Rivercrest Rebels Lose Bi-District Bid To Hawkins

The Rivercrest Rebels lost 34-14 to the Hawkins Hawks in the third consecutive year of Bi-District competition between the two teams. The Hawks, winners of District 19-AA and the Rebels, winners of District 20-AA, met for the third time at Tiger Stadium in Mt. Vernon.

The Hawks were smoking from the starting whistle, scoring on their first possession, then scoring again before the end of the first quarter.

Quarterback Jimmy Strickland began a passing assault just before the end of the first period, completing a 22 yard effort to Craig Clemmons, then firing to John Hines on the next play for 14 yards. Hines was brought down on the Hawkins 15 yard line, and the Rebels called on Jerry Merchant to take the football across the goal line.

The Rebels contained the Hawks on two series during the second quarter, forcing a

punt on the initial possession, then causing a turnover late in the period. Tony White fell on the football at the Rivercrest 40 yard line. The Rebels moved the football to the Hawkins 48 yard line before giving up the on downs just before the half time whistle blew.

The ability of the Rebels to capitalize on mistakes of the Hawks accounted for their second touchdown. The Hawks had just earned a first down on the Rivercrest 49 yard line, when Mark Mauldin fell on a loose football. Mauldin's alert play was followed by two 15 yard runs by Randy Galloway, which put the ball on the Hawk's 21 yard line. Merchant powered through the center of the line for the touchdown, and Galloway added the two points after.

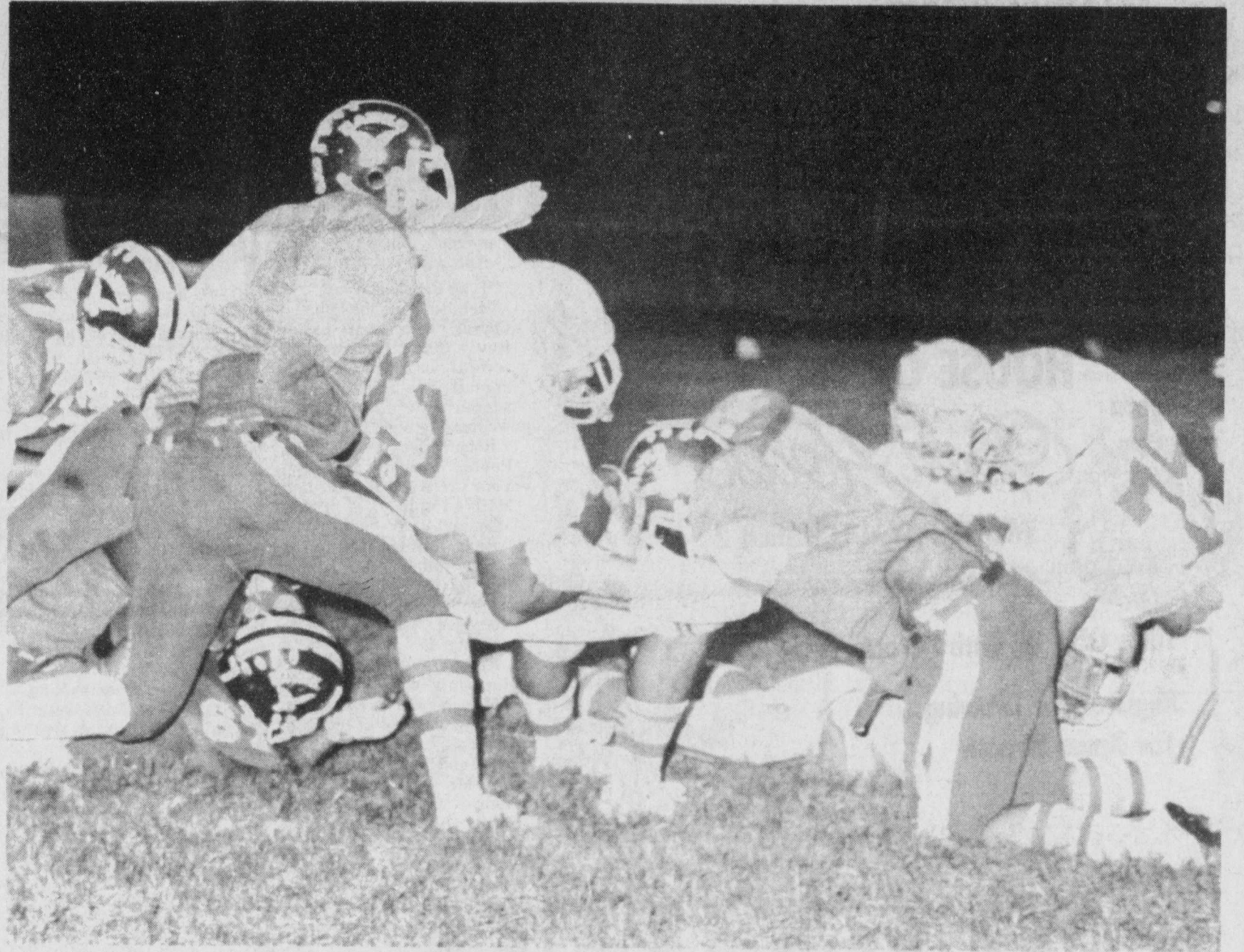
The Rebels contained the Hawks on one more series before Hawkins began a march from their own 27 yard line to the goal, a fourth

quarter score, and six of 18 points the Hawks were to put on the board during the period.

Highlights for the Rebels during the fourth quarter were two completed passes from Strickland to Larry Denny, one for 19 yards and another for 10 yards. Strickland also completed a pass for 10 yards to John Hines, but he was intercepted twice during the final minutes of the game.

Leading the Rebels defensively were Damon Ward, Bradley Moore, Barclay Powell, Charles Skaggs and James Noey.

The girls have two seniors starting this season, with three sophomores. They are working hard to

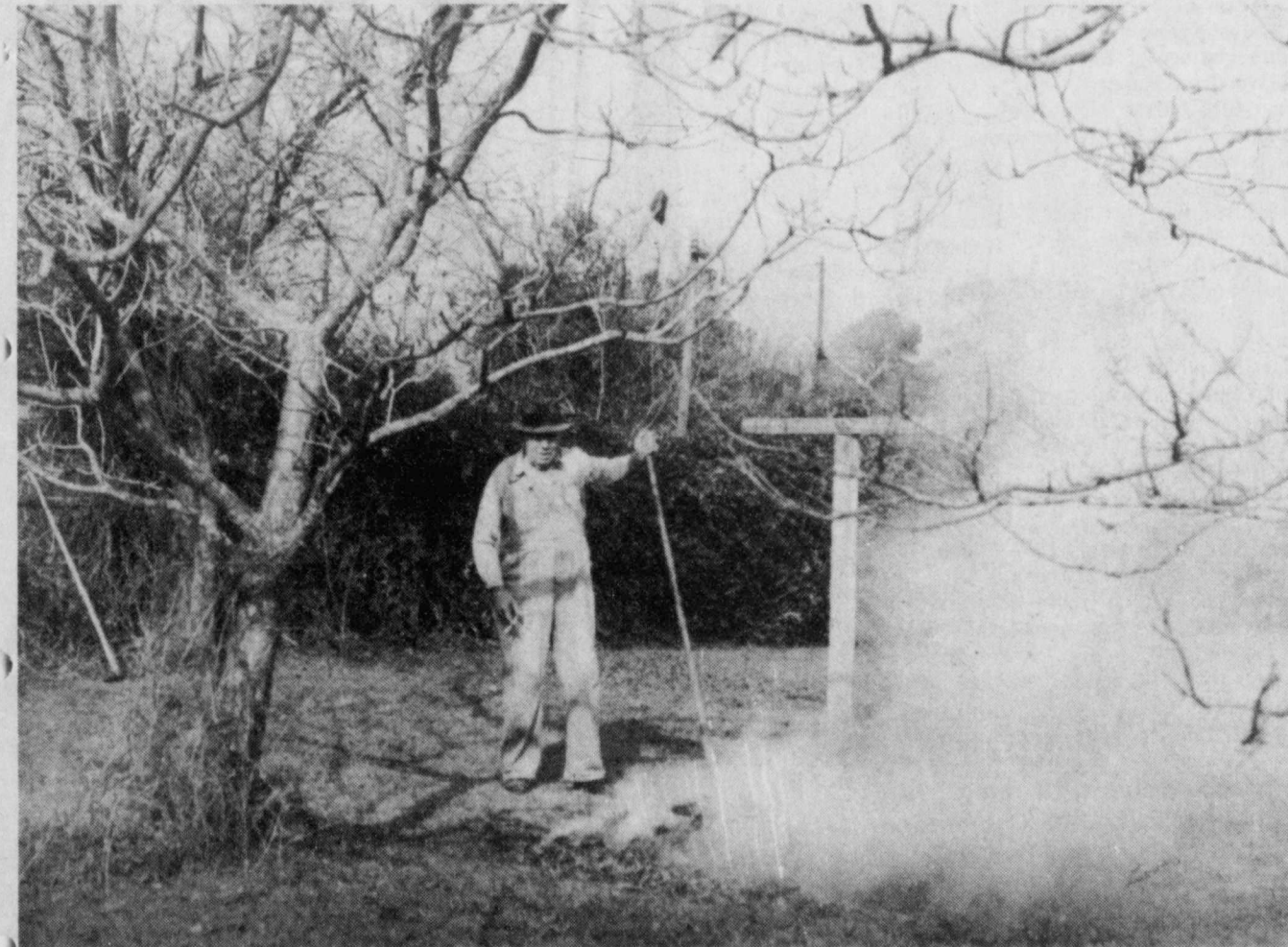
shape into the traditional Rebelette team of fast, hardplaying, accurate roundballers.

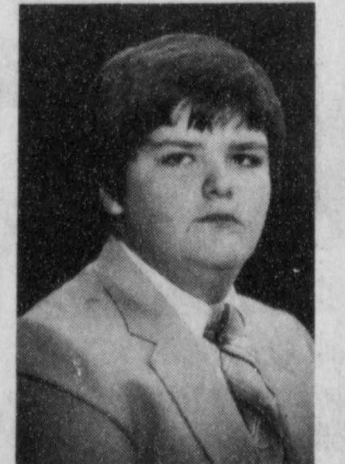

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.

Canada Geese Provide Reminder

Everyone is familiar with the V-shaped formation and lonesome honk of the Canada Goose going south in the fall or northward in the spring. They have long served as a reminder to East Texas of a forthcoming season change. Perhaps nothing can be more majestic than one of these formations, often quite large slowly winging their way from view. The Canada Goose is an alert, large bird with as much grace on the water as in the air. They do not, as some think, keep one leader at the front of the V flying formation. Rather, the strongest of the flock will take the position, which literally "splits" the air, providing a slip-stream in which the others can fly-thus the resulting V formation. Occasionally, as the front bird becomes weary, it drops back and another will take the forward position. On the ground, however, when they are feeding, there is always a sentinel on the alert. The wary birds feed on grains of all kinds, and upon water plants. They nest in the far northern reaches of the nation, mostly in Canada, but may be seen at many feeding and rest grounds during their yearly migration throughout the United States. People in this area have a unique opportunity to observe these handsome gray, black and white fowl by driving to the Gambill Goose Refuge near Paris. Sadly, lack of state funding interrupted the routine the geese had established for so many years, and their numbers, which at this time of year used to be in the near thousands, is down to a few hundred, but attempts are being made to re-establish the refuge. When confronted on the ground, especially when the geese have young, both varieties are formidable enemies. They will defend themselves, their mates or their young with much hissing and wing fanning, and can literally take a "chunk" out of dog or man! The large fowl mate for life, and many instances of one feeding and guarding another while it is ill or wounded are authenticated. The Canada goose is a stately, dignified bird which enriches the lives of more people than most birds. One does not have to be a bird enthusiast to appreciate the mournful, memory evoking sound of the graceful V-shape of wings and sound as it wends its way across our Texas sky.

Lettuce has gone up a bit in price, so why not switch to Waldorf salads or cole slaw until prices moderate again. If the recent jump in bread prices poses a problem for you, look for bargains at discount outlets or stores with their own bread. If you have storage space, purchase enough bread to last three to four weeks. Bread to be kept more than a few days should be re-wrapped and stored in the freezer. Bread without preservatives and unrefrigerated will mold quickly during humid weather. Check bargain produce. Often bargain vegetables simply mean wilted leaves have been trimmed and the vegetable has been repackaged for quick sale. Fruits or vegetables with a few blemishes may be a bargain but avoid moldy food. Mold spreads quickly and may not necessarily be restricted to one area on the fruit.
