Rebs Slay Dragons 47 - 6

The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Redwater last Friday with one thing on their minds: winning. And that's exactly what they did. They handed the Dragons a 47-6 defeat, in the best offensive show the Rebels have had this season. The Rebel offense totalled 332 yards while the defense held Redwater to 167 yards. And the slightly overlooked specialty teams showed themselves to be worthy of praise as they consistently gave the Rebs good field position on kick-off returns and put the Dragons in a hole on the kick-offs.

The Rebels started their first drive on their own 31 yard line and proceeded downfield to the Dragons 33 before a pass interception killed the drive there. But the Dragons could get nothing going and Rivercrest took over the ball at their own 22 yard line. The Rivercrest express then cranked up and drove the length of the field with James Strickland scoring from 38 yards out to give the Rebs a 6-0 lead with 1:54 left in the first quarter. The teams then exchanged interceptions, with Bradley Moore pulling in the ball for the Rebels. Then after receiving the ball over on downs, the Rebs took the ball from their own 23 yard line to

paydirt with Wade Cline breaking several tackles and carrying the ball over from 17 yards out. Jerry Merchant added to two-point conversion and the Rebs led 14-0. Larry Davis stole the next pass from the Dragons at the Redwater 33 yard line. Strickland brought the ball 20 yards closer to the goal line on a keeper, then gave Merchant the honor of crossing the line with just a few seconds left in the half. And Rivercrest carried a 20-0 lead to the dressing room.

The Rebs took the second half kick-off on their own 18 yard line and once again the express drove the length of the field eating 6:43 off the clock enroute to the goal line. Merchant scored from 16 yards making it 26-0. The next Dragon drive was brought to a halt at the Rivercrest 45 by Stan Wood who intercepted a Dragon pass and returned it to the Redwater 41. But the Rebels turned the ball over on downs, & defense held the Dragons and forced them to punt. The Rebs then stormed the punter, blocked the punt, and Billy Stewart picked up the loose ball and took it over the line for another touchdown; and the Rebs led 33-0. But the Dragons struck back. Of the 167 yards the Dragons had rushing, 72 of it came on a run that put the ball on Rivercrest's 14 yard

line. It only took three plays for Cedric Shavers to carry the ball over, and Rivercrest led 33-6 with 1:35 left in the game. The specialty teams then earned their pay. The kick-off team took the field with touchdown written all over them. Merchant received the ball at his own 20 yard line and took it up the right sideline 80 yards to the end-zone and put the Rebs up 40-6. The Dragons then took the ball at their own 22 yard line, but only kept it two plays as James Noey intercepted a Redwater pass and crossed the goal line with 27 seconds left in the game. The point after was good and the Rebels brought a 47-6 victory home.

Jerry Merchant led rushing for the Rebels with

105 yards. He also had 80 yards kick-off return run and scored three of the Rebels seven touchdowns. Wade Cline had 85 yards rushing and Strickland added 80 more to that. The Rebel defense held the Dragons to 167 yards rusing, four first downs, no yards passing, and intercepted five passes from the Dragons quarterback. Head Coach Milford Groves was very pleased with his teams performance.

The Rebs play host to James Bowie next Friday night for a 7:30 contest at Rebel Stadium.

Titus Commissioners Receive Sentence

Former Titus County Commissioners Alvin (Scooter) Parrish, and C.H. (Shorty) Reese, who had previously pleaded guilty to mail fraud and extortion charges, were sentenced on Monday, October 19 by Judge William H. Steger. Each received a 18 month

prison sentence to be followed by three years of probation plus a fine of \$2,500. Parrish was ordered to make restitution to the county in the amount of \$4,246.92 and Reese in the amount of \$1,246.26. Bert Parr, undergoing

treatment for cancer, and Bill Reynolds, recuperating from open heart surgery, have similar charges pending against them. They are both Titus County Commissioners. Their cases have been continued for reasons of their health.

The trials for R.L. (Lunsford) Edwards and Darwin Floyd, both Red River County Commissioners, are scheduled for the November term of Judge William Wayne Justice's court in Paris. These two commissioners have placed not guilty pleas to all charges.

Guaranty Bond To Build New Bank Building

Plans for the construction of a new three million dollar building for Guaranty Bond State Bank were announced Friday, Oct. 23, 1981 by Bill G. Jones, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the bank and Chief Executive Officer, and Art Scharlach, President.

Jones also stated that the bank's official name has been changed to Guaranty Bank.

The new facility will be located one block south of the present Guaranty Bank building on the block bordered by Madison, Jefferson, Alabama and Arkansas streets.

Site preparation will begin immediately and completion of construction of the new building is expected in mid 1983.

"Guaranty Bank is growing rapidly," Jones said, "and to provide the best possible service for our customers in the coming years we will need more space and additional people. This new building will permit us to offer the finest and most efficient service available."

Jones said the bank's current staff is approximately 60 people with a forecast for 28 more between now and 1987.

The 27,000 square foot, two-story building will be constructed with a steel superstructure with brick and glass exterior walls.

One of the main features of the new facility will be a six-lane drive-in tellerport, using the latest pneumatic equipment. The drive-in area is designed to expand

to a total of nine lanes.

Others features will include an automatic drive-in teller open 24 hours, night depository and a separate lobby commercial walk-in.

Parking space for over 100 cars will be situated south and west of the new building.

Scharlach said that "The Southwestern Division of Bank Building Corporation has planned, designed and will manage construction of our new building. To the maximum extent possible, Bank Corporation will employ local people and purchase materials and supplies in this area."

Guaranty Bank was founded in 1913 and currently has assets of more than \$72,000,000.

Jerry Jones of Talco is one of the bank directors.



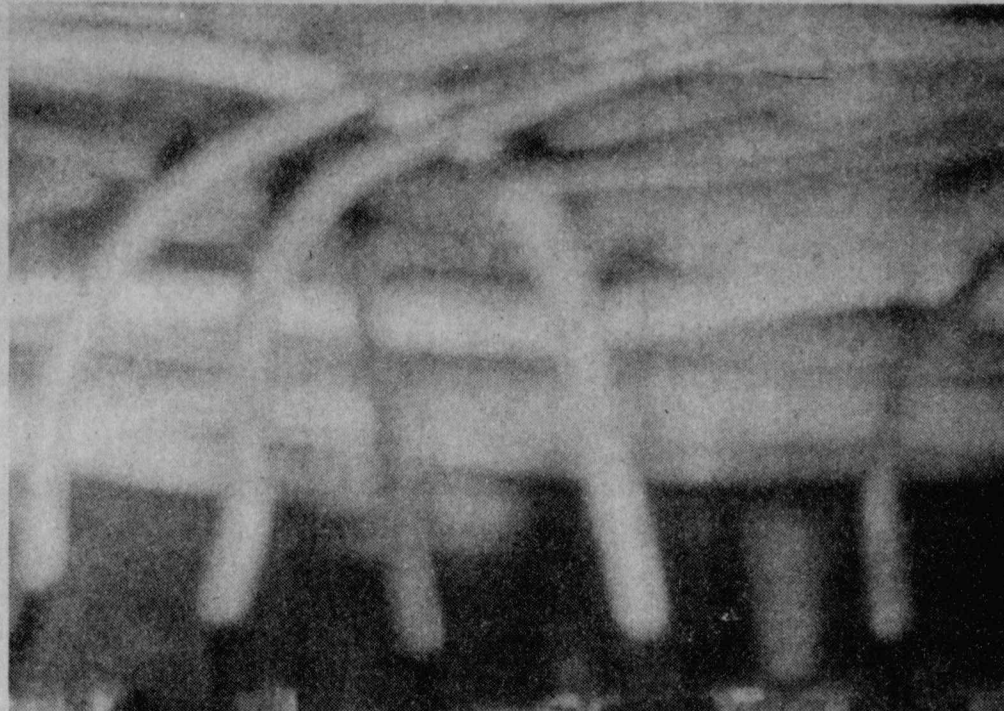

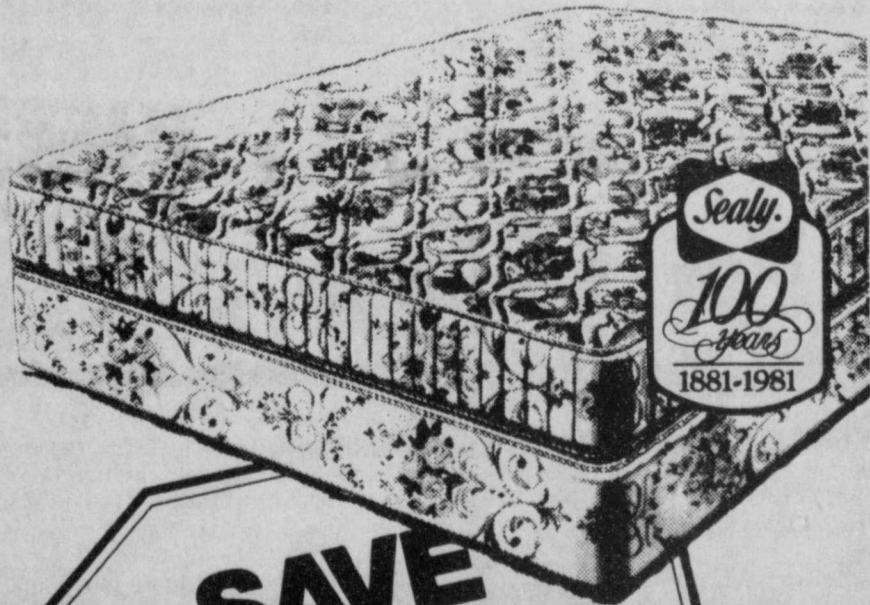

Welch Constructs Grassed Waterway

By Ray Haddock
"Gully erosion is just one of the enemies to a landowner," states Tommy Welch. Welch is the owner and operator of a 700 acre blackland farm west of Clarksville in the Batesville Community.

Severe gully erosion begins when heavy rain falls on protected land. This usually starts the gully, and after each rain and each year it becomes larger. Old tires, hay, car bodies, trash and etc. are sometimes placed at the head of the gully, hoping to head it off, but usually this fails.

After many years of trying to stop this gully, Welch decided it was time to get serious about it. He contacted the Soil Conservation Service for professional advice and assistance. After technicians made an engineering survey they found that this gully could be shaped and structural measures were not needed.

As Welch looks down the smooth shaped waterway after recent rains he realizes why the gully needed to be constructed ninety feet wide and around two feet deep. Well over 100 acres is draining into it, this much width allows the water to spread out to run slow and prevent cutting. "The bulldozer did an excellent

job shaping the waterway," stated Welch. The bottom was shaped like a saucer, with a wide flat bottom. "This also allows me to cross the waterway with ease," he continued.

Welch will be the first to agree that waterways are expensive to have constructed. "Construction is only the half way point on getting a waterway established," said Welch. After construction the next step is to get the waterway sodded to grass. "Over two hundred bushels of bermudagrass sprigs were sprigged on twenty four inch row spacing," stated Welch. This is twice the regular sprigging rate but this assures me of a good grass cover." All the contours construction would be wasted if no grass were established," continued Welch.

Most landowners can see that "Grassed Waterways," fit perfectly in their conservation farming. Instead of hard to cross gullies, vegetated waterways can carry to excess run-off water from adjoining areas without causing erosion. As Welch said "if I properly manage this waterway, I can harvest hay from it." Your local SCS technician can give you on site assistance in locating and designing waterways.

Red River County Farm To Market Beginning

Work in Red River County is included in the 1981-82 Texas Farm to Market Road Program passed October 21, 1981 by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer R.H. Lindholm, Jr. of Paris said the program includes funds to provide relocation assistance, construction,

grading, structures, and surfacing for a 4.3 mile project from FM Highway No. 410 in Detroit, northeast. Statewide, the two-year program includes \$46.8 million for new construction or additional financing on 160 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market Roads in the state. This includes funding for 133 miles of new construction

and additional financing for another 113 miles. Approximately 13 miles of projects were authorized previously and included in this program.

The Texas Farm and Ranch to Market Road system is one of the largest secondary road networks in the nation with some 41,000 miles designated since the

program's inception shortly before World War II.

The system has been developed cooperatively by the counties and the state, with local governments securing the right of way and providing for utility adjustments, and the state in charge of the construction and maintenance of the facilities.

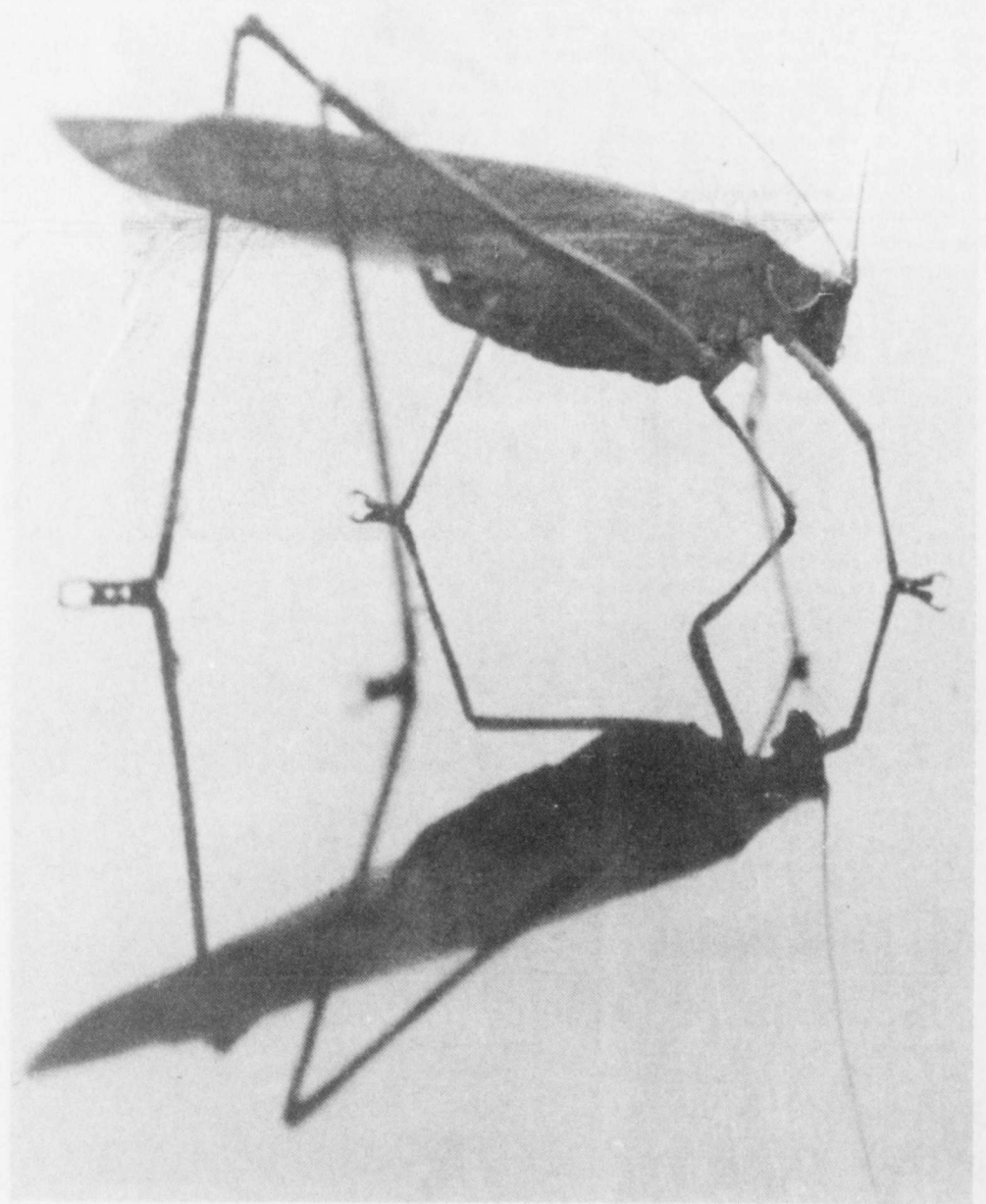

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
BY LAWRENCE W. ALTHOUSE
THE PRAYER HE PRAYED FOR US
November 1, 1981

Background Scripture: John 17.

Devotional Reading: Luke 11: 1-13.

One day just a little over two weeks ago, Valere and I stood looking into the ruins of West Berlin's Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church. Almost entirely destroyed by bombs in World War II, this church was left in ruins by Berliners to remind themselves and the world of the folly of war. Next to it a new church hall and a campanile have been constructed in a contemporary style that is a jarring contrast to the Romanesque architecture of the ruined church tower, which is all that remains.

As we turned to leave, we were confronted by an elderly woman who asked, "Are you Americans?" Aware that Secretary of State Alexander Haig was scheduled to be in West Berlin the next day and that there was likely to be a sizable protest demonstration by Berlin youth against U.S. foreign policy, we were wary of her intention as we acknowledged that we were from the U.S.A.

Please Tell America!
With a gleam of sincerity in her eyes, the woman said, "Please tell the American people when you go home how grateful are the people of Berlin for what you have done for us." She went on to say, "Since the Berlin Airlift, I have been coming to this church every day to thank visitors from England, France and America and to give them these cards as a reminder of our gratitude."

The card was a postcard photograph of the Liberty Bell replica given to West Berlin by the American people in 1950 and hanging today in the tower of the Shoeneberg Town Hall, where on June 26, 1963, President John F. Kennedy proclaimed that the proudest boast anyone in the free world could make were the words, "Ich bin ein Berliner" ("I am a Berliner").

Responding to our questions, she told us that she had lived in Berlin during the

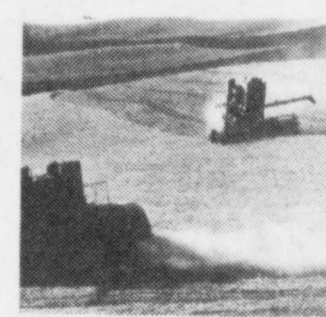
dark days of World War II. She had been in a bomb shelter nearby the night the Kaiser Wilhelm Church was destroyed by bombs. She had saved herself from rape by the Soviet troops by disguising herself as a deformed, old woman. She had seen starvation, pillage, and pestilence. "How did you survive all that?" I asked. There was no trace of false piety in her voice as she answered simply, "One learns to pray."

She had prayed her way through the horror of World War II, the occupation and the Cold War. She had prayed and still was continuing to pray prayers of thanksgiving for the help Berlin has received from England, France and the U.S.A. She prays for our people and feels a oneness with us. Although she is in her eighties, she still believes God has a mission for her to perform.

The Work Thou Gavest
That was the way Jesus prayed for us, too, in John 17. He thanked God for his disciples (and us) and prayed that they/we might fulfill his mission "the work which thou gavest me to do" (17: 4).

And his second petition? He prayed "that they may all be one." Thus he prayed for us and thus he wills that we would pray for each other. "One learns to pray," the woman said. Have you?

Pleas Heard, Punishments Set

On October 12 and 13, 1981 District Judge Leon F. Pesek heard guilty pleas in District Court and set punishments as follows:

Jerry Don Brumfield, age 17, a white male, was sentenced to three concurrent five year sentences in prison, no probation or fine. On June 22, 1981, Brumfield was convicted of the June 9, 1981 burglary of Kisner's Grocery Store in Bogata. That probation was revoked and he was convicted to subsequent burglaries at Kisner's Grocery and Denny's Skateland in Bogata, which took place on September 18, 1981.

Hilton Laverne Maxcey, a white male, age 37, was sentenced to three years in

prison, no probation or fine, for the theft of tools and a pump from the Cross Arrow Ranch on July 20, 1981. He was also sentenced to a two year term in prison, no probation or fine, such term to begin after he serves the three year term for jail escape on August 16, 1981.

Ray Paul Black, a white male, age 23, was sentenced to 22 days in the County Jail, no probation or fine, for the theft of a hog from Roger Smith on September 2, 1981 valued at \$35. Restitution had been made before sentencing.

Sam Westbrook, a white male, age 24, was sentenced to three years in prison and a \$1,000 fine for assaulting a peace officer, but the prison

sentence was probated.

James Steve Jones, a white male, age 18, was sentenced to 30 days in jail for the July 4, 1981 theft of a wheel from a pickup belonging to A.D. Stephenson of Bogata and ordered to pay a \$250 fine and \$592 restitution for damage to the pickup, within six months, but the sentence was probated for one year.

Around The County

Deer Hunter Shortcourse "Deer from Hoof to Table" will be the topic at this year's Deer Hunter Shortcourse, Nov. 5, 1981. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Community Room of the Guaranty Bond State Bank, Mt. Pleasant.

Charles Ramsey, Wildlife Specialist from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss Field Dressing a Deer, Deer Meat Quality, and Processing and Wrapping. Home Economist, Hella Campbell and I will assist in the cutting and wrapping of a deer carcass. We will have recipes and cooking hints for everyone.

Amendment No. 5 Exempting livestock from property taxes is officially on the ballot as one of seven proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on Nov. 3. The amendment will have a significant impact on all cattle breeders, especially purebred breeders.

This amendment, now termed Proposition 5, will save cattlemen over \$4 per head in some taxing districts if passed. It could cost purebred breeders as much as \$400 a head if it fails.

Proposition 5 proposes to include livestock and poultry with other farm products already exempt from property (ad valorem) taxation. Even though many school districts and most counties do not tax livestock today, inflation and rising costs of government operation are forcing taxing jurisdictions to find ways of increasing their tax base.

Actions by over 20 counties, in the last year clearly indicate that taxing livestock will be one of the first additions to their expanding tax rolls.

4-H Beef Projects.

About this time each year, we remind 4-H club members and prospective members about the 4-H and FFA steer show held each April. Club members must select a high quality beef steer and have the animal on feed by early

November. The steer should weigh between 400 and 500 pounds now in order to reach the desired weight limits by show time.

There will be an official weigh-in in early December. The date has not been set yet, but calves are required to weigh a minimum of 450 pounds and not over 650 pounds at this official weigh-in.

As you might guess the purpose of this steer feeding project is to provide an opportunity for club members to learn more about the care, feeding showing of beef cattle. Training meetings will be held during the feeding period to assist parents and youth interested in this project.

If you know of anyone interested in having a steer project or a beef breeding project (bull or heifer) in 4-H, contact the Extension office (572-5201) for more information. Be sure to let us know if you already have calf or need help locating one.

There are quite a few youngsters who have not yet found calves suitable for the steer show, so if you have any "good" calves give us a call.

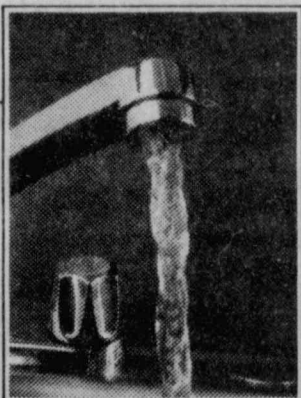

Rep. Patterson Selected For Water Committee

"Rep. Patterson is concerned about the blight of rural water cooperatives. His dedication and interest will make him an excellent member of this committee."

As we grow older we tend to look back on the times when we were young. Watching the football games over the weekend reminded me of some of the games I played in. One time I remember we were supposed to play Hughes Springs and I was sure counting on that game as they were one of our most heated rivals. They had beat us pretty bad the year before and we had been looking forward all year to playing them.

I had stayed out of school all week helping my Dad tear down and old house and I was sure that he would let me off for the big game, so you can imagine my surprise and how hurt I was when Dad told me that I had to work that day as he wanted to get the house all torn down so he could start on the new one that he was going to build in its place. I was supposed to be pulling nails and stacking the lumber and I don't think I pulled a half a gallon all day, as all I could do was to think about how bad I wanted to go and play in that game. I don't think that Dad got very much work done either as he had to spend most of his time telling me to get to work.

I got to go to town the next day at noon as nearly every one took off Saturday afternoon so they could do their shopping for the next week. Well, when I found out that we had gotten beat, I thought that if I had been there that we would have won although we had not won but about one or two games all year. When we won as many as five games a year, we had a good year. We only had about fifteen boys who were big enough to play football, so we had to play defense and offense. We had a boy who played center for us who would put him a big onion in the waist band of his uniform and when we were on defense he would rub the onion all over his hands and rub his hands in the other centers eyes so he could not see how to center the ball.

Sometimes he would forget the onion and he would scoop up a big hand full of dust to throw in the opposing centers eyes. At times the other guy would be a larger fellow and he would tell our center not to do that anymore and if he did he would be sorry, and that was usually enough to make him quit.

We did not win very many games but we had a lot of fun, and besides we got to miss a lot of classes that way.

School Board Meets With Tax Appraisal Board

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, October 13, 1981 at 7:30 p.m. Prior to the meeting, the Board inspected the partial air conditioning-heating project at the Talco Elementary School. This work has now been completed with the exception of some minor finishing work.

Members of the Red River County Tax Appraisal Board met with the school board to discuss the amount that the Talco-Bogata School District is paying toward the cost of the total appraisal work. A feeling had been expressed that the school district was not paying on the same basis as other taxing units in the county. Members of the school board expressed the feeling that the school district is paying according to law and the contract and agreements of the Appraisal Board and Southwestern Appraisal Company. The Board agreed to take the matter under advisement.

Gerald Capps, insurance servicing agent, met with the Board to review the amount of fire and liability coverage being carried by the school district on various buildings. A recommendation was made that an increase of 30 percent in the amount of coverage be considered. A final decision will be made on this matter at the November meeting.

The superintendent recommended and briefly reviewed an evaluation instrument to be used in the evaluation of teachers. Senat Bill 341 passed by the 67th Legislature now requires an annual evaluation of all certified school personnel and in case a recommendation is made for a nonrenewal of a term contract, reasons must be given and an opportunity for a hearing if requested. The evaluation instrument was approved by the Board as presented.

In other action, Board approval was given to the renewal of a contract with

the firm of McCreary and Huey for the collection of delinquent taxes. Amendments were approved to the award policy in the Student Handbook, and the various financial reports were approved. The board also gave approval to selling various surplus school vehicles by sealed bids. Four buses and two station wagons that are in various states of repair and condition will be sold by a single package bid. These vehicles may be inspected at the bus barn at the Talco School by contacting Lester Watts.

Cornelia Dickey, Tax assessor-collector, gave a brief report on the operation of the tax office with the comment that the auditors had stated that the office records and procedures were in good condition.

An executive session was held to discuss personnel matters and after returning to open session, approval was given to the employment of Pearl Spencer to work in the Rivercrest cafeteria.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, November 10, at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

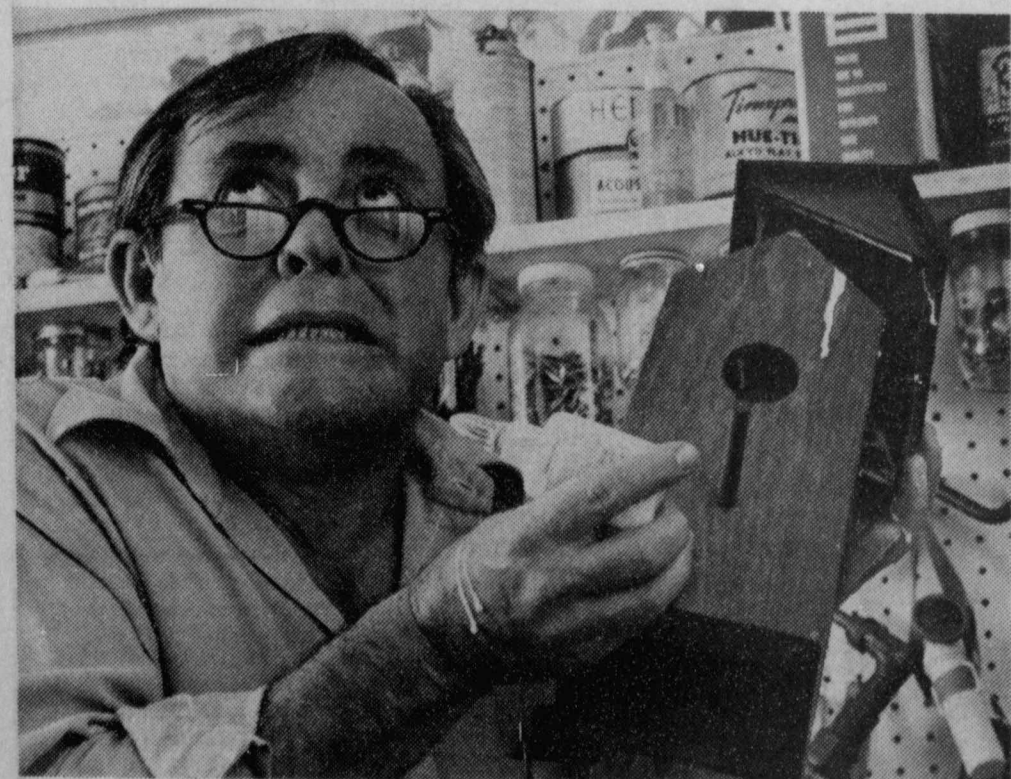
