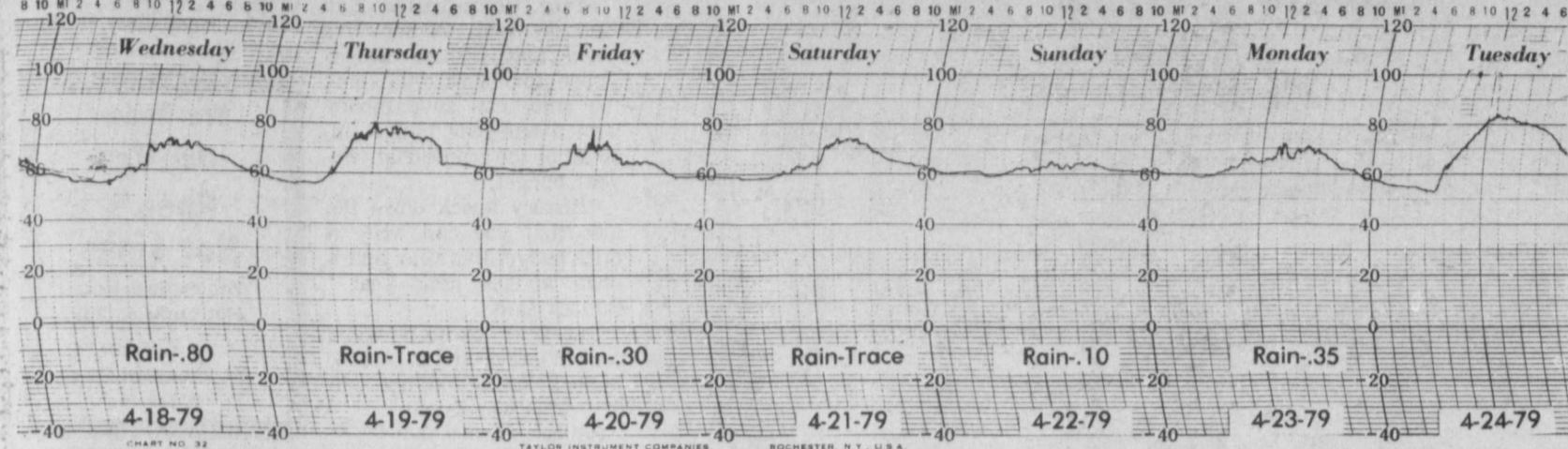
