On Sunday, June 3, Chief Deputy Carl Wolfe arrested James Richard Finley and Lynn Ray Lamon, both 17 years old, with calves in a pickup and charged them with cattle theft. A big feature of the rodeo again this year will be the selection of a Rodeo Queen.

Estimated Tax Installment Due

The second installment of estimated federal tax payments on 1979 income is due June 15, 1979, the Internal Revenue Service said.

This installment should be paid using declaration-voucher number two found in the Form 1040-ES package.

Taxpayers whose anticipated income changed during 1979 may have to file an amended declaration. Space is provided in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate, the IRS said.

For more detailed information, IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," is available free from local IRS offices. Supplies of the Form 1040-ES package also can be obtained at these locations.

In the Rodeo Queen Contest, the entrant must be between the ages of 14 and 19 (inclusive) as of the date of the contest.

Entrants must not be married or ever have been married.

Entrants must live within a 25 mile radius of Bogata, Texas.

Entrants will be expected to ride in the Grand Entry each night of the rodeo and in both the Rodeo and the Frontier Day parades.

Entrants will be expected to wear western attire at the above mentioned events.

Entrants will be asked (but not required) to submit a snapshot for contest publicity.

Judges will be from well outside the 25 mile radius such that no girl should have any unfair advantage.

Judging will be based on the following categories: horsemanship, 33 and one-third points; appearance, 33 and one-third points; personality, 33 and one-third points.

Candidates will be required to waive all liability.

Horseman's pattern to be used is reining pattern number one of the American Quarter Horse Association.

This year's Bogata Rodeo Queen, Shirley Mowery, will present the trophy to the 1980 Queen. Those wanting to enter the competition are asked to complete the entry form in this week's paper and mail to Bill Buckman, Bogata Rodeo Association.

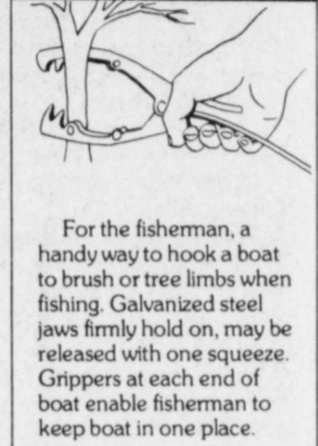
Jones Completes Navy's Basic Course

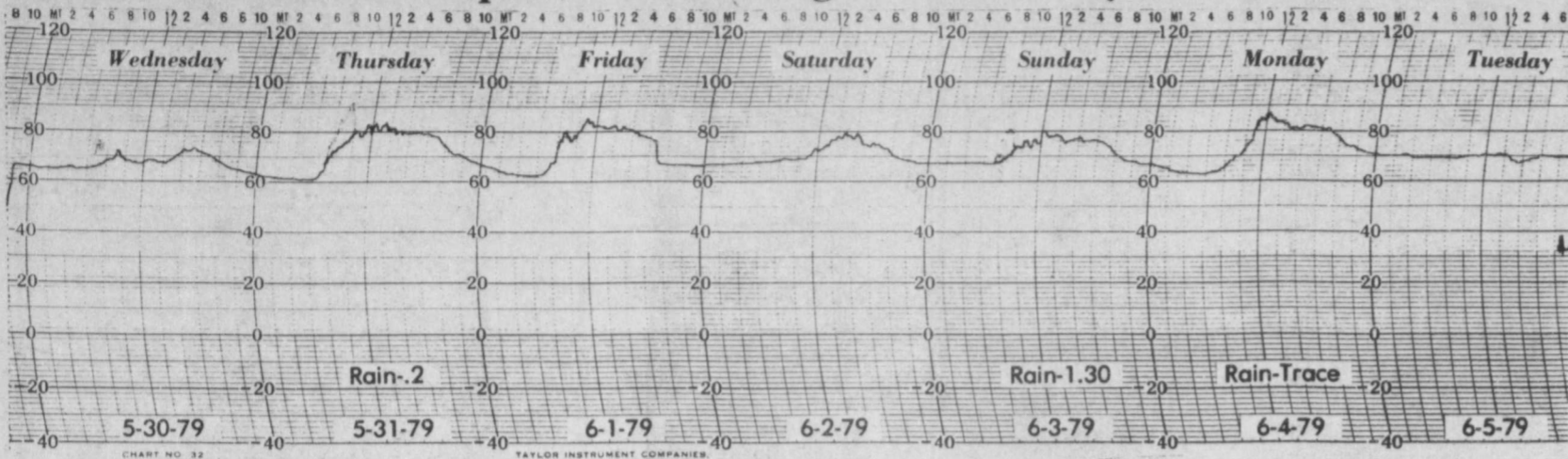

Insects Active - Preserving Field Day Scheduled

By Herb Brevard

Rains across East Texas have been welcomed by home gardeners and producers who have completed their first hay baling. However, the wet weather has hampered application of insecticides on many crops.

Dr. James Robinson, Extension area entomologist, advises pecan producers that it is getting late in most areas to spray for the pecan nut casebearer. This insect must be controlled before it enters the small nutlets. Penetration has occurred in most areas. If producers have not treated and the insect has penetrated the nut, control measures will not be as effective but will do some good.

Pine tip moth larva are active in pine and Christmas tree plantations, as well as in the home landscape. These destructive insects can be controlled before they enter the tips of the trees. Insecticide recommendations are available from local county Extension agents throughout East Texas.

Robinson also indicates that numerous insect specimens are being received for identification. One of the most frequent is the assassin bug. This insect is about three-eighths of an inch long, has a slender red and black body, legs longer than the body and a proboscis or beak. The assassin bug is a predator and feeds on other insects. Therefore, it does more good than harm in the garden and on landscape plants.

Fruit and vegetable research will be featured as well as demonstrations on home canning and freezing. Registration is from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. and the public is invited.

Texas Counties To Share Funds

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said Texas counties will share more than \$365,407 in state funds under a law designed to encourage voter registration and accurate registration lists.

Bullock said the Texas Election Code directs the Comptroller's Ad Valorem Division to make payments to counties for reimbursement of voter registration activities.

The law provides local reimbursement of 40 cents for each new registered voter and 40 cents for each cancellation made to update lists.

Candlelighters were Becky Brooks of Bogata and Kelly Jeffery, brother of the bride.

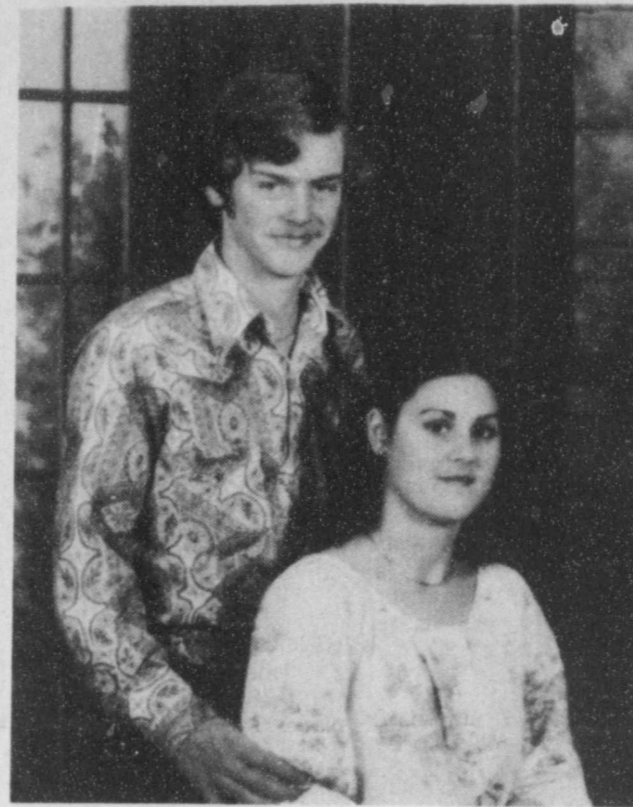

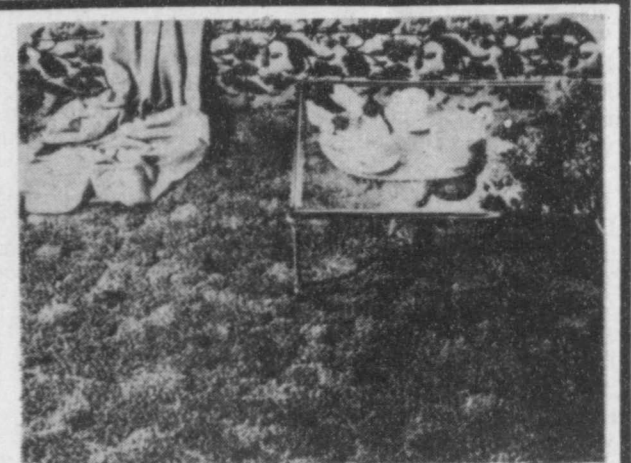

Included in the course were studies of the aging process, historical development of the nursing home, long-term care, working with individuals, needs and resource

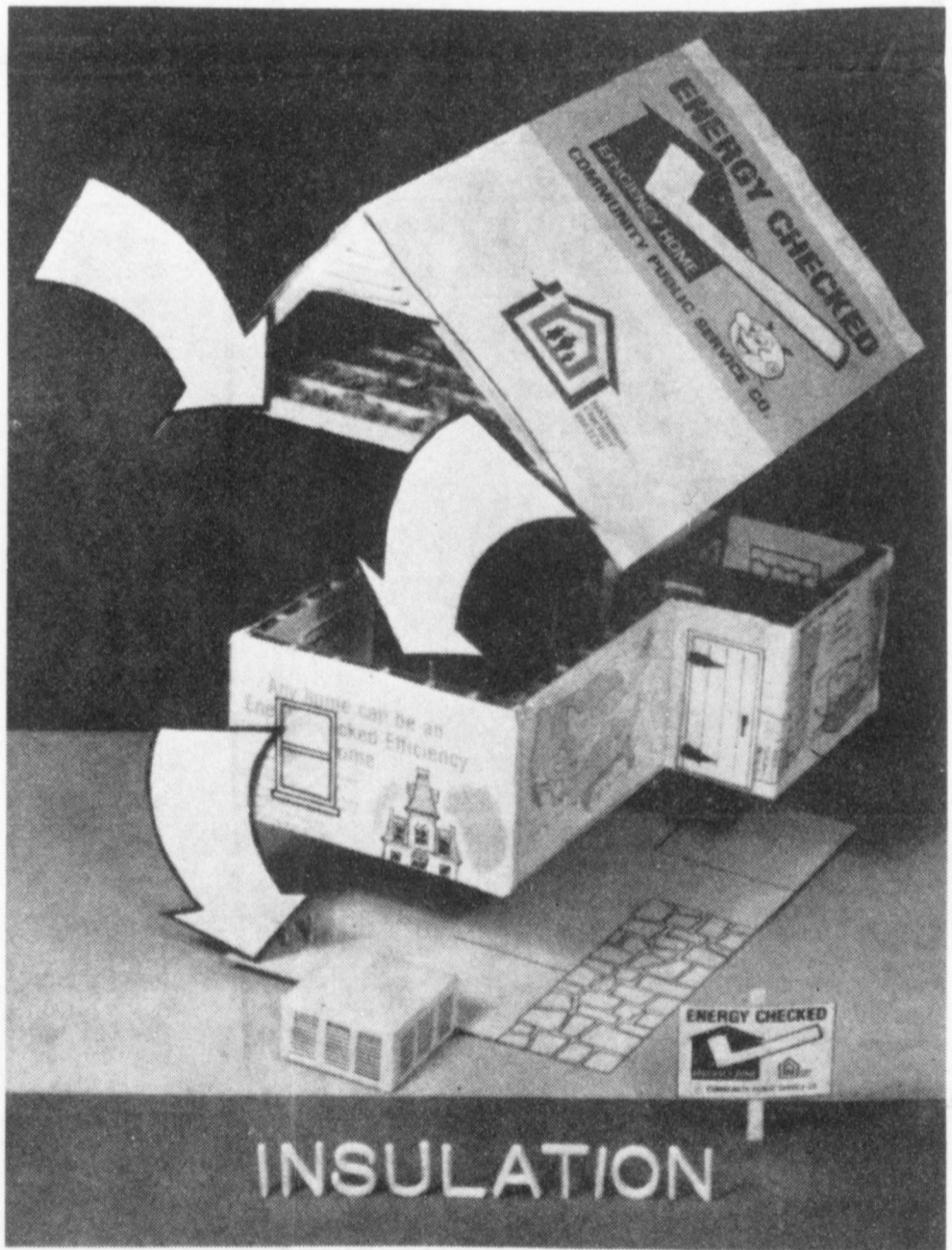
assessment, a activity program planning, skills for working with groups and programming activities. Paris Junior College has been sponsoring courses to certify nursing home activity directors since 1975.
