





A WINTER CHECKLIST

Take a peek into the attic to check for insulation. Proper insulation can cut hearing cost by up to 50%. Make sure you have enough insulation to meet the R-value requirements for your area.

Check for air leaks. Seal cracks around 2. windows and doors with caulking and weatherstripping. Also check wall outlets, switch plates and attic doors that admit unwanted cold air. Switch plates and outlets can be stuffed with fireproof insulation, and attic doors sealed with weatherstripping.

Have a qualified heating serviceman 3. check your heating unit for safe and efficient functioning. Change the filter on the heating unit monthly.

Lower your heating thermostat setting to 4. 68, the most efficient and economical setting. Each degree you lower your thermostat gives you 6 to 8 percent savings on heating cost.

Provide proper attic ventilation to keep insulation dry. Don't seal off turbine vents with plastic bags, or close off eaves vents. Preventing moisture buildup keeps insulation effective.

The traditional initial basic three-minute period rate has been eliminated in the new tariff. Instead, an initial first-minute period has been established, followed by a lower perminute cost thereafter.

A service charge for operator-assisted intrastate calls has been published. It is broken down into three different categories, making a credit card call the least expensive.

A 35 cent charge will be station credit card calls, to earlier this month. which the per-minute distance rate is then added. A person-to-person credit card call which requires the operator will be treated cost. Continental Telephone customers who must place same as before. their credit card calls with

an operator through a toll center, however, will be charged the basic 35-cent rate up front.

An operator-assisted station-to-station call will now carry a published service charge of \$1.10 plus the per-minute rate. The cost of having an operator place a person-to-person call is now \$2.65 before the conversation "message unit" begins.

The new tariff also introduces a billing charge for operator assistance in dialing a local call.

'We used to have a dial rate and an operator rate," a Continental Telephone spokesman said, trying to explain the new filing. "Now we have a service charge with a dial rate." In the new structure, however, "discounts apply to all perminute rates instead of being restricted," the spokesman
