Christmas Eve or Christmas morning? Whichever, the time is near and the time will soon be past. "I'll be glad when its over," is an expression heard often about this time of the year. Christmas does make some very real demands on us, doesn't it?

And yet, what a wonderful time of the year it is! Can you imagine a year without a Christmas? What a sad thought!

## Rebels Win Consolation

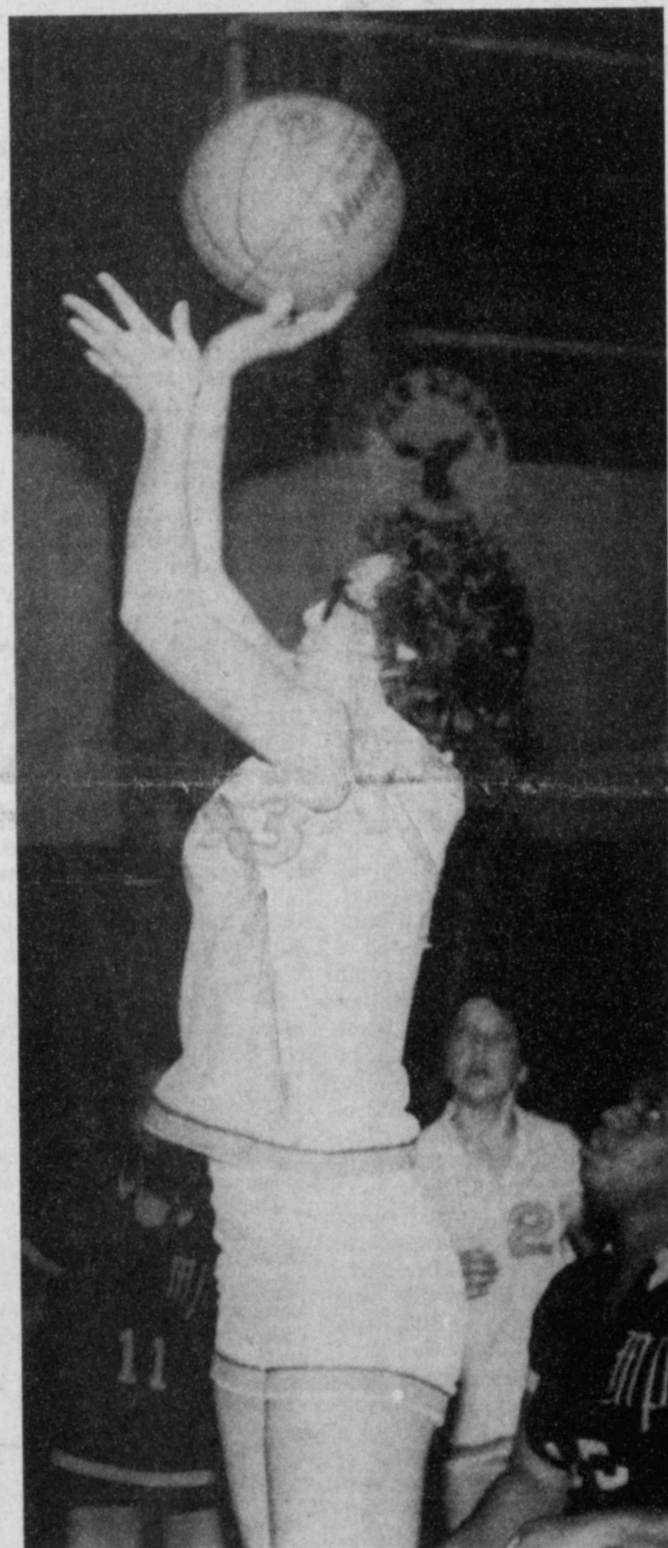
The Rivercrest Rebels won their second trophy of the year as they beat Quitman 54-52 in a thrilling game for consolation at the Mount Vernon Tourney. This raised the Rebel's season record to 6-4. In the final game it was a good team performance for the Rebels as all players contributed to the victory. Rebel point guard Stan Wood had 20 points to pace the Rebel's scoring with 16 of them coming in the second half. The Rebs were down four at the half, but their pressing defense began to wear on Quitman during the fourth quarter, and forced Quitman into numerous turnovers. At one time the Rebels led by five, but two careless back court violations on the part of the Rebels gave Quitman new life. However, the Rebels held on for a sweet 54-52 win.

Comments by Coach Wood: Our kids are playing hard and hustling good. We just have not hit our stride yet. We are at least a week behind all the other teams in our district, and it is very hard to make up for missed time. I believe our kids are willing to pay the price and catch up.

Our district is looking very tough. New Diana is beating everyone and now stands at 8-0 after winning the two tournaments they have entered. Talk is that New Diana is as good as the defending state champs, Sabine, the team that beat Rivercrest in bi-district last year and went on to win state.

Ore City, as expected, is strong again, having lost to New Diana in the finals of New Diana's Tourney by only ten. Ore City is

averaging around 80 points per game and they are going to be hard to beat. Maud and Redwater are both tough. No report is available on Harmony and Jewett. Our district race will be really a tough fight. I just hope our kids develop and we can be a contender. Right now, New Diana would have to be the favorite, followed by Ore City, and then Maud, Redwater, and Rivercrest battling for third. However, it really depends on which team improves the most and plays good when it counts.

## Judge Pesek Hears Guilty Pleas

On Monday, December 21, 1981, District Judge Leon F. Pesek from Texarkana, after hearing guilty pleas, sentenced four Defendants as follows:

The probation of Fredrick Dellmond Jolley, Jr. was revoked because he had committed a subsequent offense, and he was sentenced to four years in prison, no probation. Mr. Jolley was also sentenced to two years in prison for Felony Jail Escape, but Judge Pesek set this sentence to run concurrently with Jolley's other sentence because Jolley came back to the jail house voluntarily and surrendered himself.

Clarence Ray Garrison of Clarksville was sentenced to five years probation for the August 15, 1981 theft of two disassembled metal 5700

bushel capacity grain storage bins from John P. Warkentin near Fulbright and was ordered to pay \$569.06 restitution, most of the property having been recovered.

Kerry Melvin Duncan of Idabel, Oklahoma was sentenced to one year in the Red River County Jail for theft of a calf from Ernest Butler of the Manchester community on November 7, 1981. Duncan was not eligible for probation because he has a prior felony conviction.

Claude Barry Patt of Clarksville was sentenced to five years probation for the December 15, 1981 burglary of the Blackmon John Deere Service Center in Clarksville and ordered to pay \$83.50 restitution, most of the tools taken having been recovered.

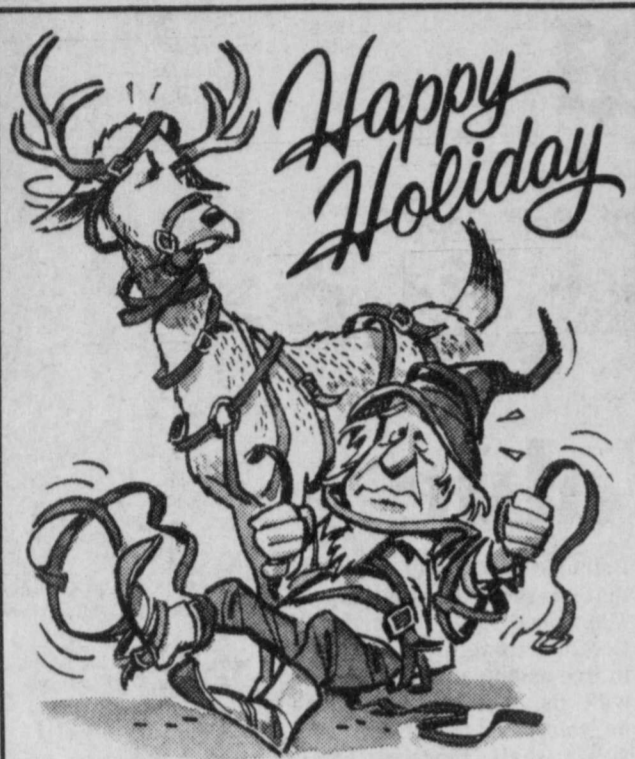

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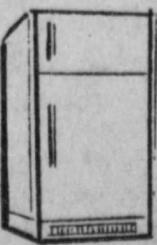
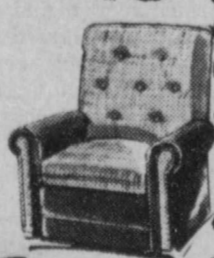

After a brief wedding trip, the couple will be at home in Lewisville where both are employed.

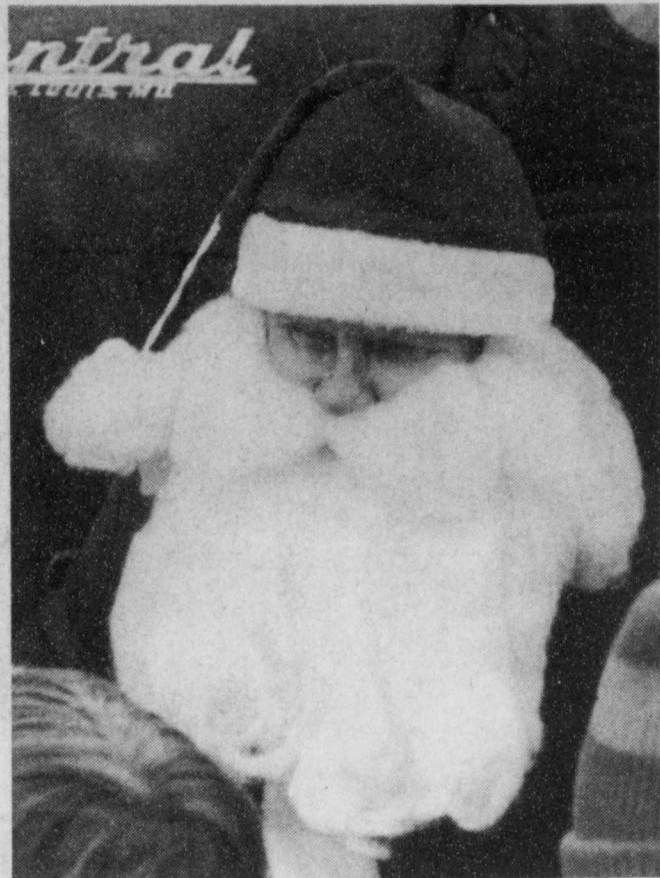

The senior play "No Room at the Inn" and children's skits were under the direction of Mrs. Charley Roberts and Mrs. Donald Jones.

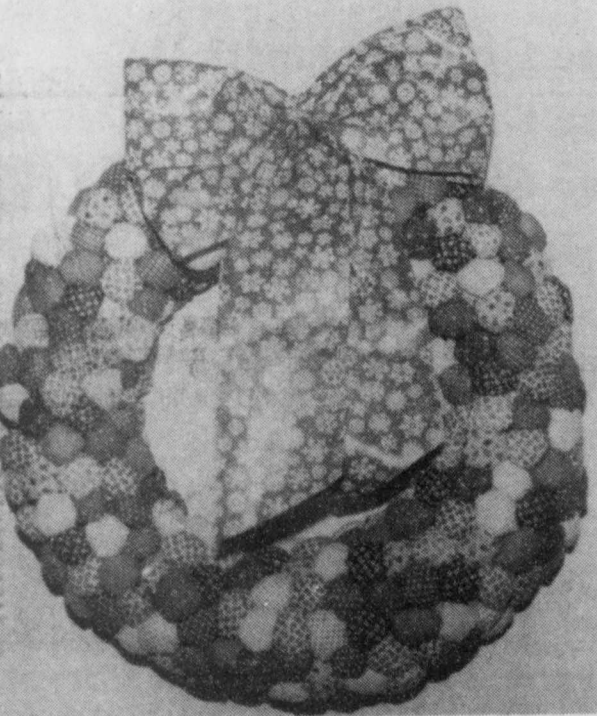
"Gifts you can give that won't cost a Thing" was presented in song and skit by Gavin Barnett, Amanda Stansell, Wendy and Lacey Jones.

#### COMFORT EGGNOG FAMILY RECIPE

- 6 egg yolks
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 cups Southern Comfort
- 3 cups heavy or whipping cream
- 1/2 cup brandy
- 6 cups milk (1 1/2 qts.)
- 6 egg whites

Beat egg yolks until thick and fluffy. Gradually beat in sugar, then Southern Comfort. Cook the custard mixture over simmering water, beating constantly, until thick and foamy, about 7 minutes. Chill.

Just before serving, whip cream until thick and fluffy; then beat in brandy. Stir milk into chilled custard. Gently fold whipped cream into custard. Whip egg whites until stiff and shiny; gently fold into custard mixture. Make 32 servings, about 5 ounces each.

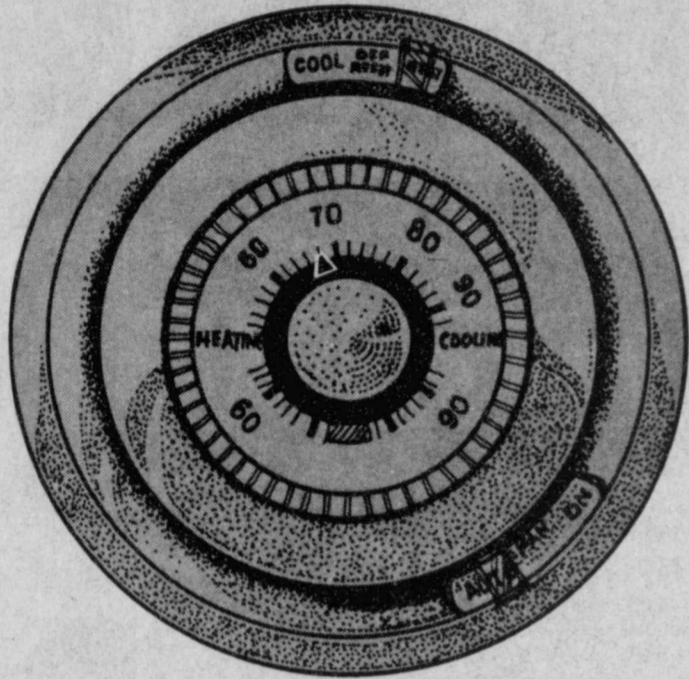

#### CLASSIC SWISS FONDUE

4 cups (1 pound) shredded Swiss cheese  
 1/4 cup all-purpose flour  
 1 clove garlic, halved  
 2 cups sauterne wine\*  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 cup kirsch OR dry sherry (optional)  
 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
 Dash freshly grated nutmeg

Toss together cheese and flour. Rub inside of a 3-quart saucepan with garlic; discard garlic. Add wine and heat until bubbles rise. Add cheese, 1/2 cup at a time, over medium-low heat, stirring until cheese is melted after each addition. Add salt, kirsch, Worcestershire sauce and nutmeg. Transfer to fondue pot. Serve with cubes of French bread, vegetable dippers, cooked ham cubes or cooked shrimp. Yield: approx. 3 1/2 cups.

\*Note: White grape juice may be substituted for the sauterne wine.

#### BEST BUY

Ground beef must contain a minimum of 70 percent lean meat per pound. There are regulations covering beef that is ground and packaged in a Federal or State inspected plant. A product labeled "ground beef" cannot have extra fat, water, extenders or binders added to the meat. Seasonings may be added, however, as long as they are identified on the label.

A product labeled "hamburger" is made of ground beef that does have seasonings and pieces of beef fat added as the meat is being ground. Again, no water, extenders or binders may be added.

One exception: Beef that is ground and labeled in the supermarket, may not have to conform to these or any other definitions.

However, since consumer satisfaction is important to a supermarket, their products usually conform pretty closely to federal and state standards.

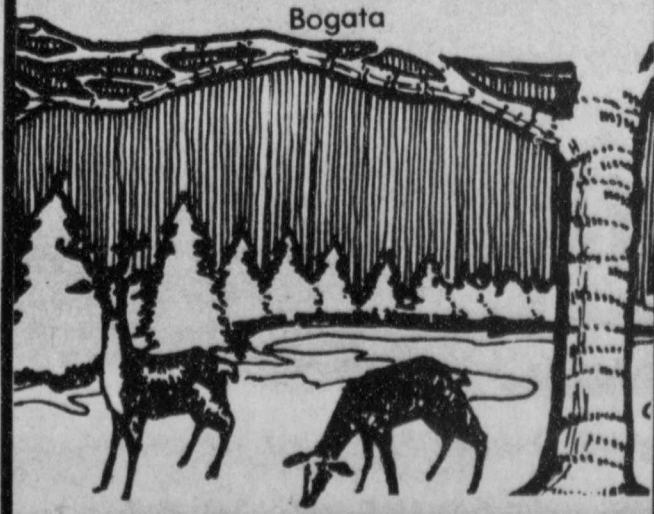

CRC Circle M dedicated the new Rig 201 with a barbeque lunch for friends and customers November 30 as it drilled for Dalco Petroleum Ltd., the ITEX operator, in the Chalk Hill Field of Rusk County, 15 miles southeast of Kilgore. 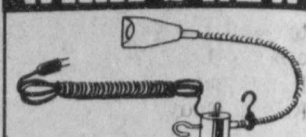

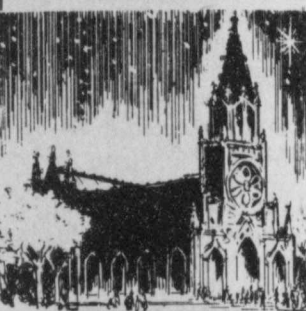

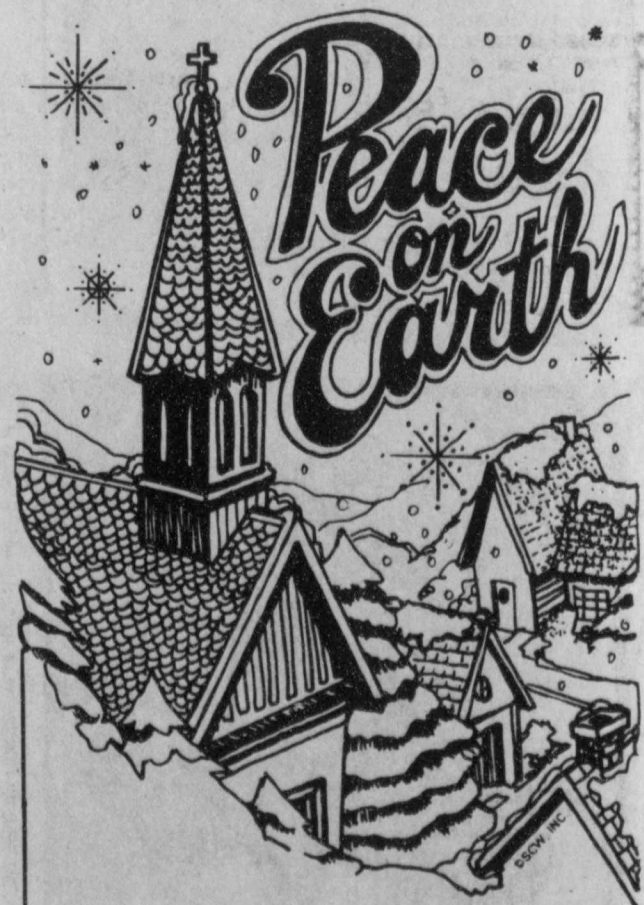

### November Accident Statistics Released

Captain J.A. Dumas has released accident statistics for November 1981, for the eleven county area comprising highway patrol district I-A. The summary shows an increase of only 2.9 percent over 1980, with only six fatalities for the month compared to 12 deaths for last year; however, total deaths for the year are up 12.1 percent over the eleven month period last year. Rockwall and Hunt counties each had two fatal accidents resulting in one death in each accident. Other counties with deaths in rural areas were Tarrant and Grayson with one each.

Denton County with 55 accidents heads the list followed by Grayson with 41, Kaufman 35, Collin 34, Cooke 32, Hunt 31, Lamar 25, Tarrant 16, Fannin 12, Rockwall six and Delta County recorded only one accident for the month. One hundred sixty people were injured in one hundred five injury accidents during the month, showing a slight decrease in injuries. The one car accident has claimed the most lives so far this year, indicating a speed too fast for driving conditions at the time of the accident. Accidents and injuries are most often occurring at night or at

a time such as foggy conditions when visibility is restricted. Captain Dumas asks motorists to be alert when driving, especially during inclement weather conditions and make sure your windows are clear for better visibility. He also states that 98.5 percent of those killed last year were not wearing their seat belts. Several fatalities which have occurred this month could easily have been prevented if drivers had been wearing seat belts. The DPS will have all available units in service over the coming holiday periods to assist the motoring public and enforcing traffic laws.

### Drug Laws Take Effect

Patients visiting their physicians and pharmacists will find some changes in the way drugs are prescribed and dispensed beginning January 1, 1982, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Two new state laws will allow the substitution of generic drugs for brand-name drugs in many cases, and will require physicians prescribing certain narcotics to fill out a new form. The form is designed to discourage both the diversion of prescription drugs to street use, particularly by drug users pretending to be ill, and the possibility of abuse in prescription writing.

In approving the generic drug law, the Texas Legislature's stated intent is to save patients money on prescriptions. The legislation allows pharmacists, with the physician's permission, to substitute a cheaper, "generically equivalent" drug for the brand-name drug. The substitute also must produce a therapeutic effect of the same strength and duration as the brand-name drug.

To allow the generic substitution, physicians first must give approval on the prescription by signing the blank labeled "Product selection permitted." (The other option is to require the brand-name drug by signing the blank labeled "Dispense as written.") If "product selection" is permitted, the pharmacist can substitute with a cheaper, generic drug—but only if the patient agrees. Before delivering the medication, the pharmacist must inform the patient orally or by a posted sign—that a substitution can be made. The patient has the right to refuse it.

The law also stipulates that the pharmacist cannot substitute unless the cost to the consumer for the generic product is less than that of the brand-name product prescribed. Some drugs are not subject to substitution.

The second law, part of Gov. Bill Clements' "War on Drugs" program, will prohibit physicians from prescribing or administering certain narcotics and other drugs directly to patients (except those hospitalized) without completing a triplicate prescription. The doctor and the pharmacist each will keep one copy, and the third will go to the Texas Department of Public Safety. The form will include the date the prescription was written; the drug prescribed, dosage and instructions for use; and the patient's name, address and age. The information is intended to aid the DPS in its efforts against illegal drug use. This computerized information will be available only to investigators from the licensing boards for physicians, dentists, podiatrists and veterinarians, and to authorized DPS officers investigating suspected criminal drug violations. The DPS officers, however, must have the appropriate licensing board's approval.

Some of the drugs covered by the law include amobarbital, amphetamine, cocaine, codeine, meperidine, methadone, methaqualone, morphine, opium, oxycodone, pentobarbital and secobarbital.

Registration for the spring semester is scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, January 6 and 7 at Paris Junior College, according to Max Mabry, director of counseling. Students may register from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. both days in the Rheudasil Learning Center on campus, Mabry said. An evening registration will be held Thursday, January 7 at 6 p.m. in the center.

Daytime and evening courses in numerous academic and technical-vocational areas will be taught Monday through Thursday during the spring term. Classes will begin January 11 and the semester will end May 12. Prospective students should have transcripts and medical records on file at PJC before registering, Mabry said.

In addition to the courses in Paris, PJC will offer evening courses in Bonham, Sulphur Springs, Greenville and Mount Pleasant this spring. A complete schedule of all courses and times offered is available at the college.

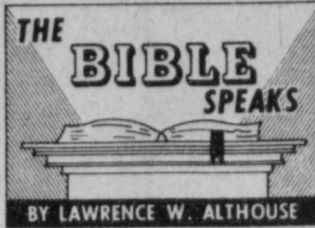

### FINDING THE MESSIAH December 27, 1981

Background Scripture:  
Mark 8: 27-29; Luke 24: 25, 26; John 2: 35-42; 7: 25-31.  
Devotional Reading:  
Colossians 1: 3-14.

#### "We have found the Messiah!"

Thus said the Galilean fisherman to his brother, Simon Peter. According to John's Gospel (1: 35-42), Andrew had gone out into the wilderness to see this man they were calling John the Baptist. He had heard John say of Jesus, "Behold, the lamb of God" (1: 36). With a companion Andrew had followed Jesus for some distance before Jesus turned and asked, "What do you seek?" And Andrew and his companion replied, "Rabbi (which means Teacher), where are you staying?" What they were saying to him was that they wanted to be his followers.

#### Andrew Found Simon

Yet, although Andrew called Jesus "Rabbi," when he found his brother Simon Peter, he didn't call Jesus a Rabbi, but "the Christ." Andrew had already decided that Jesus was the long-awaited Messiah, an expectation that appeared repeatedly in the Old Testament.

#### So what was the Messiah?

"As a Jew, Andrew and Simon Peter probably knew that the term "Messiah" meant different things to different people. In Hebrew the word literally meant "the anointed one." Such a person was someone specially set apart and designated by God for a particular mission or task. The anointing rite was a symbol of God's selection.

Andrew and Simon Peter probably also knew that the Messiah was often identified with a king, because it was the king who was in the position to bring help and deliverance to the nation. King David had been God's "anointed" and, according to the prophet Isaiah, so had been Cyrus, the King of Persia who freed the people of Israel from their Babylonian bondage. So the Messiah would be someone chosen and sent from God to bring deliverance to the people of Israel.

#### When Christ Appears

But what kind of "deliverance"? To be sure, many Jews looked for someone to deliver them from bondage to Rome. But others looked, not only for physical salvation, but for spiritual deliverance as well. Still others looked for a Messiah who would bring the apocalypse — a time when the earth would be cleared of its temporal kingdoms and in their place erected the kingdom of God.

We cannot know just what Andrew meant when he said "We have found the Messiah." Yet, it is not so important what Andrew meant as it is what we mean when we call Jesus the Christ. Our situations and needs in life are different and thus the meaning of the Christ for us will vary somewhat. Jesus is the Christ because God sent him to heal our brokenness and we are broken in mind, in body, in spirit and in relationships. We experience broken families, broken homes, broken communities and live in a broken world. The Christ is the one anointed by God to heal our brokenness wherever he finds it.

It matters little that Andrew and Simon Peter discovered in Jesus their Christ, unless we too can say with them: "I have found the Messiah!"

**Workshop Set At PJC**

A workshop for persons involved in health care of dependent patients is planned on Saturday, January 16, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Paris Junior College, according to Nancy Jackson, facilitator for allied health programs in continuing education. Purpose of the workshop is to assess management practices of the dependent patient in bed or wheelchair and to prevent decubitus ulcers and contractures. Mrs. Jackson explained.

The instructor will be Rudy L. Morton, certified corrective therapist who is education coordinator with the rehabilitation medicine service, V.A. Medical Center in Marlin, Texas. He has presented courses and workshops on rehabilitation therapy in Texas, California, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii and other states.

Fee for the workshop is \$10, to be paid in advance by mailing a check payable to PJC to Mrs. Jackson, PJC, Paris, Texas 75460, or going by her office in the Downtown Center. The course will be held in the Student Center Ballroom at PJC, and CEAP approval has been requested.

Included will be a critical evaluation of turning schedules and body positioning and causal factors of decubitus ulcers and contractures. Students will learn to define reactive hyperemia to understand classifications of decubitus ulcers, to learn alternatives to side lying or supine positioning and to practice the most effective ways to transfer dependent patients.

**Ham 'N Turkey Sandwiches**

2 cups Bisquick baking mix  
1/2 cup milk  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil

### Weekly Ag Update

Scale insects are still infesting some ornamentals in the area. Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Overton, says that pesticides labeled for scale control can still be used with fairly good results if the air temperature is above 50 degrees. However, dormant oil is probably the best during the winter months. It should be applied when temperatures are between 40 and 60 degrees F. and a freeze is not expected for at least 48 hours.

Robinson also urges homeowners and producers to clean pesticide application equipment so that it will be ready to use next spring. A thorough washing with soap

and water is effective in most instances. Ammonia is an effective detoxifying agent and may be added to the water. An application of light oil to movable parts will keep them from sticking and rusting.

Any unused pesticide should be stored in a safe, dry place, preferably behind locked doors. Be especially careful to store pesticides out of reach of children. All pesticide containers should have a label and be well sealed. Taking a few extra precautions now may prevent grief later.

#### Thoughts About Next Spring's Vegetable Garden

The debate carries on and at this point in time there appears a fairly equal division of opinions as to whether the 1981-82 winter season will be moderate and short-lived or cold, long and hard. For the avid vegetable gardener, it is always long. One can spend only so much time poring over seed catalogues and outlining a garden plot on paper.

There may be things that need doing, however. In the warm climates of the southern states some garden work now can set the stage for increased quality and production next growing season. Plant stalks, vines, weeds and stems left in the garden serve as a winter home for both insect eggs and disease organisms. These should be removed, or shredded and used as part of a mulch. When weather and soil conditions permit, the garden spot should be tilled or roughly plowed. Plowing destroys debris that contains disease organisms or insects'

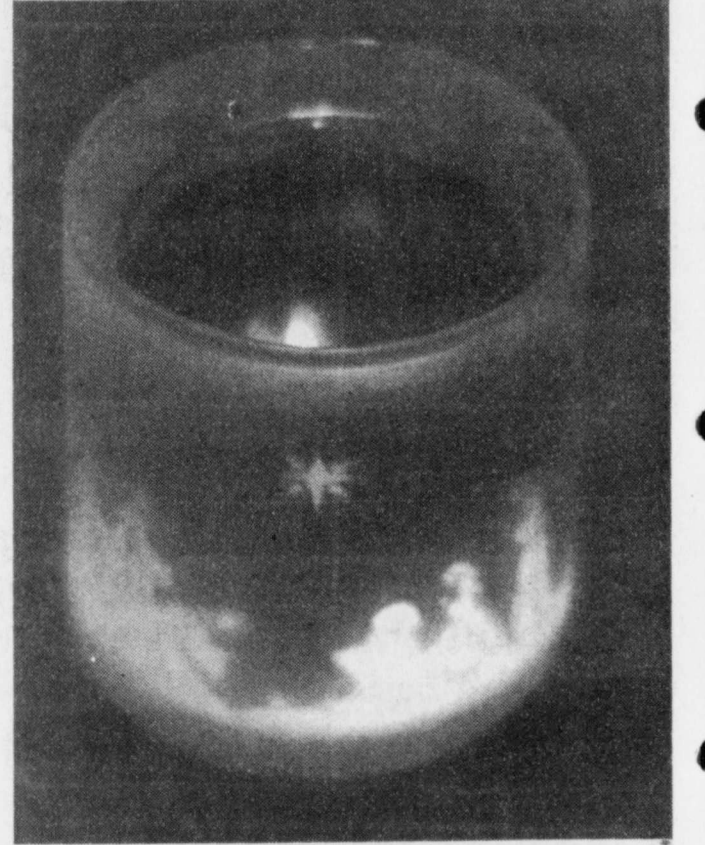
His teams have won all-city and district several times, but this is the first time in his career or in the history of Lake Highlands that they have gone farther than the regional playoffs.

**Holidays May Be Hazardous For Travelers**

The Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 89 persons may perish on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, asked Texas drivers to make this holiday season the safest in recent years.

"Nothing would please us more than to get through these holidays with far fewer fatalities than we project," Adams said. "We can reduce the number of fatalities if more drivers will moderate their speed, refrain from using alcohol or drugs if they plan to drive and make sure everyone in the vehicle wears a seat belt."

The DPS estimated that 51 persons would die in motor vehicle accidents during the Christmas holiday weekend and another 38 people would be killed during the New Year holiday weekend. Both holiday periods are 78 hours long.

Adams said 64 persons died in traffic crashes during the Christmas holiday period last year. Motor vehicle accidents claimed 58 lives over the New Year's holiday weekend.

During the first nine months of this year, 151,261 persons received injuries in Texas traffic accidents.

"That's an increase of slightly over 10 per cent compared to the same period in 1980," Adams said. "More than 19,000 of those people received serious, incapacitating injuries."

Traffic deaths over the same period totaled 3,378, an increase of almost six percent compared to the first nine months of last year.

The DPS director said that during the first six months of 1981, more than 98 percent of the persons killed in passenger vehicles were not wearing seat belts.

"A head-on crash at only 30 mph hurls a person's body forward with the same force

as a fall from a third story window," Adams pointed out. "A buckled seat belt keeps passengers from striking their head or another part of their body and prevents serious injury."

Adams also recommended that before traveling, children under four years of age or weighing less than 40 pounds should be strapped into an approved child restraint seat.

"This would be a very sensible and perhaps lifesaving gift for an infant or small child from a caring parent or grandparent," he

said.

The DPS director said all available troopers would be on patrol duty during the fatality counting periods. For Christmas, the count will begin at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 24 and end at midnight Sunday, December 27. The New Year's period starts at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 31 and ends at midnight Sunday, January 3, 1982.

The DPS headquarters in Austin will release information on the various accidents as part of the "Operation Motorcade" Program.



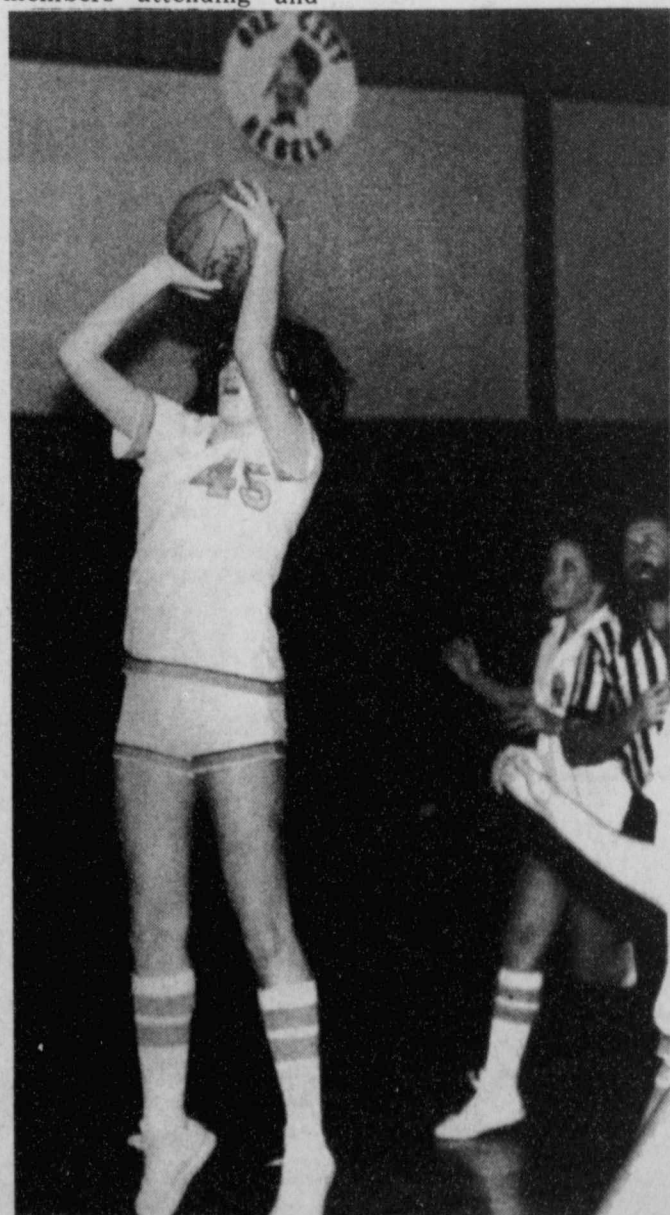
