A petition asking that the Red River County Commissioner's Court call a local

option election for the sale of alcoholic beverages for the City of Bogata was filed

Monday with County Clerk Mary Hausler.

Mrs. Hausler said Tuesday that 92 signatures were on the petition, but that the

Eleven soil and water conservation districts are members of the Northeast Texas Association of SWCDs. They include:

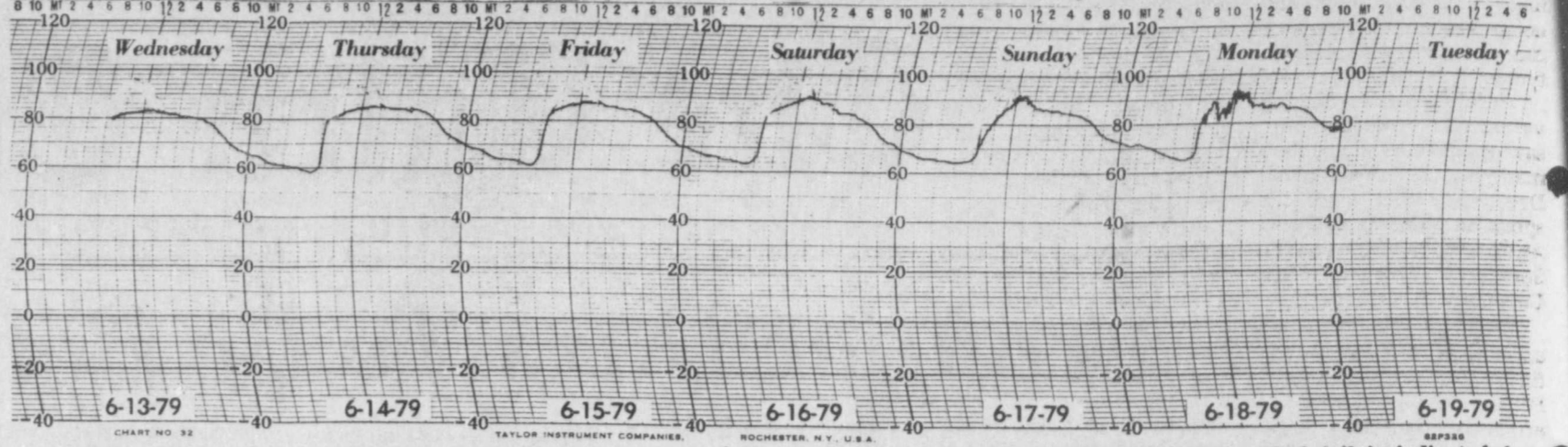

Auto Service Tips

Do-it-yourselfers should know that checking the transmission fluid in an automobile is a bit more complicated than checking the oil. Never check transmission fluid when the engine is cold; the car should run at least ten minutes or the reading will not be accurate. Park on level ground. With engine still running, set emergency brake and place foot firmly on brake pedal, then run shift lever through each of the gears. Shift to park position, and with engine running, check the dipstick. If fluid level is low, add transmission fluid slowly. Do not overfill — too much pressure in the system could destroy the seals.

SAC Bombers To Fly Training Route In Texas

Strategic Air Command (SAC) bombers will begin flying a new low level training route in Texas during June 1979 in preparation for use of the

route during GLOBAL SHIELD 79, the SAC-wide exercise to be conducted later this year. The unarmed eight-engine B-52 Stratofortresses and swing-wing FB-111 fighter-bombers will fly the training route at subsonic speeds along a center line of an eight mile wide corridor at altitudes ranging from 400 to 2,000 feet above the ground. The route will be used to measure precision bombing, navigation training and electronic countermeasure activity.

During exercise GLOBAL SHIELD 79, which will test SAC units on an unannounced basis, approximately 100 of the SAC bombers will fly the training route during a three-day period. During peak periods, single aircraft may pass along the route every 12 minutes.

Aircraft do not carry bombs on these training flights. All bombing is simulated and radar scored by a ground based scoring site. Radar bomb scoring (RBS) equipment will be located near Vernon, Texas. The site, using radio and radar signals, measures the accuracy of electronic signals simulating bomb releases and simulated launching of short range attack missiles (SRAMS).

Although the aircraft flying this low-level route will be associated with the SAC exercise GLOBAL SHIELD 79, SAC regularly conducts low-level bombing and navigation training to assure bomber crews are kept combat ready at all times. The reason for the large number of bombers flying the route during the relatively short period of time during the exercise is best stated by General Richard H. Ellis, commander in chief, Strategic Air Command, "The overriding purpose of the exercise is to test SAC's readiness and capability to support the war plans that would be implemented by national leaders in response to an attack on the United States."

Environmental studies are made and populated areas are avoided as much as possible and all routes are coordinated with the Federal

Aviation Administration (FAA). After the start of the exercise and before the intensified period of flying begins, news media in the areas affected by the flying will again be reminded of the activity. SAC plans to cease using the low level route after completion of the exercise.

Aircrews flying the training route, designated Military Training Route IR-173, will begin descending from high altitude near Ft. Stockton, Texas. They will begin the low level route north of Rankin and proceed in an easterly direction. At a point southwest of Sterling City, Texas, the aircraft will turn east on a route which takes the aircraft north of Robert Lee and Bronte, between Winters and Ballinger, Coleman and Brownwood. At a point north of Mullin, the aircraft will turn to the east-northeast flying north to Hamilton. At a point east-southeast of Cleburne and Alvarado, the

aircraft will fly an arc to the south of Waxahachie and Ennis. At a point between Ennis and north of Corsicana the aircraft will turn northeast to begin the electronic bomb run on the RBS site near Mount Vernon, Texas, by flying east of Wills Point and southwest of Sulphur Springs. At a point north of Mount Vernon the aircraft will turn to the southeast to start to climb to high altitude and exit the route near Atlanta, Texas.

Although this is a FAA established route, pilots of private aircraft are reminded that during the period of the exercise, high speed, camouflaged jet aircraft may be operating at any time, day or night and during Instrument Flight Rules (IFR) and Visual Flight Rules (VFR) conditions. Pilots operating in the vicinity of the low level route are requested to operate rotating beacons and/or strobe lights in order to aid in their detection by other aircraft.

East Texas Eating

Blackberry Cobbler or Deep-dish Blackberry Pie might well win in a vote of favorite East Texas desserts. Our family favorite is a marvelous combination of sweetened fresh blackberries and gentle flavorings encased in tender, flaky crust and baked until their silky red juice bubbles through the lattice top.

The blackberries, sugar, and butter yield a rich juice that I like to thicken with cornstarch. It seems to me that cornstarch produces a clearer fruit flavor and color than does flour and it holds up better in the presence of the berries' acidity.

Deep-dish Fresh, Blackberry Pie Filling: 2 to 2 and two thirds cups sugar 3 to 4 Tbsp. cornstarch 1 tsp cinnamon 2 quarts fresh blackberries Mix sugar, cornstarch, and cinnamon. Gently mix berries with the sugar mixture. Pour into pastry lined 9 inch square pan or a 2-quart casserole dish. Top with pastry strips laid or woven into a lattice.

Bake at 425 degrees oven until light golden brown (40 to 50 minutes).

Pastry Pastry for Crust: 3 cups flour 1 cup shortening, chilled 1 one-half tsp salt Approximately 6 Tbsp. ice water

Sift flour and salt. Cut shortening into the flour until about half of the shortening particles are the size of peas and the remainder are smaller. The larger particles help insure flakiness and the smaller ones, tenderness. Sprinkle the ice water into the flour-shortening mixture. Use just enough water to hold the flour-shortening particles together in a ball of dough. Chill the dough (covered) for several hours or overnight—if there is time. The quality of the pastry improved because the chilling allows the gluten in the flour to relax and thus it is more tender.

Divide the pastry into two balls. Roll one out to a 1/4 inch thickness. Line the pan with it. Roll the other half of the dough out and cut into 1 inch strips. Lay or weave the strips across the berry mixture in the bottom crust, into a lattice.

Serve Deep-dish Fresh Blackberry Pie warm. If you like, top with cream or ice cream.

Pecan Trees Provide Timber

While pecan trees are highly valued for shade and nut production in Texas, they can also produce valuable timber.

"Pecan trees are highly valuable for veneer and sawlogs in areas where such markets exist," says Alan D. Dreesen, area forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Pecan wood frequently appears as a veneer in the finest furniture stores. Pecan is also used to make attractive paneling, furniture and other objects around the home," points out the specialist.

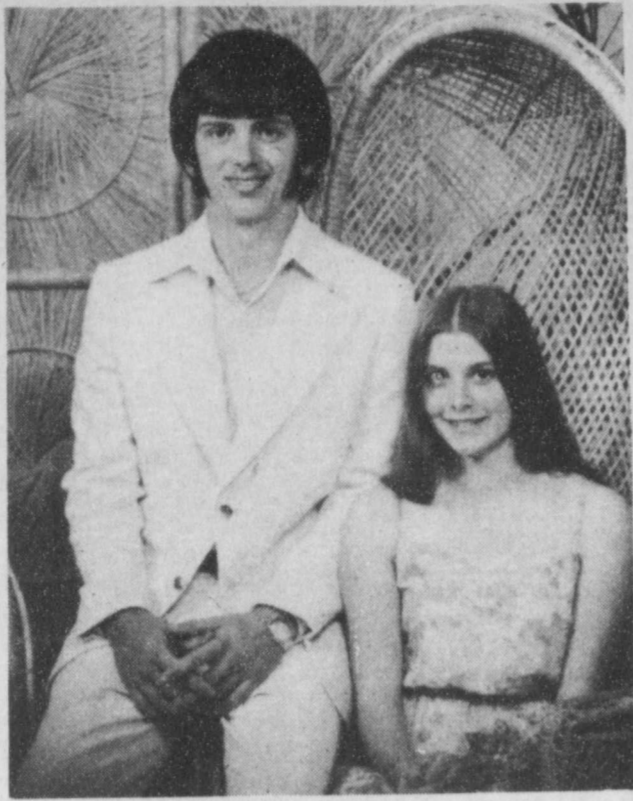
Another important pecan wood product is firewood. The popularity of wood-burning fireplaces and stoves is growing at a phenomenal rate, and pecan is one of the most available species that produces a high heat output, says Dreesen.

In parts of Texas where pecans grow wild, lan-

downers are being approached by hardwood timber buyers. These timber brokers buy the wood and sell it to a mill. "Most buyers are honest businessmen actively seeking a raw material supply," notes the forestry specialist.

"However, there are some who try to take advantage of the landowners by offering to 'thin out their trees'. Therefore, landowners should be cautious when dealing with brokers."

Of course, a landowner with pecan trees needs to consider thinning his trees for several reasons, says Dreesen. If he anticipates growing a crop of pecans, trees need thinning for improved production. Also, harvesting pecan trees for timber can produce additional income. A third reason for thinning is to improve the aesthetic value of the property. Thinning can open spaces in the native pecan forest.

Topsoil Loss Is Extremely Costly

Over 25 tons of topsoil per acre can be lost each year on cropland with no erosion control practices. This has caused an enormous problem in Red River County. It costs not only the landowners, but every one. The amounts of soil loss are determined by the universal soil loss equation.

"Over 40 thousand acres of cropland are being farmed with no regards to erosion control," according to Charles VanDeaver, District Conservationist. Many dollars have been lost this spring from heavy rains washing fertile topsoil from fields.

In some cases the lack of maintenance on conservation practices has caused a high soil loss. A broken terrace can be rebuilt with little time and expense. A well maintained terrace system will benefit the farmer as it protects the soil.

Grassed waterways can be shaped on cropland replacing gullies or eroded areas. After waterways have been sprigged to grass a properly engineered parallel terrace system can be installed.

Terraces are used to break the slopes into short segments and divert water to a stable outlet. This is where waterways play an important role. Waterways, that are covered with grass are considered stable outlets. They are used as a means of carrying excess water from fields to prevent erosion. A well planned

terrace system is worthless without a grassed waterway.

One to two tons of soil can be saved each year if crop residues are managed right. After each harvest leave all stubble, whether it be soybeans, milo, wheat, etc. near the surface of the soil. During winter months when no growth occurs the stubble or straw helps hold the soil in place.

If excessive soil loss is occurring on your farm, Soil Conservation Service personnel can help plan practices that are most beneficial. Our office is the Post Office in Clarksville.

Some 500 4-H members will explore current sources of energy and management methods as well as look at energy possibilities for the future at the 1979 Texas 4-H Congress.

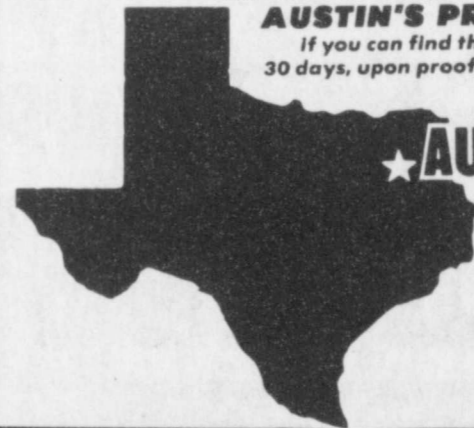

Red River Bond Sales Reach 23% Of Yearly Goal

Study On Nutrition Program Announced

The U. S. Department of Agriculture will award \$2,750,000 this fiscal year for studies and demonstration projects to evaluate and improve the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC), Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman announced today.

"A portion of the funds are available immediately to fund grants for a variety of studies and pilot projects," Foreman said. "We are particularly interested in studies with national or regional significance. We're also interested in pilot projects to improve delivery of program benefits--especially to Indians, migrants and rural residents."

"Projects which experiment with new approaches to encourage breastfeeding are of special interest," she said. The department also is interested in projects designed to test methods of using commodities which may be purchased by the federal government for the WIC program, she said.

The WIC program provides nutrition education and nutritious supplemental foods to pregnant, breastfeeding or post-partum women, and to infants and children up to age five, based on low income and nutritional need. Public Law 95-627, enacted last November, authorizes the secretary of agriculture to spend one-half of one percent

of WIC program funds, not to exceed \$3 million, each fiscal year for studies and demonstration projects designed to improve the program.

State and local health agencies, non-profit organizations, universities, or individuals may request application forms to apply for these grants from: Contracting Officer, Administrative Services Division, FNS, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250. Applications will be accepted until July 23. No projects can last longer than 18 months.

"The remaining funds available for fiscal year 1979 will be used for a large-scale evaluation of the WIC program," Foreman said. The study, to be performed under contract, will determine the impact of the program on the health and nutritional status of participating women, infants and children.

The study will also evaluate the cumulative effects of the WIC program on those participants and examine characteristics of the program delivery system that potentially affect impact. A request for proposals for this contract will be announced in the near future.

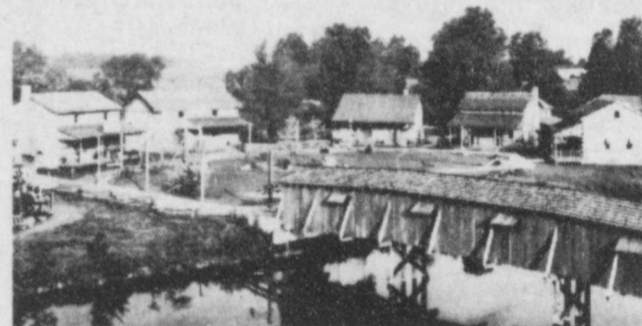

Summer Rose Care Suggestions

A little work this spring and summer will insure attractive and abundant roses this fall.

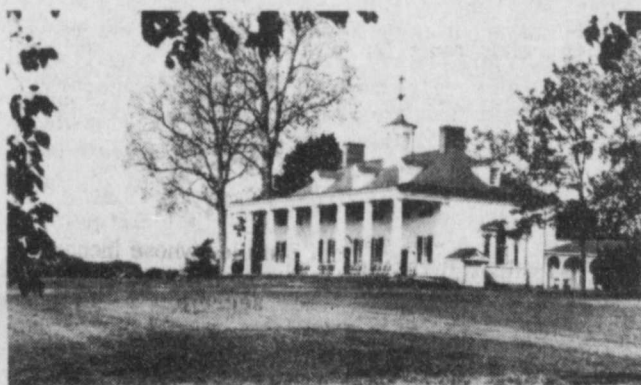
That suggestion comes from Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Remove spent flowers so that the plant's food and energy will go into flower production instead of seed production, advises Janne. Cut old flowers just above the second five-leaflet leaf above the main branch—the same as cutting flowers for arrangements. Higher cuts result in blind shoots or deformed flowers.

Another recommended practice is to apply a complete fertilizer every four to six weeks for optimum rose growth. However, don't fertilize after mid-August so the plants will mature and be less susceptible to winter injury, warns Janne.

In alkaline soils, iron deficiency can be a problem. If this condition develops, obtain a copy of the leaflet,

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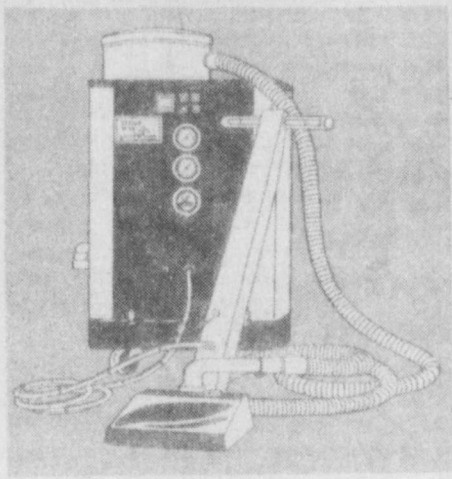

Fisheries Specialist Advises Pond Owners

By Herb Brevard

According to Dr. Joe Lock, area fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, it is getting a little late for controlling heavy infestations of aquatic weeds in farm ponds. We are approaching the time of year when hot temperatures could affect the oxygen content of the water. Decaying plants in the pond will only add to the problem.

Dr. Lock says that catfish will definitely spawn in small farm ponds. Survival of the fry (newly hatched fish) depends to a great extent on the population of bass and sunfish in the pond. Bass and sunfish eat the young fry and thus the mortality rate is high. Spawning can be improved by placing several 15-gallon cans in the pond for the catfish to lay eggs in and protect the eggs during incubation and hatching.

Commercial fish farmers are now hatching catfish fry for next year's fingerlings. Lock says that the nutrition

of the brood fish is important to the vigor of the eggs and the fry. Currently, the prospects for next year's fingerling supply looks good. Nearly 700 people turned out for the Fruit and Vegetable Field Day at the

Texas A&M University Agricultural Research & Extension Center at Overton June 13. They viewed more than 20 different vegetables and fruit which can be successfully grown in East Texas.

New Telephone Service By GT

A new long distance service for the traveling public is being introduced throughout the four-state operating territory of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Called "charge-a-call," the service is being described as payphones which won't take money," according to James B. Emery, the firm's vice president-marketing.

The first installations are being made in locations such as airports, hospitals, motels, truck stops, etc., which experience heavy payphone use.

"Charge-a-call," according to E. R. Richardson, Sulphur Springs division manager, "is designed for customers who make collect, third number and credit card long distance calls and frees them from the burden of searching for change in order to place a call. In fact, it's just like using a home or office phone. The customer talks now, pays later and has the advantage of having all of the billing details of the call recorded on his or her phone bill."

Aside from the obvious advantages for those who actually use the "charge-a-call" phones, all customers will benefit, according to the division manager.

"The new 'coinless' phones are less expensive to install, less expensive to maintain and less subject to vandalism," he pointed out, "which, thereby reduces the cost of the company and its customers of providing payphone service."

"Charge-a-call" phones are identified by a distinctive blue-orange-yellow striped sign. To place a call, the customer simply picks up the receiver and follows the dialing instructions posted by the phone. The "charge-a-call" station is automatically identified to an operator who accepts only credit card, collect or third number billings. Local calls cannot be placed from "charge-a-call" phones.

Residential or business customers may obtain telephone credit cards by making application for one at the local telephone company business office, Emery said.
