## Rivercrest Students Take Livestock Show Honors

Rusty Reeder, Rivercrest FFA, had the grand champion heifer at the Second Annual Junior Livestock Show on May 8 in Clarksville. Jimmy Dickey, also with the Rivercrest FFA, won the Reserve Champion bull trophy.

Debbie Mankins with the Pine Branch 4-H won the Showmanship Trophy for the third consecutive year.

Some 300 persons watched the bidding under the direction of Col. Bill Barton, with the top price going to Danny Lee for his 1,160 pound steer, the show's Grand Champion, bought by Barton Cattle Company and Red River National Bank for \$3,491.50. They also bought the winning steer last year.

The Reserve Champion, shown by Glen Berry, 1,100 pounds, was sold to Clarksville Concrete Company for \$2,222, \$2.02 per pound.

The annual affair jumped off to an early start on Monday night at the South Lake as the exhibitors treated prospective buyers to a steak supper with about 65 attending.

At 9 a.m. Tuesday morning at the Fairgrounds Livestock Arena both the steers and exhibitors for the breeding beef show began moving in.

All exhibitors participated in a judging contest at 10 a.m. with each giving their opinion on four classes of cattle. Winners in this event were: first, Doug Whitten;

second, Greg Pruitt; and third, Kathy Ray. They received a plaque each.

The breeding beef show, with some 60 entries in two classes, bulls and heifers,

began. Judging the show was Max Ballard, the FFA sponsor-teacher at

Prairiland. Reserve Champion was taken by Treva Lee, Dimple

4-H; Grand Champion Bull was captured by Danny Lee, also Dimple 4-H.

Steer judging began at 2:30 p.m. Exhibitors were County FFA or 4-H members who put their steers on feed no later than Dec. 1. Each youth was responsible for raising, grooming, and financing the steer's care until the sale time.

### Size Standards Effective July 15

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Postmaster McGonagill reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Talco postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster McGonagill said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be

selling undersized pieces. "Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," McGonagill said.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail McGonagill said. For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less,

### Liquor Store Opens In Annona

Liquor, beer and wine were sold legally for the first time in Red River County since 1902 last Wednesday, May 9, when the Ponderosa Liquor Store opened in Annona.

Located on Highway 82, the store is owned by Bobby Brem and Barry Peek.

Beer sales started before noon with liquor sales following late in the afternoon, according to Peek. The Ponderosa interests will operate two stores side by side, a beer and wine-only store open early and late each day and holidays, and a full package store open from 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. week days.

Trouble may still lie ahead for the Ponderosa owners, however, as a District Judge must rule on the legality of the April 7 option approval vote in a hearing set for May

22. In the meantime, Red River County residents may purchase alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption legally for the first time in 77 years.

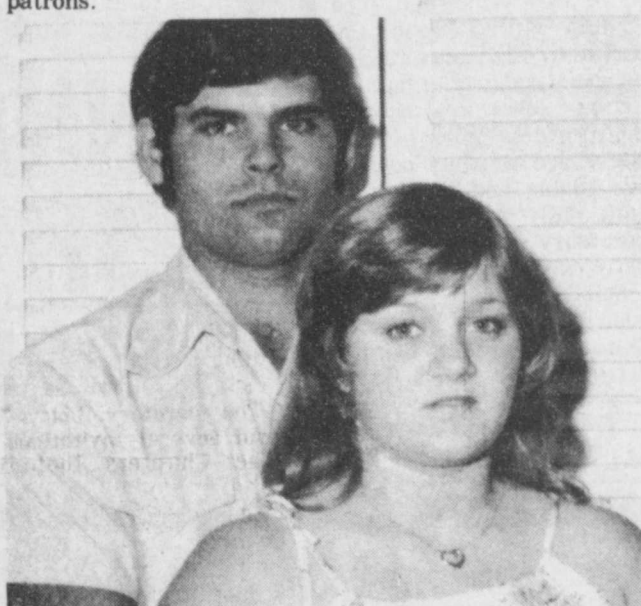

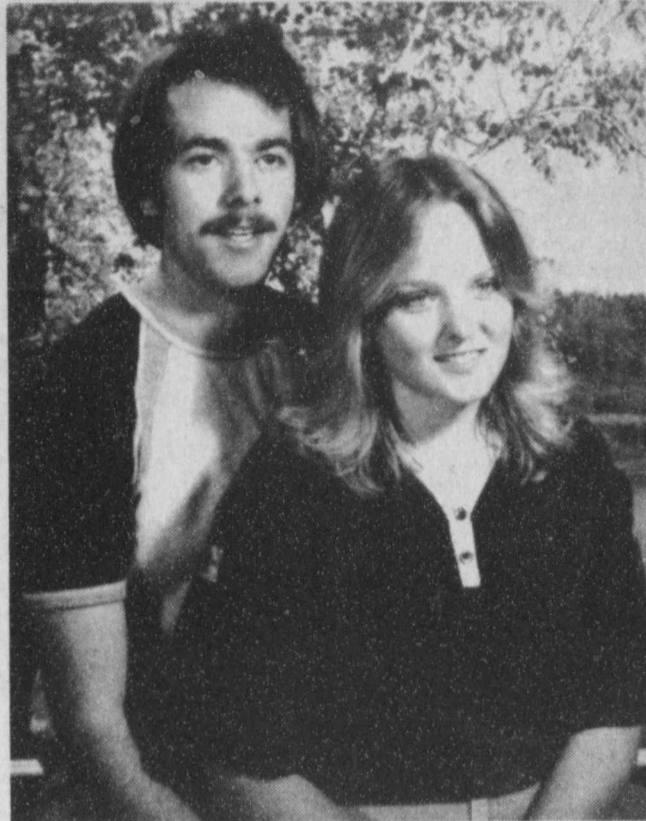
