ESTABLISH COTTON SEED BREEDING FARM NORTHWEST OF TOWN

The Mabane Cotton Breeding Association of Lockhart has established a cotton seed breeding farm in Haskell County for the purpose of raising pure Mabane cotton seed for planting purposes. The association has secured some two thousand acres west of town for this purpose and will furnish seed of the purest Mabane cotton to the farmers of that section to plant their 1922 crop. The farm will include all of Dr. Taylor's farm, J. W. Tidwell's, J. A. Lane Tom Baker, J. R. Newsome, Paul Frierson, J. H. Lawson, Virgil Bailey, Oscar Hinchins, Lewis Newsome, John Hinchins, A. A. Frierson, Mr. Bufington, Will Charstain, Calhoun Ware, all of W. E. Welsh's farm and others. The company has made a trade with E. T. Sanders to gin all cotton raised in this district on a separate gin so that the seed may not get mixed with any other variety and will be kept absolutely pure. The company has a State Agricultural man employed who will look after the raising of this cotton during the growing season. The company comes to Haskell County highly recommended as to their honesty and financial standing. Mr. Sanders made a special trip to Lockhart to investigate their responsibility and found them to be absolutely reliable in every way and understands the cotton breeding business. This company took first prize at the Dallas Fair last year on seed and length of staple and first premium for the past two years at the Lockhart Fair. This is probably one of the biggest agricultural boosts Haskell county has ever received as it is the plan of the company to make this their growing and distributing point for pure Mabane cotton seed for all West Texas and will cause Haskell to become known far and near as the home of pure cotton seed. The different farm organizations of the state are beginning to realize the importance of a better grade of cotton—a good hard cotton 1-16 or 1-18 inch staple is worth from \$5.00 to \$15.00 a bale more than inferior quality or short staple and mixed varieties. The following article which has been taken from the Southland Farmer regarding the activities of the Texas Farm Bureau along this line may be of interest. The article follows: "The Texas Farm Bureau announces the appointment of D. L. Ray as manager of the Better Cotton Seed Department, which has been established for the purpose of increasing the planting of pure cotton seed of improved varieties in Texas. It is hoped through this department to increase the value of the Texas cotton crop without measurably increasing the cost of production. It is understood that good hard cotton 1-16 inch or 1-18 inch staple is worth from \$5 to \$15 a bale more than inferior quality or short staple and mixed varieties. "Standardization of cotton by communities is one of the projects of this department. The plan is for each community to agree upon a good variety best suited to local conditions and all plant this variety, and thus establish a reputation such as has been done in communities around Paris, Robstown, Clarksville, Corpus Christi and Center."

Practically every town in West Texas will be represented at this meeting as the sentiment in favor of the proposed line being built at this time is very strong and the competing routes are all anxious to have their proposed line adopted as the most logical route. A number will probably attend the meeting from Haskell.

HEALTH WORK IS BEING CONTINUED

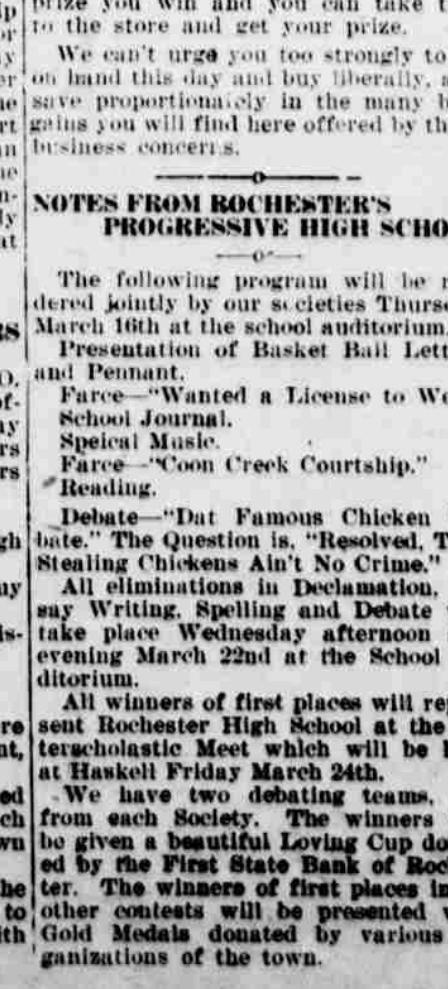
During Miss Seymour's stay in Haskell approximately 700 children were examined by the nurse and about 650 of these examined for throat, nose and ear troubles by local physicians. 25 or more pupils missed the opportunity of being examined—by reason of being absent from school on the date the examination was in progress. Of these examined 225 had bad tonsils, 63 had adenoids, making a total of 288 cases of throat and nose trouble. Defective vision and granulated eyelids amounted to nearly 200 cases. Of granulated eyelids alone there were over sixty cases—an alarming proportion of a most serious trouble. Only about one dozen cases of bad hearing developed—but it must be remembered that it was impossible to give more than a superficial ear test with the facilities at hand. 205 cases of bad teeth or diseased gums were found. 250 cases of malnutrition were discovered. Malnutrition is in most cases the result of an unbalanced diet, in a few cases of insufficient nourishing food, and in many instances the direct consequence of bad teeth of diseased throats that rob bodily systems through digestive derangement. It is believed that a close correlation will be found to exist between malnutrition and physical defects that interfere with digestive functions. A study is being made locally now to find the amount of correlation in evidence. The best results of such health work has been done here by Miss Seymour is not to be found in the amount of defects discovered however. Most parents will continue apathetic, no matter how plainly the trouble is pointed out. Even if all cases were followed up and effectually cured, the results would be slight compared with the vast amount of prevention that follows from such cases. Children are reared upon favorably through such work and are roused to better care of their bodies. It is this reaction on the part of children that makes the work really valuable by way of prevention of disease. Before leaving, Miss Seymour assisted teachers in establishing health clubs in nearly all rooms. Children elect their own inspectors from among themselves. The inspectors give severe scrutiny of their fellow pupils each morning, examining for uncombed hair, unwashed faces and hands, dirty finger-nails, dirty handkerchiefs, etc. The inspectors then report cases of untidiness to the teacher. Such pupil inspection is causing a vast improvement of sanitary conditions not only in school rooms but in the homes of the children. Four rooms have gone further and taken up Health Crusade work. Domestic science girls who assisted Miss Seymour will serve as "big sisters" to such rooms. Teachers will continue the work inaugurated by Miss Seymour. Simple eye and ear tests will be given new pupils as they enter. The most serious obstacle to such work is the lack of school scales for frequent weighing of children. Malnutrition, the school's chief health problem, cannot be tracked without scales. The Corner Drug Store generously loaned its scales during the period of Miss Seymour's active work. It is hoped that some way may be found to install permanent scales for such work in the near future.

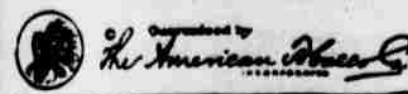
