BISCHOFHAUSEN SHOT AND KILLED SATURDAY

Bischofhausen, deputy sheriff of Haskell county, died at three o'clock Saturday afternoon from gunshot inflicted by H. J. Whitaker of Bischofhausen was working on the roadside near the Leonard southeast of town, when he was struck by a wagon driven by Whitaker. The driver was killed and the wagon overturned. Whitaker is said to have fired with a .38-40 Colt, killing Bischofhausen through the stomach and once through the shoulder.

WIND STORMS AND HEAVY RAINS HERE THIS WEEK

Haskell County and all of West Texas has been visited by heavy downpours of rain this week, with light hail storms in some localities. The rain fall Sunday afternoon had amounted to .40 of an inch, but Sunday night the heaviest rain for several months fell amounting to 2.08 inches. Again Monday night Haskell was visited by still another rain, .88 inches, being reported Monday night. Some hail in scattered localities was reported over this county, but no considerable damage.

WIND STORMS AND HEAVY RAINS HERE THIS WEEK

The down pour ranged from two to four inches over the entire portion of Central West Texas Sunday night. Together with what had already fallen it is expected to insure a splendid agricultural season. Farmers declare it will prove of some benefit to late grain and will be a great help to cotton and feed crops. It also replenished the supply of stock water which had been getting low.

Tuesday night about 9 o'clock Haskell and this section was visited by one of the worst wind storms in years. The rain was heavy, and it was accompanied by a hard wind and a severe electrical storm. The contract for paving the public square was awarded Wednesday evening to the H. J. McCollum Construction Co. of Fort Worth. The contract calls for the paving of the entire square with a 3-inch brick on a 4-inch concrete base.

BURKETT LEADS BARKER IN SENATORIAL RACE

Eastland, June 7th.—At last reports Joe Burkett was leading in the senatorial race in this district by 255 votes with a few small boxes over the district to hear from, the total vote up to date giving Burkett 2,757 and Barker 2,502.

FIRST TRAIN CROSSES NEW BRAZOS BRIDGE

Wichita Falls, Texas, June 7.—The first train crossed the Brazos River bridge of the Wichita Falls & Southern Sunday, and the laying of steel beyond the Brazos into South Bend is low under way. It is expected that the steel will have been completed to South Bend before the end of the week.

INCOMPLETE RETURNS SHOW DEFEAT OF THE ROAD TAX

Incomplete returns from the election held in Haskell County Saturday on the Road Tax and the Stock Law, indicate the probable defeat of the Road Tax, returns for 10 boxes showing 253 votes for and 305 against the tax. The Stock Law seems to have carried by a good majority in all boxes heard from, there being 435 votes for and only 41 against this measure. Returns from eleven boxes are yet to come in, but they are not likely to show any material change in the results.

WILL OF ORMER JUSTICE HELD TO FIFTY-ONE WORDS

The will of Edward Douglass White, former chief justice of the United States, was filed last week for probate in Washington. It was explained June 26, 1915 and is contained in two sentences, 51 words in all. It reads: "This is my last will. I give, bequeath and devise to my wife, Letta M. White, in complete and perfect ownership all my rights and property of every kind and nature, whether real, personal or mixed wherever situated, appointing her executrix of my estate without bond and giving her residuum thereof."

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TEXAS COTTON ACREAGE GREATLY REDUCED

The cotton acreage of Texas will be reduced approximately 4,000,000 acres this year, according to the report compiled by E. F. Shropshire, director of the Cotton Division of Texas Farm Bureau Federation, which estimates the reduction at 33 per cent. This report is made up of an average arrived at from nearly 2,000 estimates made by the county judges, bankers, secretaries of commercial and agricultural organizations for the various counties. Reports were made from 170 cotton counties and some counties were represented by as many as 38 estimates.

"This report further indicates a reduction in the use of commercial fertilizer in that part of the state where it is used, of approximately of 65 per cent, which naturally means a further decrease in yield of the acreage planted in those counties," Mr. Shropshire said.

"No effort should be spared by all interested in this essential task and especially individuals from the counties from which this report is made, to further reduce the acreage and to make absolutely that the acreage report to be compiled by the government will bear out in every particular the report as herein given.

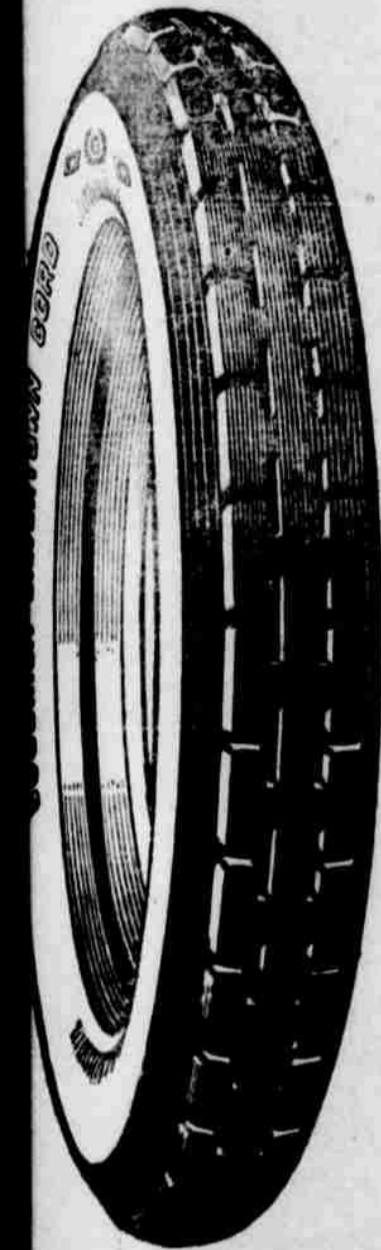
