Rivercrest Rebels VS. Maud Results In 0-0 Tie

The teams looked good when they took the field. The Maud Cardinals wore all white uniforms and the Rivercrest Rebels were clad in red jerseys with grey pants. But the water soaked field would have its toll on the uniforms as well as the players. And the scoreboard would read the same score at the end of the game as it read now, 0-0. But the players would be mud-streaked and water-soaked to the bone and the 48 minutes of game time would hold only one threat, and it would come with less than two minutes left in the game, and the scoreboard still read 0-0. And the Rebels, with their second tie, will be praying for Maud to tie or be defeated in the remainder of their games, and scoreboard will still read 0-0. And the players, cold and wet, will go home dreading the next weeks practice, and the scoreboard will still read 0-0. Although the players had been practicing in the rain all week, it still took time for them to get used to the field conditions. The game started slow as the teams exchanged punts and Rivercrest brought the game its first

excitement on their third possession. They fumbled the ball over to Maud at their own 46 yard line. But Maud only kept the ball two plays as John Hines intercepted a Maud pass at Rivercrest's eleven yard line. But the Rebels couldn't get anything started and had to punt the ball away. After another exchange of punts, Jerry Merchant intercepted a Maud pass and carried the ball inside Maud's 30 yard line, but a clipping penalty brought the ball back to the 50, where the Rebels promptly handed the ball back over to Maud on a fumble just before the half. The Rebels first drive of the second half was stalled at Maud's 48 yard line, where Cardinal rushers blocked a James Strickland punt and took over possession at Rivercrest's 33 yard line. But the Rebel defense held and Maud was forced to punt. The Rebels took the punt at their own 10 yard line and began the only real drive either team had all night. Excellent blocking from the Rebel front line helped Strickland on runs of 11, 14 and 18 yards and a 20 yard pass completion to Larry Denny to bring the ball to

Maud's 26 yard line. But it seemed neither team wanted the ball. Rivercrest fumbled the ball over to Maud again; then on the first play, Maud fumbled back to Rivercrest, but the Rebels only kept the ball three plays before fumbling back to Maud! The teams then returned to punting and turning the ball over on downs. The Rebels, after stalling a Maud drive, took over possession at their own 38 yard line with 1:42 left in the game. A seventeen yard pass from Strickland to Merchant brought the ball across the 50 to Maud's 45. On third down and ten Strickland hit Bradley Moore at the right hash mark and Moore broke a tackle and out distanced everyone across the goal line, but a clipping penalty nullified the touchdown and brought the ball back out to Maud's 39 yard line. Strickland kept the drive alive by picking up a first down at the Cardinals 35 yard line, where he once again went to Moore for a first down completion at the 20. Strickland then tried to hit Moore in the end-zone, but Moore was held up and pass interference was called

against Maud at the one yard line with only 12 seconds on the clock. The rebels then tried a pass, but all the receivers were covered and Strickland was swarmed by Cardinals as the seconds ticked off the clock; and the scoreboard still read 0-0.

Head coach Milford Groves said all the breaks went against the Rebs and luckily the Cardinals were not able to capitalize on any of them. The Rebs defense did an excellent job, holding Maud to only 74 yards rushing, and four first downs, while the offensive line had a good night of blocking. The Rebels travel to Redwater next week to take on the Dragons in another district 20-AA contest.

They are members of the Fulbright Baptist Church where Katy teaches the Young Adult Sunday School Class.

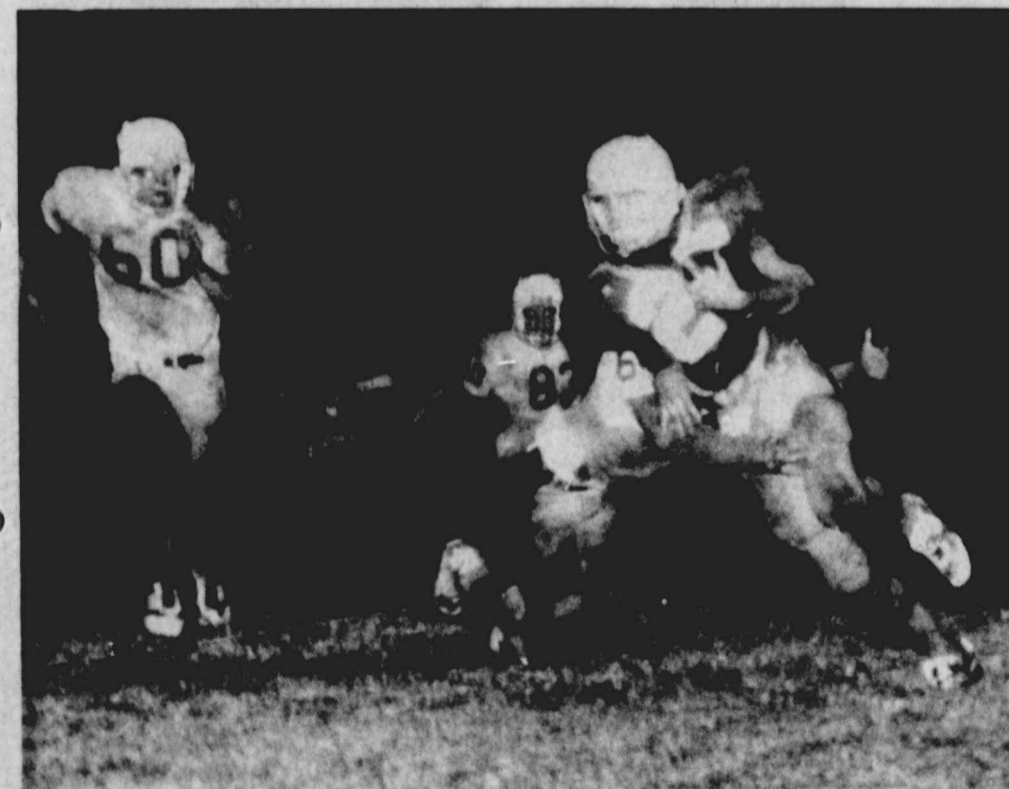
The VanDeavers have four daughters who are also teachers and five "adorable grandchildren whom we love to spoil." Her favorite color

Ambulance Service Starts Membership Drive

The Red River Ambulance Service has announced the start of their annual membership drive for the year ended November 30, 1982. Memberships may be purchased for six months or one year and the cost for membership is the same as the current year. For those who are not presently members, now is the time to subscribe and your coverage will be effective immediately.

The Ambulance Service is completing another year in

providing ambulance service to Red River County. Since the beginning of the current year (10 months) the Ambulance Service has responded to over 1200 requests for aid, transportation, etc., but to continue to provide this service we need everyone's help. We presently have three ambulances to serve the county, two of which are always manned 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Two of the ambulances are based in Clarksville and one in Bogata.

A membership entitles the members covered for up to 75 miles free ambulance transportation each trip and a charge of \$1 per mile for over the first 75 miles per trip that the patient is transported.

Non members rates are a \$75 base charge for each pickup and a \$1.50 per mile charge for each mile a patient is transported. (One trip for a non-member to a local hospital exceeds the cost of a one year's membership for an entire family.)

Membership fees are as follows:
Annual (to Nov. 30, 1982)-Family \$50 and Individual \$30; Semi-Annual (to May 31, 1982)-Family \$25 and Individual \$15.

Businesses, Industrial

plants, and School Districts may purchase memberships to cover employees (or students) while at work (or school), going to and enroute home from work (or school) and anyone requiring ambulance service while on the premises. The cost of these memberships is as follows:
1-50 employees (or students)-\$100
51-100 for \$150
101 or more-\$200

Nursing Home Course Scheduled

Part IV of a 200-hour nursing home administration course is scheduled to begin Thursday, October 29, at Paris Junior College. The course, which will cover financial aspects of nursing home administration, will be taught from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. for seven Thursdays in the Alford Center at the college.

Instructor for the course will be J.W. Ashmore, chairman of the Division of Business and Management at PJC for 11 years. He holds a B.S. in industrial engineering from the University of Alabama and M.B.A. in management from the University of Mississippi. In addition, he has completed graduate work in management at the University of Houston, North Texas State University and East Texas State University. He holds Texas Education Agency certification in management and nursing home administration.

The nursing home course

is part of a statewide program requiring nursing home administrators to complete 200 hours of instruction before applying for state board of licensure examinations. Part I of the course will begin on Jan. 14. Tuition is \$100 which should be paid in advance by sending a check to Nancy Jackson, Box 217, Paris Junior College, or going by her office in the Downtown Center. 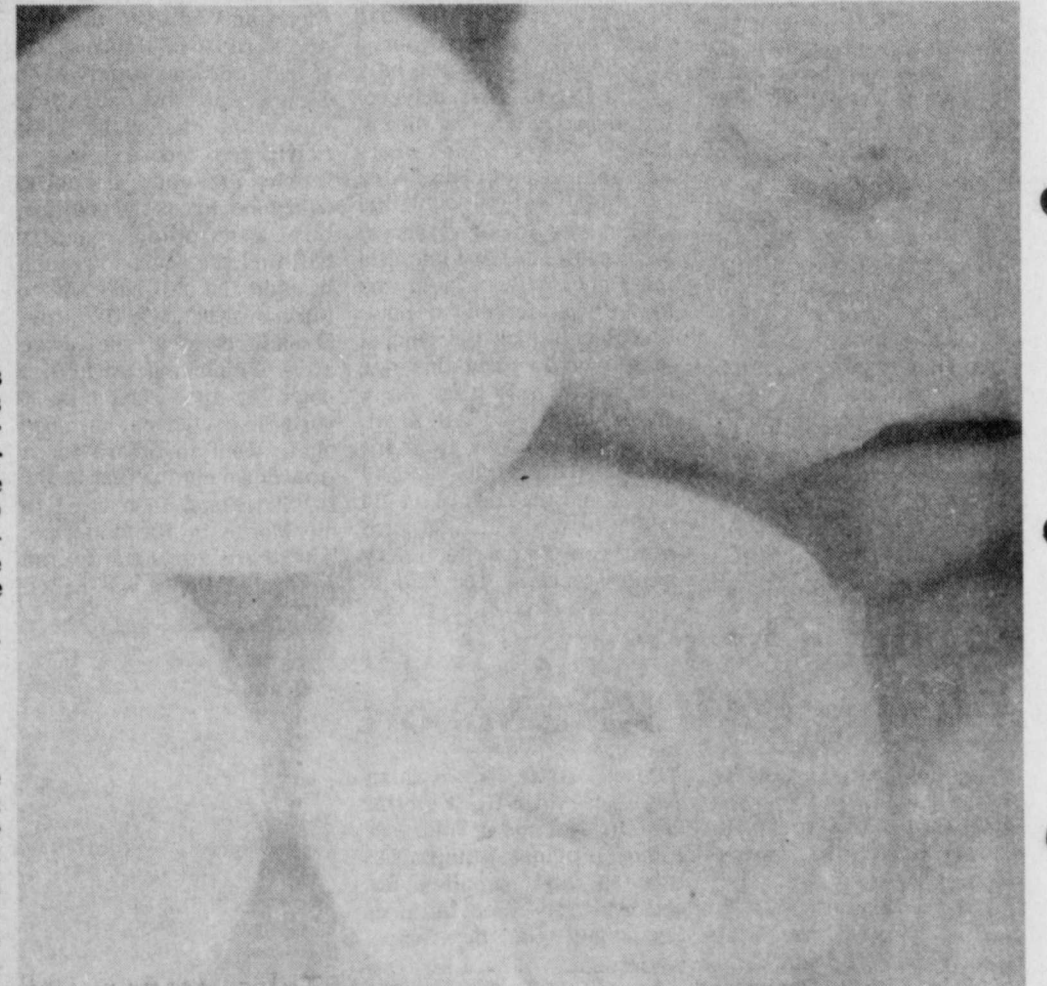
Accounting Course Set

Accounting for Managers, presented by Paris Junior College in cooperation with the American Management Association's Extension Institute, will be taught on Fridays, Nov. 6, 13, and 20, in the Chamber of Commerce Building in Mt. Immunization Changed

Public Health Region 7, Texas Department of Health, advises that effective September 1, 1981, the mandatory school immunization law relating to the requirements for measles (Rubeola-Red Measles) immunization has been amended to provide greater protection for the children of Texas against the always serious Measles disease.

Jack Frost, Immunization Program Manager for Public Health Regions 7 & 10, states that all children enrolled in public and private schools through the 12th grade are now required to be immunized with the measles vaccine. In addition, any student immunized with measles vaccine prior to the first birthdate, or prior to January 1, 1968, will be required to receive a booster measles immunization. Those students claiming a history of the measles illness in lieu of the vaccine are required to present a physician-validated statement attesting to the measles illness. All parental histories of measles illness must be replaced by a physician-validated history, or the measles vaccine is required.

"These changes are necessary as over 800 cases of measles in Texas have been reported to the Texas Department of Health during the first eight months of 1981, as compared to a total of 181 cases reported during 1980", Frost added.

Other immunization requirements for school children are: three doses of Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (DPT) and/or Tetanus-Diphtheria (Td), one of the doses being received since the fourth birthday, and a booster dose every 10 years; three doses of Oral Polio Vaccine, with one of the doses received since the fourth birthday, no booster dose required; one dose of mumps vaccine for all children enrolled through the third grade, or a physician-validated history
