

## Dog Saved By Ambulance Driver

A white French Poodle, "Pooch", determined to defend his home even against those who came to save it, was himself saved by

Lloyd's Ambulance Service attendant Roy Lee Hutson. "He had stopped breathing and was unconscious, but I could feel his heart beating,"

Hutson said. Hutson massaged the dog's throat to clear the passageway so he could breathe.

Neighbors who tried to get the dog out of the house when the fire started were turned away by the smoke, and "Pooch" tried desperately to keep the strange firemen away from his house. He finally retreated under the sofa where he lost consciousness, and was rescued by firemen, who turned him over to Hutson.

"Pooch" belongs to Tommy and Linda Tate, whose frame house on FM 909 approximately six miles from Bogata was extensively damaged by the fire on Monday. Tommy is employed at J. P. Harvey Motors in Clarksville and Linda is employed at Red River Hospital.

## Vocational Nursing Applications Being Taken At PJC

Applications are now being taken for the seventeenth class of the Vocational Nursing Program at Paris Junior College, announced Mrs. Royu (Sandra) Chadwick, director of the program. The next class will begin in late August, but early application is necessary, Mrs. Chadwick explained.

Those interested in applying for the 12-month program may call Mrs. Chadwick, (214) 785-7661, extension 158, or write her at Paris Junior College, Paris, Texas. Interviewing and testing of applicants is necessary before students are accepted.

The first step to admission is taking a pre-test, which is given in the Counseling Department of the new Learning Center at PJC. The next test is set for 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, June 5, and the testing fee is \$2.50. No appointment is necessary to take the test.

PJC's Vocational Nursing Program, which is open to both men and women, includes a 16-week pre-clinical

period and 34 weeks of clinical training at St. Joseph's Hospital and McCuiston Regional Medical Center. After completing the program, students will receive graduation certificates and will be eligible to take the state board examination to become licensed vocational nurses (L.V.N.).

Since the program began eight years ago, 225 students have graduated and are employed in Texas, Oklahoma and other states in hospitals, nursing homes and other health agencies. Classes begin in January and August each year.

## Energy Program To Be Held At Rivercrest

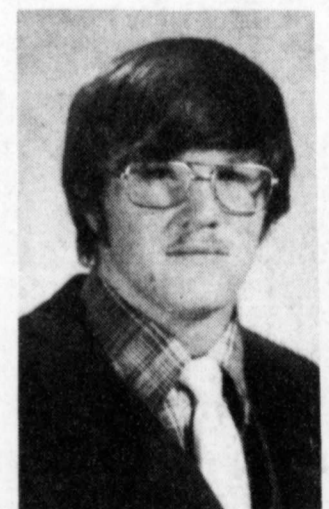

Schedules of summer classes and tuition rates may be obtained at the college. Oklahoma residents may attend Paris Junior College without paying any out-of-state tuition.

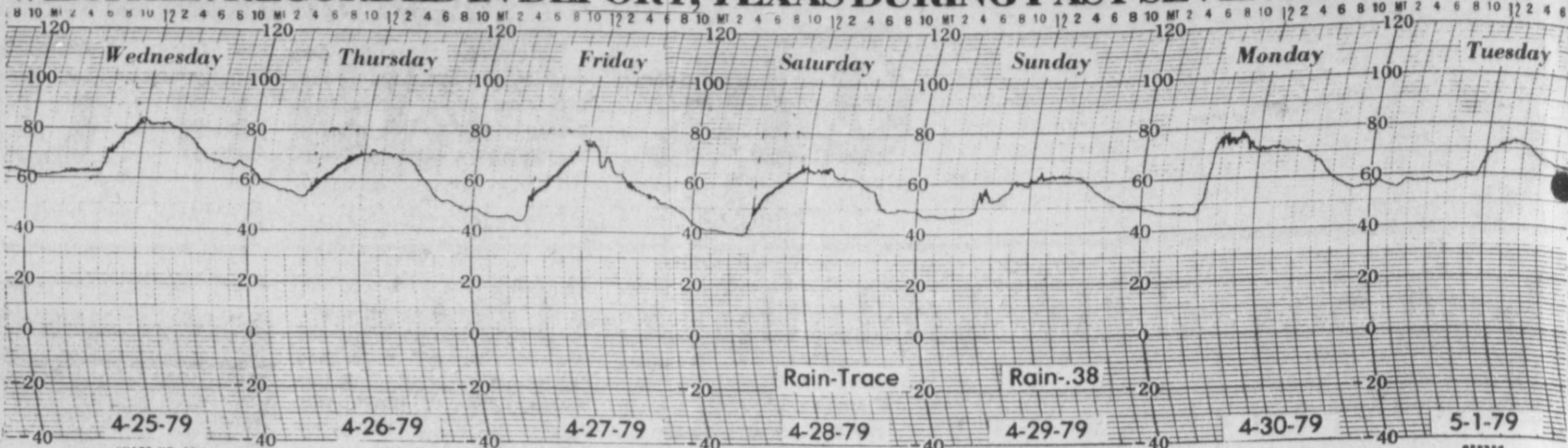
Courses in various academic and technical-vocational areas will be offered during the day and evening. Classes will begin May 29 for the first term and July 5 for the second.

**FHA Activities Updated**

"The purpose of this article," said Frank B. Stroud, County Supervisor, Farmers Home Administration, "is to bring everyone up to date on the agencies lending activities since October 1, 1978, the beginning of the fiscal year."

The principal outstanding as of April 1, 1979, is \$9,411,410.00. Assuming a 65 percent loan to deposit ratio this is equal to a bank with \$14,478,000.00 in deposits. "This assumes further significance when it is considered that this lending would not have resulted in anywhere near this volume due to our non-competition with private lending sources," said Stroud. The big thing has been the farmer lending program, in particular, the emergency loan program. From October 1, 1978, to April 1, 1979, 101 farmer program loans have been closed for \$2,890,570. Nineteen more for \$915,000.00 since April 1, 1979, have been approved and are in the process of being closed. This will bring the farmer program activities since October 1, 1978 to \$3,805,570 encompassing 120 farmer program loans.

This \$3,805,570 was used to refinance existing loans to banks, equipment companies, production credit associations, individuals, and other agricultural suppliers. "Bankers, economists, and others tell us that funds expended in an area have a multiplier effect of from 2 to 6 times," said Stroud. This means that each dollar is passed around within the community from 2 to 6 times before it leaves. Assuming a multiplier effect of only three times, this means that these agricultural funds alone will have a multiplier effect of over \$12,000,000.00. An estimated 25,370 acres of crops are being financed at this time.

"The rural housing program has not suffered any at all since October 1, 1978" said Stroud. A total of 34 housing loans for \$914,660 have been closed since then. "The same multiplier effect exists here also" said Stroud. Thirty-six more houses have been financed and eight have been repaired as of April 1, 1979.

**Tips and Reminders** Sometimes we forget the things we wanted to remember, all kinds of things. Did you know...

1. You can sterilize your own potting soil. Just place a thin layer of soil, one to two inches deep, in the oven at 200 degrees for 40 minutes.
2. Include taking pictures while your housecleaning. Do one room at a time and include everything in every room in your photographs. You will have positive proof of contents if necessary.
3. Something for the bride to know: Mashed potatoes will whip up fluffier if you heat the liquid you add to them before mixing it in.
4. If one or both ends of a can of fruit or vegetables are swollen, do not use it. This sometimes happens if the can has been stored too long.
5. Sometimes we're in the mood to cook — when this happens to you, double your recipes and have one for now and one for the freezer. It doesn't take any more time to double your recipe and is real handy for a busy day.
6. To prevent soaking of the crust in berry pies — Sprinkle bottom with flour for one thing and as a rule berry pies should be baked quickly.

**Caging Tomatoes Instead Of Staking Improves Quality**

Instead of staking and pruning tomatoes this year, use wire cages to support plants, suggests Bob Moody, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Caging rather than staking and pruning offers home gardeners in Red River County several advantages, including less sunburn of the fruit, fewer disease problems, and higher yields, all with much less work.

According to Moody, cages can be constructed from concrete reinforcing wire, hog wire or any other sturdy wire mesh that has openings of at least four to six inches and is three and one half to five feet tall. Cut and bend

the mesh material into cylinders 16 to 20 inches in diameter, fasten ends together, and snip off the bottom ring so that the cages can be pushed into the ground about six inches deep for support.

When using wire cages for growing tomatoes, space

plants about two and one half to three feet apart in the row and allow four to five feet between rows.

Moody suggests planting a vining or semi-vining type tomato variety when using cages although bush-types can also be used.

After setting tomato plants

in the garden, place a wire cage over each plant and make sure it is well anchored in the ground. The plant will grow up through the cage and the wire mesh will support it. No suckering, pruning or training will be necessary. Ripe fruit can be picked through cage openings.

Cost of cages will vary from 30 to 50 cents each, but they can be stored and used for several years. Certain other crops such as cucumbers and pole beans can also be grown using the wire cage method, adds Moody.

**Tomato Treat**

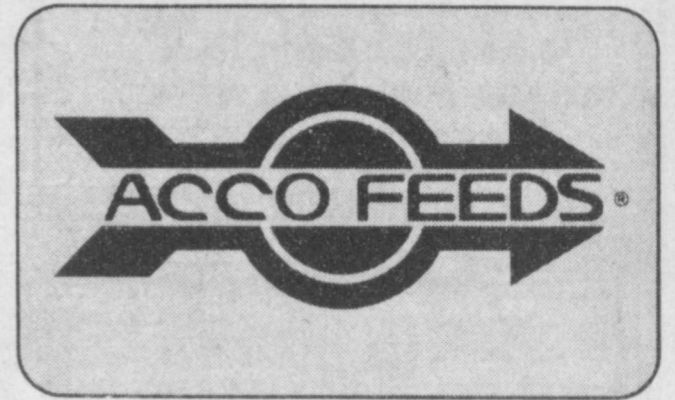

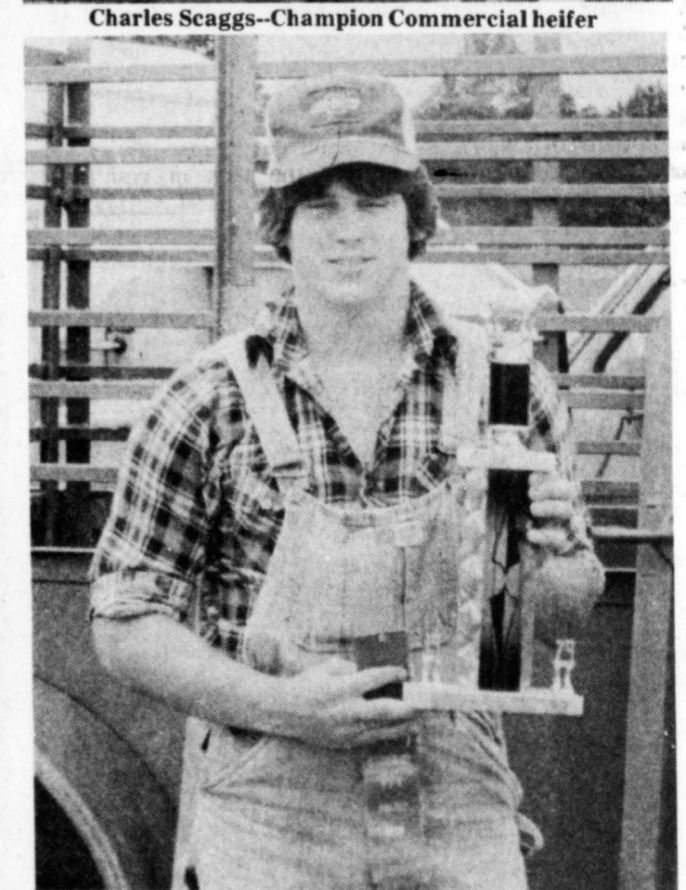

Thank you in advance for being a member of the Ambulance Service for those who will or did need the service in the future. God Bless you for your concern for your community and county.

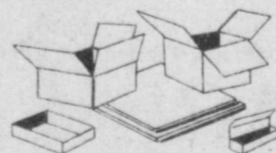

### Former Publisher Dies Following Long Illness

George W. Grant, former publisher and co-owner of The Deport Times, The Bogata News and The Talco Times died at approximately 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, May 1, 1979 at McCuiston Hospital in Paris following a long illness.

Funeral services have been set for Thursday at 2:00 p.m. at the First Methodist Church in Deport with the Rev. Sam Rice and the Rev. George Joehnk officiating. Interment will be in Highland Cemetery near Deport.

Grant was born in Kanawha on January 2, 1902, the son of Dr. Ben Grant and Mary Johnson Grant. He was married to Wilma Harbison in Bogata.

He started working for The Deport Times as a printer while still in high school and

at the age of 16, 61 years ago. Grant worked for the late Sam C. Holloway until Holloway's death in 1960, and in 1966 Grant and his son-in-law, Jerry Burns, bought the papers from Holloway's widow, Lucille. Grant and Burns sold the papers in November, 1973 to Robert W. Wright and James T. Bass, who are the current owners. Grant had been working as a Linotype operator for Swaim

Printing in Paris until his illness.

Grant is survived by his widow, Wilma, of Deport; two daughters, Mrs. Jackie Robinson of Omaha, Texas and Mrs. Jeannie Burns of

Deport; two sisters, Mrs. Marvin Nobles of Deport and Doris Nesbitt of Sparta, Tenn.; one brother, Lucian Grant of El Paso; five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.
