Texas Department of Health, advises that efmunization law relating to the requirements for measles (Rubeola-Red Measles) immunization has been amended to provide greater protection for the children of Texas against the always serious Measles

disease. Jack Frost, Immunization to be immunized with the munized with measles Those students claiming a returned to the school before history of the measles illness October 28. in lieu of the vaccine are required to present a physician-validated

statement attesting to the measles illness. All parental histories of measles illness must be replaced by a physician-validated history. or the measles vaccine is

required.
"These changes are necessary as over 800 cases of measles in Texas have been reported to the Texas Department of Health during the first eight months of 1981, as compared to a total of 181 cases reported during 1980" Frost added.

Other immunization requirements for school children are: three doses of Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (DPT) and or Tetanus-Diphtheria (Td), one of the doses being received since the fourth birthday, and a booster dose every 10 years; three doses of Oral Polio Vaccine, with one of the doses received since the fourth birthday, no booster dose required; one dose of mumps vaccine for all children enrolled through the third grade, or a physician-validated history




