

This Week's Money-Savers

The best buys at the supermarket meat counter are ground beef, pork and poul-

In the beef department you'll find a good buy on corned beef and some stores carry both corned round and brisket.

When purchasing a brisket, select a flat cut since it consists of one solid muscle with a minimum of fat.

Pork prices continue to be stable, but look for specials on pork loins.



## **BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Draft Inside Wall May**


The furnace in the old home we recently purchased is only five years old. The house is well heated, but it seems that the furnace is constantly switching on and off. A friend suggests we may have a faulty thermostat.

**Influence Thermostat** 

The thermostat could be faulty, but it may be working improperly because of air drafts inside the wall. Drafts inside the wall may seek outlet at the opening through which the wires are drawn. The periodic influx of cold air into the back of the thermostat signals the elements to switch on the furnace. Unscrew the thermostat and fill the opening behind it with firproof insulation and you may solve the problem.

When I visited the local lumber yard, I noticed that lumber was stored several different ways-some flat. some on end, and some in an "X" arrangement. I should have asked them about it, but didn't. Yet, I am

Lumber that is expected to remain undisturbed over a period of time is usually flat stacked. The pole stack, or crisscross method, saves space and allows the lumber to shed rainwater. The crisscross arrangement also allows maximum exposure of surfaces. The end stack method is generally used for seasoned wood and allows boards to be removed easily.



ARE WE STILL "PLAYING CHURCH"? November 22, 1981

Background Scripture: Ephesians 4. **Devotional Reading** Colossians 2: 8-15.

I don't know about you, but when I read the fourth chapter of Ephesians, I feel a deep sense of shame. The words are beautiful, but their power to judge us is fantastic. You don't even have to read the whole chapter to know what I mean:

. . . forbearing one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace " (4: 2, 3) "There is one body and one Spirit, ... one hope ... one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all " (4: 5-6)

. . the whole body, joined and knit together by every joint . . . makes bodily growth and upbuilds itself in love" (4: 16)

"Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, with all malice, and be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you." (4: 31,

No Longer Children

Read each of those passages along with your daily newspaper and you cannot escape the terrible knowledge that Christ's people on earth are projecting anything but the image of the

Church described in Ephesians. "Maintain the unity of the Spirit"? What unity? "Be kind to one another"? No, Christians are not kind to one another, they are contentious, judgmental, and devisive. "There is one body and one Spirit"? Hardly! There are many bodies, and it would seem, all contending that they alone possess the one Spirit.

Oh, to be sure, sometimes the Presbyterians, Methodists and U.C.C.'s get together for a service, or sit together with the Episcopalians and the Lutherans in a council of churches. Yes, and sometimes the Pentecostals sit down with the Baptists and the Church of God acknowledges the Nazarenes. And Roman Catholics and Protestants have buried the hatchet, haven't they? (-except in Northern Ireland, where they're burying one anoth-

The Truth In Love

But if you think that's what Ephesians 4 is all about, no wonder we're so divided. Ephesians 4 is speaking of a unity and love that does not issue into constant conflict and division. Ephesians 4 is the antithesis of Christians attacking each other, impugning each other's faith, deriding each other's efforts, and denouncing each other's discipleship.

The writer of Ephesians calls us to "mature manhood" (personhood) "so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro and carried about with every wind of doctrine . . (4: 13, 14). But, until we learn to accept our unity in Christ we will still be children "playing church."



# **Agricultural Update**

Commercial peach producers should spray their trees with Kocide 101 when about 75 percent of the leaves have fallen or when the leaves can be stripped off easily and with the hand, says Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultureal Extension Service. This is not a 100 percent cure-all, but will help in the control of bacterial leaf spot, Coryneium blight, peach leaf curl and bacterial canker.

Dr. James Robinson, Extension entomologist, says

that peach producers are running out of time for applying PDB crystals around peach trees for peach tree borer control. This treatment should be made within the next few days if possible Robinson also says that producers who are storing grain on the farm should inspect the grain for weevils and other stored grain insects. If more than one weevil is found per quart of grain, the infestation is great enough to warrant treatment





Reducing energy consumption can result in lower utility bills. If you'd like to see exactly how many kilowatt hours you have saved through your energy saving steps, you can easily monitor your electric meter, keeping weekly or monthly records.

Begin with the dial on your left, choosing the number the indicator has just passed. In the illustration, subtract the previous reading "88543" from the present reading "89018" to get the kilowatt hour usage. Be sure to record the dates the readings are taken, since the reading is good only for measuring kilowatt usage for the number of days between readings.
