a project agreement with the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. The agreement covers erosion control work in the Line Branch watershed that will be cost-shared by the Resource Conservation and Development program. Brumley plans to start

construction in June. The Soil Conservation Service helped Brumley with a conservation plan that includes a dam with drop pipe, shaping some gullied areas and vegetating the dam and shaped areas. This plan is the basis for his agreement with the local district. As the items in the plan are completed the district will share the expenses at 80 percent with RC&D funds. The estimated total cost of this project is

\$17,485.00. The dam is planned to impound nine surface acres of water that will submerge two active gullies. Other gullies with small watersheds will be shaped and

sodded. Wildlife plantings can be used on this type of work. Brumley plans to use pecan trees around the dam and water area
