Robinson also indicates numerous insect specimen are being received for identification. One of the most frequent is the assassin bug. This insect is about three-eighths of an inch long, has a slender red and black body, legs longer than the body and a proboscis or beak. The assassin bug is a predator and feeds on other insects. Therefore, it does more good than harm in the garden and on landscape
