The graduates left the auditorium to the strains of "Grand March from Aida." Walter Rich was the accompanist for the graduating exercises.

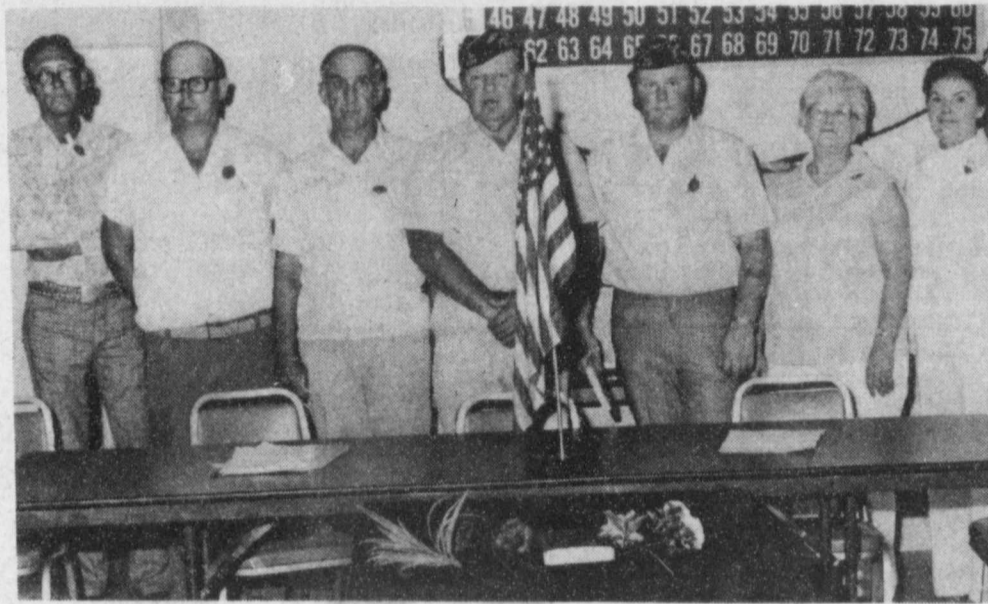
State Posts

Record Deposit

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday reported that the state posted a record multi-million dollar daily deposit as of the close of business last Friday.

Bullock said the Comptroller's Revenue Processing Division deposited \$111,103,248.85 in tax receipts in the state treasury on May 18.

That's about \$10 million more than the state's previous largest daily deposit which occurred August 18, 1978.

Rains during the past week have hampered hay harvesting operations over most of East Texas. However, the rain was light in most areas and the unbaled hay should dry within a short time with sunshine and adequate air movement.

area economist-management, has another alternative for those producers wishing to expand their cow herd. Taylor says the producer can buy twice as many cows as he plans to keep. Buy both good and choice pairs thereby reducing the average investment per pair.

Sell all the calves and one-half of the cows the first year. Keep the best cows for expansion. With a little luck, the cows kept could be paid out after the second year and can realistically be paid for in three years.

In order for this alternative to work, Taylor says that plans must begin now. The producer will need to harvest twice as much hay and may need to plan for twice as much pasture. More total operating capital will also be required under this expansion plan.

With proper planning starting now, this could be one of the cheaper and quickest ways to expand the cow herd. However, Taylor says don't delay or think about this possibility for a year or two. The time a producer gets started is important.

If and how a producer expands his herd depends primarily on the individual situation of the producer.

Bogata Rodeo Queen Contest Beginning

Plans are in the making for one of the biggest rodeos ever to be staged in Bogata, according to Bill Buckman, chairman of the Bogata Rodeo Association Queen Committee. The rodeo is set for June 28, 29 and 30. A big feature of the rodeo again this year will be the selection of a Rodeo Queen. In the Rodeo Queen Contest, the entrant must be between the ages of 14 and 19 (inclusive) as of the date of the contest.

Entrants must not be married or ever have been married. Entrants must live within a 25 mile radius of Bogata, Texas. Entrants will be expected to ride in the Grand Entry each night of the rodeo and in both the Rodeo and the Frontier Day parades. Entrants will be expected to wear western attire at the above mentioned events. Entrants will be asked (but not required) to submit a snapshot for contest publicity.

Judges will be from well outside the 25 mile radius such that no girl should have any unfair advantage. Judging will be based on the following categories: horsemanship, 33 and one-third points; appearance, 33 and one-third points; personality, 33 and one-third points. Candidates will be required to waive all liability.

Horsemanship pattern to be used is reining pattern number one of the American Quarter Horse Association. This year's Bogata Rodeo Queen, Shirley Mowery, will present the trophy to the 1980 Queen. Those wanting to enter the competition are asked to complete the entry form in this week's paper and mail to Bill Buckman, Bogata Rodeo Association.

Kenneth Brumley Signs Project Agreement

Kenneth Brumley, a dairy farmer in the Rosalie Community, recently signed

a project agreement with the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. The agreement covers erosion control work in the Line Branch watershed that will be cost-shared by the Resource Conservation and Development program. Brumley plans to start construction in June. The Soil Conservation Service helped Brumley with a conservation plan that includes a dam with drop pipe, shaping some gullied areas and vegetating the dam and shaped areas. This plan is the basis for his agreement with the local district. As the items in the plan are completed the district will share the expenses at 80 percent with RC&D funds. The estimated total cost of this project is \$17,485.00.

The dam is planned to impound nine surface acres of water that will submerge two active gullies. Other gullies with small watersheds will be shaped and sodded. Wildlife plantings can be used on this type of work. Brumley plans to use pecan trees around the dam and water area. The Line Branch watershed is the only area in Red River County that is approved for erosion control work through the RC&D program. Other areas may be approved if Congress expands the program. Landowners in the Line Branch area that want to carry out erosion control work are urged to contact the Soil Conservation Service for technical and financial assistance.

Crusaders Exceed County Goal

During the annual meeting of the Red River County unit of the American Cancer Society held Tuesday, May 15, it was announced that the highest amount ever had been attained by the Cancer Crusaders this year. The figure presently stands at \$11,849.41, and there are still some unfinished areas. This amount exceeds the county goal by \$3,049.41 and last year's total by \$681.41.

Chairmen for the crusade are Tom and Wilma Wren and Imogene Wooley.

Annual reports were given by Delia Allen, public education chairman, who reported 6577 pieces of literature distributed throughout the year and 125 program and film presentations made; by Claire Jessee, public information chairman, who thanked the news media for their help during the crusade; by Audrey Black, memorial chairman, who reported \$1,644.50 given throughout the year in memorials; and by Jennell Kocurek, service and rehabilitation chairman, who reported on the successful screening clinic which was held last year and the increasing number of cancer patients being served by the county.

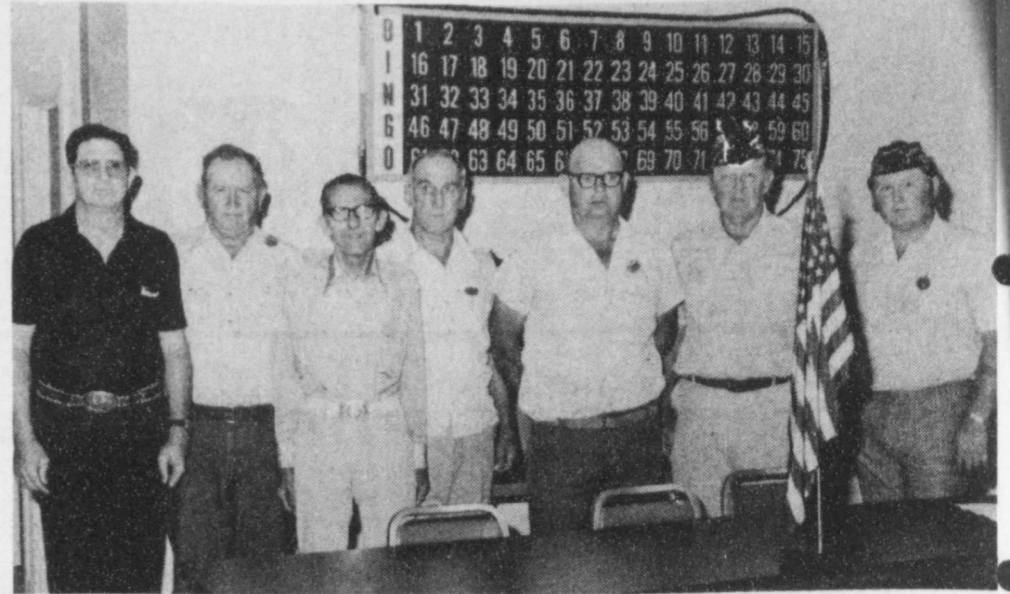

Gardening Made Easy

The extra moisture has caused fungus problems on many plants and roses have been no exception. Mildew (a powdery grey-white dust on new growth) and Blackspot (round black spots on bottom leaves that yellow and fall quickly) are much more prevalent than normal, but a weekly spraying with Benomyl (Benlate is another brand name for the same thing) will cure these pests. Mildew usually goes away on its own when hot weather hits. Blackspot will kill bushes if not taken care of by making all the leaves to fall. With few to no leaves the plant can not bloom (it takes 40 to 50 leaves to make enough food to produce one bloom) and the plant slowly dies. There is no Blackspot in California rose fields, but plenty in Tyler. This is the reason we try to carry only California grown bushes - they are clean to start with and if you don't have Blackspot in your bushes, they aren't likely to contract it. Trim off all old blooms back several leaves and any tall shoots when they finish bloom. Feed once a month with Rose Food or Fertilome with Iron (one-third cup per plant) and you should get heavy bloom all summer. Every new shoot should have a bloom so the better you care for them, the more you will have to enjoy.

spring bulbs are now yellowing. These late started plants will go clear through fall with a blaze of color. Caladiums planted as bulbs will be the finest of the year in shade spots. Work in lots of peat moss and water well - in a matter of days lush leaves will add color to brighten the darkest spot.

Enrollment

East Texas State University has made a change in its Early Enrollment Conference schedule for the summer of 1979 due to the gasoline shortage, according to Phil Ebsenberger, director of testing, orientation and school relations.

Session No. 2 of the conferences, originally scheduled for June 29 through July 1, has been changed to June 29-30 (Friday and Saturday), Ebsenberger said. "We made this change primarily because of the energy crisis and the fact that not many service stations are open on Sunday. We have reduced the price for this session to \$15 per student and \$10 per parent".

The deadline for application to the June 29-30 session is June 15.

The conferences provide new freshmen an opportunity to meet future classmates, become familiar with the campus, receive academic advisement and register in advance for the fall semester.

These last two will spread like crazy in partial to full shade, grow in most any type soil and need only a minimum amount of food and water to look great until hard freezes in late November and often December. We still have time to plant seeds of many annuals to fill in gaps where pansies and other early plants will play out in June and July. This week I'll start more Zinnia, Marigold, Moss Rose, Periwinkle, Cosmos, Lantana, Salvia and others to fill in the beds where the

Highway Rehabilitation Set For Titus County

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved a \$238 million program of highway rehabilitation and improvement in every part of the state.

The program includes rehabilitation work, safety improvements, and general betterment of US and State Highways and Farm to Market Roads.

A total of 845 projects in 203 counties are involved

with more than 72 percent of the work scheduled for US- and State-numbered highways.

Altogether, the program will result in improvements on 5,253.5 miles of the 71,000-mile state maintained highway network.

L. L. Jester, Jr., District Engineer for District 19 located in the northeast part of the state, said projects included in the program for this area totaled \$8,100,000

and should be completed by the end of 1980. The projects for District 19 in Titus County are SH 49 from US 271, East 0.7 mile, reconstructed base and resurfacing; US 271 from FM 127, South to Loop 419, 0.9 mile, resurfacing.

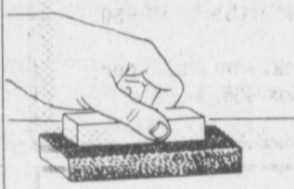

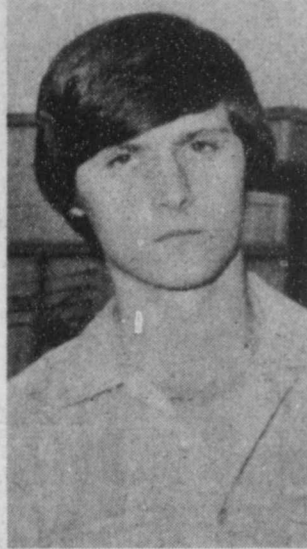
