4-H'ers enjoy shooting sports

Credit for the "birth of 4-H in the United States" is given to A.B. Graham who started a youth program in Clark County, Ohio in 1902. For some 112 years, 4-H has endeavored to empower youth to reach their full potential, working and learning in partnership with caring adults.

4-H, the nation's largest youth program, has been active in Haskell County for many years. 4-H offers a variety of programs that help young people and their families gain the skills needed to be proactive forces in the community.

One relatively new program for Haskell County youth is the 4-H Shooting Sports. Approximately five years ago, six competitors comprised the team. It grew to eight for several years, and this year eighteen youth are participating, twelve of these being first time shooters.

There are three age groups: junior, 9-10 years old; intermediate, 11-13 years old; and senior, 14-19 years old. While there are several different categories of shooting, including skeet,

5 stand, rapid fire, pistols and others, the Haskell County group is concentrating on shotgun clay shooting and rifle target shooting. Individually some of the 4-H team members have entered and placed at extra competitions throughout the year.

This is the first year for the rifle shooting sports program.

At a recent competition, coached by Jodie Tullos, the junior team of Garrett Dutton, Maddox Drager and Corey Mathis placed fourth. The intermediate team of Brison Tullos, Nate King and Shane Stanfield placed sixth, while Dutton was 6th place individual. Ernie Homeyer and Faith Jordan also competed individually.

The purpose for the shooting program is to learn shooting skills and firearms safety. Shooters attend mandatory safety meetings and follow NRA rules for safety regulations.

While the program is sponsored by 4-H, it takes many adult volunteers to make it happen. Steve Alsabrook, who is a long time supporter of area youth, has provided a place for the teams

to practice. Cherri Dutton, Tina Tullos and Keith Hannsz have attended classes to become certified coaches. Others providing expertise and encouragement are Wes Alsabrook, Jodie Tullos, Darrel Dutton, Joey Mathis and Steve King, as well as many moms and dads there to support their children.

This program of course, is not free. Guns, ammunition, clays, targets, shell bags, along with eye and ear protection are all necessary for the competition. Shooters must furnish their own guns and ammunition, using up to 75 shells each practice. Five to six hundred clays, launched by a clay thrower, are used each practice.

In last year's district competition, which hosted about two hundred 4-H'ers, Austin Alsabrook shot on the third place team, Felicity Hannsz was on a two man team which won fourth, and Hannsz was also the high individual girl. On May 17, the teams will travel to Iowa Park for this year's district competition.

Some of the reasons offered by the youth for being a part of the team, include:

"I tried it and I liked it;" "My brother was doing it, so I wanted to try;" "It is fun when you hit them;" "I like seeing the rainbow of colored hulls on the ground at the end of the day;" "I like shooting with my dad;" and "It is just fun."

The Haskell County Shooting Sports teams are grateful for the donations they have received, including over three pallets of clays from Crime Stoppers. They have also received monetary donations from individuals. Because the supplies must be replenished, they are participating in some fund-raisers, but are always encouraged by donations of any amount. If you would like to help the teams out, contact the AgriLife Extension office in Haskell at 864-2658.

The 4-H vision is "a world in which youth and adults learn, grow and work together as catalysts for positive change." An afternoon of being outdoors, interacting with friends, and being motivated, encouraged and supported by your family, seems the perfect answer to that vision.

City election set Saturday

Campaigning is quickly winding down, as election time approaches. Only two Haskell County elections will be held Sat., May 10.

The race for Mayor of Haskell will be decided on Saturday as voters cast their ballots for either John Gannaway, the incumbent, or Shane Whitt, a member of the city council. The election will be held at the Haskell City Hall from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Voters in the Rule school district will elect two school board members. Seeking positions on the board are incumbents Shane LeFevre and Sam Grindstaff, along with challenger Jeffrey Murray. The election will be held at the Rule City Hall from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Registered voters are reminded that photo identification is now required for voting in person. Even if you have your voter registration card, you are required to show one of the following forms of photo ID at the polling location, before you will be permitted to cast a vote. Forms of ID include Texas driver license, Texas Election Identification Certificate, Texas personal ID card issued by the DPS, Texas concealed handgun license, US military identification card, US citizenship certificate or US passport. All registered voters in the city of Haskell, as well as the school district of Rule, are encouraged to make their voice heard by voting for the candidate of their choice.

City-wide clean-up set Sat., May 24

 - Things that will not be accepted during clean-up week include chemicals, tires, batteries, anything with Freon, asbestos, any roofing materials and paint.
- This service is provided for citizens in the city limits of Haskell only. Citizens may be asked for proof of residence, such as a water bill.

Track bests

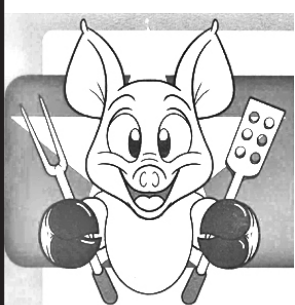
Two Haskell Indians and one Rule Bobcat were listed on the Area track and field leaders list in the Abilene Reporter-News Thurs., May 1.

Erich Fromm once wrote, "The child in the decisive first years of his life, has the experience of his mother, as an all-enveloping, protective, nourishing power. Mother is food; she is love; she is warmth; she is earth. To be loved by her means to be alive, to be rooted, to be at home."

On May 11, we will again set aside a day to honor our mothers. West Virginia, Anna Jarvis, is recognized as the "Founder of Mother's Day." Wanting to honor her late mother, she worked with other supporters to lobby for the official holiday. She sent her mother's favorite flowers, carnations, to her church and requested people wear them to honor their mothers. In 1910, West Virginia became the first state to recognize Mother's Day as a holiday. On May 8, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a Joint Resolution designating the second Sunday in May as the official holiday.

Psychologytoday.com listed just a few of the many reasons we feel our Moms are important. They include:

1. Mothers are the holding place for everyone's feelings and do their best to keep us from being hurt.
2. Mothers have the magic touch (and kiss) to help us heal our wounds, physical and emotional.

Runoff election set May 27

Although the March Primary determined many of the candidates that will face off in the November general election, it did not settle all contenders for the offices up for election. In several races, no candidate received 50% of the votes, necessitating a runoff.

The primary runoff elections are set for May 27. According to the Secretary of State's Elections Division, voters who cast their vote in the March primary election, may only vote in the same political party runoff election. If a voter did not vote in the primary election, they may still vote in the runoff election, in either the Democratic or Republican runoff election.

Early voting begins Mon., May 19 and continues through Fri., May 23 at the Haskell Courthouse. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is Fri., May 16, while the last day for your vote by mail to be received will be Tues., May 27.

On the ballot for the Republican runoff will be incumbent David Dewhurst, seeking his fourth term as lieutenant governor. He is opposed by Dan Patrick, who has served as a state senator since 2007. The office of attorney general is being sought by Dan Branch and Ken Paxton, both Texas state lawmakers.

Ryan Sitton, an oil and gas technology executive, and Wayne Christian, a former state representative, are vying for railroad commissioner. Former state representative from Stephenville, Sid Miller, is up against former state representative from Longview, Tommy Merritt, in the race for agriculture commissioner.

On May 27, voting in the Republican primary runoff will take place at the Haskell Courthouse.

The Democratic runoff will have two contested races. To decide the Democratic U.S. Senate nomination, voters will choose between Dallas dental mogul, David Alameel and Kesha Rogers. Wanting to represent the Democratic party for commissioner of agriculture will be Jim Hogan, a Cleburne farmer, and singer and humorist Kinky Friedman. This is Friedman's third run for a statewide office.

On the day of the election, there will be only four democratic voting places in Haskell County. Voters living in Precinct 1, served by Commissioner Bill Hester, will cast their votes at the Haskell Catholic Church. This includes Rochester and O'Brien. Precinct 2, served by Commissioner Tiffen Mayfield, will vote at the Haskell Assembly of God Church. This will include voters from Weinert. Paint Creek and other voters in Commissioner Kenny Thompson's Precinct 3, will vote at the AgrLife Extension Center. The Experienced Citizens Center will be the voting destination for voters in Commissioner Neal Kreger's Precinct 4, which includes Rule and Sagerton.

The results of both runoff elections, Democratic and Republican, will complete the ballot for the general election to be held in November.

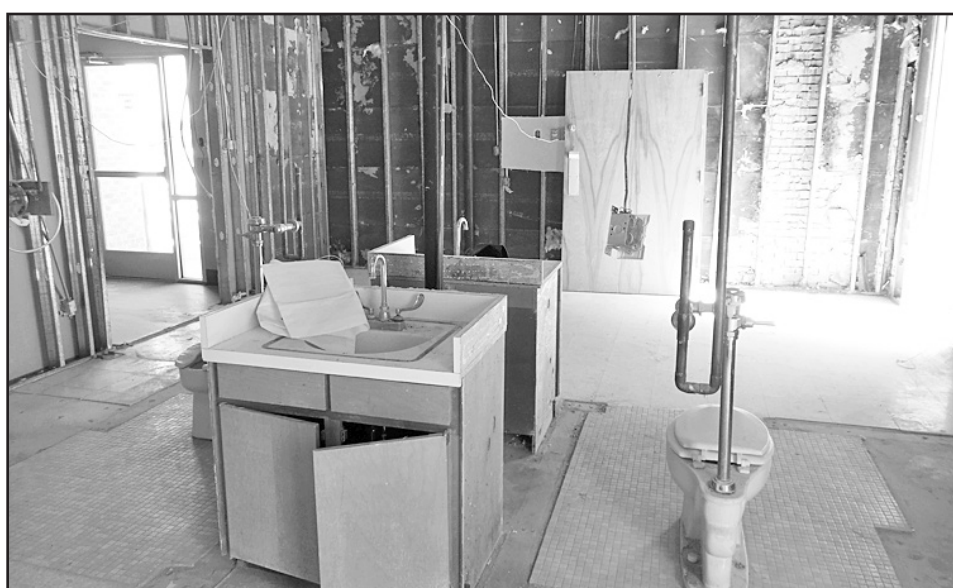

NEW CONCRETE—Workers are preparing to pour the footings for the new Emergency Room building at Haskell Memorial Hospital.

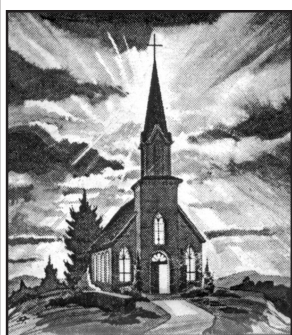

Foot Care & Diabetes

What can I do to take care of my feet?

- Wash your feet in warm water every day. Make sure the water is not too hot by testing the temperature with your elbow. Do not soak your feet. Dry your feet well, especially between your toes.
- Look at your feet every day to check for cuts, sores, blisters, redness, calluses, or other problems. Checking every day is even more important if you have nerve damage or poor blood flow. If you cannot bend over or pull your feet up to check them, use a mirror. If you cannot see well, ask someone else to check your feet.
- If your skin is dry, rub lotion on your feet after you wash and dry them. Do not put lotion between your toes.
- File corns and calluses gently with an emery board or pumice stone. Do this after your bath or shower.
- Cut your toenails once a week or when needed. Cut toenails when they are soft from washing. Cut them to the shape of the toe and not too short. File the edges with an emery board.
- Always wear slippers or shoes to protect your feet from injuries.
- Always wear socks or stockings to avoid blisters. Do not wear socks or knee-high stockings that are too tight below your knee.
- Wear shoes that fit well. Shop for shoes at the end of the day when your feet are bigger. Break in shoes slowly. Wear them 1 to 2 hours each day for the first few weeks.
- Before putting your shoes on, feel the insides to make sure they have no sharp edges or objects that might injure your feet.

Click It or Ticket is May 19-June 1

While nine out of ten Texans buckle up, too many drivers and passengers continue to risk injury or death by not using seat belts. According to TxDOT, in 2013, of all people killed in vehicles in Texas, nearly half were reported as not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Pickup trucks are so popular in Texas, but almost half of our pickup truck drivers killed in crashes were not wearing a seat belt.

After so many years of having seat belts standard in vehicles, it would seem that buckling your seat belt before driving off would be second nature. Fortunately, most of us do buckle up, but some, especially pickup truck drivers and their passengers, depend on their bigger pickup truck to protect them in a crash. Yet, pickup trucks are twice as likely to rollover than passenger cars, and pickup truck crashes can be especially serious—even deadly—due to their tendency to roll over and for unbelted occupants to be thrown from the vehicle.

Unbuckled passengers can also be deadly to others in the vehicle. Most people are not aware of the dangers posed by unbuckled backseat passengers. In a crash, they can become projectiles that are tossed around inside the vehicle, injuring or killing those in the front seat. Riders in the back seat who use lap and shoulder belts are 44% more likely to survive in a crash than unrestrained occupants in passenger cars, and 73% more likely to survive in passenger vans and SUVs.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), young adults are dying at a disproportionate rate

because they are not wearing their seat belts. Sixty-two percent of 18- to 34-year-old passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes were not wearing their seat belts.

When the Click It or Ticket campaign began in 2002, just 76 percent of Texans used seat belts. Today, over 90 percent of Texans buckle up. Also, since the campaign began over a decade ago, NHTSA estimated in 2012 (the most recent data available) that the Click It or Ticket campaign in Texas has resulted in almost 3,700 fewer traffic deaths and prevented more than 50,000 serious injuries.

Here's another good reason to buckle up—it's the law! Unbelted drivers and adult passengers can face fines and court costs of up to \$200. Children younger than 8 years old must be in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Fines issued to drivers for unrestrained children in their vehicle can be as high as \$250 plus court costs.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent DaLinda Black from Haskell County reminds drivers that the campaign this year is scheduled for May 19-June 1, which includes Memorial Day weekend. During this time, extra law enforcement representatives will be on the roads enforcing the seat belt and child restraint laws in an effort to save lives. Those officers are not out to write tickets but instead want to help prevent the needless tragedy from motor vehicle accidents. Remember to buckle up and save your life—not just during Click It or Ticket, but every day of the year!

Again, Ozona's Lozano, kept the Maidens off balance until the top of the fourth when Williams and Kelsey Guzman hit singles, Gibbs and Foster hit RBI doubles and Ashlyn Bevel hit a ground out RBI, scoring Briana Rodriguez who was courtesy running for catcher, Gibbs, grabbing the lead with the score 4-2 at the end of 3 1/2 innings.
