Head Coach Milford Groves admitted that a little luck and a lot of prayers cleared the way for the Rebels to secure the championship. SOMETHING TO DO If you're over 60 and you're bored, check out the activities at the nearest Senior Citizens Center. Like others who are uneducated,

you might think that the Center serves only the poor. Not so. Senior Citizens Centers also serve the needy -the affluent needy-those individuals of active minds and restless energy who greatly need an outlet for their talents and creativity.

The activities of a particular Center, of course, depend upon its size and resources. If the community and the Center are small, activities are limited. In a metropolitan area, however, a variety of continuingéducation classes are offered-from painting and folk dancing to conversational French and bridge lessons. Programs may in-

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clude such subjects as Social Security, fire prevention, flower arranging, crime prevention and leather-

crafts. A small fee is usually charged for many of these activities.

Travel is often on the agenda, with one-day trips to vacation spots, museums and historic sites. There may be trips to baseball games, horse races and other sports events.

Some Centers provide a job service by serving as a clearing house for those who need part-time workers and those who are seeking part-time employment. Volunteers are often available to answer questions about Medicare and Medicaid, hospital and insurance plans, the Homestead Act and other matters of import to the senior citizen.
